### She's 1st to Apply at MSUO!



LOSING NO TIME — When Michigan State University Oakland opens its doors, Lynn E. Anderson wants to be the first one in. The 17-year-old Pontiac High junior has made the first application for admission to MSUO.

Here she is, Michigan State University Oakland has its first application from a future member of the freshman class which starts one year hence.

Lynn E. Anderson, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank A. Anderson of 25 Oneida Rd., addresses a letter to MSUO with this simple but thrilling first sentence:

"I wish to make formal application for admission as a freshman in the College of Liberal Arts for the first term beginning in September, 1959."

This is the beginning of "business as usual."

The application will be processed right here by Roy Alexander, director of student services, who is now in residence and Lynn will officially hear from her future Alma Mater.

This is the first incoming freshman to apply and Miss Lynn can go down in history as Number One. And she's the first of a line that will ultimately extend far into the hundreds of thousands. ## Seek 'Maniac' in Bad Beating

Detroit Police Search for Man 'Who Enjoys Watching Others Suffer'

DETROIT (U)—A man described by police as a "sadistic maniac" was sought today in the brutal beating of a Detroit housewife.

Mrs. Jean Lowry, 53, was hospitalized yesterday with a cerebral concussion, severe facial and body bruises, and a possible skull fracture. She was found lying on a living room couch by her husband, Richard, 66, when he returned home from work.

Mrs. Lowry said she was beaten by a man who had replied to her advertisement to rent a furnished room.

Det. Sgt. Charles Perry said of the beating: "We have a sadistic maniac on our hands who gains satisfaction by witnessing the suffering of others."

Perry said Mrs. Lowry was unable to give any reason for the attack.

# School Budget Passes

## Summit Meeting at U. N. Unlikely Before Aug. 4

Seek to Settle Problem of Iraqi Representation Prior to Session

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y.

Well-informed diplomats said today Aug. 4 is the earliest likely date on which a summit meeting could be convened in the Security Council.

Whether press arrangements would be complete by then was another matter.

U.N. press officers expected a rush of at least 2,000 newsmen to the New York headquarters to cover the vital meeting — more than twice the 800 who flocked here in 1956 to cover the debates during the Suez crisis.

Nobody knew for sure when the meeting would be held, and everybody was waiting word from Washington.

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)

A final search effort began at dawn today for Wickie the space mouse, whose resting place would be marked in the South Atlantic by a carrot-colored balloon.

The Air Force said the specially-equipped search planes and ships in the hunt received no signals yesterday from the experimental Thor-Able cone in which Wickie rode 6,300 miles through the heavens.

Fear grew that she would become the third mouse lost in a combination military-scientific test series.

Officials still would not say whether the nose cone re-entered the earth's atmosphere Wednesday.

The Office of Public Information was discussing the issuance of special credentials to handle the swarm of correspondents who will arrive with White House passes, State Department cards and U.N. identification.

With security officers of a half dozen countries cooperating with the United Nations' 150-man guard force, credentials specially issued (Continued on Page 2, Col. 3)

## Ike Expected to Attend Summit as Stipulated

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower was expected to tell Russia today he will attend a summit conference if there is advance agreement on its scope and it is ruled by orderly procedure of the United Nations.

High officials said the President's new letter to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev also would insist that the U.N. Security Council itself decide what other countries should be invited as "interested parties."

The President's letter, the sources said, would be an effort to bring some order out of the chaos surrounding the proposed meeting and to apply some brakes to the pell-mell dash to the summit urged by Khrushchev.

Eisenhower was represented as ready to reiterate his willingness to hold the summit meeting under proper arrangements but reject the Soviet premier's suggestion for next Monday as too early to permit proper preparation.

In related summit developments around the world:

PARIS — French Premier Charles de Gaulle's government prepared for a New York summit meeting but was holding off its formal reply

to Khrushchev's proposal. French diplomats were convinced the summit issue already had handed a great victory to Khrushchev.

MOSCOW — Pravda urged the Western powers to hold a summit conference without delay if the West wants to preserve peace. The Communist party newspaper said none of the "difficulties" mentioned in the American press "can be taken seriously" if the United States, British and French governments sincerely want a conference of heads of government to discuss the most important and vital problem of the time—the preservation and consolidation of the peace.

CAIRO — Nikita Khrushchev has boasted to President Nasser that the Soviet Union has weapons which could easily turn the U.S. 6th Fleet into "coffins of molten steel," a Cairo editor said today.

BEIRUT — Rebel snipers opened heavy fire in Beirut last night but no major incidents followed and there were growing indications Lebanon might solve its own crisis without further bloodshed.

LONDON — Prospects of the conference were reported to have brought Britain nearer to complete national unity than on any issue since World War II. The three political parties — Liberal, Labor and Conservative — were in agreement the meeting should be held.

American officials staked out caution flags on the road to the summit. They warned reporters more exchanges with Moscow probably would be necessary to fix the terms under which the chiefs of state would meet.

Still matters of uncertainty were the time and place for the conference although the United States and Britain seemed to accept Khrushchev's approval of the New York site.

