POLITICAL SCIENCE FACULTY GIVE LECTURES

Two members of the Department of Political Science presented papers or lectures recently. They are Roger Marz and Thomas Casstevens.

Marz presented a paper "The Geometry of Politics: Metaphor to Measurement," at the Public Choice meetings in New Haven, Connecticut during the month of March; he also presented another paper, "Mayoral Leadership in S.E. Michigan," in Dearborn during the month of April. This paper was sponsored by University of Michigan Dearborn Centers of Urban Studies, Henry Ford Community College, Henry Ford Centennial Library, via a grant from the Metropolitan Fund.

Casstevens delivered an invited lecture in March at the University of Georgia on modelling legislative turnover.

AKERS HAS ARTICLE IN NEW ENGLAND QUARTERLY

Charles Akers, history, has published an article, "Sam Adams--and Much More," in the March issue of the New England Quarterly. This review essay examines historical writing on the American Revolution in Massachusetts and urges scholars to re-

consider the myth of Samuel Adams in light of the actual evidence--or lack of it--for the many claims concerning his leadership in promoting America's independence from Great Britain.

PROFESSOR OFFERS PAPER AT ACADEMY ANNUAL MEETING

Dolores M. Burdick, Department of Modern Languages and Literatures, presented a paper at the language and literature section of the Michigan Academy of Arts and Sciences annual meeting held recently in East Lansing.

Her paper was entitled "Antigone Grows Middle-Aged: A Study of Jean Anouilh's Latest Plays."

BARNES TO EDIT SPECIAL JOURNAL

Carl F. Barnes, Jr., art history, has been selected to serve as editor of a special issue of the Journal of the Society of Architectural Historians which will appear in December, 1975.

The issue will be a memorial to the late Dr. Robert Branner of Columbia University who was one of the world's foremost scholars of French medieval art and architecture. Barnes was Branner's first graduate student at Columbia and spent the summers of 1959 and 1960 in France as an assistant to Branner.

COPPOLA GIVES PAPER ON SOUTH ASIA POP CULTURE

Carlo Coppola, modern languages and linguistics, is the author of a paper entitled "Social Criticism in the Film Songs of Sahir Ludhianvi" presented on a panel dealing with the popular culture of South Asia at the fourth annual meeting of the Popular

Culture Association held May 2 - 4 in Milwaukee, Wis.

Also presented on this same panel was the paper "The Urdu Mushairah as Popular Entertainment" given by Munibar Rahman, modern languages.

HASKELL GIVES PAPER AT OPTICAL SOCIETY MEETING

Richard E. Haskell, School of Engineering, presented a paper entitled "Holographic Correlation Method for Processing Multi-spectral Scanner Data" at the Spring Meeting of the Optical Society of America held recently in Washington, D.C.

The paper described a new method for producing color maps from digital data obtained from satellite instruments, and was based on work conducted during a 1972-73 sabbatical leave at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas.

FEEMAN PRESIDES AT MATH MEETING

George Feeman, mathematics, presided over the annual meeting of the section held at Central Michigan University on May 3-4. He is chairman of the Michigan Section of the Mathematical Association of America. Louis Bragg and Robert Fontenot also at-

tended the meeting. Richard Gurnee, a graduating math major, gave a talk on "An Application of Discriminant Analysis" in the session for undergraduate papers.
