

621 Lives Lost During Holiday Period

Mishaps Claim 28 in Michigan Over Weekend

14 Killed on Highways, 12 Drown and 2 Die in Other Accidents

Michigan today counted 28 dead over the 78-hour Fourth of July holiday. Fourteen died in traffic, 12 drowned and two persons lost their lives in miscellaneous accidents.

State Police said the traffic toll of 14 was an improvement over last year when 20 died in a 102-hour period. About one death occurred every five hours last year, but this year the average was stretched to 5½ hours.

To try and hold down the death toll, State Police pressed all available men into road patrol duty, canceling all leaves. National Guardsmen were used for emergency duty.

Four persons died in a pair of accidents Saturday, and a teenager boy was killed last night when his speeding car hit a freight train.

James Leo Geraghty, 17, Whitmore Lake, was killed in Washington County when his car plowed into the side of a diesel engine pulling 54 freight cars.

James Yokum, 18, Trenary, and James Wehmasto, 23, Limestone, were killed Saturday when their car ran off U.S. 41. The car was driven by Yokum's brother, Theodore, 17.

Eugene Sampson, 33, Galdwin, and Nicholas Smith, 23, Midland, were killed in a two-car head-on collision Saturday east of Gladwin.

PEDESTRIANS DIE

Among the five pedestrians killed in holiday traffic was Robert Darling, 7, of Rochester.

Other pedestrian victims were Cora Schrikema, 80, Grand Rapids; Dorothy Stone, 39, Roscom; Harold Estwick, 28, Detroit; and Mrs. Lempi Hendrickson, 48, of Calumet.

Mrs. Hendrickson was killed Thursday night while walking along U.S. 41 near M283. Estwick was hit by an auto while trying to cross a Detroit street. Mrs. Stone was hit by a car on M144 in South Branch Township, Crawford County. Mrs. Schrikema was struck by a car south of U.S. 31 on M89 in Allegan County.

Albert Hooser, 13, Chicago — went swimming alone outside a roped off swimming area at a boys camp in Berrien County and drowned.

Tom Landendart, 24, Detroit — drowned Friday in Big Port. (Continued on Page 2, Col. 4)

Find Goldfine Suite 'Bugged' by Sleuth

WASHINGTON (AP)—A microphone was discovered early today in a position for eavesdropping on the hotel room conversations of Bernard Goldfine's aides.

It stirred a roaring side controversy to the congressional investigation of the Boston industrialist.

At the other end of the microphone wires was Baron I. Shacklette, chief investigator for the House subcommittee looking into relations between Goldfine and White House aide Sherman Adams.

With Shacklette was Jack Anderson, a legman for columnist Drew Pearson.

Chairman Owen Harris (D-Ark) called the committee into emergency session to weigh the fate of Shacklette. He said the bugging had not been authorized.

Roger Robb, Goldfine attorney, demanded under oath examination of anyone who might know whether confidential data has been obtained through such tactics.

Robb made public a letter to Harris saying these questions should be "answered in testimony under oath from all those having knowledge of the facts."

Robert stepped out into the road suddenly and was struck by a southbound car driven by Bernice M. Webb, 23, of 6044 Higgins St., Utica.

He died of a fractured neck and skull. The driver was not held.

The boat, owned by Robert Sawdon, 17, of 3704 Oakshire St., Waterford Township, was overturned by high waves in the middle of the lake at 4 p.m.

Sawdon and his two passengers Sharon Gaynor, 17, and Gary Gaynor, 15, both of 6498 Simmons Dr., Waterford Township, were under the boat when it landed in the water upside down.

The accident was witnessed by Charles A. Parker, 39, of 3850 Malden Dr., Waterford Township, who was out patrolling in his own boat. He was at the scene in 20 seconds.

Parker threw a life preserver to Gary and then pulled Sharon from the lake when she appeared from under the capsized craft. She could not swim.

