

OU considers death education

The university is considering the establishment of a Center for Death Education and Research.

Frederick W. Obear, academic vice president and provost, has named a special task force to develop a proposal for the creation of such a center.

The charge to the task force is to define the role and scope of such a center and its emphasis on teaching, research, and service.

Obear said that "Initially, a regrouping of existing credit courses might result in an educationally sound and appealing concentration which might be sponsored by an academic unit or by the Provost's Office."

Among the other activities that the center might consider are yearly conferences for clergy, funeral directors, nurses and doctors and research on death and dying.

University personnel have already established related programs in area hospitals and in the community. Obear said he feels the university can develop a useful and responsive organizational entity oriented toward death education and research. "Presently, we appear to have impressive human resources in this area which can serve as the basis for staffing a variety of programs that would

not duplicate those in existence at other Michigan higher educational institutions," Obear said.

Chairperson of the study committee is William Charles Fish, human and educational services. Members are Harvey Burdick, psychology; William H. Jones, human and educational services; Boaz Kahana, psychology; Moon J. Pak, health sciences; Barbara Russol, nursing; Ralph Schillace, psychology; Maura C. Selahowski, urban affairs; Ronald Sudol, learning skills; Arundhati Ava Tagore, library; and Howard R. Witt, engineering.

Energy course set

The Assembly of the College of Arts and Sciences has approved an energy studies concentration of 28 credits in diverse interdisciplinary areas including economics, political science, anthropology, biology, chemistry, physics, engineering, and environmental studies.

Most of the courses in the concentration already exist as individual offerings, but the grouping as a concentration provides a more visable, coordinated effort in energy studies, sponsors say.

The new concentration will begin in the fall of 1980, but interested students can begin energy-related projects this spring. Those projects include solar measurements, evaluation of a local pond for aquaculture, and thermal efficiency studies of buildings.

Interested students can contact Professor Gottfried Brieger, chemistry, at 377-2325. Before her death last month, Marian Wilson asked that gifts in her memory be made to the Department of History. Thus, the department is establishing the Marian Wilson Memorial Fund which will be used to recognize high accomplishment in the areas of Marian's professional expertise. A faculty-staff committee drawn from several university departments will establish

guidelines for administering the fund and recommending awards. Contributions may be made in the form of checks written to Oakland University and forwarded to the history office, 460 VBH.