De Gaulle is known to want the meeting in Geneva, Switzerland. He indicated yesterday he has reluctantly decided to attend a New York meeting if the other powers want it there provided it does not last more than two or three days.

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Some American paratroopers said today the only serious fighting they have done in Lebanon thus far has been with the Marines.

The fight developed when a jeepload of Marines began airing low opinions of the airborne troopers' fighting qualities and general manliness.

There was a first-rate free-for-all, and in the words of one rugged paratrooper: "I wouldn't say they love us now, but I think they have been converted."

## Education Board Puts 'Austerity Plan' in Effect

OKs \$7,846,230 for Running System and \$137,973 for Building

The Pontiac Board of Education adopted an "austerity" budget for operation next year and agreed to borrow \$2 million to finance new school construction at its meeting last night.

The budget provides \$7,846,230 for running the school system during 1958-59 and \$137,973 to be applied to the construction program.

Together with debt service, the board plans to spend \$9,772,140, exclusive of the money it will borrow.

The board agreed that it must do long-range borrowing for construction for the next few years until the state-wide school financial picture clears.

The board rejected any thought of slashing quality of instruction or stopping its building program in the face of rising enrollments. It also agreed that borrowing was preferable at this time to asking the voters for more tax money.

The borrowing will be in the form of 25-year bonds with principal payments not to start until 1961.

Superintendent Dana F. Whitmer and Assistant Superintendent Otto Hultiger told the board it could borrow this year up to \$2.4 million without a vote of the people, under state law.

Of the \$2 million to be borrowed \$351,000 will be used to complete payments on schools now under construction and \$1.6 million will go for new construction.

Authorized are additions to Madison and Washington Junior High Schools, a new elementary on Square Lake road, and an addition to Bagley School.

The board turned down the administration's request for \$140,000 to rehabilitate the swimming pool at Central High School. It did, however, add \$7,500 to the budget for a new kitchen at Wisner School.

The general feeling of the board, as expressed by veteran member Louis Schimmel, was that greater financial assistance to school districts by the state must come one day soon as most of the systems were getting deeper into the red.

He counseled that Pontiac, which has a top credit rating and very low indebtedness, borrow until the state acts.

Dr. Whitmer added that the public, which thinks in terms of tax rate, must begin thinking of actual dollars they wish to spend to support schools.

"Our tax rate remains the same, but for the next few years we can expect less dollars as the county equalizes our district at a lower valuation."

The county's action is part of its program to reduce the share of county taxes paid by Pontiac and a few other large cities. School taxes are levied on state equalized valuation, but this year the state accepted the county figures and did not increase the valuation in the school districts.

Pontiac School District was equalized by the county at \$363 million valuation this year as compared with \$378 million last year which amounts to a loss in school income of nearly \$265,000.

But the school board had anticipated a boost in valuation (Continued on Page 2, Col. 8)

## Map Shows Plans for Northwestern Highway



PROPOSED PROJECT—This map, just released by the Michigan State Highway Dept., shows the department's revised plans for widening and extending Northwestern Highway in Oakland County from Eight Mile road to M59 (Highland road) in Highland Township. Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie announced a public hearing Aug. 11 at the Southfield High School gymnasium, 24675 Lahser Rd., for the purpose of outlining details of this 23-mile, \$37,000,000 project. Plans call for a new six-lane facility and two new lanes for one-way, northwest-bound traffic, both to be constructed to the northeast of the existing highway from Eight

Mile to Orchard Lake road (M218). These new six lanes will replace the present middle island and two existing northwest-bound lanes. An additional 114 feet of right-of-way will be purchased to make way for this addition. The present two lanes of southeast-bound traffic will remain intact as a service road for traffic in this same direction. The new six-lane facility will be between this service road and the one to the east. From Orchard Lake road to M59 a new four-lane facility will be constructed.

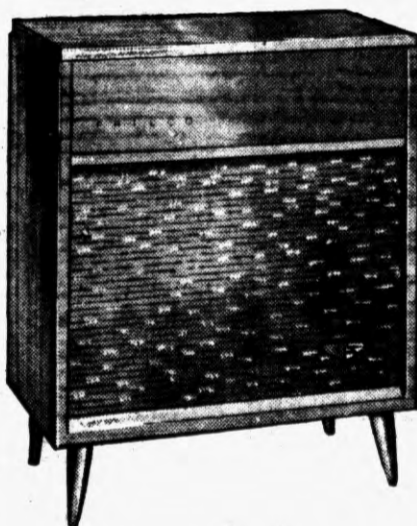

## New Six-Inch Hero to Star on Television

NEW YORK (AP)—As if every body didn't feel small enough already, we will be asked this autumn to look up to a hero only six inches tall.

He is Mel Hunter, star of "World of Giants," a new television series, and a lot of big money is riding on his tiny but muscular frame in one of the top duels of the 1958-59 video season.

CBS is gambling four million dollars that Little Mel will be able to untrack "Wagon Train," the highly rated program that sets out every Wednesday night from the rival trading post run by Sheriff Bob Sarnoff of NBC.

