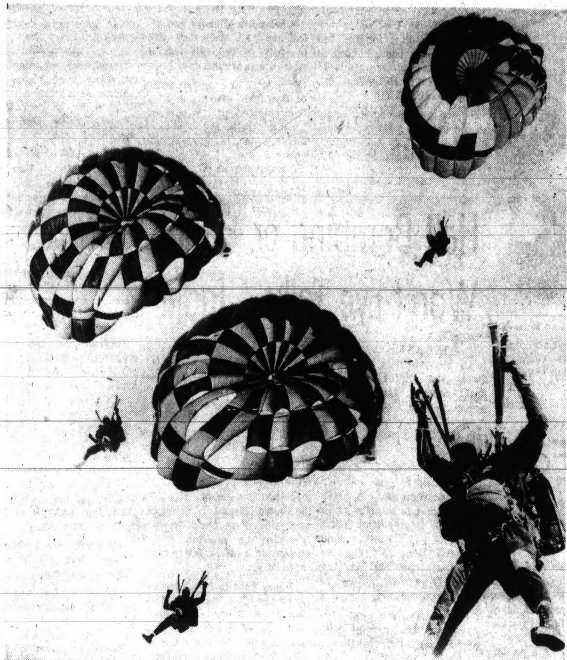

LBJ to Russia: Eye Troop Cuts

Asks Consideration of
Joint Europe Revision

NEW YORK (AP) — President Johnson today, in effect, invited the Soviet Union to consider a reduction of its forces in Europe in the same way the Western allies are considering such a step.

Recalling that the North Atlantic Treaty Organization is studying "what strengths NATO needs in light of changing technology and the current threat," Johnson said:

"Reduction of Soviet forces in Central Europe would, of course, affect the extent of the threat."

In a speech prepared for delivery at the National Conference of Editorial Writers, Johnson said:

"If changing circumstances should lead to a gradual and balanced revision in force levels on both sides, the revision could help gradually to shape a new political environment."

Reviewing U.S. policy toward Europe, Johnson proposed that the United States move ahead on what he called three fronts.

The first would be to "modernize NATO" and strengthen Atlantic institutions. The second, to further the integration of Western Europe, and the third, to "quicken progress in East-West relations."

U.S. School Aid Bills Approved

Senate, House Okays
Exceed LBJ Request

WASHINGTON (AP) — Both the Senate and House have passed broad education bills which would pour additional billions of dollars into the elementary and high school aid program over the next two years.

The Senate passed its \$6.4-billion version of the legislation

late yesterday 54 to 16. A few hours later, the House cleared its \$5.7-billion measure by a 237-97 vote.

Both would authorize funds well beyond the approximately \$4.4 billion recommended by President Johnson.

Sponsors said they do not anticipate any great difficulty in working out a compromise bill at a Senate-House conference expected to be held early next week.

The final measure will extend for the current 1967 fiscal year and for 1968 the landmark federal aid to education bill enacted in 1965.

PROVIDE GRANTS

That law was estimated to provide grants for 90 per cent of the nation's 26,000 school districts in the first year, with the emphasis on improving education for children from poor families.

Sponsors said this year's bills liberalize the aid formula and will mean that many more schools will be covered.

In the Senate, Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois offered a series of amendments to cut the bill, but all were defeated by big margins.

In the House, most of the debate centered on the efforts of the federal government to achieve racial desegregation of schools under the powers of the 1964 Civil Rights Act.

U.S. Ends Bomb Lull, Attacks Neutral Zone

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. B-52 bombers pounded North Viet Nam just above the demilitarized zone last night while tactical U.S. bombers struck 25 times inside the zone and allied troops fought hard just south of it.

As the once neutral buffer area along the 17th Parallel exploded again, the three-pronged allied force waging Operation Irving closed in tighter on encircled Communist soldiers near South Viet Nam's central coast.

A company of the U.S. 1st Cavalry, Airmobile, Division spearheading Irving burned down a Viet Cong hamlet 22 miles northwest of Qui Nhon, and American marks men strafing from gunship helicopters reported killing 20 of the enemy as they fled.

Two miles south of the demilitarized zone, South Vietnamese paratroopers clashed with North Vietnamese army regulars yesterday in a vicious, four-hour

battle that took a heavy toll on both sides.

An official spokesman said the South Vietnamese were attacked by a regiment—about 1,500 men—of North Vietnamese four miles southeast of Dong Ha, forward headquarters of U.S. Marines also trying to stop the North Vietnamese drive into the South.

