SENATE MEETING CHANGE ANNOUNCED The March I4 Oakland University Senate meeting has been cancelled. The next meeting is scheduled for April II unless otherwise notified.

WARS, REVOLUTIONS ARE CONFERENCE TOPIC The Department of History will sponsor a conference on "Teaching About Revolutions and Civil Wars" in a Saturday, March 16, program at Meadow Brook Hall. Social studies teachers from area high schools will attend.

Participating faculty include Melvin Cherno, Richard M. Brace, Robert C. Howes, Charles A. Akers, Robert J. Krompart, Colin A. Palmer, and Carl R. Osthaus. Others include James D. Graham, Mary Karasch, Roy A. Kotynek, Lawrence D. Orton, and S. Bernard Thomas. In addition, Rozelle William Nesbitt of the Africa Information Service, will discuss "The Struggle Continues."

MEADOW BROOK BALL BENEFITS THE VILLAGE Oakland University will hold a Meadow Brook Ball Saturday, March 30, with proceeds designated for the OU students' Village Project.

The university community, friends and alumni are invited to the \$10 per couple gala, according to Claudia Turski, chairman of the Meadow Brook Ball Committee. Dress for the 8:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. ball in the university's tudor-style mansion is formal or semi-formal. Tickets may be purchased at the campus ticket office, Miss Turski said.

Matilda Wilson, university benefactress, held several Meadow Brook Balls in the years prior to her death. The proceeds were given to the university's scholarship fund. The current benefit ball is given in that tradition, Miss Turski said.

The 1974 program offers punch and hors d'oeuvres, and music for dancing and listening pleasure. OU students who will perform are pianist Andrea Choelas and singer Cheyvonne Wright and members of the Doc Holladay Jazz Band. The Brahm Ward Orchestra from Flint will also be featured.

The University Congress and President Donald D. O'Dowd are helping underwrite the initial costs of the ball. The beneficiary, the Village Project, is a student-originated program.

## STUDENTS INVITED TO APPLY FOR U.A.W. SCHOLARSHIPS

Oakland University undergraduate and graduate students who are interested in labor problems and social concerns are invited to apply for two-week summer scholarships in which they can exchange their ideas with rank and file union members.

Approximately 40 scholarships will be offered to college and university students in the area under auspices of the Walter and May Reuther Memorial Fund Scholarship Program, now in its third year.

The sessions are held at the Family Education Center in Black Lake. The FEC is operated by the International Union, United Automobile, Aerospace and Agricultural Implement Workers of America (U.A.W.). Applicants can send their letters directly to Irving Bluestone, U.A.W. vice president, at 8000 East Jefferson. They should state their majors, reasons for interest in the program, and alternate dates as students will be spaced throughout the eight summer sessions, U.A.W. sponsors said.

The two-week programs begin: April 15; June 9 and 23; July 7 and 21; Aug. 4 and 18; and Sept. I. Selected students will receive room and board and educational materials, and free transportation except for the distance between Detroit and Black Lake and return.

Ken Coffman, OU's vice president for Student Affairs, encouraged interested students to take advantage of the program.

University officials said it was most appropriate that its students will be given the opportunity to apply for the Walter and May Reuther Memorial Fund Scholarships. The Reuthers were among the university's strongest early supporters, they said.

More than 400 student science projects will be on exhibit when Oakland University hosts the March 15-16-17 Regional Science and Engineering Fair for North Oakland County. Exhibitors are from grade-school through high-school age.

The program in the Sports and Recreation Building is one of six community fairs sponsored by the Science and Engineering Fair of Metropolitan Detroit. The OU campus host is the School of Engineering. #### OAKLAND SINGERS PERFORM MARCH 14

The Oakland University Singers, under the direction of John Dovaras, will present its annual spring season concert on Thursday evening, March 14 at 8:00 p.m. Free and open to the public, it will be held in the Varner Recital Hall.

Highlighting the program will be two extended works. Ralph Vaughan Williams' "Mass in G Minor," for solo quartet and double chorus, and the area premiere performance of P.D.Q. Bach's oratorio "The Seasonings."
