SUMMER HOURS BEGIN ON JUNE 23

Beginning June 23, the work schedule of most employees will be adjusted to provide for earlier starting times, shorter lunch periods, and earlier quitting times. The new schedule will be

The adjustments are being made to minimize the impact of operating without air conditioning this summer by arranging for most employees to leave work earlier in the afternoon. The decision to operate without air conditioning during the summer months was recently made to meet reductions required in the university budget.

In rearranging schedules, the necessity of some offices and operations to continue on the present schedule or to maintain variable schedules to meet special service requirements will, of course, be recognized. However, there will be exceptions, and most offices and operations will move to a normal schedule of 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. with a lunch period of thirty minutes duration between 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. Afternoon and evening schedules in those offices and operations that maintain afternoon and evening services will also be adjusted forward.

Before the new schedules are officially put into effect, employees will be advised of their specific schedules by their supervisors.

CHILD CARE, TODDLER CENTERS NAMED FOR LOWRY

Oakland University's successful Child Care and Toddler Centers have been placed under one administrative unit and renamed the Matthew R. Lowry Early Childhood Center. Dedication ceremonies

The Matthew R. Lowry Early Childhood Center is named in memory of the former teacher and codirector of the Toddler Center. Lowry died July 3, 1974, from injuries sustained in a June 28 auto accident.

The recent action by the Board of Trustees places administrative responsibilities for the new center under the School of Education. The school had operated the Toddler Center since 1972. The Division for Student Affairs had operated the Child Care Center since 1962. The two facilities are in neighboring buildings on the west side of Adams Road and north of Butler Road.

Both programs have been very successful. The School of Education's early childhood education program has been cited by the U.S. Office of Education as a programmatic model.

The toddler program is for children between the ages of 15 months to two and one-half years. The child care program is for children between two and one-half through five years of age.

**COLLEAGUES HONOR
KEN MEADE ON MAY 29**

Ken Meade, assistant to the dean, School of Engineering, will be honored by his colleagues at a Meadow Brook Hall reception and dinner starting at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 30.

Meade is retiring on July 1 after eight years of service at OU and more than 50 years of service to the engineering profession. He is a past president and fellow of the Engineering Society of Detroit, a member of the Board of Governors of Cranbrook Institute of Science, vice president and secretary of the Executive Committee of the Thomas Alva Edison Foundation, and a member of the American Society for Engineering Education and of the American Association of Physics Teachers.

During his long career, he has taught at the high school and university level and served in a number of supervisory positions.

He was assistant head of the technical exhibits department and director of the education and training program for research laboratories for GM from 1934-41, and from 1941-50 he was director of college and university relations and salaried personnel placement activity on the GM Central Office Staff. He was named personnel director of the GM Technical Center in 1950, and in 1952 Meade became manager of the educational relations section of the public relations staff.

DESPITE ECONOMIC CLIMATE, FINANCIAL AID LOOKS GOOD

"Students should not be discouraged from pursuing their education for the lack of financial resources," Gladys Rapoport, director of financial aid, said.

"Some people have concluded because of the deteriorating economic climate in southeastern Michigan that aid opportunities for fall of 1975 will likewise be diminished. Such is not the case," she said.

"Any student having difficulty in meeting educational expenses should make an application for assistance at the Financial Aid Office," she reported. Aid resources for next fall are not likely to decline.

All students who did not attend post-secondary educational institutions before April 1, 1973, should file an application for a Basic Educational Opportunity Grant, the key request needed for receiving aid, she said.

This fall, freshmen, sophomores, and juniors will be eligible for Basic Grants that are the foundation upon which other financial aid eligibility is calculated, she explained. The Financial Aid Office will assist any student in calculating educational expenses for next school year. Oakland University's financial aid program is consistent with federal guidelines in that it assists the most needy students first. "No student should automatically assume that he or she cannot continue his education solely because of lack of finances. Any decision of this nature should be made only after the student has obtained all available facts," the director said. The Financial Aid Office located in 205 Wilson Hall is open five days a week, Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. until noon, and from 1 until 5 p.m. Special evening hours will be announced later in the year.

DYKES HEADS OU AFRO-AMERICAN PROGRAM

DeWitt S. Dykes, Jr., associate professor of history at Oakland University, has been appointed coordinator of Afro-American Studies at the institution.

Dykes has taught both Afro-American and American history at OU for six years. He previously taught for four years in the American Thought and Language Department at Michigan State University.

The Afro-American Studies Program began in 1974. It is an interdepartmental concentration of courses analyzing the history, literature, art, music, sociology, economics, and politics of Afro-Americans. It is designed as a supplement to any major in the university. Completion of seven courses (28 semester hours) constitutes a "concentration" in Afro-American Studies and results in a notation on the student's transcript and degree.
