

Family Dog's Last Act: Barking to Wake of the Fire

Sugar, a little mongrel dog lost his life in a Commerce Township house fire this morning but his frantic barking was credited with possibly saving the lives of his owners.

Township fireman Clifford Campion said the dog's barking aroused Mrs. Carol O'Toole who was able to get her three children, Ronnie, 10, Ricky, 9, and Michelle O'Toole, 5, out safely.

He said a fourth child was not at home.
Mrs. O'Toole was burned around the head and shoulders and is in satisfactory condition at Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital.

The children were not hurt, according to Campion.
Firemen apparently discovered the dog's body after the fire was put out about 5:30 a.m.
"It was apparently his barking that woke the mother in time," said Campion.

HOUSE DAMAGED
Campion said the fire at 3180 Brisbane, which broke out about 3:50 a.m., caused an estimated

\$5,000 damage to the house and about \$2,000 damage to its contents. He said it destroyed the interior of the one-story home.

Cause of the fire was attributed to defective wiring in the kitchen.
The Commerce Township Fire Department was assisted by Walled Lake.

Light Turnout Seen for Tomorrow's Vote

Slightly more than half of Oakland County's 350,000 registered voters are expected to go to the polls in tomorrow general election.

County Clerk-Register of Deeds John D. Murphy today estimated the turnout at 180,000, with the total possibly reaching 200,000 if weather conditions improve.

The estimated turnout falls far below the record 295,735 voters who cast ballots in the

1964 presidential election, and the 257,684 in the 1962 off-year general election.

State Elections Commissioner Robert Montgomery has esti-

mated a statewide vote of about 2.7 million for tomorrow.

Murphy's estimate for tomorrow is only 80,000 to 80,000 more

than the record turnout in the August primary of 120,000.

He said the total vote could go higher if voters show an interest in a county proposals on a millage increase for a county park system.

A number of proposals in local communities, a few of them involving tax increases, could generate further concern, and add to the total vote, said Murphy.

In Waterford Township, where there are 24,222 registered vot-

ers, property owners will be asked to decide a proposed one-mill tax increase to aid the fire department.

Pontiac has approximately 35,400 voters registered for tomorrow's election, about 400 less than in the 1964 election.

Voting machines will be used throughout Oakland County with the exception of the City of Orchard Lake Village and the townships of Brandon and Groveland, where paper ballots are used.

Traffic Claims 4 From Area

Crash Kills City Man in Bloomfield Twp.

Weekend traffic accidents took the lives of four Pontiac area residents, including a Pontiac man who died Saturday when his car ran into a traffic sign in Bloomfield Township.

Dead are Glen D. Platt, 59, of 19 Salmer; Mrs. Ralph Seiling, 51, of 60 Edison; Mrs. Richard McEneaney, 39, of 931 N. Perry; and Mrs. Robert Young, 33, of 201 Maple, Almont.

Bloomfield Township police said Platt was fatally injured when his car apparently went out of control while entering a restaurant parking lot at Hunter Boulevard and Oak Street.

Platt's wife, Melba, 53, with her husband in the car, is reported in satisfactory condition at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital.

Mrs. Seiling and Mrs. McBride were killed Saturday in a head-on collision on Hall Road about seven miles west of Utica.

Macomb County sheriff's deputies said a car driven by Mrs. Seiling collided with a car driven by Herman Black, 34, of Mount Clemens. Black is reported in critical condition at Mount Clemens St. Joseph Hospital.

Mrs. Young died early Saturday in a collision at the intersection of Van Dyke and 14 Mile in Warren.

2 Youths Arrested in Area Destruction

Two Avon Township youths were arrested by Oakland County sheriff's deputies early today in the wake of a \$2,500 spree of destruction through Troy and Avon Township.

David H. Burnell, 17, stepson of Norman Pardike, 2550 Leach; and Martin L. Clason, 18, son of Harold Clason of 3031 St. Clair, face a charge of arraignment on charges of malicious destruction over \$100.

Conviction on the charge — a felony — carries up to two years imprisonment.

