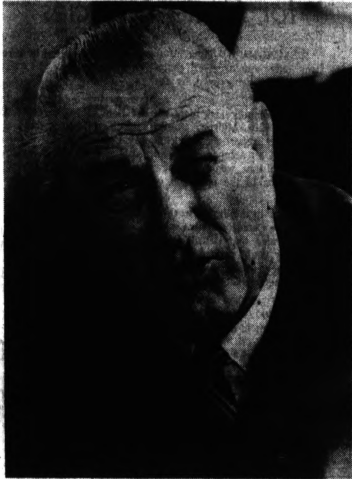

Dugan Is Firm on Rezoning

'2nd Traffic Outlet Necessary for Okay'

District 5 City Commissioner John A. Dugan claimed last night that as long as he could get one other vote, there would be no rezoning for a 20-acre parcel on Pontiac's East Side for an apartment development until a second outlet was provided for traffic.

Dugan, who represents the area, led the opposition last week when the commission voted 5-2 to reject rezoning from single-family residential to multiple dwelling.

A minimum of six of the seven commissioners would have to vote for the rezoning to get it approved, because a protest petition has been filed.

"I'm not going to be pressured into changing my mind," said Dugan. "I will continue to represent District 5 and the people of Herrington Hills subdivision and do what the majority of people want."

Dugan claimed that never had such a small rezoning matter received such newspaper coverage.

LBJ: Viet Reds Faltering

President Says Enemy Knows War Now Lost

Optimism Expressed at Texas Conference; More Talks Are Due

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson, declaring the Communists know they cannot win a military victory in Viet Nam, has voiced optimism that "we are on the way" to solving the Vietnamese problem.

Johnson planned a series of Viet Nam conferences at his ranch home near here tonight, summoning Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, roving Ambassador W. Averell Harriman and other military and diplomatic advisers for an overnight business visit.

The President expressed an optimistic view of the war during a news conference yesterday on the front lawn of his ranch—a session preceded by a barbecue buffet lunch served by Mrs. Johnson and daughter Luci.

Taking the wraps off a top secret message from the Pentagon, Johnson cited estimates that stepped-up bombing raids on the Hanoi-Haiphong area have wiped out 57 per cent of North Viet Nam's petroleum storage facilities.

He said 57 per cent of all storage capacity has been hit during the raids that began last week.

OTHER HIGHLIGHTS

Other conference highlights: •Discussing racial problems, Johnson indirectly chided militant Negro leaders by asserting "We are not interested in black power and we are not interested in white power, but we are interested in America democratic power, with a small 'd'." Some militants have raised "black power" as a battle cry.

•Turning to politics, the President said "as time permits, I will be traveling throughout the country" in the four months between now and the November elections.

He said that if he continues his recent travel rate, he could cover all 50 states by late October.

•The latest budget deficit, he reported, will be "far below" (Continued on Page 2, Col. 5)

Veep Defends Viet Policy Before U.S. Governors

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey told the nation's governors today that the United States has the initiative in Viet Nam and must stay and fight there until it has stopped the aggression from the north.

The vice president, in a prepared address to the 58th annual meeting of the governors, said that because of a series of "smashing defeats" to the North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong, the initiative in the conflict clearly "has shifted to the allied forces."

2 Car Firms Report Rise in June Sales

DETROIT (AP) — Chrysler and American Motors corporations reported yesterday an increase in car sales during the last 10 days of June.

But Ford Motor Co., while reporting it sold a record number of cars in the first six months of this year, said its sales in the last 10 days of June fell off the pace for the same period of 1965.

General Motors Corp. was due to issue its preliminary sales figures today.

AMC, smallest of the major U.S. auto firms, led the upsurge with a 21 per cent increase in car sales for the 10-day period.

Chrysler, which last year sold 49,983 autos in the final 10 days of June, boosted its sales to 51,064 in the same period of last month.

His letters to Belinda's mother took a slightly different tone:

"I sure hope I may get out of this place. I keep telling everyone I will."

The Smiths, father and son, met last May in Viet Nam.

City Quits Project for Sewer Line

Seven communities outside Pontiac will be paying more than they expected for Oakland County's proposed Clinton-Oakland Sewage Disposal System.

A need for revising costs outside the city resulted from the City Commission's decision last night to "go it alone" in construction of a sanitary trunk sewer to serve a largely undeveloped area in the northeast corner of the city.

