ABOUT OAKLAND UNIVERSITY...



Oakland University is a comprehensive state-supported institution of higher education located in suburban Oakland County, Michigan. Undergraduate programs are offered in 73 areas and graduate programs at the master's and doctoral level in 34 areas.

Dedicated to providing students with the skills to succeed in a complex world, the university is organized into the College of Arts and Sciences and the schools of Business Administration, Education and Human Services, Engineering and Computer Science, Health Sciences, and Nursing.

Virtually all courses are taught by faculty members, not teaching assistants. The Honors College, a division of the College of Arts and Sciences, meets the educational needs of highly motivated students. The Division of Continuing Education meets the needs of adult learners through evening and extension programs.

Academic support facilities include such notable entities as the Eye Research Institute, the only major eye research center in the United States not affiliated with a medical school; the Meadow Brook Health Enhancement Institute, which provides health maintenance/health improvement and cardiac rehabilitation community outreach programs; and the Center for Robotics and Advanced Automation, a unit of the School of Engineering and Computer Science that utilizes high technology manufacturing methods.

Total enrollment approximates 13,200 students, most of whom commute from the surrounding counties of Oakland, Macomb, and Wayne. More than 1,100 students live on campus in modern residence hall facilities.

The university collaborates actively with business and industry to foster economic development in southeastern Michigan. Adjacent to the campus is the Oakland Technology Park, a research park where private-sector companies work hand-in-hand with higher education.

OU's professional arts programs annually attract thousands to the campus. OU has received national recognition and local kudos for its Meadow Brook Theater, Meadow Brook Art Gallery, Meadow Brook Hall, and Meadow Brook Music Festival.

Oakland University was created in 1957 when the late Alfred G. and Matilda R. Wilson donated their 1,500-acre estate and \$2 million to begin a new college in Oakland County. Named Michigan State University-Oakland, the new campus enrolled its first students in 1959. In 1963, its name was changed to Oakland University, and in 1970 the Michigan Legislature recognized the maturity and stature of the university by granting it autonomy. The governor appointed Oakland University's first board of trustees in 1970.

GARY RUSSI
Interim President



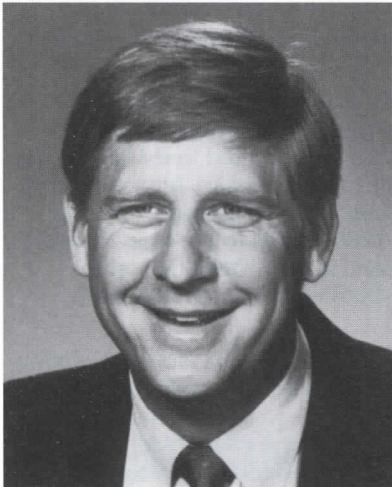
Gary D. Russi was named interim president and vice president for academic affairs of Oakland University on January 10, 1995, after spending a year and a half as the university's chief academic officer.

Russi, who is also a tenured professor in health sciences, came to Oakland from Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa. Russi was Drake's vice president for research and strategic planning, and a tenured professor of pharmacology and toxicology.

Russi also served as vice provost for academic affairs, vice provost for planning and budgeting, and director of university planning.

An American Council on Education Fellow in 1982-83, Russi received his baccalaureate in pharmacy in 1969 from Southwestern Oklahoma State University and a doctorate in pharmacology and toxicology from the University of Kansas in 1972.

JACK MEHL
Director of Athletics



Jack Mehl was named as Oakland University's Director of Athletics on July 6. Mehl becomes the school's fourth Director of Athletics, replacing Paul Hartman, who retired from Oakland on June 30, 1994. Assistant to the Director of Athletics and men's basketball coach Greg Kampe had been serving as Acting Director of Athletics during the search for Hartman's successor.

Mehl comes to Oakland from his position as Business and Marketing Manager for the Rose Bowl, a position he held since 1993. He was responsible for the overall administration of all business, sales, and marketing strategies for the Rose Bowl, and was lead administrator for the Rose Bowl Master Plan Committee. That committee is designed to identify capital strategies, budgeting, and external revenue sources for the stadium itself. While at the Rose Bowl, Mehl developed advertising programs that generated more than 1.3 million dollars of external revenue.