BELIEVE 200 KILLED

The Vietnamese paratroopers called in U.S. air strikes, art-

illery support and naval gunfire, and a Vietnamese spokesman estimated 200 North Vietnamese were killed in the prolonged action.

The official body count of North Vietnamese dead was 41, but the spokesman said the enemy dragged many of the dead away.

Casualties among the South Vietnamese troops were officially termed moderate, meaning they were hit hard.

2 School Issues Are Approved

Birmingham District
OKs Bonds, Tax Hike

Birmingham School District voters yesterday approved both a bond issue and tax increase proposal by a 3 to 2 margin.

The \$9.8-million building proposal was passed 3,960 to 2,627. The 13.9 operating tax proposal was approved 3,907 to 2,764.

About 29 per cent of the registered voters, or 6,814, went to the polls. There are about 34,000 registered voters.

Approval of both proposals means that taxes will be increased by 3.50 mills or \$3.50 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation over the present 32.1 mill levy.

A tax increase of six-tenths of a mill is required to cover the bond issue. The present bond levy is 5 mills.

ACTUAL INCREASE

Eleven of the 13.9 operating mills represent a renewal leaving an actual tax increase of 2.9 mills or \$2.90 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation.

By approving the bond issue, voters bought themselves a new junior high school, additions to the existing junior and senior high schools, a new elementary school additions to four elementary schools, a new administration building, school sites and building renovations.

School officials said that passage of the operating proposition will allow the district to "continue to reach and teach each student by developing a curriculum and programs for individuals."

They said approval of both propositions means they can offer the best curriculum and teachers available in classes of a reasonable size.

Gasoline Fire Leaves Boy Burned Severely

A Pontiac boy burned over 45 per cent of his body yesterday in a gasoline fire is listed in serious condition at Pontiac General Hospital.

Jerry Green, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnnie Green of 451 Moore, was caught in flames yesterday when a gasoline can he and his brother were "playing with" suddenly ignited.

Neighbors said 13-year-old Willie Green ran from the basement unharmed seconds before Jerry stumbled out of the home, struggling to pull off his burning clothes.

A hospital spokesman said the Green youth suffered second- and third-degree burns and

is being treated in the intensive care unit.

Willie, firemen said, told them he and Jerry were "playing" with the gasoline can when flames erupted.

The resulting fire gutted the inside of the family home in the Herrington Hills subdivision and nearly claimed the life of a young fireman momentarily trapped in the basement.

George Kielhorn, an engineer, entered the home in the early stages of the fire and suffered a 10-stitch gash on the forehead when two neighbor men pulled him through a broken-out window.

GUSH OF FLAMES

Kielhorn was caught by a "gush" of flames which engulfed the small basement room when he broke down the door.

Fire Marshal Charles Metz, who described the house fire as the worst he has seen in 24 years, said damages to the building and furnishings would be in the neighborhood of \$20,000.

It was the second tragic event inflicted on the Green family in 24 hours.

Mrs. Mary L. Green, of 490 Luther, mother of Jerry and former wife of the boy's father, died Wednesday following a short illness.

AT FUNERAL HOME

Green was at a Pontiac funeral home making arrangements for his ex-wife's burial when the fire struck his home.

Rusk Stymied on Peace Talks

Red, Neutral Envoys
Provide Little Hope

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk apparently is returning empty-handed to Washington after trying in three days of talks with Communist and neutralist diplomats to get hopeful signs of peace talks on Viet Nam.

If the Communist or non-aligned nations have had any hint from North Viet Nam that it is prepared to ease its conditions for negotiations, there is no sign that they passed the information on to Rusk.

It became clear that the Americans were making little headway after the secretary of state talked yesterday with Foreign Ministers Vaclav David of Czechoslovakia and Janos Peto of Hungary.

The Americans apparently had centered their hopes on David, whose Premier Jozef Lantier conferred recently in Hanoi with North Vietnamese President Ho Chi Minh.

Asked about Lantier's mission to North Viet Nam, David told newsmen he had no message to relay to Rusk.

'GENERAL TERMS'

"We mentioned North Viet Nam only in general terms," he said.

The Hungarian foreign minister told newsmen only that he and Rusk had touched on Viet Nam along with other world problems.

A meeting between Rusk and Foreign Minister Marko Nikizik of Yugoslavia apparently was just as unproductive.

Summit Good Place to Hear Ideas---LBJ

WASHINGTON (AP) — President John F. Kennedy hopes to learn the most extensive Asian tour ever undertaken by an American President.

