'Schools to Need \$1 Billion'

Two High-Speed Collisions Kill 5 Men, 7 Teens

Owosso Scene of Crash Fatal to Adults; Youths Die in Minnesota

Two collisions this morning took the lives of five young men at Owosso and seven teen-agers near St. Paul, Minn. Both fatal accidents involved speeding automobiles.

The five Owosso deaths were among eight fatalities on Michigan highways as the weekend began.

Two young men also were killed at Muskegon and a third at Kalamazoo.

Killed in the Owosso collision were Charles A. Tamm, 23, of Grand Blanc; and Kenneth Jackovitz, 21, Charles R. Daugherty, 22, Frank Held Jr., 22, and Paul Spencer, 21, all of Flint.

Police said witnesses told them the young men's car was traveling 80 to 100 miles an hour on Main Street when it leaped a curb and veered back to the center of the street. The collision followed.

The driver of the other car, Frank Baleja, 41, of Owosso, father of two sons, suffered a crushed chest, broken leg and other injuries.

Baleja was returned to Owosso Memorial Hospital which he had just left to go to see his dead friend's wife.

GOING 100 M.P.H. — At St. Paul, seven youths were killed when a car carrying four teen-agers at more than 100 miles an hour careened broadside into another on a four-lane highway.

Impact of the crash hurled the motor of one vehicle 150 feet.

Authorities said four youths in the speeding car were "all dressed in black leather jackets and motorcycle boots."

In Michigan, James Jandron, 23, of Muskegon and Herbert Conner, 23, of Park Ridge, Ill., were killed on U.S. 31 about five miles north of Muskegon.

Aaron Ballantine, 20, of Kalamazoo, a sophomore at Western Michigan University, was killed when his car and another collided at an intersection near the university.

City Falls Below Requirement

A campaign to promote public use of existing scheduled airline service will be one of the major aims of the Pontiac Area Chamber of Commerce's new aviation committee.

The committee, meeting for the first time yesterday, adopted a six-point program. Members pledged themselves to press for additional routes and services—including a Pontiac-Chicago flight, and expansion of Pontiac Municipal Airport under co-ownership of the city and county.

State aeronautics officials said today passenger loads during the first month of North Central Airlines' service in 10 cities, including Pontiac, showed less than the minimum requirement in half the cases, but they aren't discouraged.

"The first few months are not necessarily an indication of whether the service will continue," said James D. Ramsey, state aeronautics director.

"Cities normally get about six months to get the service installed and organized and then a year test period is conducted to see whether the airline will maintain its service to the cities," Ramsey said.

STARTED DEC. 1 — North Central started service Dec. 1 in the 10 Michigan cities under a Great Lakes local service program approved last summer by the Civil Aeronautics Board.

The program specifies cities must average five passengers daily over the 12-month test period.

Swainson Calls for Equitable Fiscal Changes

Fails to Spell Out Any Tax Recommendations to Legislature

GRAND RAPIDS (AP)—Michigan must spend a billion dollars in the next five years, says Gov. John Swainson, to provide 25,000 additional school classrooms.

For every dollar spent on education in the 1950s two dollars will be required in the 1960s, the governor told the Michigan Association of School Administrators Friday night.

"We will have to work to get these needed finances at all levels of government," Swainson said, calling for "the enactment of a stable and equitable fiscal policy."

He did not, however, spell out what his administration's recommendations will be to the legislature.

"The problem now revolves," he said, "around the achievement of a fiscal (tax) reform with equity, with fairness to all persons at all income levels and to business and industry at all levels."

"We can reach our education goals if we join our efforts in support of a revised financial structure which will provide adequate revenue for them."

FOREIGN DEFICIT

Swainson said that by the end of the current fiscal year next June 30, there will be a school aid deficit which will have to be made up from the general fund because the schools' share of the state sales tax has fallen short of estimates.

"We are all too familiar," he continued, "with the frustrations of our present revenue situation. They range from our sensitivity to the problems of the average citizen to the realization that our state needs additional revenue if we are to meet even our current needs."

Swainson told a news conference he supports a starting salary of \$4,000 for school teachers and a minimum of \$2,800 a year after a teacher has 10 years of experience.