He then rescued the two youths. None of the three were injured.

355 Traffic Toll Falls Below Estimate of 410

Deaths Taper Off in Final Hours of Nation's 3-Day Weekend

The nation's traffic death toll during the Fourth of July weekend tapering off during the closing hours after starting off at a fast pace, appears to be well under the preholiday estimate of 410.

Late reports of highway deaths will boost the total but indications are it will fall short of the record toll predicted by safety experts for a three-day July 4 holiday period.

However, it appears the final count will be close to the number killed during the recent Memorial Day holiday period.

The 371 traffic deaths for the three-day Memorial Day period set a new record for the holiday.

Thus, the traffic death toll for the first two long weekend holidays this year was more than 725. During the first five months this year traffic deaths averaged 88 per day.

RECORD IS 407

The National Safety council had estimated the 410 traffic death toll for the 78-hour period starting at 6 p.m. local time Thursday and ending last midnight.

The record high traffic toll for a three-day July 4 holiday period was 407 set in 1955 while the record low since World War II was 225 deaths in 1947.

The holiday was marred by several multiple traffic accident deaths. One of the biggest was near Junction City, Kan., Saturday in which six persons were killed in the collision of two cars. Drownings took a heavy toll. (Continued on Page 2, Col. 3)

"The last thing Arthur Carlton ever designed," said Inspector Winters, indicating the house of cards balanced on the coffee table.

"Who found the body?"

"I did, sir." A man wearing a chauffeur's uniform limped into the living room. "I had just returned

from driving Mr. Pennington, a frequent visitor, to the city. I was delayed in getting back. As I drove the car into the garage, I noticed the lights in the living room go out, and the house fell into darkness.

"Upon entering the back door," continued the chauffeur, "I heard Mr. Carlton call out as if in pain. I ran into the living room and saw a man dart across

the room and escape through the window. I might have tackled him, but in the darkness I tripped against the coffee table and fell."

"The murderer must have known the room well," muttered Haledjian, looking about at the overcrowding of furniture. "Who else lives here?"

"Miss Hancock, the housekeeper. Her room is next to mine on the second floor."

"What delayed you in the city?"

"Mr. Pennington asked me to look at his car—one of those sports models that can pass anything on the road. A carburetor valve was stuck, so I fixed it for him."

"Did you leave Mr. Pennington in the garage, or at his front door?"

"In the garage. He wanted to test the motor."

"I believe, inspector," said Haledjian, "I've heard enough."

'Doc' Brodie Becomes 'Lifeguard'

Former Pontiac Press Advertising Director H. F. "Doc" Brodie saved the life of a neighbor recently, when he pulled her from the Gulf of Mexico near Venice, Fla.

Rescued when she became overpowered by an outgoing tide in deep water was Mrs. Edward R. Naar, 57, formerly of Traverse City, and now living just two houses away from the retired Brodie's home on Casey Key.

"I was just sitting in the house after finishing lunch when I heard this scream," Brodie related by phone when contacted by The Press. "I ran outside to try and find out what was wrong, when this woman approached yelling, 'Someone save her.'"

"I threw off my trousers and jumped in the surf when I spotted Mrs. Naar about 300 feet out," said Brodie.

"When I got to her she was completely exhausted and just floating, or trying to, on the surface. Luckily she hadn't taken in too much water. She cooperated beautifully and I got her to shore."

Brodie himself was exhausted from the endeavor and had to be helped from the water by another neighbor after the 10-minute ordeal.

Given first aid at the beach, Mrs. Naar later was taken to Venice Memorial Hospital for treatment of shock and exhaustion. She later was released.

Russia Frees 9 U. S. Airmen Downed in Armenia

Radio Moscow Tells of Release

C118 Crew Is Freed at Iranian Border; Held Since June 27

LONDON (UPI) — The Soviet Union today released the nine crewmembers of a U. S. military plane forced down by Russian jets in Soviet Armenia June 27, Radio Moscow said today.