The President is scheduled to leave for a six-nation tour later this month, that at the Manila conference. "I want to be a good listener as well as an active participant."

The schedule calls for the President to be in Manila from Oct. 23 to Oct. 27. He will meet with the government heads of South Viet Nam, Korea, Thailand, the Philippines, New Zealand, and Australia — nations with some forces in the Vietnamese war.

Johnson has expanded his trip to include a visit to the Philippines, the most extensive Asian tour ever undertaken by an American President.

SOUTH VIET STOP?

The President was asked at his news conference if there is any possibility he would visit South Viet Nam, too. "No consideration has been given at this time to any such proposal or any such visit," he replied.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Following are highlights of President Johnson's news conference Thursday: Manila Conference: "I think that we should thoroughly explore each leader's idea about how an honorable peace can be reached, and what course reconstruction efforts following the peace could very properly take, and how we could participate in those efforts."

Phone Strikes End in 3 Cities

While wildcat strikes by southeastern Michigan telephone workers ended in three communities Thursday, a new walkout erupted at Ann Arbor. Wildcat strikes, involving some 800 members of the Communications Workers of America at localities in Lansing, Pontiac and Wyandotte ended. But a wildcat walkout at Flint moved into its third day today.

In Ann Arbor, about 200 of 265 workers in the Michigan Bell Telephone Co. office walked out in late afternoon, said Jerry Fugia, shop steward at Local 4011.

Supervisory personnel, called in out of town, and non-striking operators maintained service, he said. Pickets marched outside the Ann Arbor office.

AGREEMENT PROTESTED

Fugia said the protest was as much against the CWA, protesting last Tuesday's contract agreement with Michigan Bell, as it was against the company. Lansing reported normal operations by Thursday evening after members of Local 4040 voted by a narrow margin to return to work.

But George Voorhis, Lansing Bell manager, said work orders for maintenance have piled up. Mrs. Jane Steinhauer, local president, said the issue was over failure of the new contract to shift Lansing from Wage Area 2 to Wage Area 1, meaning about \$3 to \$4 a week per worker.

The return to work at Pontiac ended a wildcat walkout which began Sept. 23. The Lansing and Wyandotte walkouts began Wednesday.

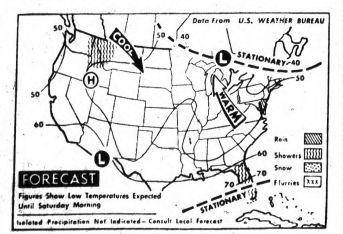

militarized zone, B52 bombers hammered in a nighttime raid on North Vietnamese storage areas, truck parks and bivouac sites from which the Communists infiltrate South.

It was the fourth B52 strike in just over two weeks against North Viet Nam. All four have been in the same general area of the infiltration straggles.

Smaller U.S. tactical bombers flew 25 sorties Thursday against North Vietnamese positions inside the six-mile-wide buffer zone, a U.S. spokesman reported.

The American raiders concentrated on the central and western areas of the zone, keeping clear of the eastern end where a bombing pause has been in effect for 11 days to allow field teams of the International Control Commission to investigate violations of the zone's neutrality.

Other formations of B52 bombers at dawn today hit Communist base camp and headquarters areas in South Viet Nam 49 miles northwest of Qui Nhon.

NEAR OPERATION

This target was 10 to 15 miles north of the American, South Korean and South Vietnamese force which in Operation Irving was tracking down the remnants of a badly battered force of some 3,000 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong.

Since Sunday, South Vietnamese units joined the South Korean Tiger Division, the allied force has reported killing 711 enemy troops and capturing a spectacularly large bag of 477 prisoners. Of these, the U.S. troops reported killing 372 and capturing 308.

Epilepsy Area of Brain Said Accessible

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — Two Duke University researchers report they have found a means of reaching into the brain's inner sanctum, a discovery which may be useful to persons with epilepsy.

Dr. Blaine S. Nashold, associate professor of neurosurgery, and Dr. William P. Wilson, professor of psychiatry, said their work proves epilepsy can originate deep in the brain as well as near its surface.

For many of the two million victims of epilepsy in America, science has made life more bearable by providing drugs and new surgical techniques to control sudden seizures. Others have not benefited from drug therapy and surgery, because physicians have been unable to identify the trigger area which sets off their epileptic attacks.

One thing that has slowed the search for an answer to all types of epilepsy has been the inaccessibility of the deeper areas of the brain.

Now the two Duke researchers have found a path to this previously unexplored area of the body.