Commissioners voted to stick by their June 30 deadline to construct the Galloway Creek Trunk sewer as a city project.

The sewer would parallel the future Clinton-Oakland interceptor in that area.

The commission's decision last night to pull out supports the 45-day ultimatum previously handed Oakland County to get the Clinton Oakland contracts approved by the participating municipalities.

Rejected was a request to extend the deadline to July 20. The request had come from Roy J. Alexander, director of the county's department of public works.

Alexander reported that only three municipalities — the townships of Avon and Independence and the City of Orchard Lake — have not yet approved the contract.

Yank Planes Dodge Heavy Missile Salvo

Soviet-Made Rockets Fail to Hit Targets in Big Day of Raids

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — American warplanes successfully dodged a heavy onslaught of Soviet-made missiles over North Viet Nam's Red River Valley yesterday during one of the heaviest raiding days of the war.

The U.S. military command announced at a briefing today that 27 to 29 surface-to-air missiles had been fired at U.S. planes.

A few hours later, however, official spokesmen reported there may have been some duplicate sightings in the accounts from pilots.

The spokesmen said it probably would be at least 12 hours before intelligence reports could be sorted out and a definite figure established.

The original announcement said it had been the largest number of missiles fired in a single day since the beginning of the air war and despite the confusion later, it obviously represented a day of heavy missile activity.

The largest number of missiles sighted previously was 12 one day last March and it was believed that yesterday's firings exceeded that total.

The missiles were fired from sites in the Red River Valley 50 to 115 miles north and northwest of Hanoi. U.S. Air Force pilots reported wrecking four of the sites and also hitting two fuel depots within 33 miles of the North Vietnamese capital.

One of the oil storage areas was 28 miles north of Hanoi, the other 33 miles northwest.

Air Force and carrier-based Navy jets flew a total of 106 multiple-plane missions, a new high in the 16-month air war. But a spokesman said the missions did not involve a record number of planes.

Heat Relief Nearly Here

A bit of relief from the heat is in sight for Pontiac area residents even if highs are in the 80s.

The warm, muggy weather of yesterday will become cooler with low temperatures 57 to 62 tonight. Sunny and cooler with highs 77 to 82 is Thursday's forecast, and fair is the prediction for Friday.

Temperatures for the next five days will average about 3 to 4 degrees below the normal high of 82 to 84 and low of 57 to 61. Only minor temperature changes may be expected until the weekend when temperatures will turn cooler.

Precipitation will total one-half inch toward the end of the week.

Morning southwesterly winds at 15 to 25 miles per hour will shift to west to northwest at 10 to 15 miles tonight.

A sunny 71 was the low in downtown Pontiac prior to 8 a.m. The thermometer registered 83 at 1 p.m.

for Women Continues

CHESTERTON, Ind. (UPI)—Coast Guard authorities today examined a motorboat believed to be one in which three missing Chicago-area women were last seen Saturday at the Indiana Dunes State Park.

Law enforcement officials resumed an intensive search of the barren dunes at dawn.

The boat was found late yesterday at the Ludington, Mich., Yacht Club, about 150 miles from the park where witnesses told police the girls had entered a boat with three men.

Joining the hunt today were two aircraft and a helicopter from the Civil Air Patrol, Indiana State Police, Coast Guard boats and soldiers from an Army missile site near the dunes area.

The missing women were Mrs. Renee Bruhl, 19, Chicago, wife of a young college student; Miss Ann Miller, 21, York Center, Ill., who was employed until recently exercising horses at the Oak Brook Polo Club; and Miss Patricia Blough, 19, Westchester, Ill., a secretary at the Commonwealth Edison Co.

They were last seen at the park beach Saturday morning by a lifeguard, who said he watched the women climb into a motorboat with three men. The lifeguard said he cautioned one of the women about dangling her feet in the water.

FEAR FOUL PLAY

"The possibility of foul play must be considered in view of the circumstances of their disappearance," State Police Sgt. Edward Burke, said.

More than half of the 2,300-acre park, a popular spot for Chicagoans and residents of northern Indiana, was covered by the search party before darkness fell last night.

Among the searchers was Harold Blough, father of one of the missing women and commander of Group 25 of the Illinois Civil Air Patrol.

Relatives of the other women were also at the park.