Sgt. James Sites and Deputy Roland Pless took Burnell and Clason into custody shortly before 2:30 a.m. on Waukegan Road in Avon Township.

Deputies said the pair was in a car parked near a battered mailbox — one of some 60 mailboxes bludgeoned and shattered with what investigators believe was a heavy iron bar.

Focal point of the destruction, which apparently began in Troy, were business and store windows smashed with thrown beer bottles in the Auburn-Livermore area south of Rochester.

2nd Funeral in Tragic Case

Bizarre Events Saw Orion Girl, Man Die

ORION TOWNSHIP — A sense of tragedy hung over the area today as petite, dark-haired Mrs. Alfred B. Howey Jr. buried her husband in a service from the Bossardet Funeral Home of Oxford.

It was the public windup to a sequence of bizarre events in which the lives of two persons were taken by self-inflicted gun wounds — apparently the result of an unthinking Halloween prank.

In the death of Howey, the impulse which caused the hunter and fisherman to use his 20-gauge shotgun against himself was attributed to a series of harassing phone calls.

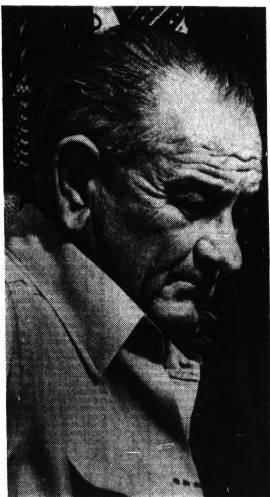
He was blamed by the callers for initiating a series of events which last Tuesday ended in the death of 13-year-old Charlotte Hinton.

Howey, the father of two daughters — one about the age of the Hinton girl, could apparently no longer stand the accusations, even though, as Sheriff Capt. Leo Hazen said later, he had not been responsible for the Hinton girl's apprehension over allegedly defacing mailboxes.

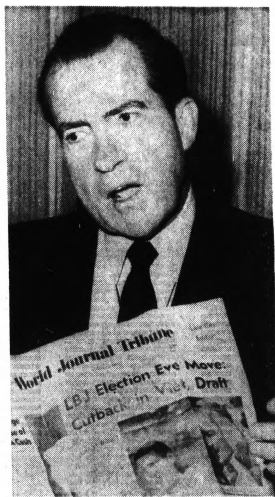
DEATH FOLLOWED TALK

The girl killed herself within an hour after being talked to by a deputy sheriff about the mailbox vandalism. Charlotte, the daughter of Edward G. Hinton of Metamora and Mrs. Ralph J. Bowen of 66 Goldenside, was 13.

Romney, LBJ, Nixon

Report on 3 Political Big Guns

NEW YORK (AP) — Richard M. Nixon urges the American people to turn from President Johnson to Congress for new leadership and to fill Congress with "men who will stand up for the people when the President is wrong."

The former vice president, campaigning for Republican candidates in tomorrow's election, sounded the call to the voters yesterday as he made two half-hour national television broadcasts.

Nixon accused Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara of indulging in "political fakery" by making a pre-election announcement of a forthcoming slowdown in the dispatch of troops to Viet Nam.

He called the secretary "Lyndon Johnson's Charlie McCarthy," his political stooge for lying to the political atmosphere of the LBJ Ranch in Texas as to say that next year's build-up would be less than the 200,000 men sent to Southeast Asia this year. McNamara also predicted a cut in draft quotas.

Nixon said the move "impaired the integrity of the office of secretary of defense."

NO NEW FEUD

Johnson, questioned by reporters in Texas, refused to renew his feud with the former vice president.

DETROIT (AP) — A possible 1968 presidential bid by George Romney may be on the line tomorrow when voters choose between the Michigan governor and his Democratic challenger, Zoltan Ferency.

Romney, 59, has been given a 2-1 margin in most polls to win a third term as a governor.

Ferency, 42, Democratic state chairman, has said Romney is considering a bid for the 1968 Republican presidential nomination. Romney has turned aside questions on whether he has White House ambitions.