The airmen were turned over to U. S. authorities on the Soviet-Iranian frontier.

Radio Moscow said the handover took place at Astara on the border with Iran.

The brief broadcast said the men were handed over to U. S. military representatives and gave the names of the men.

The nine Americans were crewmen of a C118 transport which the Soviets claimed violated Russian air space over Armenia.

The U. S. aircraft was forced down by two Soviet fighters near Erevan, Armenia on June 27. A Soviet announcement said that the plane burned after landing but that the crewmen were safe and well.

The plane had been en route to Iran and Pakistan carrying supplies to U. S. forces there. It had come from West Germany and had touched down in Cyprus only a few hours before it was forced down at a Russian airfield.

The Soviets had twice protested formally against the alleged border violation. They charged that such violations of Soviet frontiers were frequent and premeditated.

The United States had sent a note to Moscow demanding the men be released and at the same time expressing regret if the plane had actually crossed the frontier.

Astara, where the Americans were handed over, is a little more than 300 miles southeast of Erevan, where the airmen had been seized. It lies off the Southwestern shore of the Caspian Sea where Russia and Iran meet.

The air route from Cyprus to Iran passes within 50 miles of the Soviet border at this point—a fact which the U. S. government pointed out to the Soviets in its note last week.

Weatherman Takes No Holiday Across Michigan

The weatherman didn't take a holiday over the Independence Day weekend in Michigan.

Friday there were showers over parts of the state; Saturday two thunderstorms lashed Southeast Michigan and yesterday funnel clouds were reported sighted near Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo and Three Rivers.

The U. S. Weather Bureau at Detroit said a pilot reported sighting a funnel-shaped cloud east of Grand Rapids last night. A number of persons in the Kalamazoo area also said they saw a funnel-shaped cloud high in the air.

The Weather Bureau said it had no explanation for either report, because tornado conditions were not present in Western Michigan.

Washtenaw County appeared hardest hit by Saturday's brief storms. Two sail boats were overturned in Barton Pond and 26 trees were knocked down by the wind.

Heavy rains hit Texas last night and the showers continued to a lesser degree eastward to the Atlantic Coast.

The showers and thunderstorms seemed fairly widespread in an area from Texas and Oklahoma eastward across Arkansas and southern Missouri into the Ohio Valley.

They Might Make Target Date

Congress Sights August Adjournment

WASHINGTON (AP)—Shooting for early August adjournment, congressional leaders mapped out a heavy work docket today as Congress returned from its last prolonged 1958 holiday.

Target date for adjournment is Aug. 9, and prospects are bright that it won't be missed far.

Senate leaders posted five bills for action this week. They deal with atomic energy construction, public works appropriations, housing, agriculture and minerals development.

The House faces an even more ambitious program, dealing with military construction, small business, marketing facilities, science scholarships, atomic energy construction, relief for depressed areas, construction of community facilities and small boat safety.

Chances are neither branch will clean up such a heavy program in one week.

There still are some controversial measures in the offing.

The Senate hasn't acted on House-passed bills to provide for reorganization of the Defense Department, extension of the reciprocal Trade Agreements Act, and miscellaneous appropriations including financing of the foreign aid program. All must be considered before adjournment.

The list of "must" House bills includes measures to boost Social Security benefits, to provide pensions for former presidents, to regulate union pension and welfare funds, and to authorize and finance a big military construction program.

A Senate-passed bill for general labor law revision currently is not on the program for House action but may be put there in the closing days of the session.

Americans for Democratic Action renewed its call for a tax cut of at least eight billion dollars a year, and for more spending programs to provide a boost for the economy.

But there appeared little likelihood either would be voted.

The ADA, which describes itself as a nonpartisan organization, issued a statement signed by a group of economists, educators and labor leaders. Without further government efforts, it said, production levels of 1957 will not be equaled again before 1960. It added that a "long period of underemployment and underproduction . . . lies ahead."