When last seen, the women were clad only in their swimming suits. Saturday night, park personnel discovered on the beach a blanket containing the girls' car keys, sunglasses, towels and purses, which contained about \$60. A tag on the car keys led to Miss Miller's automobile, which was parked in the parking lot.

The women had left their homes early Saturday morning, and they expected to be back by 5 p.m. There were no reports of three young men being missing.

White Lake Riding Stable Burns, Killing 3 Stallions

A fire of unknown origin destroyed a \$34,500 barn and killed three Arabian stallions in White Lake Township late yesterday.

Another 70 riding horses were outside in a pasture when flames swept the Teeple Lake Riding Stable, 550 Ford, according to White Lake Township firemen, who today were continuing their investigation into the cause of the fire.

Firemen said the barn, filled with 6,000 bales of hay, was an "inferno" by the time they arrived at 6:15 p.m.

The three horses belonged to Grant Ireland, who operates the stable for the Department of Conservation as part of the Highland Recreation area.

Raymond Kelley, manager of the Highland Recreation area, reported that 50 saddles were destroyed in addition to the hay and a grain elevator and hopper used to feed the horses. Damage to the contents is estimated at \$7,410.

to "go it alone." Mayor William H. Taylor Jr. indicated the city was still very much interested in cooperating with the county project.

"But," added Taylor, "we can no longer delay."

City officials have estimated the trunk sewer would mean the development of some 1,900 acres in the upper northeast corner of the city.

Plans for the city's Galloo Creek sewer—now three years old—were ordered reactivated by last night's unanimous commission vote.

Among the items to be reviewed will be the size of the actual pipe, new cost estimates and the bond issue needed to finance construction of the trunk sewer.

Sewer connection charges have been planned to finance the bonds.

Pontiac's role in the Clinton-Oakland system has been planned as a relatively minor one, consisting of only about \$137,000 in the total cost of the interceptor or collection system.

Donald W. Rindler, deputy director of the county DPW, said today Pontiac's share of the costs for Clinton-Oakland would have to be spread over the seven other participating communities.

He said this would mean some contract revision.

ROUTE UNCHANGED

Pontiac's withdrawal from the system, however, is not expected to change the route of the trunk. Rindler said some minor engineering changes might be necessary, but essentially the same route would be followed.

Four communities—Waterford, Orion, Pontiac, and West Bloomfield Townships—have approved the Clinton-Oakland contract.

County officials have estimated the total cost of Clinton-Oakland at \$2.6 million, including \$12 million interest on the 30-year bond issue.

Waterford Township is to pay about 40 percent of the total, while Avon Township—one of the holdouts—is to pay about 26 percent.

Pontiac and Independence townships are each to pay about 10 percent; West Bloomfield Township, 6.1 percent; Orion Township, 4.7 percent; and Orchard Lake, 1.4 percent.

Harry Byrd Lapses Into Deep Coma

BERRYVILLE, Va. (AP)—Former Sen. Harry F. Byrd is suffering from a malignant brain tumor and has lapsed into a coma, a family member said today.

Richard E. Byrd, a son, said his father is not expected to come out of the coma.

The younger Byrd said the comatose condition "has not been consistent until recently."

He said the elder Byrd had been slipping into and out of the coma for several weeks "and we did not want to say anything public about it when he might come out of it and hear it."

Richard Byrd said he was preparing a statement on his father's condition.

The elder senator is being treated at his home in Berryville. Doctors have decided not to attempt to move him to a hospital.

Leftists, Police Battle in Japan

Protest U.S. Viet Policy at Rusk's Hotel

KYOTO, Japan (AP)—About 300 leftist students threw rocks and traded punches with police today in a brief but bloody protest against U.S. Viet Nam policy.

The student-police clash, which occurred five minutes after Rusk had returned to the hotel from dinner with Foreign Minister Eisaku Sato, was the last of a series of demonstrations by 6,000 to 12,000 Communists, Socialists and students. Rusk was unaware of the incident.

Some demonstrators carried placards, one of which read "Get away Rusk. Hold back your ugly hands from Viet Nam."

After snake-dancing down Kyoto's main Kawaramachi Street and shouting for "Rusk the Murderer" to leave Japan and quit Viet Nam, the crowd broke up peacefully.

Then the students—members of the far-left Zengakuren—formed their own group and stormed a group of 30 policemen, barring the way to the hotel.

