Free World Strengthened, Says Johnson on Return

VP Believes Berlin Trip Tightens Ties With Bonn

WASHINGTON (AP)—Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson brought back to President Kennedy today a report that the free world's bonds have been strengthened by his 36-hour visit to West Berlin.

The presidential jet touched down at nearby Andrews Air Force Base after a 7

hour, 45 minute flight. Johnson is scheduled to report to the White House after Kennedy returns late this afternoon from his Hyannis Port, Mass., summer home.

In an arrival statement read beside him, Johnson said he had returned from his conference

with top German officials convinced that ties between United States, West Berlin and West Germany "already very strong, have been made even stronger and more enduring."

Before the vice president left, a fresh battle group of 1,500 American troops rolled in to strengthen his repeated pledge that the United States will stand firm with West Berlin and the Communist-encircled city "can never be bullied into the surrender of its freedom."

13,000 STRONG
The new arrivals brought the U.S. British and French garrisons in West Berlin to a total of 12,000 troops.

Over the weekend, when Johnson called "one of America's finest hours," the fears of war subsided noticeably and the prospects of negotiations with the Soviets grew, both in Berlin and Washington.

Mayor Brandt, who said his discussions with Johnson went "far beyond the Berlin issue and that there will be no war and predicted East-West talks late in the fall. U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk told a U.S. television audience he did not expect the Soviet threats to West Berlin to lead to war.

"We do expect negotiations to take place," Rusk said. He said he did not know how, when or where—but he did not rule out the possibility of a summit meeting after "full preparation."

President Kennedy planned to take place—negotiations will be held in the White House.

Outlook Optimistic for Area Forecast

Senate in Scrap on Civil Rights

House Working on Bill Asking Death Penalty for Plane Hijackers

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate plows into a scrap over smoldering civil rights legislation today, while the House takes up a bill providing a death penalty for airplane hijackers.

Promising sparks in the Senate was a leadership-sponsored move to suspend the rules and look onto an appropriation bill a two-year extension of the Civil Rights Commission, now due to expire Nov. 9.

Advocates of other civil rights measures planned to try to get in some ticks of their own despite the damper the Kennedy administration has put on legislation in this field this year.

The hijacking bill up with a string of routine measures, is similar to legislation recently passed by the Senate in an effort to halt an outbreak of piracy in the skies. It provides for a maximum penalty of death, and not less than 20 years' imprisonment, for hijacking airplanes. In addition, it makes federal offenses of assaults, murder, robbery and other crimes committed aboard planes.

In the Senate, Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana and Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois will try to attack a bill extending the Civil Rights Commission to a 10-year term. It would require a two-thirds majority to suspend a Senate rule.

Look Forward, Never Backward

Editor's Note: When is the time of your life? For some it is the past. For others, it's yet to come. In "Time of Your Life," James Thurber looks back at the time of his life. The story is in "Time of Your Life."

To a blind writer five years older than our blind country, it is far easier to remember the times that he is glad are over, rather than the times, or time, he wishes he could relive.

Nostalgic reverie, like amorous fantasy, belongs in the category of escape, along with smoking, drinking, and tranquilizers, and is neither a kinetic nor a dynamic energy in a modern world that increasingly demands both.

The non-escapee would surely rather discuss what he would like to do to improve, in his tiny corner, the human condition, now so often referred to as the human predicament or human struggle.

Our well-known American urge to escape from the menaces and obligations of the present is best illustrated by our insatiable hunger for Westerns on television. I like to believe that one new President, and his chief associates, who are living with such vitalism in 1961, will have a good influence in getting millions of their compatriots out of the Last Chance saloon and into the New Chance living hour.

HUNDREDS WRITE
The thing that disturbs me most (a darned good title for a symposium) is the apathetic, dependent and unself-reliant attitude of

so many of the hundreds of school children who write to me, practically asking me to write, for them, what they think about my work.

One of my favorite English expressions (I am writing this in London) is the vital "Get cracking!"

At drinking parties in America, I am often there without actually

being present, because after many years of writing news stories in city rooms, with 20 typewriters banging around me, I can concentrate in the midst of babble, or even Babel or Bedlam.

At such moments of obliviousness, I am trying to write something new, and not under the name of A. I. Glatsun (try spelling that backward).

When I sit silent at parties, I am not remembering the time, at my 13th birthday party, that I kissed a little girl named Eva, or my election in 1923 as president of my senior class at East High School in Columbus, Ohio, or the evening I won a zither in a rotation pool tournament in that city, or the time I read "The Wizard of Oz," or the day in 1927 when I got, as a reporter for the old New York Evening Post, the first interview that Thomas Alva Edison had given to a newspaper man in many years.

A certain professor of English in America has written a dissertation on my work, in which he speaks of my "major phase" as if it were in the past.

It is in the past, I shall denote it from major to significant, for a man's major phase, whether he be a writer or President of the United States, should be ahead of him, and not behind him.

Time and space are relative, and in motion, and if I seriously selected "the time of my life," it would deal with a continuing time, and might well be the time that began when I sold my first piece to the New Yorker Magazine in 1934, which I am still contributing after

In conclusion, I'll paraphrase old Longfellow: "Let us then be up and doing, with a heart for any chore; still achieving, still pursuing, stay away from days of yore."

Merchant Dies in Car Accident

Gabriel Rapaport, 80, Has Had Retail Clothing Store Since 1911

Gabriel J. Rapaport, citizen and pioneer merchant in Pontiac, was killed yesterday in an auto accident near Pinconning.

Police at the Bay City Post said witnesses to the accident—between Linwood and Pinconning—said Mr. Rapaport applied his brakes when approaching the scene of another accident on the other side of the highway. They could give no other reason since traffic was clear, they said.

