Tax Important for Construction and Expenses

2 Board Members to Be Elected; Polls Open at 7, Close 8 P. M.

Pontiac School District voters will go to the polls Monday in a school election that will include two special issues in addition to the election of two board members.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m. Monday.

All 42,500 school district voters registered to vote in general elections can vote in Monday's school election. They do not need to own property.

Voting places will be Bagley, Bailey, Baldwin, Central, Crofoot, Eastern, Emerson, Hawthorne, Le-Baron, Longfellow, Lincoln, McConnell, Owen, Washington, Webster, Whitfield, Whittier, Willis and Wilson schools.

Voters will have three main tasks before them Monday:

1. They must choose two of the six candidates for the Pontiac Board of Education. The seventh candidate Edward P. Barrett, has withdrawn from the race. Still running are Mrs. Paul A. (Matty) Brown, Dr. Walter L. Godsell, Mrs. Harry (Lola B.) King, Dr. Leonard F. Klausmeyer, Paul J. Simmons and Everett C. Spurlock.

2. They must decide whether to put Pontiac County under a state law so it can set up a county-wide system for educating handicapped children and whether to vote a half-mill (50 cents on each \$1,000 worth of property) to pay for the program.

3. They must decide whether to let Pontiac Board of Education levy school taxes 6.25 mills over the 15-mill limit from 1955 until 1957 and 8.75 mills over the limit from 1958-1964.

Actually, the net tax increase from this 10-year Pontiac tax proposal would be only about 4.25 mills (\$4.25 per \$1,000) as two voted taxes now being levied will expire—one this year and one in 1957.

The schools' total tax rate would run about 18.45 mills from now through 1964—a dollar-and-cents hike of \$13 to \$14 a year for the person who owns a home assessed at \$3,000.

The proposed tax increase would accomplish two purposes, school officials say:

It would build some \$9,000,000 worth of new schools—enough to contain Pontiac's growing enrollment for the next 10 years. School men expect the number of students (Continued on Page 2, Col. 8)

Cohn, Kennedy Almost Tangle at Army Hearing

Hot Exchange of Words Ends in Fight Challenge by McCarthy Aide

WASHINGTON (INS)—A sidelines fracas that almost led to blows lent new bitterness to the Army-McCarthy hearings today as the marathon inquiry rounded into what seemed to be the home stretch.

Blazing words exchanged by Roy M. Cohn and Robert F. Kennedy after Friday's session overshadowed other developments and appeared to be the forerunner to new battles to come next week.

Cohn, 27, is chief counsel, and Kennedy, 28, is Democratic counsel of the Senate Investigations subcommittee, which is conducting the televised hearings.

Kennedy told newsmen he became enraged when Cohn threatened to "get" Sen. Henry M. Jackson after the latter ridiculed a psychological warfare plan by Pvt. G. David Schine, former subcommittee consultant.

Acting Chairman Karl E. Mundt (R-S.D.) told newsmen that he will call night sessions if necessary to complete the investigation next week. It already has covered 32 days in seven weeks.

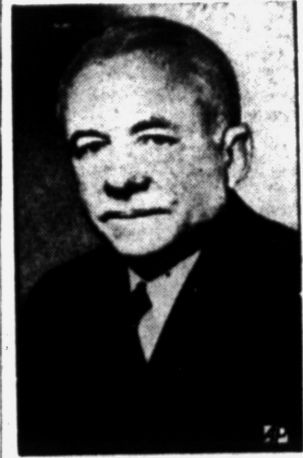
The Cohn-Kennedy shouting spree, which took place in full view of newsmen and astonished other observers, was a direct result of the cross-examination of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy by Jackson.

Cohn denied making any threat and maintained he only said Jackson "was unfair about the report." He said he asked Kennedy if he felt qualified to take part in the hearings when he has "hated" for one of the principals.

Asked later to explain this, Cohn said: "Before the hearings, he sought out somebody in Sen. McCarthy's office and said he hated me and was going to get me in these hearings."

Wins NYC Control

Young Is Victor in Central Fight

Financier Wins Control of Nation's 2nd Largest Railroad

NEW YORK (AP)—The future of the nation's second biggest railroad, the New York Central, lay today in the hands of Texas-born financier Robert R. Young.

He won the bitter fight for control by a margin of 1,070,000 shares out of the Central's grand total of 6,447,410, an authoritative source who declined to be named said yesterday.

The official results, which may vary slightly from this figure, are to be announced Monday at 10 a.m. EDT by the election inspectors at Albany, N. Y., where the count of shares has been in progress since the stockholders' meeting May 28.

But there was no doubt about the outcome. In Los Angeles, Young's wealthy Texas friend, Clint W. Murchison, confirmed the smashing victory.

It was Murchison who, with his fellow Texan, Sid W. Richardson, bought the long-contested 800,000 shares which were the back-bone of Young's victory.

"Yes, we have won the Central fight—the Young group, that is," said Murchison, "it's in the bag." (Continued on Page 2, Col. 3)

Senate OK Expected for Reciprocal Trade

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate leaders in both parties today predicted Senate approval of an extension of the nation's 20-year-old reciprocal trade program which expires at midnight.