In the ensuing melee, the police reinforced by reserves brought up from the hotel area, kicked and punched the students. Julius Boros, a National Broadcasting Co. cameraman, was hit by a stone in the head but despite the injury kept on shooting.

the \$6.4 billion estimate he gave Congress in January. He said final figures for the fiscal year that ended June 30 aren't yet available, however.

Washington (UPI)—The former commander of the Army's pioneering Air Cavalry Division in Viet Nam said yesterday: "We are winning the war militarily and can keep on winning it militarily."

Ma Gen. Harry W. O. Kinnard, who returned from Viet Nam last month after commanding the division since last September, told newsmen at the Pentagon, however, that he "would not be so bold as to try to put a time on when the war will end."

Tighter Controls Eyed for Cycle Agencies

BIRMINGHAM—Tighter control over motorcycle rental agencies is being eyed by the City Commission.

Commissioners last night instructed City Attorney James Howlett to prepare for their consideration an amendment to an ordinance that would add new regulations to the operation of agencies.

Earlier in the day, however, a Wayne County Circuit Court judge ruled that Detroit temporarily could not enforce an ordinance aimed at curbing rental agencies.

A final decision in the case may provide some guidelines for Birmingham in drafting its proposal.

Birmingham presently has only one motorcycle rental agency, located on Woodward and George.

COMPLAINTS RECEIVED

Police say they have received several complaints about noise from area residents, and that a few accidents have been caused by young people riding motorcycles.

A half dozen or more new regulations are to be included in the proposed amendment.

Among these are to be a requirement that no agency operate within a given distance of a residential area unless a percentage of the homeowners approve, and a provision relating to a minimum liability insurance requirement on all vehicles.

The age of the operator is also to be considered, as well as a provision that would bar the carrying of passengers.

POSSIBLE PROVISION

According to city attorneys, who prepared a list of possible restrictions for the commission's review, the revised city code could include a provision that would make it mandatory that all vehicles be stored and repaired inside the rental agency.

Another provision to be considered is one that would make the agency file a bond to protect public property.

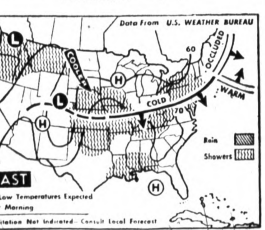

Police Still Seeking Kidnaped Girl

INDEPENDENCE, Mo. (AP) — Capt. Elza Hatfield, a veteran Kansas City policeman whose major-case unit gets the worst crimes, reached into his pocket and pulled out a picture of a blue-eyed girl, her mischievous, freckled face ringed with curls.

"I carry that with me wherever I go," Hatfield said. "Every man in the office does."

The portrait was that of Denise Sue Clinton, 9 years old and on summer vacation when she was kidnaped July 8 a year ago by a robber who apparently look her only as an afterthought.

There has been no trace of her — no torn or discarded clothing, no ransom demand, no indication whether she is dead or alive.

Police said they wanted to question Hays about the kidnapping to eliminate him as a suspect. He probably will be returned to Topeka on the warrant charging him with robbing the Peacock laundry there. The grandparents will be taken to view him.

DENIED CHARGES

Hays denied in Oklahoma City Tuesday night that he kidnaped Denise. He also denied robbing the Peacock laundry.

Federal Employees Hit Record in D. C.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Civil Service Commission estimates that the number of federal employees in the Washington area now is at an all-time high.

The commission says there were 282,769 federal employees on May 31 and that 14,000 students have been hired since then for temporary summer jobs.

This means there are more than 296,000 federal employees now, compared to the previous high of 294,515 in December 1942.

Teamster Leaders Divided

Hoffa Silent on Resignation

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — James R. Hoffa kept other high Teamsters Union officials in the dark today about whether he will keep his promise to resign as president of the giant union if he goes to prison.

"He wouldn't resign if he had two machine guns pointed at him," snorted one member of the powerful Teamsters executive board which Hoffa so far has kept from open rebellion.

"He's made that commitment and I think he will," said another board member of Hoffa's promise to quit if he loses appeals on his federal jury tampering and mail fraud convictions.

The question is crucial in the power struggle shaping up among the 13 Teamsters vice presidents despite Hoffa's denial of any dispute in the union hierarchy.

