Thousands expected for career day

Several thousand area high school students and their families are expected to attend Oakland's February 25 competitive scholarship examination and career day open house.

The sessions are aimed at two major concerns—how to get a scholarship based on ability without regard to family need and how to pick a career field with good job prospects after graduation—according to Jerry Rose. Rose is director of admissions and scholarships at the university.

All high school students and their parents are invited to the open house and career day talks, but only high school seniors who register in advance will be eligible for the scholarship exam. Awards range from \$100 to \$600 a year based on test scores and high school grades, Rose said. Information can be obtained by calling 377-3360.

The career seminars include education, biology, health sciences, engineering, human resource development, economics and management, nursing, mathematical and physical sciences, social science, and the liberal arts.

A special orientation session for parents has been planned and will include representatives from financial aids, career advising and placement, and student services.

The opening program is at 12:30 p.m. in the Sports and Recreation Building. "Doc" Holiaday's Afram Jazz Lab Band will provide entertainment prior to the opening session. The Meadow Brook Estate, OU's student jazz and show ensemble, will perform during a special reception stated for 2:45 p.m. in the Oakland Center. The program is sponsored by the Student Life Staff of the university.

Governor announces budget recommendations

Governor William Milliken has recommended the university receive a \$19,244,778 general fund appropriation for 1979-80, an increase of 6.3 percent over the current level of funding.

The recommendation is part of the state budget that will now be considered by the legislature.

OU had asked for \$21,316,400 in state appropriations. The governor's recommendation includes no new program revision funds or money to support enrollment growth. The recommendation does include a six percent inflation factor to cover all costs including wage and salary increases.

The minimum increase in funding for public colleges and universities was six percent. Lake Superior State College received an 11 percent increase and Grand Valley State College a 7.8 percent hike to recognize enrollment growth at those institutions.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT

On January 19, President O'Dowd and central university administrators, the academic deans, and 30 women in administrative positions on campus met with the Michigan State Planning Committee of the American Council on Education's (ACE) National Identification Program for Advancement of Women in Higher Education.

Sposored by ACE's Office of Women in Higher Education the program is intended to result in a personalized system for the Identification, recommendation and advancement of women who hold major decision-making positions in higher education administration. The program is decentralized, developing through planning committees in more than 40 states. ACE also provides national forums to increase the visibility of women leaders on the national higher education scene.

Michigan, with its large number of higher education institutions and students, was among the first states selected for the national identification program.

Major accomplishments of the first year have been:

A survey which resulted in the identification of 1,044 women administrators in Michigan. One hundred and three institutions were contacted and 91 responded. The breakdown by job classification was:

Fifteen leaders in education, corporations and public affairs in the State of Michigan were appointed to the Michigan State Panel.

A planning conference, involving 30 leaders in education and state panelists was held on May 16, 1978. This all-day meeting was aimed at identifying significant issues that affect the advancement of women in higher education, considering priorities, and making plans for future action.

The January 19 visit to the Oakland University campus was the first of its kind thus Oakland University provides the model for Planning Committee visits to campuses across the state during the next 18 months of the program. The purpose of the visit was to share information about the National Identification Program as a resource and a pilot program and to seek information on strategies for advancement which have proved successful at Oakland, and ideas which should be explored.

Pat Houtz, campus ilaison and Geraldene Feiton, member of the state planning committee are arranging a followup meeting scheduled for February 23. Future American relationships with mainland China and with Taiwan will be discussed in a February 22 Area Studies Seminar at Oakland University.

Faculty from history, political science, philosophy, and Chinese studies will participate in the noon program in the Gold Room of the Oakland Center. The public is invited at no charge.

Speakers will cover all aspects of American-Chinese relations, past history, educational and trade benefits, and the possible political consequences of the switch in U.S. recognition from Taiwan to mainland China.

Some faculty members will speak for and against the new U.S. China Policy. A question and answer session will follow the formal presentations.

Richard Stamps, anthropology, will serve as chairperson for the seminar. Making presentations will be Paul Michaud, Patrick Strauss, and Bernie Thomas, history; Clifford Quinlan, U.S. State Department Diplomat in Residence; John Mamey, Chinese Studies; Sheldon Appleton, and Dolores Kefgan, political science; and Bob Wargo, philosophy.

The College of Arts and Sciences at Oakland University draws on faculty from various disciplines to offer a distinctive series of area studies programs. Areas of concentration include African, Afro-American, East Asian, Latin American, Slavic, and South Asian studies.

A conference for parents and teachers of young handicapped children will be held at Meadow Brook Hall Saturday, February 17. The conference is sponsored by PROJECT EARLY, Oakland University's three-year pilot program funded by the U.S. Office of Education, Bureau of the Handicapped. Sessions will provide current information about programs, services and techniques to meet the needs of preschool children with emotional impairment and learning disabilities.

An educational team from Schaumbera Early Education Center will present a program on "Assessing Young Children in a Natural Setting." Keynoter Dr. Paul Pearsall from the Department of Psychiatry, Sinai Hospital, will talk about "Helping Families with Young Handicapped Children." Fifteen other speakers will present sessions on various topics of special interest: "Nutrition in the Making," "Arts for the Handicapped Child." "Parent Problems and Programs," and "Developmental Approach to Emotional Disturbance. Conferees will have the opportunity to attend two sessions of their choice.

The conference fee is \$15.50 which includes luncheon at Meadow Brook Hall. For further information, contact the Conference Department, Oakland University, (313) 377-3272.

DeWitt S. Dykes, Jr., history, was the principal guest on a television program dealing with black family history, genealogy, and **Roots.** The program, hosted by Jim Ingram, aired on Channel 62, WGPR, at 12:30 p.m. Sunday, February 11, and will be shown again at 8 a.m., Saturday, February 17.

Dykes will discuss the importance of family history, the significance of **Roots** for black history, and methods of researching and writing family history. Specific books and materials of interest to blacks searching for their family roots will be discussed.

A non-credit course in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training will be offered for students, faculty, and staff on three consecutive Thursdays beginning March 22. The nine-hour course will be held from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m., March 22 and 29 and April 5 in the Oakland Room of the Oakland Center. The course will be taught by Shawn McCormick, physical education and athletics, who is certified through the American Red Cross and the Michigan Heart Association.

The first session will include an introduction, a discussion of liabilities and human anatomy, a demonstration, and practice. The second session covers practice skills and a review. The third session begins the certifying process.

Upon successful completion of a written and skill test, students will be certified by the American Red Cross and the Michigan Heart Association to administer CPR. The enrollment will be limited to the first 15 applicants. Registrations will be taken at CIPO, 49 Oakland Center, beginning Monday, February 26.