Romney, former president of American Motors Corp., ended his campaign Saturday except for a news conference today.

But Ferency continued today the active campaign he has been pressing among the normally Democratic labor movement in metropolitan Detroit.

LANDSLIDE POSSIBLE

Romney's potential to win in a landslide is deemed a factor in the election bid by Robert P. Griffin, named by the governor last spring to fill a vacancy created by the death of Sen. Patrick V. McNamara, D-Mich.

Observers and polls have cited a close contest for the Senate between Griffin, 42, a former five-term congressman, and Williams, one of the state's most popular politicians in decades.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson heads today for his old schoolteaching haunts halfway between his ranch and the Mexican border to deliver a day before election speech on education.

Later in the day, the President will drop by Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio for presurgical tests.

He hoped to have his operations there later this week — sooner than originally expected — because he said: "As long as you have a kind of curtain hanging over you, not knowing what is in your throat, what is going to be the result of it, the best way to do it is to just hit the cold water."

Ades said the National Education Association suggested some time ago that Johnson mark National Education Week, which started today, with a speech at the 200-pupil Welhausen School in Cotulla, where he taught Mexican-American students in the late 1920s.

As it turned out, the President was looking for an opportunity to make a "nonpolitical" election eve appearance close to his ranch.

REDUCED WORK

Johnson flew to the ranch Friday for a period of "reduced work" prior to operations to remove a growth from his throat and to repair an abdominal hernia which has formed at the site of his 1965 gall bladder-kidney stone operation.

After going to Episcopal Church services yesterday in Fredericksburg, 15 miles west of his ranch, Johnson told a news conference he wants to expedite the surgery.

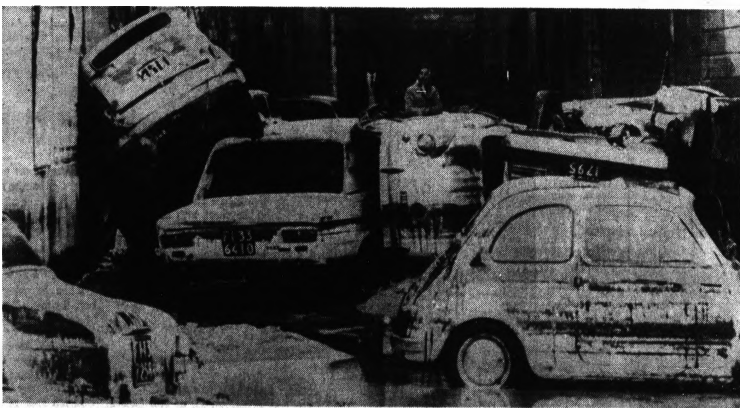
Rain to Remain; Mercury to Rise

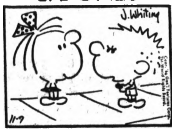

Cong Unit Eludes Pursuing Gls

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — A large Viet Cong force eluded pursuing U.S. infantrymen today, slipping away through the dense jungle of Tay Ninh Province near the Cambodian border after inflicting heavy casualties on some U.S. units over the weekend in one of the fiercest fights of the war.

About 200 South Vietnamese militia, aided by accurate artillery support, beat off an unsuccessful attack by 400 to 500 Communist on a government post 12 miles southeast of Quang Ngai, on the central coast. A scene said there had been only South Vietnamese spokesman isolated sniper fire during the day.

Three new operations were announced, two by American forces and one by several South Vietnamese battalions.

A U.S. military spokesman reported "absolutely no contact" in Tay Ninh Province some 50 miles northwest of Saigon.

The American infantrymen swept through a complex of enemy bunkers in dense jungle today. The bunkers had been stoutly defended until air strikes and artillery apparently forced a retreat. The spokesman said no Viet Cong were found in the area. This was the region from which the Communists had launched human wave assaults against the attacking American forces.

Military analysts in Saigon said the stiff enemy resistance apparently developed because the Communists felt the U.S. probes were getting too close to the guerrillas' "central office for South Viet Nam," thought to be somewhere near the Cambodian border.