Mr. Rapaport's car skidded over the center strip and struck another car head on. Two occupants in the second car are hospitalized at Mercy Hospital in Bay City, police said.

The well-known citizen and local church leader, who celebrated his 80th birthday nine days ago, was traveling alone on U.S. 23 on his way to his summer cabin at Higgins Lake. He planned to return to the city today.

The funeral will be at 1 p.m. tomorrow at the Clover Hill Chapel on 14 Mile Road with burial to follow in the Clover Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Rapaport's body will be at the Ira Kaufman Funeral Home today and tonight.

The family has asked that any tributes be sent to the Temple Beth Jacob, of which Mr. Rapaport was one of the founders.

Mr. Rapaport came to Pontiac in 1911 and was in the retail clothing business at 9 S. Saginaw St. at the time of his death.

He was a member of Pontiac Elks Lodge 810 and B'nai B'rith. He participated in many charitable drives in the city and his name was common in many other civic affairs.

He attended public school in Rochester, N. Y., his birthplace, and traveled widely abroad since he was 14 years old.

Mr. Rapaport married the former Leone Kasky of Omaha, Neb., on Dec. 7, 1908.

Mrs. Rapaport survives along with two daughters, Roberta and George, Richman, both of Pontiac, and a son, Raymond, who operated the clothing store along with his father.

A brother Jack of Grand Rapids and a sister, Mary Robinson, of Rochester, N. Y., also survive.

Mr. Rapaport lived at 11 Monmouth Road.

UAW Cancels Chrysler Pact

Union Awaiting Reply; Contract Now Expires Some Date as Others

DETROIT (UPI)—The United Auto Workers Union today canceled its contract with Chrysler Corp., effective Aug. 31.

The move had been expected. It means the UAW-Chrysler pact will expire at the same time as similar contracts with General Motors and Ford.

UAW Vice President Norman Matthews said, "We feel the termination notice is necessitated by the fact that we have made absolutely no progress at the bargaining table" with Chrysler.

A Chrysler spokesman said, "We're going to study this decision and will likely have an answer this afternoon."

BIG 3 READY
The action came as the UAW entered the crucial phase of new contract negotiations with the industry, confident the Big Three companies were nearly ready to make economic offers.

General Motors, Ford and Chrysler were known to be preparing such proposals. They were expected to be presented early this week by GM or Ford taking the lead.

SUPPORT FOR WALKOUT
The union said interest talks from its strike vote—83.3 percent—overwhelming support for a walkout if necessary to back up the UAW's demands.

Business from one Ford and 11 GM plants had 15,326 members approving a strike, with 1,318 opposed, an average far above the two-thirds required to authorize a walkout.

UAW Vice President Leonard Woodcock said he believed "there should be uninterrupted production of these dual defense systems." He said he was confident the plants' "special problems" can be solved "jointly and without difficulty" by GM, the UAW and the government.

UAW President Walter P. Reuther urged the union's optimism that big three offers are forthcoming soon.

Rail Workers Walk Out in Argentina Strike

BUENOS AIRES (UPI)—Rail workers walked out today, beginning a 48-hour strike which paralyzed the nationalized railway network.

Buses and trucks were pressed into service to replace commuter trains in transporting workers from suburban homes to jobs in the city.

Seeks to Collect Bill From the Revolution

LONDON (AP)—Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express today cautioned a Philadelphia minister against trying to collect about 270,000 pounds—\$756,000 for a church fence the Reds broke down during the American Revolution.

The Rev. Joseph Koci Jr. of Philadelphia presented the bill to Chancellor of the Exchequer Selwyn Lloyd. The Episcopal minister asked for the cost of the fence plus interest for 183 years.

"But suppose the British government were to submit a bill in the United States for the cost of the fence plus interest—of protecting the American settlers from the red Indians in the years before the War of Independence?" asked the Express editorially.

"That would make a nasty hole in the vaults at Ft. Knox," Ky. The editorial concluded with this advice: "It does not pay to dabble with history. Mr. Koci. Just stick to reading it."

Beaverbrook's newspaper may have brushed aside the minister's claim, but the British treasury took it more seriously.

A spokesman said the bill has arrived and will be considered and replied to.

"It is too early yet to say what we shall do," he commented.

The spokesman said the Rev. Mr. Koci left the exact amount of interest to be computed by the treasury, as several American banks gave him different figures. The Redcoats used the fence for firewood in 1778.

GOP Asked to Back Moderates' Aims

LANSING (AP) — A group of moderate GOP state senators faced the task today of persuading other Republicans to support a legislative program billed as a constructive long-range project to change Michigan's image as a "problem state."

In a conciliatory move, the eight senators decided to bring down days of closed-door meetings in Traverse City to seek the cooperation of State Central Committee members and other lawmakers in launching the new program.

During their session, the moderates adopted a "middle-of-the-road" platform of their own, which included proposals for more money for mental health and higher education, civil rights legislation, a complete tax revision and elimination of wasteful spending by state agencies.

"We do not intend to belabor the point," they said, "but a review of the last legislative session demonstrates the necessity for new thinking and new approaches in considering the problems facing Michigan."

State Chairman George M. Van Peltman praised the moderates for their willingness to discuss their program with other Republicans and to listen to suggestions and ideas.

"This means a new look for the GOP," he said, "and a new relationship between the State Central Committee and the legislature."

PRESENT AT SESSIONS

Van Peltman sat in on some of the sessions of the moderates, as did Frank D. Beale of St. Clair. Senate majority caucus leader, Congressman Robert Griffin and Rep. Arnold Engstrom, both of Traverse City.

Both Van Peltman and Beale declined to say whether they endorsed the moderates' program, explaining that they had not had time to study it thoroughly.