Guard, Reserve Face Bigger Trainee Jam

WASHINGTON (AP) — Barred by a major change in Pentagon policy, the National Guard and Army Reserve will continue this fiscal year to induct enlistees at a faster rate than they can be trained, figures showed today.

The Reserve units, which had 133,000 untrained men on hand last June 30, the end of fiscal 1966, revealed they inducted 7,474 men in July and 8,826 in August to fill vacancies caused by normal attrition.

But it also was learned that the Army now plans to train about 85,000 Reserve enlistees by next June — an average of roughly 7,000 per month.

National Guard officials further reported that more than 16,000 guardsmen had signed up in fiscal 1966 for training this year and up to now have not been included in the June 30 untrained totals.

These figures indicate that the Army, at the present induction and training levels, will be faced with a backlog of more than 130,000 men — enlistees who are untrained — by the end of this fiscal year June 30.

The huge backlogs have been sharply criticized by some congressmen who charge that the Reserve program provides a

Chrysler Back at Work Today

DETROIT (AP) — Chrysler Corp. resumes production of 1967 model cars today following settlement of a strike over working conditions at its Twinsburg, Ohio, stamping plant.

A company spokesman said full production at six U.S. assembly plants would resume Monday. Operations at Chrysler of Canada, Ltd., at Windsor, Ont., across the river from Detroit, were to resume Tuesday.

A strike by 4,000 United Auto Workers at the General Motors Corp. Chevrolet plants in St. Louis, Mo., moved into its fourth day with negotiations reportedly deadlocked.

Negotiators reported little progress at another GM facility in Kansas City where UAW Local 93 is holding a grievance talk over the work load at the plant. Union men have approved a strike 1,545 to 142 last Tuesday night but no decision on a walkout has been made.

LAI OFF

Some 42,600 of Chrysler's 150,000 hourly rated workers in the U.S. and Canada were laid off because of the week-long Twinsburg strike.

The plant is one of two Chrysler facilities capable of stamping all body sections for Dodge, Plymouth and Chrysler cars.

UAW Local 122 at Twinsburg voted overwhelmingly Thursday night to ratify an agreement hammered out Wednesday by Chrysler and UAW negotiators. The walkout began Sept. 29.

The 4,200 workers were to return to work today.

Welsh author Richard Deacon claimed the Welsh were first.

Angier Biddle Duke, U.S. ambassador to Spain, noted that one scholar lists these possibilities as predecessors of Columbus:

Stone age nomads crossing the Bering Strait from Asia to Alaska; Phoenicians who might have reached New Hampshire or Venezuela after the Punic Wars and a few hundred years before Christ; Romans who could have fashioned iron

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — India has informed the United States that North Viet Nam officials refuse even to discuss peace negotiations with U.S. delegates who had been hoping the chief executive would come here to delineate U.S. policy to the assembly.

NO PLANS

Johnson had no plans to visit the United Nations, U.S. sources said, and the lunch he was scheduled to address in an auditorium seating 240 persons was sold out.

It was announced yesterday afternoon that the President would talk to the editorialists in place of Rusk, who was spending his second week in New York without participating actively in the assembly session.

The United States had no comment on India's information on Hanoi's position or on British Foreign Secretary George Brown's announced intention to propose a Viet Nam peace conference as soon as possible.

Brown, due in New York from London today, was scheduled for a policy speech to the assembly Tuesday morning.

Losing Money Game Helps Space Plans

GREENBELT, Md. — After misguiding a \$3.9 million satellite program over its budget by 50 per cent, the guilty project manager simply shrugged and told himself that it was just a game — and it was.

Besides money troubles, he was plagued for a week with

such hypothetical problems as parts that would not fit together, sloppy technicians who short-circuited vital components, and memos from "on high" with warnings to drop everything and prepare next year's budget.

Happily tearing their hair through all of these "preturbations" were a dozen players,

including nine National Aeronautics and Space Administration engineers and technicians from space installations around the country.

The game was called "GREMEX" (Goddard Research Engineering Management Exercise).

Project GREMEX was actually the pilot effort for a possible series of such games, designed to teach the complex and ulcer-causing art of program management.

