

GRADUATE COORDINATES PEDIATRIC PLAY PROGRAM

Bonnie Ream, a graduate of OU's master's degree program in early childhood education, has been hired to coordinate a pediatric play program for Pontiac General Hospital.

The program is the first of its kind in a community hospital in this area. The pediatric play program began at Pontiac General in the fall of 1975 as a pilot project. Ream and three other OU students worked on the program under the direction of Doris Sponseller, education.

Their success resulted in the creation of a formal program at the hospital. The project includes daily visits to the young patients and provision of toys, games, and arts and crafts activities to meet the child's developmental needs. Parents are encouraged to participate in the activities.

Pediatric play programs are designed to fight the detrimental effects that hospitalization can have on young children. Six OU graduate students and four undergraduates are assisting Ream at Pontiac General.

SLAVIC FOLK ENSEMBLE PERFORMS MARCH 27-28

The Slavic Folk Ensemble will present three performances at the university on March 27-28 in Varner Recital Hall.

There will be 8 p.m. shows on both days and a 2 p.m. matinee on March 28. The admission is \$1 for students and \$2 for adults. Tickets can be obtained in the Campus Ticket Office of the Oakland Center and at the door prior to the concert.

The programs conclude the ensemble's regular 1975-76 season although the group is considering an invitation to perform in Poland starting July 29, 1976. The program sponsor is the Friendship Ambassadors Foundation, a nonprofit, tax-exempt foundation furthering international understanding through the performing arts. The foundation is based in New York City.

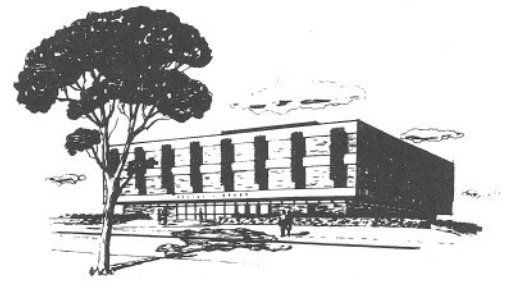

PAYMENT VOUCHER RULES MODIFIED

The procedure for paying individuals by direct payment voucher has been modified to provide better internal control.

This type of disbursement (fees, honorariums, reimbursements, etc.) is generally unsupported by documentation such as an invoice or receipt. Payment in the past has been made solely on the authority of the individual initiating and signing the voucher. This lack of support or second party involvement is a weakness in control. To establish more effective control, it will hereafter be required that vouchers for such payments bear the cosignature of the next highest administrator to whom the authorized signer reports. 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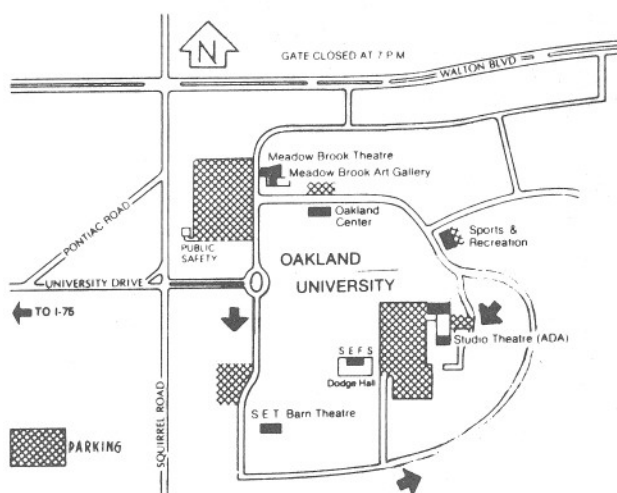

Members of the Department of Learning Skills will present a panel entitled "New Imperatives in the Teaching of Writing" at the March 26 meeting of the Michigan College English Association. The sessions will be held in Meadow Brook Hall.