"I hope my presence here will enhance the program," Mehl said. "The leadership at Oakland is terrific, and I wouldn't have left the Rose Bowl if I didn't have confidence in the support of the program."

Mehl served as the Director of Athletics at Florida Atlantic University for 12 years, from 1979 to 1991. At FAU Mehl was responsible for proposals which moved the school's athletic program from the NAIA to the NCAA Division II level, and ultimately to its current affiliation at the NCAA Division I level. He administered a 14-sport program at FAU which operated with a budget in excess of \$2 million and had a staff of more than 40 employees. Mehl was able to secure over \$8 million in funding to build a 5,000-seat indoor arena and a 3,500-seat baseball stadium, and negotiated an agreement between the City of Boca Raton and the university resulting in over \$3 million worth of improvements to FAU's soccer facilities. He also successfully completed a State of Florida Challenge Grant, which created an endowed scholarship program for women's athletics at Florida Atlantic.

Between his stint at Florida Atlantic and his duties at the Rose Bowl, Mehl was the managing partner of the Collegiate Management Group, a consulting group. Mehl's group provided a wide range of support to colleges, universities, and non-profit organizations, specializing in athletic organization and administration, fund raising, and strategic planning.

Mehl has also been a coach of both golf and basketball during his career in athletics. He was Florida Atlantic's golf coach during his first five years as Athletic Director from 1979-84. Mehl was also an instructor in FAU's College of Education during that same five-year period. He was a coach of basketball at three different institutions, including the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, where he served as head coach from 1975-78. He was also an assistant coach at Ohio State University under Fred Taylor during the 1974-75 season, and was an assistant at Otterbein College in 1973-74. Mehl also was the Coordinator of the Department of Recreation and an instructor in the School of Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance at UNC-Greensboro.

Mehl received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Health and Physical Education from Otterbein College in 1972, and a Master of Arts degree in Athletic Administration from Ohio State University in 1974. The 45-year-old Mehl and his wife, Lynn, have three children -- Kristen, 14, Gregory, 11, and Douglas, 8.

GARY PARSONS

Head Soccer Coach

Oakland University soccer coach Gary Parsons keeps getting closer and closer to that holy grail. His Pioneers suffered an overtime loss to the University of Tampa in the national championship game last season, falling just short of winning OU's first NCAA II soccer crown. That still didn't dampen a season that saw Oakland run up an 18-2-2 record and earn its ninth straight NCAA II Tournament bid, and saw Parsons win his 200th career match.

Under Parsons OU has made 12 national tournament trips in 14 seasons, advancing as far as the national semi-finals on six different occasions. Last year's battle with Tampa for the national crown was the second time OU advanced as far as the championship game. OU was beaten by Seattle Pacific, which OU defeated in last year's semi-final, in the 1986 title tilt. OU has been the Central Region's top rated team four times under Parsons and has been rated as high as second nationally. During Parsons' tenure Oakland has averaged over 15 wins a year and has averaged one All-American and four All-Region players per season. His career mark is 213-54-27 in his 14 years.

Parsons' coaching success began before his arrival in Rochester. After going to four straight NCAA tournaments as an assistant coach at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and Eastern Illinois University, he almost led OU to the playoffs in his first year with a 14-4-1 record and the number one ranking in the Mideast Region. He upgraded the schedule and shored up some weak areas for his second season and Oakland became one of the top soccer powers in the nation.

His 1982 squad made OU's first final four trip, losing in the national semi-finals to Florida International University. The following season the Pioneers returned to the final four, suffering a 1-0 loss to Seattle Pacific. Both losses were on the road to the eventual national champion.

After those two tough semi-final losses, the Pioneers advanced to the national tournament for the third consecutive season. This time, Seattle Pacific needed a penalty kick shootout to oust the Pioneers. In 1985, OU missed out on the playoffs despite a 14-3-2 mark which included a 13-1-1 record in the last 15 games. This just fueled OU's fire in 1986.