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Moves Henry Be Disqualified

Ewart Says Attorney Can't Legally File Suit Against Pontiac

A motion was made this morning before Oakland County Circuit Judge Clark J. Adams to disqualify Milton R. Henry as the attorney in a law suit brought against the city by four of its police officers.

The move was made by William A. Ewart, city attorney, in a notice of special appearance of himself as attorney for the city, Walter K. Willman, city manager, and Police Chief Herbert W. Straley, defendants in the action.

Ewart told Judge Adams the city felt that Henry, also a city commissioner, "could not legally hold this dual relationship" in filing suit against the city.

The action was taken today when the three defendants had been ordered to show cause why a writ of mandamus shouldn't be granted by the court ordering the city to promote the four officers.

Sgt. Raymond E. Meggitt and Fred L. Goines, and Dets. Herbert C. Cooley and James H. LaPonsie, filed for the writ June 24 claiming the city had not complied with the State Civil Service Act in promoting them.

Henry came under fire last Tuesday by fellow city commissioners for entering into a contract with the city to draw as the officers' legal counsel.

Ewart's motion was made today, he said, because no official withdrawal had been filed by Henry with the court.

Judge Adams took Ewart's motion without acting on it. Henry, who according to Ewart had not served summons on the defendants, was not present when the case was called by Judge Adams' court clerk. Neither could he be reached for comment.

surpassing by far the 132 reported during the Memorial Day period. Deaths from miscellaneous type accidents also were higher than the 89 during the Memorial Day holiday.

A fireworks plant blew up in Portland, Ore., killing one child and injuring at least 20 persons. However, no deaths in fireworks displays were reported.

An Associated Press survey during the nonholiday period covering 78 hours from June 19 to June 22, showed 339 traffic deaths, 118 drownings and 63 deaths in miscellaneous type accidents. The overall total of 520 was more than 100 under the combined total during the July 4 weekend.

The parade welcoming Cyril yesterday was a gala affair with a band and floats.

The Toledo Zoo also sent along as a gift a baby puma. The puma is a brother to the puma cub given to Prince Rainier and Princess Grace of Monaco.

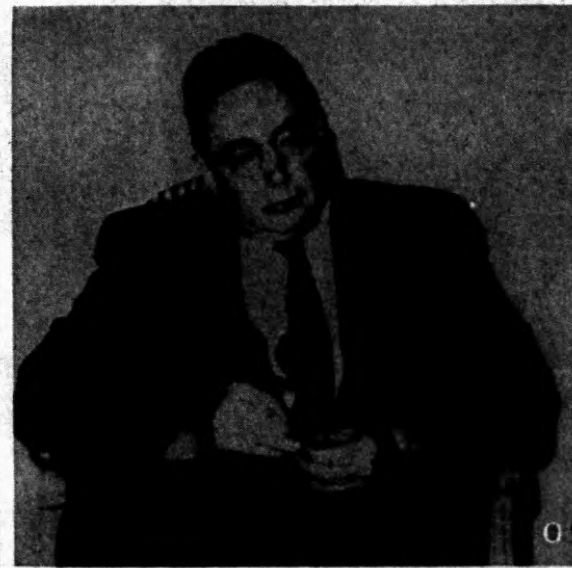
To show their gratitude at getting Cyril back, Ontario officials announced that they are presenting the Toledo Zoo with two bears.

Air Force Staff Sgt. Charles Hayward of Roseville was fatally injured when the car in which he was riding crashed into a ditch near Lockbourne Air Force Base at Columbus, Ohio, where he was stationed.

The body of a Detroit man was recovered from Lake Erie at Erie, Pa. Robert Herman, 27, drowned Saturday while skin diving in the lake.

Wayne Conway, 27, Saginaw, drowned Saturday when he fell from a dock into the Union Ship Canal at Buffalo.

