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Airman Arrested as Spy; Russian Is Told to Leave

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A German-born U.S. airman has been arrested and a Soviet diplomat ordered to leave the country in the fourth major American spy case reported since July by the FBI.

Staff Sgt. Herbert William Boeckenhaupt, 23, was seized yesterday by FBI agents at

March Air Force Base in Riverside, Calif.

He was arraigned here on a charge of conspiring to commit espionage to deliver to a Soviet diplomat "information relating to the national defense of the United States."

Boeckenhaupt, who lived in Superior, Wis., with his family

since immigrating to the United States in 1948, pleaded innocent. He was ordered held on \$50,000 bail.

After the FBI announced the sergeant's arrest, the State Department asked Aleksey R. Malinin, commercial counsel at the Soviet Embassy in Washington, to leave the country as soon as possible.

MET SECRETLY

Boeckenhaupt, stationed at the Pentagon from April 1964 to August 1965, allegedly met secretly with Malinin in June 1965 and April 1966. He had enlisted in the Air Force in 1960 at the age of 17.

The FBI did not disclose whether any money was involved in the alleged meetings, nor whether any information was actually passed.

Agents also refused to say what Boeckenhaupt's duties were at the Pentagon, although he was a communications repairman at March.

The FBI said Boeckenhaupt met with Malinin in June 1965, in an Arlington, Va., suburb where Malinin questioned the serviceman about his duties at the Pentagon.

ALLEGED SLIDE

The men reportedly met again in a bowling alley parking lot last April, and Malinin gave Boeckenhaupt a 35mm slide that pinpointed "drop areas" and meeting places, the FBI said.

Boeckenhaupt lives with his wife near March Air Force Base. Agents said his apartment was searched with the sergeant's consent last week.

U.S. Commissioner Russell R. Herman set a preliminary hearing on the case for Nov. 18. "Not guilty," the tall, dark-haired sergeant told newsmen.

Malinin, 45, came to the United States Sept. 12, 1963 and was assigned to the Soviet Embassy two months later.

Bell Pact Is Rejected by Workers

DETROIT (AP) — Communications workers rejected a proposed contract with Michigan Bell Telephone Co. by a vote of 7,018 to 4,825, a ballot count showed yesterday.

Officials of Bell and the Communications Workers of America Union said they were willing to resume negotiations quickly.

Rejection of the proposed 36-month contract, a pact Bell estimated would have cost the company \$10 million a year, came in a mail ballot.

Results were announced today by the Detroit accounting firm, Ernst and Ernst.

Wayne R. Osborn, chairman of Bell's negotiating team and assistant Bell vice president, said the rejected proposal would have given the firm's 17,000 employees "the biggest wage and fringe benefit package ever negotiated by Michigan Bell and the Communications Workers of America."

SIMILAR CONTRACTS

He said, "Sixteen other Bell System bargaining units covering more than 100,000 employees have already accepted contracts similar to those negotiated in Michigan."

The proposal called for wage hikes in the first 18 months of \$5.50 to \$8 weekly for part-time employees and \$3.50 to \$5.50 weekly for full-time operators and accounting and clerical employees.

Walter R. Schaar, vice president of the union's District 4, called for workers to remain on their jobs on a day-to-day basis as contract talks resume.

7 Die as Cong Shell Saigon

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — The Viet Cong unleashed an artillery bombardment on the center of Saigon today in a spectacular but unsuccessful attempt to disrupt South Viet Nam's National Day observances.

Six Vietnamese and one American were known dead. Conflicting reports listed up to six more killed but these reports could not be verified. The one American known dead was a Navy officer.

At least 30 Vietnamese and five Americans were wounded in the bombardment, the first time the Viet Cong shelled the capital with mortar and recoilless rifle fire.

The Viet Cong hurled 24 rounds of 75mm recoilless rifle fire in and around the parade route, U.S. military headquarters said.

Vietnamese authorities reported mortar shells also struck during the shelling.