But the state chairman said he would see to it that copies of the dozen-or-so proposals are sent out to key members of the party. And the entire program probably will be discussed, he said, at a GOP conference at St. Joseph next month.

Beale plans to send out copies of the program this week to other Republican state senators, along with some of his own observations.

The program also is expected to be aired at a meeting this weekend at the Ann Arbor home of Sen. Stanley Thayer, one of the moderates. Some 20 Republicans, most of whom are sympathetic with the moderates' aims, have been invited.

Included are Paul D. Bagwell, GOP candidate for governor in 1958 and 1960, former State Chairman Lawrence B. Lindner and National Committeeman John B. Sharpe.

IN BETTER MOOD

At their Traverse City meeting, the moderates appeared to be in a somewhat less belligerent mood than they were at the close of the legislative session last June. At that time, they were critical of both the Democrats, for what they considered a double-cross in a proposed coalition, and the old-guard Senate conservatives, who opposed their program.

\$1-Million Fire Destroys N.J. Railroad Terminal

WEEHAWKEN, N.J. (AP) — A half-mile railroad terminal and dock area was destroyed today by a fire which raged for three hours before it was brought under control. It was the second big New Jersey waterfront fire within three days.

Fire department officials said the blaze caused more than a million dollars in damage.

The fire apparently started at the New York Central Railroad abandoned 42nd Street ferry, officials said. The first alarm was received at 3:15 a.m.

Forty-five minutes later, the ferry terminal, adjoining docks, and several nearby freight sheds and boxcars had been reduced to a glowing pile of crackling timber. Flames could be seen from the center of Manhattan on the New York side of the river.

The terminal building covered almost a full city block. It was a one-story, steel-frame building. It had been abandoned about four years ago, when the New York Central eliminated passenger service on that line.

Four hundred firemen from 12 departments in Hudson and Bergen counties were joined by fireboats from New York City and the Coast Guard in fighting to contain the blaze. They were struck by a shifting wind that fanned the blaze.

During the fire, six trucks were recalled to West New York, N.J., just north of Weehawken, where a fire jumped three piers an estimated \$1-million loss Friday night.

Revised Zoning Before Board at Waterford

Township and county officials have been concerned about "up zoning."

Bids for paving several streets in Waterford will be opened at 8 p.m. Township engineers have estimated the cost at \$64,000.

The board is expected to accept a low bid from the Ann Arbor Construction company for black-topping Tyrone Street.

The board also will establish a policy for next year's chloride program.

The county civil defense committee decided to build the shelter in line with an appeal from President Kennedy for more family fallout shelters.

The shelter will house a family of six and is being built at a cost of about \$500.

Free shelter specifications and other data will be available at the display.

The model is expected to be finished in several weeks. The building is at 111 S. Troy St.

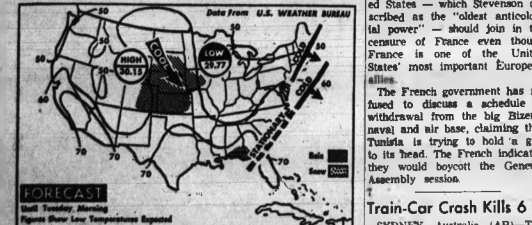

sen delegate said unless the United States supported Tunisia, it could expect little support from the anticommunist countries if it should bring the Berlin crisis before the United Nations.

EXPECTED NEGOTIATION

There was some belief the United States abstained on the Security Council vote because it thought then it could get the Tunisia to negotiate with the Tunisians. Chief U.S. delegate Adlai E. Stevenson now apparently has abandoned this hope, and Tunisia's backers feel that the United States — which Stevenson described as the "oldest anticommunist power" — should join in the censure of France even though France is one of the United States' most important European allies.

The French government has refused to discuss a schedule of withdrawal from the big Bizerte naval and air base, claiming that Tunisia is trying to hold a gun to its head. The French indicated they would boycott the General Assembly session.

Free Press business manager Henry Weider said the paper would seek a federal injunction barring the pickets. He said the strike was illegal and in violation of a contract.

Over \$1,300 Stolen From Home of Store Owner

in Crucial Vote**

**Lean to Democracy or
Soviet-Type Socialism
Likely Result**

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana (AP)—Voters in this tiny British colony of East Indians and Negroes on South America's north coast chose a new government today in an election that political experts believe may decide whether British Guiana moves on to democratic independence or Soviet-style socialism.

Cheddi Jagan, Socialist with Communist leanings who has dominated the colony's politics for eight years, moved to become its first premier. Opposing the

East Indian dentist for power over the 23,000 square miles of tropical territory are Forbes Burnham, Socialist lawyer leader of the Negro-dominated People's National Congress (PNC), and Peter Dagnan, an anti-Communist beer baron of Portuguese origin.

Jagan attacked the United States in an election eve statement and said he did not "propose to establish any form of totalitarian regime."

DOESN'T DENY RED TIES

Without denying his enemies' claim that his People's Progressive Party (PPP) is Communist, he said: "Events in Russia and Cuba have deeply wounded (North Americans' national pride and made their fear of communism psychopathic."

His opponents predicted that Jagan would lean to the Soviet side in the cold war if the PPP took enough seats in the legislature to form a new government. Jagan said he will lift the 38,000 Guianese from the "mire of poverty" will be taken from the United States, Britain or Russia "without commitment of any sort."

Let's Make Michigan Roads Example for Other States

Highway Commissioner JOHN C. MACKIE has announced a far reaching road plan for Michigan which looks well into the future.

Glancing ahead 20 years, Mr. Mackie believes the State will require \$11 billion, which is nearly \$3 billion more than the current revenue will provide.