Mike Valentine, 9, son of Mrs. Anna Valentine, Detroit, drowned in a lake near Huntsville, Mo., yesterday when he jumped or fell off a dock into 10 feet of water. His body was found under the dock.

Mexico Elects Mateos No. 1

PRI Party Choice for President Wins Quietly by Big Landslide

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Handsome, 48-year-old Adolfo Lopez Mateos, the brilliant labor minister in the last government, was elected president of Mexico yesterday in probably the quietest vote in the nation's history.

The dominant government Party of Revolutionary Institution (PRI) claimed Lopez Mateos had won by a landslide—somewhere between 70 and 85 per cent of the votes. No big totals were announced, however.

Lopez Mateos' victory over textile manufacturer Luis Hector Alvarez had never been in doubt. The PRI and its predecessors have never lost an election since the parent party was launched in 1923.

Mexico also elected a full new Congress of 60 senators and 162 deputies. The PRI claimed that it had retained control by an overwhelming majority.

There were prospects, however, the new Congress may contain more than the nine opposition deputies it now holds.

Only one serious incident was reported, during an argument over a local election in Ciudad Obregon, on the west coast. A voter was killed and a soldier injured during a fight.

Women voted for the first time in a presidential election.

Opposition parties began filing protests of alleged election fraud before the polls closed. But generally the election seemed to have been conducted on democratic lines. The PRI had invited foreign observers from the United States and South America to come see for themselves.

Official returns will not be known for a week. Unofficial returns may be made known tomorrow or later.

The Braves broke their five-game losing streak as Joey Jay hurled a 2-0 shutout against Pittsburgh. Chicago's Cubs, behind the one-hit pitching of Dick Drott and Don Elston, defeated Los Angeles 6-2. A Seals' Stadium crowd of 22,736 saw five home runs in the Giants-Cards battle. Lockman and Kirkland hit successive homers off Jim Brosnan in the first inning. Leon Wagner homered for the Giants in the fourth. Slender Right-Hander Fans Pinch Hitter in 9th to Save Game

DETROIT (AP)—The Detroit Tigers were back home today for the interlude-vacation before the All-Star game, and had Jim Bunning to thank for their continuance in the American League's first division.

A gilt-edged performance by the slim right-hander against the Chicago White Sox yesterday enabled Detroit to square the two-game series at Chicago with a 2-1 victory. The Tigers lost the opener Saturday 8-1.

Bunning scored his fifth straight triumph to bring his season record to 7-5 as he won a duel with Dick Donovan with a four-hit shutout going until the ninth inning.

A crisis developed in the ninth with former Tiger Earl Torgeson, batting as a pinch-hitter, doubled home the only White Sox run with two out. But Bunning made Lou Aparicio his fifth strikeout victim to save his victory in the clutch.

The Tigers, held to seven hits by Donovan, scored their two runs in the fourth. Frank Bolling doubled home the first one and then scored on Billy Martin's single.

A workout for pitchers was the only Tiger activity today as most of them began a three-day loafing spell around the All-Star game at Baltimore Tuesday. Harvey Kuenn and Al Kaline are the only Detroit players in the game.

The team as a whole returns to action at Washington Thursday.

Until the ninth, Bunning had the White Sox eating out of his hand. They put a few men on base, including two from singles in the second, but Bunning stayed in full charge.

The ninth was ticklish for a time. The Sox had gone down in order in the seventh and eighth and the first two men up in the ninth also went down. Only once had the ball left the infield.

With two gone in the ninth, Don Mueller lined a single to right. Jim Rivera ran for him and stole second. Torgeson, batting for Norman Cash, whipped a double to right scoring Rivera. But Bunning then got Aparicio in a called strike.

The Tigers threatened a number of times against Donovan. Three Sox double plays cut off threats, however.

Detroit got its two runs in the fourth after two were out. Al Kaline led off with a walk but Gail Harris and Charley Maxwell hit into successive force outs.

