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ALUMNI UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH GRANTS AWARDED - - -

Undergraduate research grants ranging from \$150 to \$180 were awarded to six students in December. The grants were made possible by a \$1,000 grant established by the OU Alumni Council with funds from the 1969 Alumni Fund.

Lewis N. Pino, Director of Research Services, said he hopes continued support will permit the university to make the awards an annual event. He said such a program is rare at the undergraduate level.

Paul T. Elder of Sterling Heights to study the toxic effect on the heart of emetin, an alkaloid medicine once commonly prescribed for amoebic infestations in man.

Bruce Zellers of Rochester to test a thesis concerning the roots of social and political unrest during the Revolutionary War era.

Kathleen Dykzeul of Rochester to do a painting in a new style know as "environmental art."

Sarah L. Krauss of Royal Oak for a study to attempt to determine whether there is a differentiation in the length and type of sentence given to men convicted of approximately the same crimes as women.

William A. Denham III of Royal Oak to establish a computer program for statistical analysis of turnover and tenure of Michigan state legislators.

1970 ALUMNI ANNUAL FUND - - -