The five, released on \$1,000 bond each following their arraignment, are charged with conspiracy to violate state gambling laws.

The warrants for their arrests were signed by one-man Grand Juror Philip Pratt, who is conducting the second grand jury probe. The present investigation was launched in August to investigate alleged criminal activities surrounding the Hazel Park Race Track.

Saturday's raids were conducted about an hour before post time at the Detroit Race Course, Livonia. It was the last day of the racing season at the track.

City officials report that this tract of land is the site of some dilapidated buildings.

The city is to acquire the land and demolish the buildings.

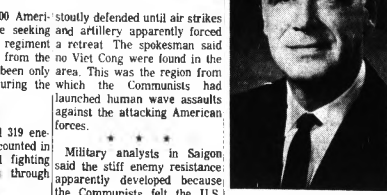

Ex-Assistant to Bronson in Sticker Race

An assistant prosecutor who was fired when he decided to seek nomination for Circuit Court judge in the August primary election announced today he is running as a sticker candidate for a short term on the bench.

Walter D. Schmier, 58, said that he has distributed "several thousand" name stickers to be used in tomorrow's general election.

The post will be won by the attorney who receives the most write-in or sticker votes. No name appears on the ballot for the short term since no one filed nominating petitions for it.

The short term resulted from the death of Judge Stanton G. Dondero, and runs to Dec. 31.

Schmier of 8577 Hendrie, Huntington Woods, was dismissed in March by Oakland County Prosecutor Jerome Bronson, when Schmier announced he was a candidate.

Bronson, too, was a candidate, and successful in winning one of the six nominations to fill three full Circuit Court terms to be decided tomorrow.

Schmier, who today entered private practice with the Waterford Township law firm of Smith and Magnusson, finished eighth among the 22 candidates in the primary.

LBJ Plans Tied to New House

WASHINGTON (AP) — The future of President Johnson's "Great Society" could be largely determined Tuesday when voters select a new House of Representatives.

Although Democrats appear certain to retain control of the House, it seems equally certain the big majority that enabled Johnson to launch his far-reaching domestic program will be reduced.

The question, which can't be answered until the polls close, is how much?

On election eve, Democratic and Republican strategists, in separate assessments of House races, are in near agreement that Republicans stand to gain between 25 and 30 seats. They had 149 seats to the Democrats' 285 in the 89th Congress.

RELAYS ASSESSMENT Johnson refused Sunday to predict election results, but passed along the assessment of Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien that Democrats would lose fewer than 40 House seats — the 32-year average loss in off-year elections for the party in power.

But there is an uneasiness among some Democrats and a bubbling hope in Republican ranks that the GOP pickup could be greater.

Traffic Problem Will Be Aired

BIRMINGHAM — The City Commission tonight will be asked to consider the problem of what home owners call "excessive volume" of traffic on Willits.

In a letter to the commission, a spokesman for the home owners said the traffic is "extremely excessive" and that the problem is aggravated by the narrow width of the street and its steep hills and sharp curves.

Residents say, these factors create safety hazards, the noise of squealing tires and "loss of residential amenities."

Home owners are reportedly prevented from backing out of their driveways by congestion at the intersection of Chester and Willits.

They suggest several solutions including closing Willits anywhere between Greenwood and Baldwin.

"MODERATE VOLUMES" In a report on the situation, Police Chief Ralph Moxley said that traffic counts taken recently showed "moderate traffic volumes" for this type of residential street. He said it is normal for a street located adjacent to a business district.

He did say, however, that he was concerned about the speed of vehicles there and that speed limit signs will be posted and additional radar enforcement effort applied.

BIRMINGHAM — The Michigan Historical Commission's Historymobile will visit Birmingham Friday.

It will be located at Henrietta at 15th Park and will open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. through Sunday.

The Historymobile is valued at more than \$50,000. buried Friday from Allen's Funeral Home in Lake Orion.