Romney Try to Bar Dem Ad Claimed

Democratic gubernatorial candidate Zoltan Ferency charged Monday that Gov. George Romney attempted to "intimidate" a television station manager into canceling a paid Democratic program.

Ferency accused Romney of trying "to enforce an information blackout in the gubernatorial campaign."

The Democratic state chairman said Romney sent a telegram to Elroy Strand, general manager of WLUC-TV in Marquette, in regard to a 28-minute film based on a two-hour debate between Romney and Ferency.

The telegram told Strand: "Expect you will consider carefully any showing of such a program inasmuch as the debate consumed two hours and any edited version for partisan purposes would undoubtedly misrepresent the context of the full debate."

SIGNED BY GOVERNOR
Ferency said the telegram was signed "Governor Romney, Lansing."

Ferency said Strand first canceled the 45-minute paid program, which included the tape, and a half-hour later Monday took back his stand.

Strand said he "temporarily canceled" the program and that was not necessarily the result of Romney's telegram.

A spokesman for Romney said the telegram was not an attempt to halt broadcast of Ferency's program.

THIS AFTERNOON
The program was to be broadcast this afternoon.

The telegram attributed to Romney also said the governor wrote Monday to August Scholle, state AFL-CIO president, protesting the proposed television use of the edited version of the debate with Ferency.

The debate was sponsored by the Committee on Political Education of the AFL-CIO.

Nov. 28 Hearing Slated on Cycle Agency Code

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Kelley, Lindemer Share Issue—Crime

(EDITOR'S NOTE—This is the second in a five-part series on the major statewide races in the Nov. 8 election. It deals with the candidates for attorney general.)

The little-known candidate struggles for recognition against the apparently popular incumbent.

And while he tries to familiarize the public with his name, the incumbent makes news almost at will through the activities of his key state office.

And to top it all off, polls show that the incumbent with a margin political observers consider almost too comfortable.

Democratic challenger Zolton Ferency versus Gov. George Romney?

No. Republican challenger Lawrence Lindemer versus Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley.

In the race to head Michigan's largest law firm, the big issue this year is crime.

POINTS TO RECORD
Kelley points to the record four grand juries he has asked for and been granted in the past 14 months as evidence of a strong, vigorous campaign against organized crime.

Lindemer uses the same evidence in his attempt to show Kelley's fight against crime increased in intensity in inverse ratio to the length of the time left before the election.

The attorney general is the chief law enforcement officer of the state. Heading a staff of some 85 lawyers he also serves as the primary and official legal adviser to state officials and county prosecutors. Romney, the Legislature and State Department must turn to Kelley for interpretations of their powers, duties and rulings on the meaning and effect of new state laws.

Kelley, seeking his third elected term, has made use of the built-in public forum his office provides. His most recent pronouncements included recommended legislation aimed at ending the mounting death and accident toll involving motorcyclists and an announcement that he will fight to keep the federal government from splitting Michigan's Upper and Lower

peninsulas between Eastern and Central time zones.

one in Oakland to investigate probe racing and one in Kent to charge that meat from a state work done by his office and unlicensed slaughterhouses was reaching the consumer.

Kelley has asked for more grand juries than any previous attorney general: Two in Wayne County to investigate alleged ticket fixing, organized crime

regulating hearing aid sales.

The 41-year-old former Detroit lawyer who went to Alpena in 1954 to become a "bigger fish in a smaller pond," frequently points with pride to another record he has set since becoming the largest fish in the Michigan legal community.

Only one of the 575 opinions he has handed down since he was appointed in 1961 has been overturned in court.

Kelley's activities extend into virtually every field of Michigan, and Midwest, life. These include the St. Lawrence Seaway, Great Lakes water diversion and pollution and even the 1835 "Toledo War," which still smolders in a Michigan-Ohio boundary dispute in Lake Erie.

Kelley serves as first vice president of the National Association of Attorneys General, and is due for the presidency next year.