The Press has just two questions: Is this enough? Will it do the job?

This newspaper believes that the Commissioner knows more about Michigan's roads and Michigan's needs for additional roads than anyone around. He has made an intensive study and deserves the hearty commendation of the entire citizenry.

Michigan has the biggest stake in roads of any State in the union. We manufacture the very products that use them. Beyond all other 49 Commonwealths, we should support a big broad, ample program that makes Michigan a model for other States to copy and emulate.

Let's set the pace. We must sound the tocsin for neighboring Commonwealths and lead them along the paths of progress by a sound, intelligent example.

If suddenly, all the roads in America could be doubled in width and doubled in numbers, Michigan and Pontiac would be the first and greatest gainers. The better the roads, the more America will use them. The wider the roads, the more America will ride. There—and there only—does the Nation use those magnificent transportation products which we produce.

Michigan must lead the way. She should stand first.

Fortunately, we have a Highway Commissioner with the breadth of vision to comprehend the situation.

Automobile drivers stay home by the millions rather than use bad roads. Automobile drivers stay home by the millions to avoid narrow, crowded and inadequate highways. But conversely, they come out by the millions when the "going is good," and when the highways avoid crowding.

Oakland County is earmarked for a sizable portion of this money and it should be. Commissioner Mackie recognizes that we're the second most populous county and about second in size. We're a gateway to the North from the most heavily populated area; and we're the same gateway for the return trip. Travel from all Eastern states "turns the corner" at Toledo and heads through Oakland County.

With the Chrysler Highway, our North-South situation will be vastly improved, but this big County is absolutely hamstrung on East-West traffic. Try driving out East Auburn. Try driving West past the airport. You're usually hog tied. Our roads have never kept pace with our huge population increase.

And we're still growing.

When Commissioner Mackie looks 20 years "down the road," he exercises the intelligent foresight that this Commonwealth

Again Appearing Around Lake That Has Its Name

Chip on shoulder: The most insupportable kind of wood.

In our early days the loon was quite prevalent in the Pontiac area. It is a most and could be found around most of our numerous lakes.

It gathered in large numbers around that Drayton Plains lake that bears its name. In fact, it drove most of the other birds away from that lake.

It is a scrappy bird to the extreme, and other birds, and the smaller wild animals, depart for other scenes just on hearing its eerie cry at night. That cry even has a mournful portent for humans.

However, residents along the north shore of our Lake now report that they have heard the bird's cry at frequent times in the night this summer. At least three people have seen a large and strange looking bird flying above the lake just before dark.

Highway department workers, engaged in the surfacing job on the Dixie Highway, which runs along the shore of Loon Lake, report having seen a mother loon and her convoy of six young birds on the waters of the lake, taking refuge in the tall grass on its shores when alarmed.

The full grown loon is a large bird, three feet long and weighing up to 12 pounds. It has a five-foot wing spread, and is one of the most expert swimmers and credited with being the most expert diver in the bird kingdom.

Its body feathers are checkered black and white, with a black head and neck, and under coating of light grey. Its long legs are black.

Although celebrated for its looney tricks, the loon is one of the wisest birds. Its queer antics are employed only to outwit mere man — which it usually does.

Forget about that mossy old gag, "Crazy as a loon." Its extreme wisdom probably accounts for its return to the Pontiac area.

Bet You Can't Explain What 'Allergy' Means

Allergy has become a household word these days, the fact that not many of us know what it actually means.

Perhaps the most graphic way to make its meaning clear is to compare it to a situation in which a policeman clubs the householder instead of the burglar.

Or a bank guard opens fire on a depositor instead of the holdup man.

In each of these instances, you see, the energy (ergon) that should have been expended in the interests of the defender was used in a manner that was alien to (alios) the purpose for which it was intended. Hence, allergic or allergy.

What actually happens when a defense force turns on the defender for whose preservation and protection it was organized and supported?

Scan Export to Red Lands

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. officials have been instructed to take a harder look at proposed exports to Iron Curtain countries. The new orders came because the volume of American goods licensed for shipment to Communist countries increased more than 80 per cent in the three weeks after President Kennedy's address to the nation on Berlin.

In the three weeks before Kennedy's July 25 radio-TV speech on the Berlin crisis, the Commerce Department authorized shipment of \$75,196 in American goods to the Soviet Union and its satellites.

With department officials apparently continuing to take a business-as-usual attitude after the Kennedy talk, the licensing total soared to \$5,278,566 in the next three weeks.

The increase came despite the attitude of Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges expressed in an Aug. 8 news conference.

I think the whole tempo and temper of our people in the last six or eight weeks has changed toward the question of any kind of trade with Russia," Hodges said then.

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Auto Union, Firms Aware of Financial Shock

By SAM DAWSON

NEW YORK (AP)—Auto strike talk is rising. Added volume normally can be expected as contract negotiations near the Aug. 31 deadline.

How much is blurt on either side, how much is real, you'll have to guess for yourself. But should the talk become action, the auto workers would have one of the fattest of labor's strike benefit funds to bolster them while off company payrolls.

And management, too, can be presumed to have prepared for the financial strain of a strike that would dash or delay Detroit's hopes of launching the 1962 model women into a higher orbit than this year or last.

Such planning is spreading in both union and management circles. And often customers of basic industries take suppliers' strike possibilities into account ahead of time.

VITAL PART OF PLANNING

More and more labor unions build up specific funds to assure the economic staying power of members during a strike. And management has learned that as well as production planning.

This year strike talk is particularly disturbing because of many touchy situations such as the Berlin crisis, relatively high percentage of unemployment, and the timing and strength of business recovery.