Initial cause of the tragedy was pinned on the defendant as several neighbors in the area's south of the Village of Lake Orion.

Neighbors near the Howays reported several such incidents occurring over a period of time.

The area is one of wide lawns, long driveways and homes ranging from nearly new to aged.

HIGHLY REGARDED The Howey house sits on top of a knoll — its own neatness visible in the new gray paint job and the new garage, only recently completed — where the Howays' body was found slumped over the wheel of his car.

The Howey family is spoken of with high regard by residents of the area.

A 25-year-old resident said that while the Howays had lived there over the past 10 or 12 years the neighbors had never once found reason to complain.

"Why Mr. Howey used to bring us fruit," said the elderly parents of a retarded son.

Authorities now say that the Hinton girl, who lived perhaps a half mile away, had often threatened to kill herself in the past. She was classed as a "borderline" case at Lake Orion Community High School by family friends.

Michigan faces many sharp races tomorrow, but Governor and Senator command the greatest interest.

Few doubt the outcome of the contest for Governor. Businessman ROMNEY stepped into office with a staggering deficit staring him in the face, but today the State is solvent and we haven't heard of a payless payday since "SOAPY" departed. Governor ROMNEY is an odds-on choice. He has the ability, and the business training backed by a fine standing across the nation.

ROMNEY's the man by miles.

The question of U. S. Senator brings G. Mennen Williams against Robert P. Griffin.

The Pontiac Press feels Griffin will definitely contribute the most to Michigan. He has no stigma of past failures but enjoys a fine reputation as a "poor man" who fought his way to the top by sheer determination and ability. His opponent is a child of inherited wealth and while this is no disgrace, he has never been

compelled to succeed personally in the ruthless marts of competitive trade.

When Governor WILLIAMS left Michigan, his associates expected him to land a choice appointive political plum, but it never materialized. Apparently, he was found wanting by his Democratic superiors who shunted him off to Africa.

Senator GRIFFIN is "self-made" in every sense. He worked from earliest childhood and was actually employed right here in Pontiac along the assembly line at one time. Pontiac and Oakland County can take a personal pride in his fine rise to success and splendid achievements. He knows about the problems of the workingman firsthand. And, he isn't clutched in the tightly closed palms of smiling labor leaders who can chuck him in their vest pocket and leave him there.

The Landrum-Griffin act bears his name and is virtually a "bill of rights" for the workingman, protecting him against possible injustices within and outside of a union. The original draft was sponsored by the late President KENNEDY when he was in the Senate.

At the outset, former Governor Williams figured he was a "shoo-in," and many of his associates and some of the opposition went along with this. But this picture has changed daily. As the lines became more clearly drawn, popular sentiment edged perceptibly towards Griffin until polls show him out in front. This race is attracting nationwide attention.

The Press indicated political choices Friday, tapping both Republicans and Democrats. But the top struggle is for the Senate and the Governorship.

The men are miles apart. Help your own State progress. Governor Romney and Senator Griffin are the outstanding choices.

President Disability Plan Weak

WASHINGTON—Every time a president gets sick or goes to the hospital for an operation, people become worried about what may happen if he were to be incapacitated for any length of time.

The American presidential system in this respect is plainly inadequate.

Although warning signals have often been given, nothing has been done to accomplish a satisfactory transition of presidential power whether it be for one day or week or month or longer.

A constitutional amendment which now is pending, and which needs ratification by seven more states for adoption, deals with situations arising from temporary disability, but the plan projects a vice president suddenly into the executive power when he really isn't thoroughly familiar with the confidential documents and background relating to all the important problems which will face him immediately.

In contrast, the British and Canadian parliamentary systems take care of any similar emergencies because the Cabinet — and not one man — is responsible to the Country.

Inside the Cabinet, every member is familiar with the day-by-day operations of the government, and an acting prime minister can take over in a few minutes. This maintains public confidence and assures absolute continuity until such time as an election may provide a change of leadership or party.

Under the American system, the vice president has duties that are largely ceremonial or political. He is supposed to preside over the Senate, and does so infrequently. He may attend Cabinet sessions but, under Presidents Kennedy and Johnson, these meetings have been held only occasionally.