It is to be a no-holds-barred contest for audience favor between the "fantastic" and the horse opera.

Who is this rash unknown, Mel Hunter, who has risen to challenge the long reign of the Western?

He is the brainchild of John Ziv

and Richard Dorso.

Mel is a strapping 6-foot secret agent who is exposed to rays from a deadly enemy missile fuel behind the Iron Curtain. His molecular system is affected, and he shrinks until he is only half a foot tall.

Instead of asking waivers on him or peddling him to a circus, Mel's superiors in a government department known only as "the Bureau" decide to keep him on the job as a spy hunter.

The fact they now have a 6-inch agent is, of course, the bureau's top secret. He goes on his missions in a briefcase carried by his buddy, Bill Winters. The briefcase has air vents and contains an airplane-type seat in which miniature Mel straps himself for comfort.

Because of his small size, everything that happens to Mel is a matter of life or death to him," said Dorso.

"A spilled bottle of glue, a vacuum cleaner, a sudden rainfall that washes him down a sewer—these are terrible perils to him. Two of his biggest problems in the pilot show are how to outwit a hungry cat and how to get a telephone off the hook so he can call the bureau."

Dorso, a man vaccinated long ago with a Madison Ave. prose needle, believes "the little man" will become the hero of the year to both kids and grownups.

"There is no ceiling to this," he said. "We think it will go right through the roof. We're going for the long ball."

"This is going to be the year of the fantastic in television. Oh, there'll be a rash of fantasies—a real rash of them. All kinds of

It's selling like wild fire at all local and area record shops. This just goes to prove that records can still be made that please both the older and younger generations alike.

A hot item on the jazz front is "The Ahmad Jamal Trio" album (Argo LP-628) just released. Jamal, who recently appeared in Detroit, plays some wild piano. Local fans seem to appreciate his work from a look at sales.

Arthur Lyman's "Taboo" (Hi-Fi R-806) is still a steady seller in the upper bracket and his latest contribution to the world of exotic sounds, "Bwana" (Hi-Fi R-808) looks like a good follow-up.

## Higher SS Tax Likely, Causing Another Cut in Take-Home Pay

**NEW YORK (AP)** — The chances are good today that come New Year's there'll be another legal shrinkage of your take-home pay.

Congress is talking of increasing Social Security taxes then. The Social Security fund is running in the red, although it has sizable reserves to fall back on — carried as U. S. Treasury securities, not as cash.

The present maximum deduction from a paycheck is \$94.50 a year. The proposed maximum after New Year's would be \$120. But there would be some increase for every employee at whatever wage scale.

And for business there would be an increase in operating expenses, since the amount the employer pays into the kitty would rise at

the same time and in the same amount.

The proposal is based on two factors:

1. Currently the amount workers are paying into the Social Security fund is running behind the sums being paid out to the increasing number of the retired, making for embarrassing red ink bookkeeping.

2. Congress is talking of in-

creasing the amount of old age and disability payments, as it has in each election year since 1952. It is reacting to the impact of inflation on those with fixed incomes.

For many years the Social Security fund was increasing. But as new types of beneficiaries were added and the life expectancy of all increased, the outgoing payments finally outstripped the income tax receipts.

Head Coach Otto Graham, former star quarterback of the Cleveland Browns, Thursday greeted 52 players at Northwestern University where the ex-collegians will prepare for their clash with the National Football League champions.

This is Graham's first crack at the All-Star coaching job handled last year by Curly Lambeau, a pro football pioneer. Lambeau's

second All-Star club lost last year to the New York Giants, 22-12, in a rain-drenched contest.

The All-Stars last defeated the pro champs in 1955, edging the Cleveland Browns, 30-27, for only their seventh victory against 15 defeats and two ties in the late summer grid spectacle.

Graham and his pro game-versed staff selected the 1958 All-Star squad with the aim of throwing the brawnier linemen and swiftest backs possible against the rugged Lions.

The All-Star roster lists 17 guards and tackles, 6 linemen, weighs 240 pounds or more. Thirty-seven collegians weigh more than 200 pounds each.

The important quarterback assignment will be shared by King Hill of Rice, Ray Brown of Mississippi, Jim Ninowski of Michigan State and Tom Forrestal of Navy.

Biggest All-Star performer is John Baker, 290-pounder from North Carolina College. Other collegiate giants include tackles Alex Karras of Iowa, Frank Youso of Minnesota, and guard Proverb Jacobs, California, 250 each; guard Don Healy, Maryland, 225; Jim McCusker, Pittsburgh tackle, 245 and Ed Cooke, Maryland end, 240.

Average weight of the guards and tackles is 234.

Graham has a fine array of fleet, powerful backs, headed by Michigan's Jim Pace, Illinois' Bobby Mitchell, North Carolina State's Dick Christy and Texas A&M's John Crow.

The All-Stars coaching aides include Don Doll, Don Paul, Pete Pihos, John Sandusky, and Northwestern Coach Ara Parseghian, all former pro stars.