SALARY HIKE

Hoffa prepared today to gavel through constitutional changes boosting his salary from \$75,000 to \$100,000 a year, authorizing the union to pay his huge legal expenses and empowering him to assign his duties to a new general vice president if he is jailed.

Despite the outward appearance of solidarity at the Teamsters convention, the private

grumbling in the union's top echelon grew louder over Hoffa's open attempt to keep control of the world's biggest and richest union by one means or another.

"The hell with our enemies," Hoffa yelled and some 2,000 delegates stood and gave him a cheering vote of confidence.

"Let that be an answer to our enemies and those stupid individuals who think they can divide us with their filthy propaganda," Hoffa said.

But the major question dividing other high Teamsters off-

FUTURE UNCERTAIN

They aren't sure just how Hoffa will try to perpetuate his nine-year reign over the 1.7-million-member union with some \$1 billion in assets.

"A power grab," one executive board member called it and predicted Hoffa would never turn the presidency over to Vice President Frank Fitzsimmons. Hoffa's choice to replace him if he dies, resigns or is removed from office.

Lauds Romney, Blasts Soapy

DETROIT (AP) — Teamsters Union President James R. Hoffa praised Michigan Gov. George Romney while blasting former Gov. G. Mennen Williams at the Teamsters convention in Miami, Fla., a dispatch to the Detroit News said Tuesday.

Labor writer Jim Crellin said Hoffa declared in an interview that Romney, a Republican, has done "more for the working people in two terms than Soapy (Williams) did all the time he was in office."

Hoffa repeated that he would support Detroit Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh against Williams in the August Democratic primary but said he had not decided whether to endorse Romney in the general election, the News story said.

Final Details on Waterford Sewer Pact

Final details were approved last night for a proposed contract between the city and Waterford Township to expand sewer services to an area in the township.

The city attorney was directed by the City Commission to draft a contract for submission Monday to the Township Board with the city's final approval to follow Tuesday.

In a complicated accounting arrangement, the 29-year agreement would provide for township residents to pay a double sewer connection

charge (\$200 as opposed to the \$100 charged city residents).

However, half of this fee would be deposited in a trust fund and turned over to the township when the proposed Clinton-Oakland Interceptor system went into effect.

The township then would be free to charge its own connection charge.

SERVICE RATES

Previously, City Engineer Joseph E. Neippling indicated the quarterly service rates would still be double to township users.

In other business last night, the commission approved the sale for \$200 of a small parcel of land on the northwest corner of Whittemore and Perkins to William Grace, the owner of abutting property.

The parcel was in the R20 urban renewal area.

The commission took under advisement proposed pay changes for workers at city elections.

MEMBER RESIGNS

The resignation of James Taylor, 254 S. Johnson, from the Zoning Board of Appeals

was received. Taylor resigned because of the press of other business.

Public hearings were scheduled for July 19 on sidewalk construction on a small portion of Baldwin, near Brooklyn; curb, gutter, grade and gravel on Broadway, Mount

Bigham to the east line of sewer pit No. 105; and Bigham from the south side line to Broadway.

The sidewalk construction was estimated at a total cost of \$1,800 with the assessed cost of \$300 and the city's share of \$1,500.

Street improvements on Broadway were estimated at \$11,820 with the assessed cost at \$4,170 and the city's share \$5,213, while similar work on Cedar was estimated at \$15,500 with \$5,200 assessed and the city's share \$10,299.

TOTAL COST

The total cost for Bigham was set at \$21,310 with an assessed cost of \$6,907 and a city cost of \$13,698.

A public hearing was also set for July 19 on special assessments for street improve-

ments on portions of Gage, Prescott and Filbert.

In other business, Jack Douglas, president of the Pontiac Firefighters Association, asked Mayor William E. Taylor Jr. when the contract between the city and the fire fighters was going to be approved.

Douglas said the proposed contract had been agreed upon May 12.

Taylor replied that the contract was on the commission's agenda for consideration at an informal meeting July 11.

Improvement Fund Approved

\$13,500 for Share of New Hangar Deleted

With only one minor change, the 1966 capital improvement fund of \$818,097 was approved last night by the City Commission.

The commission deleted \$13,500 proposed as the city's share of a new hangar at Pontiac Municipal Airport. The money was added to the fund's \$27,760 contingency.