How can a vice president suddenly assume the duties of a president and acquire overnight an intimate knowledge of every important question on which a decision has to be made?

In a nuclear age, action might have to be taken within minutes or hours, and it is not possible to familiarize anybody with the essentials of crucial matters in such a brief time.

Even apart from the problem of how to handle the transfer of presidential power in case of a long or short illness of the chief executive, a serious and unresolved question is whether any one man should ever wield the powers

that a president of the United States does today.

If, instead, 10 of the best qualified men in the country within the president's party were chosen for the Cabinet and were not bogged down with administrative duties, the chief executive would have at his side constantly a group of advisors well-informed on national policies.

The need for more attention to this reform is being demonstrated again today.

"No one can ever compute what Equipoise might have won if he were running today, with the big purses available. I doubt if he won a quarter of a million dollars over his entire career.

"Equipoise had that infelicitous something that no com-

puter will ever be able to discern: The competitive spirit. Horses have it just as humans do.

"Equipoise couldn't bear the thought of another horse passing him in a race. He was disqualified on several occasions for biting into the neck of a horse that tried to pass him.

"Sonny Workman, who rode him, was perfect for Equipoise. Sonny couldn't bear to be beaten either. They made a great team."

The Underachiever - 7

Some Parents Prone to Ignore Problems

By LESLIE J. NASON, ED. D.
University of Southern California
(EDITOR'S NOTE—This is the seventh in a 12-part series on the severe problem in today's schools—the underachiever—by Dr. Leslie J. Nason.)

Some parents, with the best of intentions, are prone to close their eyes to the problems of their underachieving child. They think, "Someone will strike the right chord and make him want to learn. He will grow up and eventually see the light."

While these seeming miracles DO occur, in the majority of cases the underachiever remains so until someone sets out to bring about a better result.

Occasionally a school assignment such as a special report or the lead in a class play is the spark that sets the student on fire.

The usual underachieving student needs adjustment and improvement in several areas and only a consideration of his whole pattern of thinking and learning can appraise one of the combination of changes needed to help him.

The pupil must try to learn! Otherwise he soon becomes an underachiever.

MINIMUM EFFORT

The most often repeated comment by parents and teachers in discussing underachieving students is that they seem to be satisfied with the situation as it is now and with the grades they are now making. They put forth a minimum of effort on homework.

What are the "blocks" that keep students from wanting to try for more learning and how can these blocks be removed so that students are

willing to do an about face and make an effort to improve their school situation?

There is no single set of answers to these problems!

One condition, especially in the primary grades, that starts a student off doing a mediocre job of learning is lack of challenge.

LACKS CHALLENGE

A second-grade pupil who can read at fifth-grade level but who is required to read at second-grade level not only lacks challenge but is rewarded for underachievement.

Apparent success comes to this pupil with little effort on his part.

If the problem is found immediately, the remedy is simple—provide the missing challenge, place him in a special group, give him special assignments, or advance him a grade.

The longer the condition is allowed to persist the more difficult the solution.

NO INTEREST

John was a third-grader who showed no interest in school. His father was a commercial artist with an excellent educational background; in fact, he taught some classes in a university.

In spite of the fact that the home seemed to provide plenty of stimulus toward John's success in school he made little effort.

Tests showed him to have a very high IQ, somewhere in the neighborhood of 160.

His parents tried tutors, a private school and, in one instance, he was advanced a grade, all to no avail.

SOMETHING LACKING

At his father's request I discussed learning procedures with John. He showed interest in the ideas but not in putting them into practice.

His statement was, "Dr. Nason, I know all the things

I should be doing—I just don't do them."

There was still something lacking—with his newly acquiring skills he had even less challenge than before. But, at this point, a challenge was added—he was again advanced a grade and suddenly the miracle happened.

He began trying and soon was at the top of the advanced class.

SPECIFIC IDEAS

This time he was not only presented with a challenge but had specific ideas of how to meet it.

