SENATE APPROVES ADMISSIONS REFORMS

In a meeting last Wednesday the University Senate approved proposals designed to increase enrollment of academically and economically disadvantaged students. The approved measures include: (1) establishing alternate admissions criteria to admit students with high school grade point averages of less than 2.00; (2) intensifying the summer orientation program and the fall-winter academic support program to provide more counseling and tutorial help for disadvantaged students; (3) aiming for recruitment of 5 to 10 percent of the freshman class in the GPA category of less than 2.50, and (4) making "all efforts...to insure that at least 15 percent of all new students (freshmen and transfers) are black." The Senate approved establishment of a non-matriculation category for individuals wishing to take a course without entering a degree granting program. Details are to be completed, but it is expected that individuals in this category would be able to apply for admission to a degree granting program if they desire. Credits earned in this category would probably be treated as transfer credits when application is made for admission.

NEW CDPC DIRECTOR

Richard Habermas, who has been supervisor of financial programming for the Computing and Data Processing Center since February 1969, was named CDPC director last week by the MSU Board of Trustees. He succeeds Benjamin Cheydleur, who resigned to assume full-time duties as professor of engineering. Habermas holds a bachelor's degree from Wayne State University and a master of arts degree in the teaching of mathematics from the University of Detroit. He taught in Oak Park High School for eight years and was a program analyst with General Motors Corp. before joining the OU staff.

Done leave of absence for the fall semester and four for the entire 1970-71 year have been approved by the MSU Board of Trustees. Victoria Kay Thorsen (art) plans to study in this area during the fall. Full-year leaves will be taken by Cordell W. Black (modern languages), to study at the University of Michigan; Charles E. Brownell (art), to study in England; Robert L. Donald (English), to study at the University of Detroit, and George P. Rawick (sociology), to continue as a visiting faculty member at Washington University.

Donald E. Morse (English) was the featured speaker at the Friends of Kresge Library Annual Meeting. His topic was: "An English Teacher on Vacation or How to Enjoy Sex, Censorship and Research."

GRANTS APPROVED

Ten grants totaling \$70,950 were accepted for OU by the MSU Board of Trustees at the meeting Friday. The three major grants support research in biology and mathematics. Clifford V. Harding (biological sciences) will be in charge of a \$31,000 grant from the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission in support of research studying cellular proliferation and regeneration following tissue damage. Another \$21,000 from the Commission will be used under the direction of V. Everett Kinsey (biological sciences) to study the ocular lens in relation to cataractogenesis.

The National Science Foundation grant of \$11,900 will be used to examine the approximation of functions by means of positive linear operators under the direction of Ronald A. DeVore (mathematics).

FIVE REPORT RESEARCH

Several members of the Institute of Biological Sciences reported their research findings at the Annual Meeting of the Association for Research in Opthalmology which was held in Sarasota, Florida May 1-5. Dr. V. Everett Kinsey, Dr. Michael V. Riley, Dr. S.D. Varma, Dr. V.N. Reddy and Mr. B. Chakrapani presented their research papers. Dr. Reddy was this year's chairman of the biochemistry section of the Association, and Dr. Kinsey was the chairman of the session dealing with control of corneal hydration.