With Maxwell on first, Bolling smashed a double down the third base line scoring Charley, Martin then singled to right scoring Bolling. But Billy then took too long a lead off first and was picked off by Donovan.

Bolling, again making Donovan an easy mark, got three of the Tigers' seven hits. In addition to his double he got two singles. Earlier in the season, he beat Donovan with a three-run homer in the ninth inning.

Today as Higgins takes inventory during the season's half-way turn, he shudders to think where his second place Sox would be without Delock. Ike not only blossomed into a starting pitcher but he has become the team's

biggest winner and the ace of the staff.

The 28-year-old right-hander won his seventh game without defeat Sunday as the Red Sox defeated the New York Yankees 10-4. It was Boston's first victory over the American League leaders since April 16 and only the second in eight decisions this season.

Despite the defeat, the Yankees remained 11 games in front of Boston and Kansas City, tied for second. The A's were beaten by Cleveland 8-5. Detroit nipped Chicago 2-1 and Washington came from behind to shade Baltimore 4-3.

After limiting the Yankees to four hits through seven innings, he was clipped for three more hits in the eighth, including Mickey Mantle's 21st home run.

Ike received credit for snapping the Yankees' five-game winning streak. Delock, counting his last four decisions in 1957, now owns a string of 10 successive victories.

Ted Williams and Jackie Jensen paced the Red Sox' 13-hit attack against loser Don Larsen and five relievers. Williams rapped his 14th home run and Jensen drove in three runs to raise his league leading RBI total to 68. Jackie has hit safely in his last 15 games.

Lary Doby continued his batting rampage for Cleveland, rapping three singles in four times at bat, scoring once and driving in a run.

Rookie Gary Bell hurled a seven-hitter for his third victory in his first complete game in the majors. Ned Garver, who had beaten the tribe three times, was the loser.

Julio Becquer's two-out pinch single in the eighth drove home Rocky Bridges that enabled the Senators to snap a 3-3 tie with Baltimore.

Relief pitcher Dick Hyde assured Washington of its first home victory against Baltimore since May 27, 1957 by retiring three straight Orioles in the ninth. Russ Kemmerer was the winner. Jim Lemon lashed two singles and his 15th homer, driving in two Washington runs.

State Seeks Deer Hunters for Experiment

LANSING (AP) — The state conservation department is looking for men to take part in a deer hunt practically guaranteed to bring success.

Aim of the experiment is to bag eight to 12 of the 30 deer living inside a mile-square deer enclosure at the State's Cusino Wildlife Experiment Station near Shingleton.

The hunt will start Dec. 1 and continue till the job is done. The number of hunters will be limited to the number of deer that have to be removed.

Game experts plan to interview hunters afterward to determine how difficult it is to spot and kill a deer when a known number are present in a given area.

Hunters must turn over venison to school host lunch programs and provide their own equipment, food, travel and lodging. Under these circumstances, the problem is to find experienced hunters willing to take part in the test.

Doctoring Your Golf

By DR. CARY MIDDLECOFF

PATIENT'S COMPLAINT: Weak on All Shots.

DIAGNOSIS: Wrong Theory of Golf Swing.

TREATMENT: Not yet dead — although it never should have lived at all—is the theory that a good golf swing calls for "hitting against a firm left side." If you still harbor such an idea, better discard it at once.

Replace it with the proper theory: the left hip begins turning back to the left immediately after the downswing is started, and keeps on turning around to the left until the swing is completed. This turning action keeps your clubhead moving through the ball. IT KEEPS YOU FROM QUITTING ON THE SHOT.

Here's the way you can check yourself on this: If your belt buckle is facing squarely toward the target when you complete the follow-through, you know you've carried out this hip-turning phase of the swing well. If you've turned your left hip around a couple or three inches further than that, so much the better.

The phrase, "hitting against a firm left side," used to be in popular usage among golf theorists. Now, however, nearly everybody knows it's wrong.