The earlier try at promotion alone had not brought about the desired result; yet, promotion was a necessary element in the solution of John's problem.

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Tragic Death for Virginia Sky Diver, 11

MANASSAS, Va. (AP) — Dana Rutledge, 11, spent half his young life around sky diving. He knew what it was all about.

So skilled and trustworthy he was that for the last 300 of 1,000 jumps his father has made, he was allowed to pack the chute.

The father, Carl A. Rutledge, is a classifier at the U.S. Patent Office in nearby Washington and lives in Vienna, Va. He has been jumping for five years and is president of "The Targeteers," a sky-diving club.

None of the 100 or so members of the club loves sky diving more than Dana did. He was, said Rutledge, "very athletic and smart as a whip and quick in his response to things."

DAD GAVE IN
Yet, when Dana begged to be allowed to jump, Rutledge thought a long time. Finally, because of Dana's "over-all general knowledge" of sky diving, Rutledge gave in.

Dana made his first jump last summer. Sunday, he made his ninth and last. His chute failed to open properly and he fell to his death in a field on the family's farm near here.

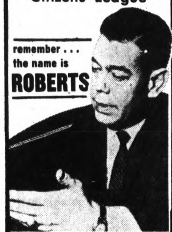
On the ground, Rutledge saw it happen. He was in charge of the jump. A week before, another member of the club, O.L. Gates, 36, of Rockville, Md., died in a similar accident.

Another Rutledge son, Mark, 10, was just as interested as Dana at the start. But his interest waned. He made his first jump just last month. Afterward, he said he didn't want to jump anymore.

Mark disappeared about two weeks ago and hasn't been seen since. Asked whether jumping might have had something to do with the boy's disappearance, Rutledge said "it may have." But he said Mark decided on his own he wanted to jump.

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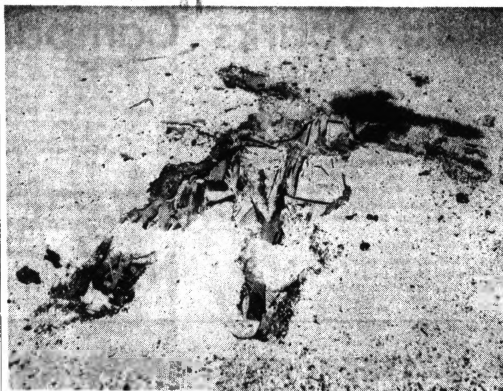

6 Million Expected to Vote

N.Y. Race Considered Close

NEW YORK (AP) — Some six million New York State voters will decide Tuesday what is considered a close gubernatorial race between incumbent Republican Nelson A. Rockefeller and Democrat Frank D. O'Connor.

Rockefeller is bidding for his third term. O'Connor, New York City Council president, has served in the New York Legislature and is a former district attorney of Queens.

Contributing to the uncertainty of the outcome are two other aspirants for governor: Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., Liberal party candidate, and the Conservative party standard bearer, Paul L. Adams.

O'Connor has termed Roosevelt a "spoiler" — taking votes away from the Democratic column in the first gubernatorial breakaway by the Liberals since they organized 22 years ago. Observers see Roosevelt, who withdrew from the race for the Democratic nomination, getting 10 to 15 per cent of the vote.

ABOUT & PCT.
Adams, expected to draw up to 5 per cent of the vote, could cut into the Rockefeller figures. The Conservative party was formed four years ago, mostly by Republicans, with Rockefeller as one of its main targets, contending that he is too liberal.

The current race is being compared to the contest in 1954, when Democrat W. Averell Harriman, now a U.S. roving ambassador, defeated the late Republican U.S. Sen. Irving Ives by 11,000 votes, but needed the Liberal party vote to win.

Apart from the selection of a

governor and lieutenant governor, voters will elect an entire legislature, all 41 congressmen, 186 delegates to the 1967 constitutional (revision) convention, elect a variety of local officers, and express themselves on a state lottery to aid education.

New York City voters will decide the fate of the controversial civilian-dominated police review board.

