SENATE APPROVES OFFICIAL STATEMENT ON CREDIT STRUCTURE

The Oakland University Senate has approved a new formal statement on the credit structure and a new class schedule matrix effective with the 1974-75 fall term.

The new OU Senate legislation includes a specific reference to scheduled instruction time. The two-part section affirms "That one credit unit is equivalent to a total of three hours of work per week including 50 minutes of scheduled instruction and the estimated time that an average student spend in outside preparation each week." Also, "That the standard Oakland University course is a four-credit course which is scheduled 200 minutes per week and requires the equivalent of 12 hours of work per week."

The old University Senate legislation in effect since 1965 omitted specific reference to scheduled instruction time and was thus open to various interpretations. There were internal and external pressures for change, university officials said.

The class schedule adopted to accommodate the new credit structure will be reviewed by the University Senate before Feb. 1, 1976.

NEW LONDON ENSEMBLE PERFORMS FEB. 13

The New London Soloists Ensemble, a group of leading solo and chamber musicians, will perform on the University Recital Series Wednesday, Feb. 13, at 8:30 in Varner Recital Hall. The ensemble is on its first tour of the United States and

it appears at OU in place of the Czech Chamber Orchestra which cancelled its 1974 tour.

The new London Soloists Ensemble features violin, flute, and harpsichord soloists, with the supporting instrumentation of four violins, two violas, two cellos, and double bass. All celebrated musicians, they perform standing, rather than seated, building their performances around a leader, rather than a conductor.

Works by Boyce, Vivaldi, Boccherini, Elgar, J.S. Bach, and Jolivet will be featured.
