This most recent edition includes an expanded basic sciences section, focusing on new techniques in molecular medicine.	
Hughes GRV et al. Clinician's Manual on Lupus. Springer, 2012. A recent text, written at the primary care level and serving as an educational reference for medical students.	
Schur PH et al. (eds). Lupus Erythematosus: Clinical Evaluation and Treatment. Springer Healthcare, 2012.	
As indicated by the title, this recent, concise text focuses on the clinical and treatment aspects of SLE.