Approved more than six months after the start of the fiscal year and four days after the 1966 tax levy, the capital improvement fund incorporates a surplus from 1965 of \$208,000.

The largest expenditures proposed in the 1966 fund are \$119,000 for local street paving projects and \$100,000 as payment on the central fire station.

Other payments (prior commitments on the fund) include \$77,250 for the northside fire station, \$88,302 for the Hayes Jones Community Center and \$21,903 on the 1965 purchase of land for Galloway Park.

INCREASE CONTRIBUTIONS

Local taxpayers will contribute \$601,571 toward the 1966 improvement fund—an increase of \$22,088 over 1965.

The city's capital improvement fund is supported through an earmarked 1.5 mills.

Other 1966 improvement projects include \$10,000 for paving parking areas at the municipal golf course, \$8,000 for tree planting, \$5,100 for a new water system at Jayces Park, \$55,000 for storm drains, \$29,000 for a police pistol range, \$15,000 toward renovation costs of the old library building and \$19,400 for new cemetery equipment.

OEO Center Lease Extended 6 Months

Pontiac will continue for another six months to pay the \$800-a-month rent for the war on poverty center at 7 W. Lawrence, but after that, antipoverty officials better get some money elsewhere.

This was the message contained in two items voted on last night by the City Commission.

The commission voted 6-1 to extend for six months (not the 2½ years requested) the lease on the secondary office space for the Oakland County Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO).

However, the commission voted 7-0 on a motion instructing OEO officials that after Jan. 1 other cities and townships in northern Oakland County should help pay their share on the basis of population of the rent.

District 2 Commissioner Robert C. Irwin cast the lone no vote.

NO EXPLANATION

Although he did not explain his negative vote last night, Irwin previously voted against the lease because he thought questions on the antipoverty program itself had not been answered.

Al Davis, an OEO spokesman, said the city's payment of the rent was only a portion of the contributions made by area communities toward the 10 per cent local financial support required by the federal government.

Davis said northern Oakland County contributed about \$200,000 toward the ten per cent figure. He estimated 85 per cent of the people serviced by the local OEO center were from Pontiac.

Making reference to the city's support of Pontiac Municipal Airport, Commissioner Leslie H. Hudson said the antipoverty center was another illustration that city residents "can't carry the full load."

School Board to Organize

The Waterford Township Board of Education will organize for the 1966-67 school year at its meeting at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow.

The board will elect a president, secretary, treasurer and chaplain in addition to appointing representatives to various committees.

In other business, the board will consider ratifying contracts with two groups of school employees.

The board also will consider a recommendation to authorize E. Finnegan, who were elected to new terms earlier this spring.

Cheerleaders Win Awards

A cheerleading team from Mason Junior High School has won two trophies following competition at Camp All-American in Hartland.

Competing against about 145 cheerleaders from Michigan and other states, the six Waterford Township girls captured the team improvement and uniform trophies.

Representing Mason were Cindy Shannabrook, Nancy Baleman, Melanie Granfors, Danell Foote, Gayle Zollner and Jane Sayers.

Their sponsor was Charlene Cook, a physical education instructor at the school.

said the land in question would not be rezoned until there was an outlet provided on Mount Clemens, a major thoroughfare.

The rezoning would have permitted construction of a \$3-million apartment project by developer Joseph Dugan on a site near Herrington Elementary School.

Dugan claimed that during 1965 and part of 1966 there were 2,767 multiple dwelling units built, under construction or land rezoned to accommodate them.

"That's not too bad for a city of our size," he added.

Dugan said still other projects were turned down. He said there

had been opposition to some projects.

Dugan said it still wasn't known what kind of project had been planned. He said plans and drawings were submitted for other such projects before the land was rezoned.

Opposition to the apartment project has come primarily from residents of the Herrington Hills Subdivision.

The nearby home owners claimed motorists from the apartments would turn south onto Bay to reach Featherston and thereby create a traffic hazard through the residential section.

Those opposed to the rezoning claimed a second outlet is

needed for the apartment traffic.

Mrs. Haeven Peery, 458 Kuhn, vice president of the Herrington Hills Home Owners Association, supported Dugan's contention.

"We feel you (the commission) made the right decision and feel your decision should be accepted by all. We also feel that a true picture has not been presented."

"We don't oppose residential zoning with the proper traffic flow."

WHAT TYPE?