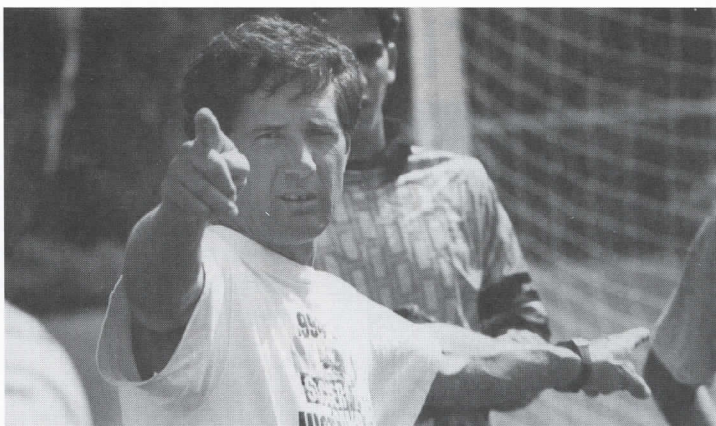
That year's run to the national finals included a pair of 1-0 home playoff wins against Lock Haven University and Davis and Elkins College. These games sandwiched a stunning 2-1 win on the road against Gannon University, a team the Pioneers had never beaten before. The playoff run ended in Seattle, when Seattle Pacific scored two early goals and coasted to a 4-1 title win. In 1987 OU returned to the national tournament, losing a first-round match-up to semi-finalist Missouri-St. Louis. A third-straight trip came in 1988, and a fourth final four appearance ended with an overtime road loss at California State-Northridge. OU was ousted from the playoffs in overtime again in 1989, losing a first round match-up at Gannon. In 1990 OU fell to the Knights again, this time in the Central Region final and in 1991 Oakland lost to national finalist Sonoma State in a shootout in the tournament's opening round.

OU's fifth semi-final berth came in 1992, when the Pioneers posted an 18-3-1 mark. Oakland beat California State-Chico at home in the first round, and then avenged a regular season loss by shutting out Lock Haven, 2-0, on the road. OU's run for the title ended with a 3-1 semi-final loss to host Tampa. OU fell to Gannon in the regional finals in 1993.

Parsons has earned five Mideast Coach of the Year selections and was the coach of the victorious West team in the 1989 Soccer Senior Bowl in St. Louis, a team which included John Stewart, the second two-time All-American in Oakland soccer history. In 1990 Earl Parris became the sixth Pioneer under Parsons to be selected to the Senior Bowl, meriting a post-season trip to both the indoor and outdoor classics.

In addition to his coaching prowess, Parsons enjoyed a noteworthy playing career. He was voted the Most Valuable Defensive Player at Plymouth State College as a senior and helped the Panthers mane the New England State College Athletic Conference finals in his last two years. Parsons holds degrees in math and physical education from Plymouth State.

A native of Oakham, Massachusetts, Parsons also serves as an assistant coach with the Michigan State Youth Soccer Association's state select program and is on the staff of the Region II Olympic Development program. He is a holder of a United States Soccer Federation "A" License, and directs his highly successful OU soccer camps during the summer months.

STEVE SEARGEANT

Assistant Coach

Steve Seargeant begins his fourth season as Gary Parsons' top assistant coach. Seargeant was previously Parsons' assistant in 1984 before beginning his second stint at Oakland University in 1992.

Seargeant, a native of England, played soccer professionally for 16 years. He has been a camp coach and clinician since retiring

from the professional ranks in 1982. His other coaching stints include the Sport Club and Michigan selects, and the Wallasey Youth team in his native England. He coached the Wallasey team for five seasons.

As a youth Seargeant had the honor of playing in historic Wembley National Stadium for England's national under 16 team.

Two summers ago Seargeant served as a correspondent for USA Today, covering the World Cup games held in the Pontiac Silverdome.

The 44-year-old Seargeant is single and lives in Auburn Hills.



RALPH TORRE

Assistant Coach

Ralph Torre is in his sixth year as an assistant coach on Gary Parsons' staff. Torre was OU's starting goalkeeper for two seasons prior to beginning his stint as an assistant coach in 1990.