But if strikes come, the size of benefit funds and payment practices are important because: 1. They help to indicate how long a strike could last, and 2. They show to what extent purchasing power will be trimmed in affected communities.

To discover union practices, the National Industrial Conference Board queried 102 national and international unions with a total of about 14 million members.

Definite strike benefit plans are in force in 57, with 5 million members. Of these 41 have set up special funds to finance this strike aid. Some of the 43 reporting they haven't established benefit plans that tap their national funds, indicate that locals often have ways and means of their own of aiding individuals when they hit the picket lines.

Highest assessment on mem-

bers on the national scale is \$1.25 per month per member, paid by the United Auto Workers and the United Rubber Workers.

AS A YEAR LOWEST

Lowest assessment among those reporting is about \$1 a year set aside by Utility Workers.

Some most frequently reporting are in the 20 to 50 cent a month per member range. The conference board finds the medium to be 30 cents a month—that is, half differ as to married or single of the 57 reporting pay more than that, and half less.

Flat sum benefits are paid to strikers by 25 of the unions reporting. The range was \$5 a week by the Brewers' Union to \$50 a week by the Photoengravers and the Independent Mailers Union.

The median weekly amount is \$30.

But most unions use a sliding scale payment plan. It can be based on individual need, or on striking local and its members be men and as to number of dependents. Some union pay a per-

centage of the striker's average weekly wage.

A few withhold cash but distribute groceries and pay rent, utility and emergency bills.

Unions have rules about eligibility for benefit payments. Most call for approval of the strike by national or international headquarters. Others specify that a striking local and its members be in good financial standing with the national organization, that

strikers be available for picket duty, that strikers can't be paid if earning more than a specified amount at other employment.

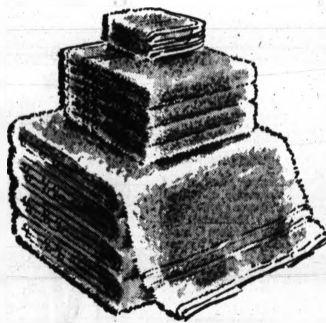
Sixteen unions start paying benefits during the second week of a strike, 20 during the third week, 2 during the fourth week. Some start paying at the discretion of top officials. And some start paying the second day of the strike.

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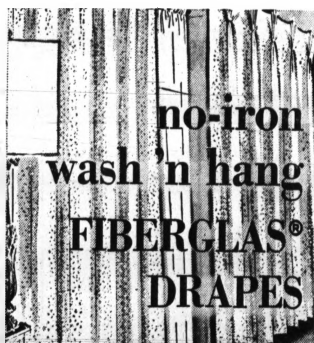
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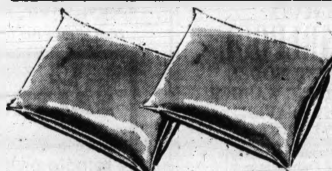
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5 People Killed in Bolivia Riots

Many Hurt as Violence Erupts in Santa Cruz Over Accused Politico

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — Five persons were killed Sunday and an undetermined number injured in political riots in Santa Cruz, press reports said today.

The riots erupted from demonstrations in support of Sen. Luis Sandoval Moron, Santa Cruz political boss, accused by his own political party of complicity in large-scale smuggling operations in eastern Bolivia.

Santa Cruz was declared a military zone Aug. 2 after a Constellation plane flown by Americans landed in that eastern city and was seized on smuggling charges. The five members of the crew were arrested.

Sandoval Moron was fired from his post of leader of the government's political party, the National Revolutionary Movement, after the plane incident. He has remained in La Paz and the government of President Victor Paz Estenssoro has refused him permission to return to Santa Cruz.

The riots developed after demonstrations in the main square by the senator's followers, who demanded that Sandoval Moron be allowed to return home. The demonstrations got out of hand and troops and police moved in and broke them up.

Little Leaguers: a Boon to U.S.

EDITOR'S NOTE—Following is the last of three articles in a series "How Women Can Watch, Coach and Better Baseball This Season" by Jerry Coleman, former manager of the New York Yankees and now a division director with the Phillips-Van Heusen Corp.

If you have a son who is a member of a Little League baseball team, you find that he has become "one of the boys." Accept the challenge gracefully—and with sufficient knowledge.

How It Started:

Little League baseball is regular baseball with an important idea behind it. Today about 250,000 young boys under 12 play Little League baseball, thanks to a little fellow who once sat on a fence in Williamsport, Pa., and couldn't play it.

He wasn't old enough, so Carl E. Stots grew up with an idea cooking in his brain, and in 1939 he organized the Little League program. As a result, America took one of the biggest and best strides forward in the development of its youth.

How It Differs from Major League

Little League baseball is actually the major league game scaled down in size for youngsters. The ball fields are smaller, the bats lighter and down the line everything is made smaller to facilitate easier handling by youngsters.

Out of the stress of competition many new problems will arise to challenge the judgment and sportsmanship of the mothers.

The following is a creed of fair play that might serve as a guideline for proper thinking about the salient features of Little League baseball.

The Player:

He lives clean, and plays hard. He plays for the love of the game and wins

without boasting, loses without excuses and never quits. He also learns the rules, respects the officials and accepts their decisions without question. The contestant has responsibility to his family, team, league, community and country.

The Coach:

He is a man who inspires a love of the game and a desire "to win." He teaches the players to win fairly and respect officials. He is a prototype of the man the boys want to be. He may be your husband, and if he is, you make his work pleasanter and easier by keeping his weekends free of too many social engagements. There is need, too, for your participation in the project.

The Officials:

They know the rules and are fair and firm in all decisions. They treat everyone courteously and alike. They never supersede the game.