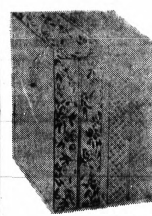

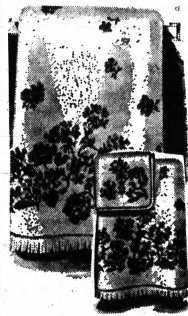

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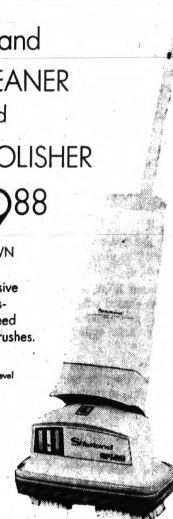

Ships Crash in River

ST. CLAIR (AP) — Nineteen the 35-mile long river linking the Lakes Huron and St. Clair. The West German freighter "I heard a grand and then a Thursday night after it col- lided," said Michigan State Police with a Panamanian ship in Trooper Jack V. Trombly, the St. Clair River.

He said he looked up and "all I could see were flames." The Coast Guard plucked the men from the 393-foot Emsstein. Trombly, on duty at a State Police post about three-quarters of a mile from the collision, launched the post's 35-foot rescue boat with two other troopers and sped to the scene.

Nobody was injured in the collision or fire, State Police said. The Emsstein, out of Bremen, West Germany, collided nearly head-on with the 576-foot Olympic Pearl, owned by Falmouth Marine of Panama.

The ships smashed into each other at 9:10 p.m. EST ripping a 50-foot gash along the port side of the Emsstein, just offshore from St. Clair in Southeastern Michigan.

The Olympic Pearl, registered out of Monrovia, Liberia, suffered a gash more than 25 feet along her port bow, but the damage was high above the water with a load of general cargo and ter line. The Coast Guard permitted the ship to proceed down-bound with a grain load when river, en route to her destination, the ships hit about midway, on tion of Montreal.

RFK-Lindsay Dispute Ends as Courtsey, Manners Prevail

NEW YORK (AP) — An apology by Mayor John V. Lindsay to Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., apparently has ended an angry exchange which, at its height, had Kennedy criticizing City Hall's "good manners and courtsey."

The dispute broke out Thursday in connection with a campaign to support the Police Department's civilian complaint review board — a panel backed by Kennedy, Republican Mayor Lindsay and Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y.

At its most bitter stage, Lindsay said through a spokesman "Sen. Javits promised he would physically produce Sen. Kennedy" at a New York strategy conference.

The Democratic senator replied: "When and if good manners and courtsey are learned at City Hall, I would be happy to meet with the mayor." But the controversy seemed

to calm down Thursday night when a Kennedy spokesman said Lindsay apologized over the telephone for the remark. The mayor told Kennedy it was made without his knowledge.

Lindsay "has nothing but the highest regard for Sens. Kennedy and Javits," his office said, saying that the mayor wanted to "clear up the misunderstanding immediately."

Lindsay has been attempting to bring the senators together to join him in a street corner campaign for the review board. The fate of the panel, which hears civilian complaints against police officers, will be decided in a city referendum next month.

When reporters at City Hall asked when the three men would begin campaigning, a Lindsay aide told them Javits had promised the mayor he would "physically produce" Kennedy.

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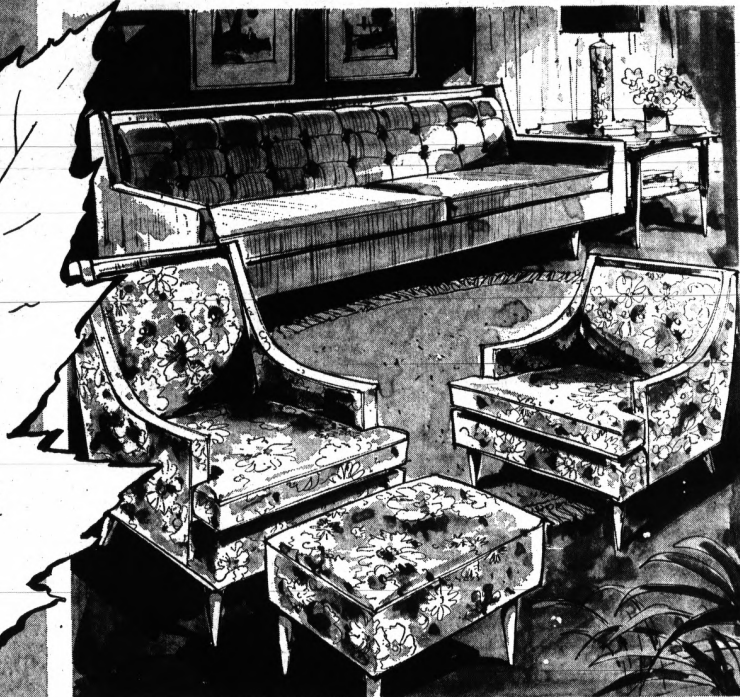
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
