# Search For Vice Provost Opens

# **IBS Fights Eye Disease**

Editor's Note—Several times each year the OU News carries articles emphasizing particular disciplines at the university. This issue presents an overview of the acclaimed Institute of Biological Sciences where top students may now engage in a research training program. Information about the training program and the institute is carried below.

The Institute of Biological Sciences at Oakland University is the major research center committed to basic eye research and supported by federal, state and private funds. Current projects include investigations on various factors that cause lens opacification (cataract), physiologic factors involved in glaucoma, the mechanism by which corneal transparency is maintained, biochemical and physiological clues to understanding how the retina converts light signal to neural response, and characterization of an antigen that causes inflammation (uveitis) of uveal tissues.

Using facilities at the IBS laboratories, the IBS offers a research training program for a limited number of students. The program is intended to provide students opportuni-

ties to acquire laboratory experience in biomedical research and can be credited to course 490. Whether for credit or noncredit, interested students are urged to apply at the IBS office or contact Hitoshi Shichi, assistant director, 423 Dodge Hall, phone 7-2361.

Five members of the institute have been invited to present papers at symposia and workshops this fall at the 5th International Congress of Eye Research which will be held in Eindhoven, The Netherlands, October 3-8. This is one of the major international meetings of eye research.

Venkar N. Reddy, director of the IBS, will present a paper (Role of Na-K ATPase in X-ray induced cataract) at a symposium entitled Transport ATPases in ocular tissues. He is also participating in the workshop on calcium metabolism in lens. The other papers to be presented at various workshops and symposia are: Michael V. Riley (with M.I. Peters): Distribution of ATPase in the ciliary body; Frank J. Giblin (with J.P. McCready and V.N. Reddy): GSH and detoxification of H2O2 in the lens; Kenneth R. Hightower: Calcium-inhibited Na/K pump; Hitoshi Shichi (with K. Yamamoto): On "active" rhodopsin.

- D. The Office of Institutional Research, and
- E. The Office of Research and Academic Development.

The vice provost and dean of the graduate school represents the Office of the Provost in the day-to-day dealings with these units, sets policies for the operation of these units within an overall university framework, and formulates policy recommendations to the senior vice president for university affairs and provost on matters of concern and interest to these units.

The vice provost and dean of the graduate school serves as the presiding

officer of the Graduate Council as provided in the constitution of that body. In this role, he or she serves as the principal officer of the senior vice president for university affairs and provost for monitoring the operation and effectiveness of graduate programs, working with several academic deans in the allocation of resources to graduate programs, guiding and directing the academic planning process for new programs, and guiding and directing periodic evaluations of existing programs. Of special importance is the responsibility for auiding and directing the program evaluation process, a responsibility to be executed in collaboration with the academic deans and with the Graduate Council.

The vice provost and dean of the Graduate School will assist the senior vice president for university affairs and provost in the establishment and maintenance of an academic planning activity. In this capacity, he or she will work with the academic deans, directors, department chairs and appropriate committees of the senate and other academic governance bodies as well as with other individuals on the staff of the senior vice president for university affairs and provost.

In addition to these continuing responsibilities, the vice provost and dean of the Graduate School advises the senior vice president for university affairs and provost on a variety of matters and also officially represents this officer in his absence.

OU and the OU Chapter of the American Association of University Professors have reached tentative agreement on a new three year contract. The tentative agreement was announced Monday, Sept. 6. Terms were withheld pending a ratification vote by the membership. The contract must also be approved by the OU Board of Trustees.
