

### PROGRAMS WELCOME NEW STUDENTS

An exciting school year of new student programs is planned to enhance the out-of-class and in-class experiences of new students entering Oakland, fall semester, 1975. # OU ENGINEERS TAKE FIRST PLACE

Oakland University engineering students won two first place awards in an August 12-16 national competition on alternative energy sources. More than 100 schools competed in the count held in Albertantee N.M.

in the event held in Albuquerque, N.M.

The university won first place for its design of a wind turbine machine. The university won another first place for having the best electrical system output in the wind energy area of the competition. Oakland University did not have an entry in the solar energy category.

The contest was sponsored by SCORE (Student Competitions on Relevant Engineering). The nonprofit corporation was established in 1971 by the academic engineering community to sponsor national student engineering design contests. This was OU's first entry in a SCORE competition. The 1975 theme was alternative energy sources.

Oakland University's entry was a wind machine consisting of a 22-foot high shaft mounted on a tripod stand. Three four-foot by ten-foot sails were attached. The sails and shaft turned horizontally in the wind to drive

an output gear.

OU students who worked on the wind machine design are: Mel Buss, Chelsea; Dave Gallup, Bloomfield Hills; Mickey Galper, Southfield; Bob MacFarland, Lake Orion; Dave Pocholok and Steve Rumancik, Sterling Heights; Mike Sigilai, Pontiac; and Erik Vigmostad, Mt. Clemens.

In a separate competition, OU won third place in a "student innovations" category. The teams judged each

other to decide the most innovative entries.

Cars will be towed away for parking in other than overnight lots, for parking in restricted areas without a decal, for parking on the grass, for parking in excess of 15 minutes in unloading zones, and for parking in loading dock areas, roadways, or aisles of parking lots.

# FACULTY SALARY OPTIONS MUST BE CHOSEN BY SEPT. 10

The 1974-75 faculty agreement provides that a faculty member may elect to have his/her yearly salary paid in nine installments rather than 12. It is also possible for a faculty member on a nine installment pay schedule to revert to a 12 month basis. Unless authorization for a change in payment schedule is received in the Office of Employment Relations by Sept. 10, each faculty member will be paid in 1975-76 under the same schedule that was in effect for that faculty member during 1974-75.

# OU APPROPRIATION SLASHED BY \$135,000

Governor William Milliken, through the Bureau of the Budget, has cut one percent or \$135,000 from OU's general fund appropriation for 1975-76.

The new appropriation figure is \$13,358,100. The university received a \$12,706,500 appropriation in 1974-75.

The university was notified of the one percent cut on Aug. 27. Almost every state agency and all public colleges and universities were effected. The money obtained from the cuts will be used to establish a "contingency fund to meet later revenue deficiencies." Should the state's financial picture improve, the funds could then be distributed to OU and to the other institutions.

# BICENTENNIAL ESSAY COURSE OFFERED

Oakland University and the <u>Detroit Free Press</u> are cooperating to offer an American Forum course this fall. During the term, the newspaper will run 13 bicentennial essays written by scholars from throughout the United States. The essays will be supplemented by class discussions and lectures.

The course is being offered for two undergraduate credits. Meetings will be on alternate Monday nights starting Sept. 8 running through Dec. 15. Course information can be obtained by calling the evening program office of Oakland University at 377-4010.

Two OU graduates, Ivy Corfis, romance languages and literature, and Donald Mayo, engineering, have received Michigan College Fellowships from the University of Michigan. The tuition stipend awards for graduate study were announced by Ronald Kevern, OU's director of career advising and placement.

#### FEEMAN ADVISING IN NEPAL

George F. Feeman, mathematical sciences, has been given a two-year leave of absence to serve as Mathematics Specialist at Katmandu, Nepal. He was invited to join the NEA Contract Team, Office of International Relations, affiliated with the U.S. Agency for International Development. He is accompanied by his family and expects to remain in Nepal until August, 1977.

Jerry W. Rose, director of admissions and scholarships, attended the Los Angeles meeting of the Undergraduate Admissions Committee of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers, July 10-12.