The House passed a one-year extension bill yesterday 281 to 53, giving President Eisenhower a partial victory on the controversial foreign trade issue.

The big question in the Senate was whether a group of Democrats would make an all-out fight for what the President originally asked for—a three-year extension with new power to cut tariffs 15 per cent.

Key House Republicans strongly opposed this proposal. Eisenhower subsequently let it be known he would settle for a simple one-year extension this year, the same as Congress voted in 1953, but said this does not mean he is backing down from his long-range program for promoting trade between America and other nations.

Kidnap Victim Identifies Welder as Her Abductor

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UP)—Mrs. Evelyn Ann Smith identified an unemployed welder as the man who kidnaped her for \$75,000 ransom but the suspect refused today to admit or deny the abduction.

The welder, Daniel Joseph Marsin, was trapped, in part, by his persistent mispronunciation of the Superstition Mountains, where Mrs. Smith was held captive, as the "Superstitious Mountains."

Police were searching today for the \$75,000 paid by the victim's husband, well-to-do Herbert Smith, to win her release Thursday.

Maricopa County Attorney William P. Mahoney Jr. said that Marsin "would neither admit nor deny" the crime during several hours of questioning.

Mrs. Smith confronted Marsin Friday. She said that although Marsin was wearing different clothes than her abductor, she recognized physical characteristics.

Marsin, she said, also called the nearby range of hills the "superstitious" (Continued on Page 2, Col. 8)

Salk Participant Contracts Polio

Oakland County Girl, 7, 2nd Test-Group Child Stricken in Michigan

Oakland County's first case of poliomyelitis among children taking part in the Salk polio field tests was reported today.

Linda Brooks, 7, of 22028 Albion, Farmington Township, is being treated at the Sister Kenny Polio Treatment Center, Farmington, for non-paralytic polio.

The second grade student at Middlebelt School had received two inoculations and was scheduled to take a third when she became ill June 2, according to her 29-year-old father, Earl.

She was admitted to the Oakland County Contagious Hospital here for observation June 4 and transferred to the center that night.

Her mother, Mrs. Betty Brooks, 29, is under observation for polio at the center. She was admitted Monday. The Brooks' two other children, Pamela, 3, and Cheryl, Anne, 15 months, apparently were not affected.

It will not be known until records are checked whether Linda received the Salk serum or an inactive fluid given to half the children participating.

This is only the second case of polio reported among the 50,000 odd children in Michigan who received inoculations. Earlier, Lenawee county reported a polio case in the test.

Undeserved Riches Give Woman Uneasy Hours

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—Mrs. Nettie G. Freeman, a \$1.83 an hour riveter in an aircraft plant, is embarrassed with riches. She received a \$4,181.42 check as a refund on her income tax. Mrs. Freeman figured the government owed her \$148.80.

Mrs. Freeman doesn't intend to cash it, but the income tax office is open only during the hours she is at work.

U-M Gets OK to Construct Powerful Nuclear Reactor

ANN ARBOR (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission has approved allocation of uranium to the University of Michigan for one of the world's most powerful nuclear research reactors.

President Harlan Hatcher said today the AEC approval gives the university the green light to proceed with construction and operation of the reactor.

Construction is expected to begin this fall. Hatcher told alumni on campus for the 110th commencement.

Hatcher said he had been notified of the approval in a letter from Lewis L. Strauss, AEC chairman.

The research reactor will be built with a grant of \$1,000,000 from the Ford Motor Co. fund to the Michigan Memorial-Phoenix project, the university's wartime memorial dedicated to peaceful uses of atomic energy.

The grant is expected to cover the entire cost of the reactor and a special building in which it will be housed on the north campus.

The reactor will serve primarily as a source of neutrons and gamma rays, Hatcher said.

The reactor will be located in a reinforced concrete building. It will be open for inspection, subject only to restrictions necessary for public safety.

Runaway Auto Injures Woman

Strikes Crash Witness Standing Near Scene on M59 Last Night

A Milford woman narrowly missed death under the wheels of a runaway car which knocked her down last night as she was standing at the scene of an auto accident.

Mrs. Frances Bedford, 47, of 2655 W. Commerce Rd., is listed in satisfactory condition at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital with multiple leg fractures and back injuries.

Oakland County Sheriff's Deputies James Stone and Marion Bauman said a rear wheel of the driverless car, which rolled down a small knoll, came to a stop against the victim's head. Witnesses at the scene freed Mrs. Bedford.

Four other persons were struck by the runaway car, but none was injured. The deputies said the car was in neutral gear and the emergency brake was not set.

Mrs. Bedford was watching action at the scene of an accident shortly after midnight at M59 and Williams Lake road involving Thomas R. Hyland of Detroit.

Hyland, driving west on M59, said an oncoming car forced him to make a sudden turn onto Williams Lake where he overturned. A passenger, James Walker, 16, of Hazel Park was treated at Pontiac General Hospital for multiple face cuts.

Owner of the runaway car was reported to be Manley R. Chamberlain of 6519 Simmons, Route 7, Pontiac.

Deputies said no one saw the car roll down the knoll due to the darkness.