The Spectator:

He or she never bores a player for making an error or a mishap. He respects decisions of all officials and strives constantly to set an example of sportsmanship by good conduct.

As an old major leaguer, who has played in six World Series, where competition was utterly severe, I know that the objectives of the Little League are the same as those of the major leagues. Nothing is more important than keeping the game clean and exemplifying the best qualities of sportsmanship.

As Ford Frick, commissioner of baseball put it, "Little League baseball properly conducted in local communities is one of the finest things that ever happened to this country."

Nikita Wins 1st Round in Berlin

The Berlin border crisis goes into its second week today, and the West might as well face up to this unpleasant fact: The Communists have won the first round.

Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev has been eager for a long time to do these things:

—Stop the flow of East Germans who have been fleeing to the West. This has been done. The crisis became especially acute when the cream of East German big game—doctors, lawyers, skilled craftsmen.

—Make it impossible for East Germans to go into West Berlin and compare living conditions there with their own substandard economy. This has been done.

—Establish the principle that East Germany is a separate and sovereign nation and that East Berlin is an integral part of it. This has been done.

While Khrushchev has been acting, the West has been reacting to his moves. The reaction has been defensive in nature. Last week Mayor Willy Brandt of West Berlin wrote an urgent letter to President Kennedy. It is known today that it was a desperate call for help.

The low point for West Berlin apparently was last Thursday evening. There was genuine fear that the morale of the city was collapsing and some officials even were predicting there would be a mass flight of West Berliners out of the crisis city into the safe of West Germany, 110 miles to the West.

Kennedy reacted promptly. It was announced that Vice President Lyndon Johnson would fly to Berlin and that the American garrison there would be reinforced by 1,500 troops.

Both moves were in the nick of time. Johnson, using the breezy Texas campaigning technique that he has developed into a political art, was a smash hit as he roared around West Berlin, making speeches and handing out souvenir ball point pens.

The American troops who paraded down West Berlin's main street Sunday brought the allied garrison there up to about 10,000 men. The Communists, with 400,000 men in and near Berlin, could overrun them in a matter of hours if they should suddenly attack some dawn.

But the mission of the 1,500 Americans was more political than

military. They restored the faith of the West Berliners in America's intention to stand firm.

So the extent of the Western alliance's success to date is that two firm gestures have been made without starting World War III.

The crucial question is whether they should have been firmer and insisted that travel between East and West Berlin be allowed to flow. There is no point in second-guessing Kennedy on this one, because the risk of an armed clash would have been enormous and probably even if you get guarantees of today.

The London Sunday Times, for instance, carried these quotes from a perhaps overly-pessimistic West Berlin workman:

"When the Red flag is flying over Buckingham Palace, remember that it all started on Aug. 13, that day you British let the Communists get away with sealing off East Berlin. They won't stop now, not in three months, quietly turned 31 today."

investigating the fires found an unexploded bomb at one of the villages. The RCMP said arson was evident in all of the fires.

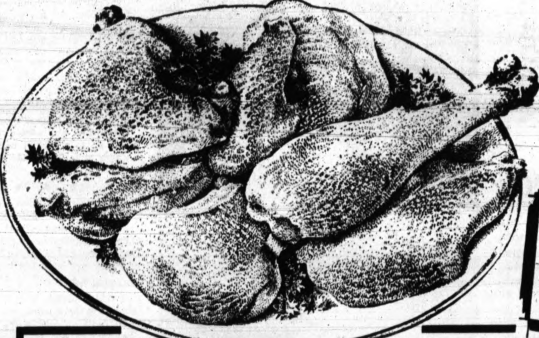

County Farmers to Vote on Wheat Quota for 1962

Wheat producers will vote Thursday on whether marketing quotas will be in effect for the 1962 wheat crop. Robert H. Long, chairman of the Oakland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminded growers today.

In setting the Aug. 24 referendum date, Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman said, "The decision that farmers make is extremely important to them and to the rest of the nation, not only for 1962 but also for many years to come."

"The program available with quotas in effect would be far different from that which could be operated without quotas, he indicated. If quotas are approved by at least two-thirds of the farmers who vote Aug. 24, co-operators will be eligible for 1962 price support.

Wheat farmers also will be eligible to participate in the wheat stabilization program which provided payments for diverting acreage from production into conservation if the quotas are approved.

Producers are eligible to vote in the forthcoming wheat quota referendum if their farm has produced more than 13.5 acres of wheat in at least one of the years 1959, 1960 and 1961.

For the townships of Troy, Bloomfield, Southfield and Royal Oak at the Oakland County ASC office, 18 S. Perry St., Room 323 Hubbard Bldg., Pontiac.

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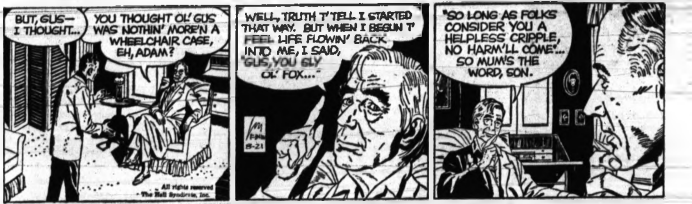

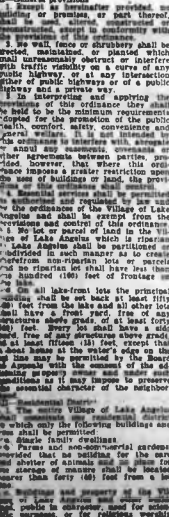

Scare Buying Not Evident
Despite Possibility of War

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Despite the possibility of war over Berlin and the strengthening of U.S. military forces, consumers and businessmen have refrained from the scare buying President Kennedy and his advisers feared.