Mrs. Peery claimed the developer had not yet shown what type of dwelling was planned. She said that the home owners

did not want a low-grade development.

"We feel only half of the story was told. We're sorry for the undue criticism," she concluded.

Commissioner Leslie H. Hudson, who along with Commissioner Robert C. Irwin voted in favor of the rezoning, disputed Dugan's contentions.

Hudson said that there was nothing wrong with having an informed citizenry.

"There was nothing derogatory. All the remarks were true. I've heard them myself many times."

"I see no reason for Dugan to be upset," added Hudson.

Organ for Jazz Not New

Every so often, a jazz buff will hear an exceptionally fine jazz organist and think he has discovered something new and different.

The technique may be new and different such as the fresh sounds made by the young artist, Freddie Roach, but the organ as a jazz instrument is not new at all.

PIPE ORGAN BLUES

The history of the jazz organ dates back to the early 1920's when the late "Fats" Waller studied it as a child. In 1926 he recorded St. Louis Blues and "Lenox Avenue Blues" playing a pipe organ.

Then, the invention of the electric organ by Laurens Hammond in 1935 created a whole new area of musical exploration. Waller was enthusiastic and made a series of recordings on this organ during the three years before his death. One was his famous composition, The Jitterbug Waltz.

In the 1930's Count Basie released an organ-recording of Nobody Knows and Milt Herth was heard in a series of jazz novelty records.

Toward the end of the war years, Bill Davis, who was playing with Louis Jordan's Tympany Five, developed a pedal technique which attracted the attention of Duke Ellington. Together, Ellington and Davis produced a recording with Davis on the organ and Ellington on the piano.

Another Davis, Jackie, who worked as accompanist for Ella Fitzgerald, Louis Jordan and Dinah Washington, claims to have been the first jazz pianist to switch to organ and make a name for himself as a jazz organist.

ORGAN TRIO

Later, the spotlight turned to a young Pennsylvania pianist, popular Jimmy Smith. Jimmy has won a Major Bowes tal-

ent contest as a nine-year-old prodigy. By the time he was 19, he had formed his own organ trio.

He arrived in New York in 1956 and was an immediate success, the first jazz organist — of international popularity — to reach the front ranks both musically and commercially.

With Smith as an inspiration, many other jazz pianists switched to the organ throughout the 1950s and into the 1960s. The organ, too, as an instrument kept pace by challenging new young talent with a tremendous range of new sounds and combinations.

Names such as Richard "Groove" Holmes, a brilliant blues artist, Charles Kynard who swings with a guitarist, and Shirley Scott, a young Philadelphia, have sprung into prominence.

Is organ jazz new? Maybe it is . . . after all, 30 to 40 years in a musical world is not very old.

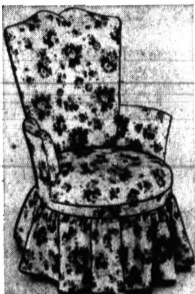

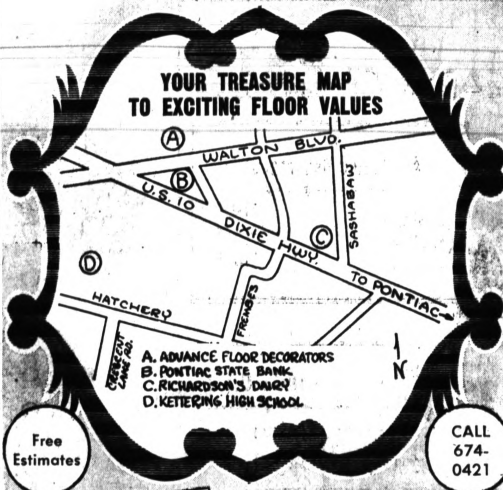

Ho's Remark Not Verified

Stary Said N. Viet Can't Keep Up War

PARIS (AP)—Official French sources today said they had no information to back up a magazine's report that President Ho Chi Minh of North Viet Nam warned Red China and the Soviet Union that he might not be able to carry on the war in Viet Nam beyond the middle of next year.

The report was published Tuesday by the weekly magazine L'Entreprise. The brief article said Ho Chi Minh told the Chinese and the Soviets "if there is no new development, we will have to come to terms (with the United States) toward the middle of 1967."

High sources at the foreign ministry said they knew of the L'Entreprise account but had no similar information from official channels.