Torre earned All-Region honors in both 1988 and 1989. His 11 shutouts in 1989 rank second on the single-season charts, while his 0.74 goals against average rates him fourth. He is fourth at OU in career saves and shutouts and second in goals against average. Torre helped lead the Pioneers to a pair of NCAA tournament bids,

including a trip to the final four in 1988. The Pioneers were 29-9-5 with Torre in net.

A native of Mississauga, Ontario, Torre is a graduate of Oakland with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English. He also earned a Master's degree in English at OU.

Also a youth and camp coach, Torre in single and lives in Pontiac.

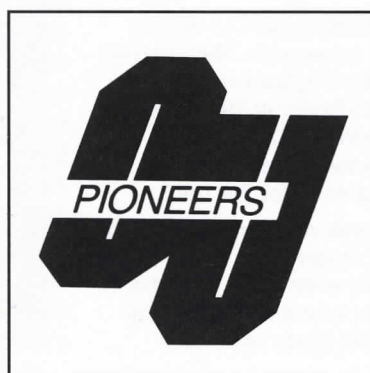

MEET THE PIONEERS



RECRUITING CLASS HAS PARSONS' PIONEERS RELOADING, NOT REBUILDING

December 3, 1994 was a very significant day in Oakland University soccer history. On that day the Pioneers came closer than ever to their ultimate goal of winning a national championship, falling in overtime to host Tampa in the NCAA II title game. That day also marked the last appearance in an OU uniform for a group of seniors that included two All-Americans, one of them the first three-time All-American in school history, the school's all-time scoring leader, and a total of five four-year starters.

"Last year's team had great talent, but also had great chemistry," OU coach Gary Parsons said. "Chemistry takes a long time to build. We went through a long evolution process to develop the type of chemistry we had last year."

After the exhilaration of the greatest season in school history and the depression of losing in the championship game had both worn off, coach Gary Parsons knew he had a monumental task ahead of him. Returning just half of his team and less than half of his starters for the 1995 season, Parsons hit the recruiting trail hard, coming up with a class that could help put the Pioneers back in the thick of the NCAA tournament chase.

Leading OU's returnees are a pair of three-year starters in seniors Chad Schomaker and Will Bothe. Schomaker is OU's top returning scorer, logging nine goals with seven assists last year in the midfield. Schomaker, who set an OU freshman record with 13 assists in 1992, had a team-high five game-winning goals last year, including the sudden-death winner in the NCAA Tournament against East Stroudsburg. He could move up to the forward line this year. Bothe, an All-Region defender last

season, missed most of the playoff run after separating his shoulder in that same game. Bothe scored four goals last year thanks to his ability in the air, and is healthy and ready to return to his status as OU's top marker. Schomaker and Bothe are joined in the senior class by forward Ari Koss and midfielder Tito Tep. Koss missed the first six games of last year due to an ankle injury, but became a solid reserve upon his return. Koss scored four goals and added five assists in his 16 games. Tep saw limited playing time, notching three assists in six games.

Junior Paul Doroh cracked the starting line-up last season as OU's other marking defender. Doroh was one of just five players to play in all 22 games last year, and one of three to log more than 2,000 minutes. Ben Cesa was OU's big sparkplug off the bench a season ago. Cesa, a junior who played both forward and midfield, scored five goals and added six assists, and is Oakland's number two returning scorer behind Schomaker. The third junior returnee is midfielder Anthony Verrino. Verrino scored three goals off the bench last season, including the game-winner in a regular season win against East Stroudsburg.

OU's final two returnees are in the sophomore class, and the pair made a large contribution in their freshman seasons. Amir Tal stepped right in where former four-year starter Mike Sheehy left off. Tal played in all 22 games for the Pioneers, posting nine shutouts and a 0.77 goals against average, among the best in the nation. He helped OU to five straight shutouts in the middle of the season, and posted the biggest shutout of the year in the regional final at Wisconsin-Parkside. Andreas Papoutsis was a starter for the majority of the year in the midfield, scoring five goals with three assists. Two of his goals came in a big win against Keene State.

