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#### CAMPUS FERMENT IS TOPIC FOR PARENTS DAY

The 1968 Parents Day on Saturday, November 16 will discard the traditional for the timely in the schedule of talks and panels for visiting parents. "Ferment on Today's Campus" will be the general theme for a series of three sessions beginning at 11:15 a.m. Parents will register for the day's events at 9 a.m., hold their annual meeting, present the Matilda R. Wilson Honor Scholarship, hear an address by Chancellor Varner, and see the film, "Meadow Brook Hall," a project of the Friends of Oakland which annually sponsors Parents Day.

Parents then have a choice of three lecture-panel discussions. Robert L. Stern, associate professor of chemistry, will lecture on "Black Power: Misunderstood?". Panelists on that subject will be moderator Harvey Burdick, professor of psychology; Marylou Lacy, graduate librarian, Kresge Library; Robert L. Stern, associate professor of chemistry; Karl Gregory, assistant to the Chancellor, urban affairs; Gwendolyn Heard, student; and Ingo Dutzmann, student.

William F. Sturner, assistant provost and assistant professor of political science, will lecture on "Politics, Parents and Pedagogy: The Concerns and Objectives of Student Activism". Panelists on that subject will be Carl R. Vann, associate professor of political science; Thomas Dutton, Dean of Students; William F. Sturner, assistant provost, assistant professor of political science; Mike Honey, editor of the Oakland Observer; and Cindy Attwood, member of the University Senate.

A panel of students discuss the student life and activities on campus. Panelists will be James Appleton, moderator, associate Dean of Students; Kathryn Philliben, resident assistant, Association of Women Students, president; Margaret Russell, Student Activities Executive Board, member at large; David Black, member of the University Senate; Kenneth Meldrum, Student Activities Board, chairman; and Michael Nolph, member of the soccer team.

Faculty and members have been invited to join parents and their sons or daughters at a  $1:30~\mathrm{p.m.}$  luncheon in the Oakland Center.

Special events later in the day include the Ted Knerr exhibit in the University Art Gallery, open house in the Kresge Library, activities in the Sports and Recreation Building, and open houses and programs in the resident halls.
