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BUDGET CUTS AFFECT STUDIO ART, LANGUAGES

tion.

A schedule of studio art and Hindi-Urdu courses will be offered this fall, but then the university will phase out these disciplines in response to a severe budget reduction at the institution.

Frederick W. Obear, academic vice president and provost, also announced that general fund money will no longer be used to support programs in Italian, Portuguese, and Hebrew and Judaic Studies. However, some outside funding may be available to continue some or all of these course offerings, he said.

In addition, Obear said that Allport College, one of two inner colleges, was being discontinued as a separate unit. Allport's programs will be offered by other units of the university, Obear said. New-Charter College, the remaining inner college, will continue its operations.

At the present time, the disciplines named above are those most seriously affected by the university budget cuts. The university is working with the American Association of University Professors on the faculty lay-off procedures.

The current reductions will affect 64 university positions including 17.86 full-time equivalent (FTE) faculty, 14.5 FTE administrative-professionals, 19 FTE clerical-technical positions, and seven FTE positions in hourly, police officer, and other categories. Six part-time athletic coaching positions will be eliminated.

The budget reductions are being made in anticipation of recommended lower appropriations levels for 1975-76.

Governor Milliken has asked the Legislature to reduce appropriations for higher education institutions by another two percent for the 1975-76 fiscal year. That request is in addition to the four percent cut that the governor announced when he delivered his budget message in January. These actions would lead to a reduction in the university's appropriation of \$734,000.

The Senate and House appropriations committees are currently considering the governor's budget requests, and both houses of the Legislature have had hearings on Oakland's proposed appropriation. There is no indication yet as to when a final decision on the appropriation will be made.

William Sturner, assistant president for administrative affairs, has been named vice president for academic affairs at the State University College at Buffalo. Sturner has been OU's assistant president for administrative affairs since 1971. He also has been serving as associate professor of political science since 1966. Sturner previously was assistant provost (1967-1969) and vice provost (1969-1971) at the university.

Prior to joining the faculty at Oakland, Dr. Sturner was an instructor in Political Science at the University of Detroit.

A 1957 graduate of Fordham College, Dr. Sturner received an M.A. in Mass Communications from the University of Wisconsin in 1960 and earned his Ph.D. in Political Science from Fordham University in 1966.

MEAL REIMBURSEMENT POLICY ESTABLISHED

The university has approved a new meal reimbursement policy that is effective immediately. The policy is as follows: "Meal expenditures incurred in connection with meetings of university personnel are generally not reimbursable. In special situations such as workshops or seminars, reimbursement will be made when authorized by a presidential officer. Casual breakfast and luncheon meetings and departmental or divisional staff meetings do not qualify."

"Meal costs incurred in connection with the hosting of official guests of the university are reimbursable. The number of university personnel attending should be kept at a reasonable level as should the meal costs. The university meal allowance for travel should be used as a guideline."

UNIVERSITY CITED FOR UNITED WAY EFFORTS

Oakland University has been cited by the United Way for Pontiac and North Oakland County for its contributions during the 1974 campaign.

Lewis N. Pino received an award of merit for the institution as OU raised \$16,668 or 128 percent of its goal.

In addition, 17 units within the university received outstanding citizenship awards for having average contributions of \$18 or more.

Areas receiving one years awards were Meadow Brook Festival and Theatre, music, employment relations, physical education, physical plant, provost's group, and student life. Areas receiving two year awards were continuing education, dramatic art, education, biology, chemistry, English, and psychology. Administration and mathematics each earned three year awards. Engineering was cited for achieving an outstanding citizenship award for the fifth straight year.

MALLOW LECTURES AT DENVER MEETING

Jeffrey V. Mallow, physics, presented two papers dealing with the effects of relativity on atoms and ions at the Denver meeting of the American Physical Society. The topics were "Unrestricted Dirac-Fock Determinations of Core Polarization Contributions to Hyperfine Interactions" and "Relativistic Electron Densities and Isomer Shifts in Transition Metal Ions."
