SIGNED: OU GETS \$14,235,500 BUDGET

Gov. William Milliken has signed a state budget that includes a \$14,235,500 appropriation for OU. The funds will be paid during the state's fiscal year running from October 1,

1976, through September 30, 1977.

The governor did veto funds for new capital outlay projects including the \$233,000 OU was to have received to improve and increase the water distribution system in the southeast campus area. The university will seek alternative means of funding.

Michigan will receive money from a new federal public works bill, and the governor has suggested that a number of capital outlay projects may qualify for funding from that

source, university officials said.

THEATRE LOWER LEVEL LIQUOR OK FOR BARN

The Oakland University Board of Trustees has approved the renovated lower level of the Barn Theatre as one of the sites where alcoholic beverages can be consumed on campus. A dedication of the new facility is planned for September 8.

The August 9 recommendation amends a September 13, 1972, board action that approved the moderate and lawful use of alcoholic beverages in private areas of the university residence halls and in public university areas that are specifically identified. The Barn Theatre area was not specified in the 1972 action.

Any use of alcoholic beverages on the approved locations is governed by the liquor control act, the university ordinance 2.02:2, and by provisions provided under the university policy on the use of alcohol at scheduled social events.

The barn's lower level has been remodeled at a cost of \$20,000 to provide space for students, faculty, and staff concert and lecture activities, dances, and theater receptions.

The renovation is part of the Students for the Village Project that will convert the campus barns into a theater-artscrafts complex.

The students raised \$10,000 toward the renovation of the theater's lower level and the university matched that effort.

OU VENDING COMMITTEE SELECTS VENDOR

The Oakland University Vending Committee has announced that Canteen Corporation has been selected to provide full service vending to the campus for 1976-77. Canteen will place machines in all buildings throughout the campus (except Baldwin Pavilion, Meadow Brook Hall, and the golf course). Actual full service will begin by September 1.

REESE GETS AWARD

David G. Reese, a 1975 Master of Science in Management graduate, was presented with the Society of American Value Engineers, Inc., Student Award for 1975-1976 for the report prepared in his mas-ter's project. This report, "The Process-Efficiency of the Youth Assistance Program, Oakland County Youth Service Bureau," was chosen for the award because of "the unique and effective manner" in which he had employed the principles of value engineering. The presentation was made in May at the society's international awards banquet in Minneapolis.

EMPLOYERS NEED NEW STUDENT PAY FORMS

Barbara Gaves reminds campus employers that effective with the August 30 student payroll period, new student pay rate recommendation forms must be prepared for all students receiving more than \$2.50 per hour or a lump sum payment. If a special pay rate form has been issued with an effective date prior to August 30, 1976, a new form will be needed with an effective date of August 30, 1976.

The forms should be prepared far enough in advance of the effective date to allow your department ample time to obtain written approvals from the financial aid office and the Office of Employment Relations. If an approved form is not on file in the payroll office by September 10, 1976, the individual will be crossed off the time sheet and not paid.

All special pay rate forms must have a specific effective date; "fall term" will not be accepted as an effective date.
