## Obear asks for unity

OU has achieved its 1980 United Way fund drive goal of \$22,000. Chairpersons for the various units of the university express their thanks to all those who contributed. The leaders of the campus drive were Gary Diles, Ruth Eberle, Ed Heubel, and Bill Marshall.

The OU Board of Trustees will meet Jan. 21 at 7:30 p.m. in Lounge II of the Oakland Center.

Residents of Fitzgerald House won the \$75 holiday house decorating prize. The funds went for the purchase of a black and white TV set to be donated to the Plymouth Center.

Joseph Klaits, associate professor of history, has won a prestigious National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowship for College Teachers 81-82.

Klaits will spend the academic year in Paris and Strasbourg studying the "Culture and Society in 18th Century Alsace." He is researching the production of books and the activity of the press and learned academies. His work will form the basis of a book to be published at a later date.

OU History chairperson John Barnard said Klaits has won one of the most prestigious and competitive awards available in his field of study. Klaits is currently on leave from OU and doing research in Washington, D.C. He is completing a study of "European Witchcraft Trials in the 17th and 18th Centuries."

I wish to express appreciation to the trustees, faculty, staff, alumni, students, and friends of the University community who supported my candidacy for the Oakland presidency. I was honored to have been included among the finalists. Your words of encouragement to Trisha and me and your sensitivity helped to shorten what at times seemed like an interminable process. ## Court lifts restrictions

The Honorable Alice L. Gilbert, circuit judge, has issued the following order clearing the way for the university to inaugurate Joseph E. Champagne.

## ORDER DISSOLVING TEMPORARY RESTRAINING ORDER

At a session of said Court, held in the Court House in the City of Pontiac, Oakland County, Michigan, this 17th day of December, 1980.

This court having entered an Order for Temporary Restraining Order dated November 17, 1980, under which Oakland University was restrained from inaugurating a new president for a period after the selection of the president, and it appearing to the court

from the court records and the statements of counsel that Joseph E. Champagne was validly selected and appointed as President of Oakland University by the Board of Trustees of Oakland University at a public meeting on December 11, 1980, and it further appearing that it would serve no useful purpose to delay his inauguration and that the public interest would be best served by dissolving the aforesaid order,

It is therefore ordered as follows:

The Temporary Restraining Order issued by this court on November 17, 1980, is hereby dissolved and the Defendants are expressly authorized to inaugurate Joseph E. Champagne as President of Oakland University at any time.

## Fellowships awarded

Thirteen Oakland University faculty members have won fellowships totaling \$46,590 in the most recent round of awards announced by the University Research Committee.

The competitive awards will support research on the religious experiences of women, record the beliefs and knowledge of an Indian shaman or religious leader, and aid the study of Medieval Japanese narrative painting, among other projects.

The award winners and areas of interest are listed below.

Charles Akers, history, \$3,600 to continue investigation of the thesis that subordination of women in the past has turned them to religious movements for solace and ego satisfaction.

Baruch Cahlon, mathematics, \$3,400 for research entitled "Numerical Solution of Differential Equations."

James Dow, sociology/anthropology, \$4,000 to work with an Indian shaman, a practioneer of a kind of ritual that implies that humans can control the supernatural. He will conduct his research with a shaman in the Sierra de Puebla, Mexico.

George Gamboa, biology, \$3,890 to study the role of the queen bee and the

 Theodore Landau, psychology, \$3,000, "Aromatization and Organization of Sexual Behavior in Neonatal Rats."

J. Christopher Maloney, philosophy, \$3,150 for research on "Figurative Thought."

James McKay, mathematics, \$3,000 for a study of "Combinatorial Matrices and Cyclotomic Integers."

Kathleen Moore, chemistry, \$4,000 for heart research entitled "Hydrolase Activities in Inhibited Cardia Mitochondria."

Lawrence Orton, history, \$3,000 for a study of the "Ukrainian National Movement in Galicia, 1830-1849."

Jeffrey Rosenthal, chemistry, \$4,000 for "Fourier Transform Analysis."

C. Franklin Sayre, art and art history, \$4,000 for an investigation of "Japanese Narrative Painting."

Robert Schwartz, education, \$4,000 for research entitled "Coordination of Processing Decisions for Comprehension of Expository Texts."

Frederic Shipley, economics and management, \$3,550 for a study of "Information Dissemination and the Liquidity of Financial Markets."

Peter Jaber, \$250, investigation of "Indian Habitation in Southfield."

Christian M. Larch, \$247 for a study of "Structural Change and Succession in Smooth Sumac."

Gary Perrault, \$188 to study the "Amino Acid Complexes of Cadmium, Mercury, and Lead."

Terri L. Ticknor, \$205 for a psychology project that will use children's art as a means of identifying victims of abuse.


#### Lecture switch
