OU offers brain-based learning program for educators

Oakland University's **School of Education and Human Services** is offering a three-course, graduate-level certificate program on brain-based learning. The program may be completed in one year, and the first class will begin on Jan. 12 at Troy High School. Applications currently are being accepted.

Designed for educators and school administrators, participants will gain comprehensive preparation in groundbreaking brain research and techniques that can be applied to create a high-challenge, low-threat classroom that optimizes student learning. Classroom management and environment, lesson design and delivery, and memory techniques will be emphasized.

Jerry Evanski, an educator and consultant on brain research and classroom methods, is the program instructor. He has trained extensively in brain research application in educational settings with Eric Jensen, Richard Allen, and Geoffrey and Renatta Caine, experts in the field. Evanski presents seminars on brain research, creativity and school discipline throughout the United States and Canada.