REPORTS ABUZZ

In spite of these statements, diplomatic circles buzzed with reports that France has received indications that the North Vietnamese will continue the war is weakening.

France has an embassy in Peking and maintains a trade delegation in Hanoi. Jean Sainteny, a former French minister and diplomat in Indochina, is now in Hanoi. Although Sainteny saw President Charles de Gaulle before he left for China and North Viet Nam, French officials have said that he has no official mission.

American sources said they had noted the L'Entreprise account but had nothing further on the subject. They said they were unable to evaluate its accuracy.

A U. S. State Department spokesman in Washington said Tuesday he had no information to support the report. At a news conference in his Texas ranch, President Johnson said he had not seen the magazine article.

Inflation Is Worse Abroad

Cost Rise Less in U.S.

NEW YORK—The dollar doesn't go as far as it used to. Even so, most other countries have more room for complaint.

Despite all the unpleasantness of the rising cost of living here, other nations have seen a bigger erosion of the market value of their currency in the last 12 or 18 months. And as here, higher food prices often have been the main culprit.

If you figure the market value of the local money as an even 100 in 1955 the U.S. dollar was worth 85 cents in 1965. Only three other countries beat that mark. In El Salvador and Guatemala the local currency still bought the same amount of goods and services 10 years later, as measured by cost of living index. In Venezuela the currency's index value is 89. And in Ecuador it's also 85.

Everywhere else the drop has been pretty bad over the long stretch, right down to the example of Brazil where an index value of 100 in 1955 is a lowly 3 in 1965.

BY COMPARISON

The performance of money in 1965, when the cost of living started climbing in the United States to everyone's discomfort, shows Americans ahead of the game by comparison. In a compilation of the depreciation of the value of money in 45 countries in the last 10 years, the First National City Bank, New York, reports that the decline in 1965 was steeper in 31 of the lands than had been the 10-year average.

The one-year drop was 1.7 percent in the United States. In Canada the drop was 2.3 percent. France saw a 2.4 percent slide. But this bettered its pre-

vious experience. The annual rate over the 1955-65 period had been 4.6 percent in France. Fiscal policies to fight rising inflation apparently were helping France at least slacken the upward pace of the cost of living.

Depreciation in the value of the local money in West Germany, Switzerland and Belgium was held for the 1965 period to 3.8 percent in each instance. Norway saw a 3.9 percent decline in the purchasing power of its money.

So the United States, despite its prolonged economic boom, and its recent pinch on consumer pocketbooks, still has been able to maintain a much lower rate of depreciation than other major industrial nations.

The rising cost of living has been a growing concern here, but a much more pressing one in other lands.

FOUND DEPRECIATION

The United Kingdom and Sweden saw their money depreciate at the rate of 4.6 percent in 1965. Italy and Ireland each reported a 4.8 percent drop. In the Netherlands the

decline was an even 5 percent. Denmark's loss was 6.4 percent.

But of all the industrialized nations Japan apparently was worst hit by the rising cost of living. There, last year's depreciation in the value of money was 7.1 percent, compared with a 10-year average of 3.7.

Successful Investing

Q: "How should I invest \$14,000 received from sale of AT&T stock? The money is in savings at four per cent. I have \$5,000 in real estate; \$3,000 life insurance; \$2,000 E bonds; 95 AT&T; \$2,000 salary and \$4,000 pension at age 62. I have had cancer which has been treated for five years. I expect to spend \$25,000 for my children's education between 1972 and 1978 and would appreciate any suggestions." R.D.

A: I would hold your Series E bonds, which are equivalent to savings. In your situation, I would also leave \$5,000 in the bank as an additional reserve against contingencies.

The \$11,000 balance should be invested in strong growth issues which can enhance your capital over a period of time. In this category I suggest Bristol-Myers, which has had unusual growth and has advanced some \$300 per cent in the past decade. I continue to like Avon Products which—adjusted for splits—has moved up from 34 in 1956 to its current price of 85.

As a third choice, I suggest Burroughs, a major factor in the computer business and particularly strong in the banking field. These shares have been moving up sharply and on a long-term basis should continue this action.

Q: "I have been hearing good things about Cities Service. Do you feel that this is a good time to invest in this company's stock?" C.C.

A: Yes, I believe it is. Cities Service is in the petroleum business. It has shown strong earnings.