That brings us to OU's large and talented group of newcomers, a group which could give the Pioneers more depth than they have enjoyed in a number of years. The group will converge on Rochester from five states and two countries. OU's foreign connection this year comes in the form of defender Markus Paija and midfielder David Hall. Paija could step in and be Oakland's sweeper this year. The reliable back-line player played on the highest level in his home country in Finland. Paija could also find himself as OU's defensive center midfielder, where he would combine with Hall. Hall, from Surrey, England, has a wealth of experience, playing on a number of school and county all-star teams. He is pencilled in as OU's attacking center-midfielder.

Replacing OU's offense was a big priority for Parsons, as OU returns players who accounted for just 31 of its 67 goals a year ago. Michigan All-State choices Rob Wisser and Nick Deren could be big factors on the Pioneers' scoreboard. Wisser was a first-team All-Stater in 1993 at Gull Lake High School, and transfers from Kalamazoo Valley Community College with four years of eligibility. Deren was a two-time All-State selection at Livonia Stevenson High School with a nose for the net.

The Pioneer midfield is as deep as ever, with a pair of returning starters in Schomaker and Papoutsis, already competent reserves on hand, and the addition of Hall. Parsons solidified his midfield even more with the additions of Mike Dodd and Chad Johnson. Dodd was a three-time All-State choice in Nebraska, while Johnson earned All-State honors in

Kentucky. Both have experience on their state and regional Olympic Development Programs. Also new in the midfield is Juan Delgado, a former high school standout in Florida, and a pair of Michigan natives, Anthony Vettraino from Livonia Stevenson and Nate Martin from Troy Athens.

Another Troy Athens player, Eric Pogue, will be Tal's back-up in goal. Pogue was an honorable mention All-Stater as the Athens starter. Also candidates for playing time will be a pair of redshirt freshmen from Warren DeLaSalle High School, Iain MacDonald and Jake Jeakle. Both were All-Staters in 1993 before coming to Oakland last year. "I wanted to recruit as many talented players as I could," Parsons said. "When we start training camp we will see who the best players are and where they can play. The focus of our season is to figure out who's going to play where and what system will be best for us."

The Pioneers' road back to the finals will be difficult, as usual. Oakland faces all of the Central Region's best, led off by Southern Indiana, which returns to NCAA II and hosts OU on September 9. Oakland also faces road contests at Wisconsin-Parkside and Gannon, while hosting Mercyhurst and Lewis in home matches, Missouri-St. Louis and Florida Tech in the National Invitational Soccer Tournament, and Lock Haven, Northeast Missouri State, and West Virginia Wesleyan in the Central Region Classic. West Virginia Wesleyan is a perennial NAIA powerhouse in its first year in both NCAA II and the Central Region. Throw in state rival Detroit, and the Pioneers will be well-tested. OU will also have another challenge in front of it. OU, Gannon, Mercyhurst, Ashland and Saginaw Valley State will kick off men's soccer in the GLIAC this year.

"I am concerned with the quality of our region," Parsons said. "The region is already deep with quality teams, and you're adding Southern Indiana plus the West Virginia conference. It's not a good year to have a young team."

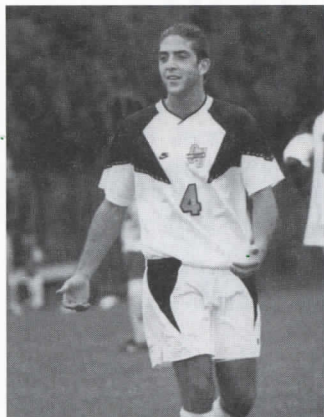
Oakland's streak of nine straight years in the NCAA Tournament is the longest current active streak in Division II. With the losses they have suffered and the schedule they face, the Pioneers 10th post-season trip looks to be the most difficult to earn. Parsons has replaced the nucleus of his last four teams with a number of talented players. Their ability to mesh quickly with the incumbents will be the key to the season. OU's schedule is tough from top to bottom. The Pioneers will have to be ready.
