## **BIOGEOLOGIST GIVES SIGMA XI LECTURE**

Preston Cloud, noted research biogeologist, will speak on man's mismanagement of earth's resources, when he appears in a Sigma Xi science lecture Monday, Oct. 21.

The 8 p.m. program is in Room 180, Hannah Hall of Science and it is open free to all interested persons. Cloud appears under the auspices of OU's Sigma Xi Club.

Sigma Xi is a national organization devoted to furthering scientific research. Its 1974-75 program of lectures for area clubs is underwritten by a grant from the National Science Foundation.

Cloud is currently research biogeologist with the U.S. Geological Survey and professor emeritus of biogeology at the University of California at Santa Barbara.

His more than 180 published papers and books deal with problems in biogeology, sedimentology and historical geology with special reference to the primitive, recent and future earth.

Biogeology is Cloud's shorthand for the total body of evidence and theory relating to biological processes and actions on the evolving earth. He is a member of the prestigious National Academy of Sciences, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and a member of the governing board of the National Research Council.

His many honors include the A. Cressy Morrison Prize of the New York Academy of Sciences, the Rockefeller Public Service Award, and the Distinguished Service Award and Medal of the U.S. Department of the Interior.

## **PULITZER PRIZE WINNER OFFERED BY STUDIO COMPANY**

The Academy of Dramatic Art will open its 1974-75 dramatic season on Thursday, Oct. 17 with the Pulitzer Prize-winning play, J.B., by Archibald MacLeish. The play is the Biblical story of Job retold in 20th century terms.

## **"TONIGHT AT 8:30" OPENED MEADOW BROOK SEASON**

"Tonight at 8:30," three one-act plays by Noel Coward, opened Meadow Brook Theatre's ninth season last Thursday, October 10.

Performances will be each Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday at 8:30 p.m. with Saturday performances at 6 p.m. and 9:30 p.m., and Sunday evening shows at 6:30. The play runs now through Sunday, Nov. 3.

Premiered in 1936 in London with Coward as not only playwright but director and leading actor, "Tonight At 8:30" was a dazzling success both in London, and later that same year, in New York.