OTHER CANDIDATES
The candidates for lieutenant governor are: Lt. Gov. Malcolm Wilson, Republican; Howard J. Samuels, Democrat; Donald S. Harrington, Liberal; Kieran O'Doherty, Conservative; Doris Ballantyne, Socialist Labor, and Richard Garza, Socialist Workers.

Vying for comptroller are incumbent Arthur Levitt, Democrat, who has held that office since 1955; Charles T. Lanigan Jr., Republican, and Benjamin R. Crosby, Conservative. Levitt was endorsed by the Liberals.

In the congressional races, Republicans hope to narrow the present standing of 27 Democrats and 14 Republicans.

In the race for attorney general are Republican incumbent Louis J. Lefkowitz, Simeon Goetz, Liberal, a deputy commissioner in the New York City department of relocation and the only Negro candidate for state office, and Mayor Frank A. Sedita of Buffalo, Democrat.

Fails to Death From Airplane

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — Daniel Janzen fell to his death just before his plane crashed and federal investigators say nothing in the wreckage indicates mechanical failure.

Investigators said today they didn't know why he fell from the single-engine aircraft Saturday.

Janzen, 21, a Stanford University graduate, landed on an apartment rooftop so hard that it left an outline of his body imbedded in the roof. He wore no parachute.

The plane, owned by the Garden City Aero Co., crashed between two apartment buildings on Meridian Street in San Jose but caused no damage.

Relatives said Janzen, a student pilot who received his degree in psychology from Stanford last June, had just returned from an around-the-world trip.

Yank Forgets to Declare His Polish Souvenir

DOVER, England (AP) — Ronald Gray, a Californian living in Britain, drove a small truck off the channel ferry at Dover Saturday night and told the customs men: "All I have to declare are 200 cigarettes and a bottle of perfume."

The customs men searched the truck. "I put my hand under a heap of clothing and felt something warm," one official reported. Out came Barbara Gryma, 22, a Polish blonde. She tearfully pleaded to be allowed to stay in Britain.

After questioning at the Dover police station, Gray, 37, was allowed to go. The girl was put on a ferry back to France since she had no visa. An immigration officer said he understood she was returning to Poland, and the home office said no question of political asylum had been involved.

VOTER APPROVAL
The construction projects were approved by district voters who passed two bonding proposals totaling \$10.8 million last June 13.

In other business tomorrow night, the board is expected to vote again on whether to take steps toward acquisition of the Drayton Plains Nature Center. In a previous vote, the board failed to latch onto the project.

"We hope to have complete local returns available two to three hours after the polls close," said Ron H. Lockhart, Pontiac Jaycee president.

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School Funds Are Released

Oakland County Treasurer James E. Seeterlin has announced the release through his office of \$1,638,789 in sales tax division funds for the quarter which ended Sept. 30.

These funds, distributed to cities, townships and villages in the county, compare to \$1,556,161 for the same quarter a year ago.

"This increase would indicate that the economy of Michigan is still moving forward," Seeterlin said.

Two-thirds of the total tax collection returned to the school districts while cities, townships and villages share in the remainder which is prorated by population.

Pontiac will receive \$191,102 compared to \$181,856 last year. Royal Oak, the highest single share.

The only other community exceeding the \$100,000 mark is Waterford Township with \$111,691.

Cities receiving more than \$50,000 are Berkeley, \$55,394; Birmingham, \$60,749; Ferndale, \$74,605; Hazel Park, \$61,001; Madison Heights, \$79,567; Oak Park, \$87,184; and Southfield, \$74,972.

Townships in the same category are Bloomfield, \$53,621; and Farmington, \$60,751.

The highest village share was \$20,546 for Beverly Hills.

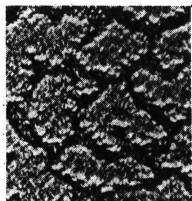

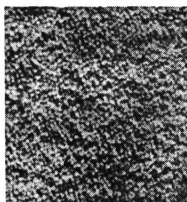