Moreover, the President's economic aides believe that on purely economic grounds—that is, omitting the still real possibility of war—nerves hoarding—inflation is unlikely in the months ahead.

Top officials are greatly relieved that Kennedy's July 13 nationally televised speech on the Berlin crisis did not touch

off a buying binge. There has been much worry in the days preceding the speech about the effect it would have on the public.

"We're still intensely concerned and watching price developments much more closely than previously," commented one high official. "But by and large we have been very reassured."

Several wholesale price and commodity price indexes back up economists' "feel" of the situation—that consumers and businessmen have not panicked and are buying and ordering in normal fashion.

ECONOMISTS CONFIDENT

What slight upward drift has occurred in some of the indexes since July 25 is attributed to seasonal factors and the continuing expansion in the economy. Industrial production has increased for five months in a row. Yet, top government economists are confident that the business upswing is not about to touch off a round of price increases.

"Barring major changes in the international atmosphere, which can always occur, the outlook for price stability for the months ahead is very good," Kermit Gordon, one of Kennedy's economic advisers, told United Press International.

Why was there no wave of scare buying? The economists admit they do not know. One speculation is that the American people do not really believe the Berlin crisis will lead over into war.

Inasmuch as hoarding developed the first week after the Korean War started, officials are hopeful that the absence of hoarding in the past three weeks indicates that the greatest danger is past.

Call Off Threat
to Blockade U.S.
Ships on Seaway

OTTAWA (UPI)—Canadian dock workers on the St. Lawrence Seaway and Welland Canal have suspended their threat to blockade American shipping on the inland waterways for the time being.

The Canadian Brotherhood of Railway, Transport and General Workers lifted its threat of retaliation against a boycott of the Canadian-managed one freighter Northern Venture by Duluth dockworkers, provided the ship is allowed to fly freely on the Great Lakes.

W. J. Smith, president of the 40,000-member brotherhood, said no action now is planned for the moment. "But if the ship is interfered with again, we certainly will act."

School Scandal
Action Urged

Rockefeller Asks N.Y. Legislature to Declare State of Emergency

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller called upon a special session of the New York Legislature today to declare a state of emergency in the scandal-ridden school system of New York City.

The Republican-controlled legislature was ready to approve the GOP governor's recommendations for a series of sweeping reforms. Minority Democrats balked at some details.

The New York City administration is Democratic-controlled. Rockefeller, in a message prepared for the special session, told the lawmakers: "The crisis in New York City's public schools stems from the reluctance of city leadership to assume its responsibilities and take decisive action."

BESIEGE BY CHARGES

The New York City school system, which comprises a million pupils, 40,000 teachers, 800 schools and an annual operating budget of \$650 million, has been beset by charges of graft and corruption in building programs, hazardous conditions in present schools and inefficient administration.

Rockefeller asked the legislature to:

1. Proclaim a state of emergency in the giant school system throughout the next school year.
2. Authorize Mayor Robert F. Wagner to appoint a new, nine-member school board from a select list of 18 nominees to be submitted by a panel of educators and other community leaders.
3. Require the new board to make periodic reports of what it does to eliminate corruption and otherwise improve conditions in the system.
4. Give the new board power to appoint members of the 54 local school boards that function within the system. Those members now are appointed by borough presidents.
5. Provide \$175,000 to help the new board get started, make its reports and finance drafting of legislation for later, long-range improvements in the system.

Many Schools Adding 4th 'R'—Rigor—in Fall

It's about time—The school bus is in the line for millions of children. When they get to school, they find a fourth "R" has been added to the list of "R's" that stand for "Rigor."

WASHINGTON — Renewed emphasis on reading, writing and arithmetic, and a rapid spread in foreign language teaching, space science and how-to-study courses.

That will be the pattern in many public schools this fall when more than 37 million pupils return to the classroom.

A survey by the National Education Association (NEA), released today, indicates that grade schools and high schools from coast to coast are adding a fourth "R"—"rigor"—to the curriculum. The survey does not necessarily indicate a trend. But some of the examples cited should please even the most bitter of those critics who call American education "soft."

CLASS TIME DOUBLED

In Davenport, Iowa, for instance, English classes for all 7th and 8th graders will be extended from 45 to 90 minutes a day. Emphasis will be on spelling, reading and writing.

Teachers will have lighter classroom loads so they can spend time on lesson preparation, grading lessons, etc.

In Beverly Hills, Calif., students in grades 7 through 12 will be expected to write at least one theme a week.

Auburn, N.Y., plans increased emphasis on teaching pupils to

write—and so does Harvey, Ill., and Mt. Lebanon, Pa.

A poor reader is inevitably a poor learner. Many schools this fall will introduce special courses to meet this problem.

Cheyenne, Wyo., hopes to identify potentially poor readers as early as kindergarten.

Many cities, such as Farmingdale, N.Y., will offer remedial reading courses all the way through grade school and high school.

Some cities, such as Union City, N.J., and Medford, Mass., have introduced special programs for teachers to improve reading instruction.

'ARITHMETIC OF FLYING'

New program of arithmetic and mathematics, particularly those developed at Yale and the University of Illinois, are winning general acceptance across the country. The NEA survey indicated.

Mr. Vernon, N.Y., has gone a step further with a course in "The Arithmetic of Flying," designed to show the new importance of mathematics in the space age.

IN ANOTHER MOVE TO KEEP THE SCHOOLS UP WITH THE SPACE AGE, PARMA, OHIO, REPORTED IT WILL INTRODUCE THIS FALL A COURSE IN ASTRONOMY, COMPLETE WITH PLANETARIUM.

Other schools reported that earth science courses are becoming increasingly popular.

Foreign language courses are spreading so rapidly through the U.S. public schools that the figures are running far behind the facts.