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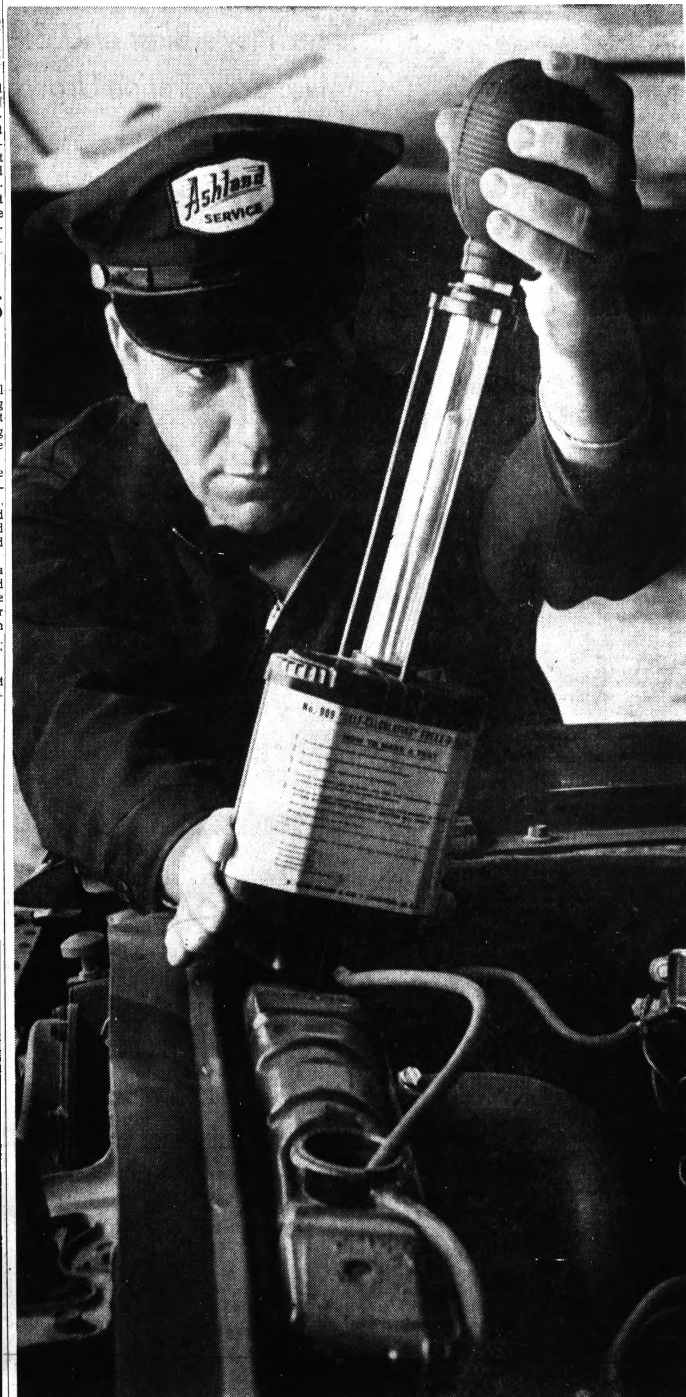
Shooting Jails Bill Collectors

DETROIT (UPI) — Two bill collectors accused of terrorizing a debtor with shotgun blasts at his home and family were being held today for trial in Wayne County Circuit Court.

Livonia Municipal Judge James McCann yesterday ordered Charles G. Franchi, 31, alias Nicholas Barone, and Marvin S. Mason, 23, bound over for trial on extortion and assault charges.

Police said the owner of a Livonia roofing firm, Raymond Griffin, 42, complained the shooting incidents occurred after the two men had warned him "We're going to get the money. Our methods are not too nice."

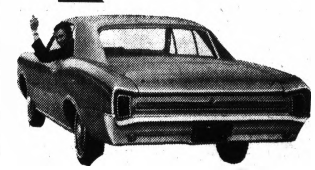
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