IN SANTA CRUZ, CALIF., ALL PUPILS FROM KINDERGARTEN THROUGH THE

sixth grade will get Spanish lessons this fall.

In Farmingdale, N.Y., all students from grade 4 through 12 will have a 30-minute period of conversational foreign language, five days a week, all year long.

Marion, Ohio, is working toward a 16-year sequence in Spanish.

Most educators agree that many college students flunk out in their freshman year only because they don't know how to study.

This year, for the first time in the annual NEA survey, many high schools reported they plan special courses to meet this problem.

In Laredo, Tex., for instance, there will be a one semester course in how to study, designed especially for college-bound students.

Boise, Idaho, and Tyler, Tex., plan similar programs with emphasis on taking notes in the classroom.

Other developments turned up in the survey.

Bloomfield, N.J., will experiment with the use of teaching machines in special classes for mentally retarded children.

Reno, Nev., plans special classes for slow learners in junior high school.

Casper, Wyo., is scheduling more

Owen C. Pyle of Louisville, Ky., president of the company, said the production will be absorbed by the company's three other plants in West Virginia, Missouri and Kentucky.

Old-Fashioned Fish Fry Fair Game for Tax Man

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (UPI) — Even the old fashioned charity fish fry has fallen prey to the tax collector.

Illinois Atty. Gen. William Clark has ruled that under the state's newly expanded sales tax law such events as fish fries, ice cream socials and watermelon feeds staged by charitable organizations are fair game for the tax collector if tickets are sold to the public.

Goldberg Gets New Briefing

Met's President Goes to Denver, Gives Report on Labor Dispute

DENVER, Colo. (AP) — Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg will be briefed for the second time in as many days today on the Metropolitan Opera Association's stand on a labor dispute which has led to cancellation of the Met's 1961-62 season.

Goldberg will meet here with Anthony A. Bliss, president of the Met, who came to Denver from his Montana ranch.

The two talked for more than an hour Sunday about a dispute over wages involving the Met and Local 802 of the Musicians Union.

A spokesman for the labor secretary said Goldberg has a meeting scheduled Tuesday with Alfred J. Manuti, president of the union local, who will brief Goldberg on the union's position.

Twice in recent weeks opera officials have announced flatly that the winter season, scheduled to begin in October, has been canceled.

The musicians are asking a wage increase from \$10 a week to \$248. The Met termed the demand exorbitant, and countered with an offer of \$3-a-week raise in each of the next two seasons, plus fringe benefits it said would bring the total increase to 14 per cent.

GOP Asked to Back Moderates' Aims

LANSING (AP) — A group of moderate GOP state senators faced the task today of persuading other Republicans to support a legislative program billed as a constructive long-range project to change Michigan's image as a "problem state."

In a conciliatory move, the eight senators decided during three days of closed-door meetings in Traverse City to seek the cooperation of State Central Committee members and other lawmakers in launching the new program.

During their session, the moderates adopted a "middle-of-the-road" platform of their own, which included proposals for more money for mental health and higher education, civil rights legislation, complete tax revision and elimination of wasteful spending by state agencies.

"We do not intend to belabor the point," they said, "but a review of the last legislative session demonstrates the necessity for new thinking and new approaches in considering the problems facing Michigan."

State Chairman George M. Van Pelt praised the moderates for their willingness to discuss their program with other Republicans and to listen to suggestions and ideas.

"This means a new look for the GOP," he said, "creating a closer relationship between the State Central Committee and the legislature."

Van Pelt said in an interview after the session that he was "pleased" to see the moderates' program, "especially that they had not had time to study it thoroughly."

The state chairman said he would see to it that copies of the ten-point proposals are sent out to key members of the party. And the entire program probably will be discussed, he said, at a GOP conference at St. Joseph next month.

Beeble plans to send out copies of the program this week to other Republican state senators, along with some of his own observations. The program also is expected to be aired at a meeting this weekend at the Ann Arbor home of Sen. Stanley Thayer, one of the moderates. Some Republican leaders, most of whom are sympathetic with the moderates' aims, have been invited.

Included are Paul D. Bagwell, GOP candidate for governor in 1958 and 1960; former State Chairman Lawrence B. Lindner; and National Committeeman John B. Martin.

At their Traverse City meeting, the moderates appeared to be in a somewhat less belligerent mood than they were at the close of the legislative session last June. At that time, they were critical of both the Democrats, for what they considered a double-cross in a proposed coalition, and the old-guard Senate conservatives, who opposed their program.

\$1-Million Fire Destroys N.J. Railroad Terminal

WEEHAWKEN, N.J. (AP) — A half-million dollar railroad terminal and dock area was destroyed today by a fire which raged for three hours before it was brought under control. It was the second big New Jersey waterfront fire within three days.

Fire department officials said the blaze caused more than a million dollars in damage. The fire apparently started at the New York Central Railroad abandoned 42nd Street ferry, officials said. The first alarm was received at 3:15 a.m.

Forty-five minutes later, the huge ferry terminal, adjoining docks, and several nearby freight sheds and boxcars had been reduced to a glowing pile of crackling timber. Flames could be seen from the center of Manhattan on the New York side of the river.

The terminal building covered almost a full city block. It was a one-story, shed-type frame building. It had been abandoned about four years ago, when the New York Central eliminated passenger service on that line.

Four hundred firemen from 12 departments in Hudson and Bergen counties were joined by fireboats from New York City and the Coast Guard in fighting to contain the blaze. They were struggling against a shifting wind that kept the flames blowing.

During the fire, six trucks were recalled to West New York, N.J., just north of Weehawken, where a fire destroyed three piers at an estimated \$1-million loss Friday night.