Asked how much additional his suggested salary would require from the state, the governor said:

"You can get any number of estimates up to \$150 million a year. The additional funds, of course, would have to be raised."

Swainson declined to add, "by taxes," but said he already was on record for total revision of the state's tax structure to accommodate all state needs.

Second Integration Test Looms for U. of Georgia

ATHENS, Ga. (AP)—Students and faculty members at the University of Georgia today anxiously awaited a second test of integration in an atmosphere of mingled apprehension and reassurance.

The grim memory of recent rioting was offset to a degree by a promise from Gov. Ernest Vandiver that he would provide any force necessary to prevent a new outbreak of violence.

At the same time the governor warned that law enforcement officials of great experience had informed him that "indiscreet conditions exist."

In turn university officials said they would act swiftly to prevent any demonstrations when Charles A. Hunter, 18, and Hamilton B. Holmes, 19, return to the campus of this oldest chartered state university in the country.

The two Atlanta Negro students were ordered segregated by a federal judge in Macon who strictly warned that no action must be taken to expel them.

Judge W. A. Boyle restrained all state officials having any connection with the school or university officials themselves from again suspending or dismissing them.

Boyle ruled Friday that the university's "order of withdrawal or suspension is hereby terminated by 8 a.m., Jan. 14."

The two students were expelled early Thursday morning in the wake of a campus riot finally broken up by authorities using tear gas and fire hoses.

Miss Hunter and Holmes were taken to their Atlanta homes, where they remained in seclusion. Both said they were eager to return to the university to resume studies started without major incident during the daylight hours Wednesday.

HONOLULU (UPI)—An Air Force spokesman says the United States has "unofficial but very specific information" that two Russian ships were heading toward the first men in space.

Navy was inclined to believe the object fired last night was a satellite rather than a missile whose nose cone the Russians would want to fish from the ocean.

Other sources, however, felt the object was a missile.

T. Keith Gleason, chief of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, said in Chicago he would not be surprised if the Russians tried to launch a man into orbit "any day."

He noted that in the past Russia has timed some of its space spectaculars to coincide with important events.

The space chief made his statement before the Air Force announced that its radar station had spotted the Russian object at 8:38 p.m. (Pontiac time).

It was the first time the United States has publicly announced it had spotted a Russian missile as it was launched.

That was the first shot of the war.

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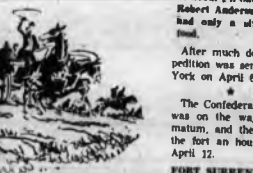

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Air Traffic Control Blamed for Crash

NEW YORK (AP)—The top attorney for United Air Lines blames the federal plane-guiding air traffic control system for the Dec. 18 collision of a UAL jet and a Trans World Airlines Super Constellation over Staten Island.

Charles F. McElean, United's vice president in charge of legal affairs, testified Friday, just before the close of eight days of hearings on the crash, which took 134 lives.

"This accident would not have happened had air traffic control properly utilized the equipment, personnel and facilities available," said McElean adding, "Frankly, we have been shocked at some of the things we have learned since this investigation vice president in charge of legal started."

Kaiser, Steelworkers Hope to Scrap Strikes With New Idea

FONTANA, Calif. (AP)—The Kaiser Steel Corp. and the United Steelworkers of America are asking the public to sit in permanently on future relations between company and union.

The goal: to eliminate strikes.

Both Edgar F. Kaiser, board chairman of Kaiser Steel, and David J. McDonald, union president, have high hopes for the plan. So does the chief representative of the public on the company-union Long Range Committee, Dr. George W. Taylor, University of Pennsylvania professor. He is chairman of the committee and headed President Eisenhower's Taft-Hartley board of inquiry during the 1959 steel strike.

"We're all hopeful this will minimize if not eliminate strikes over renewal of agreements," Taylor told a news conference at the Kaiser Steel plant here Friday.

The Long Range Committee, set up after the 1959 strike, has equal representation from company, union and public. Its overall purpose: to eliminate strikes.

Spokesmen stressed that in asking the public's representatives to take part, when necessary, in the collective bargaining, neither company nor union is binding itself to follow the public members' advice.

Adult Audience Thrills at 'Caesar'

If you failed to attend Friday's performance of "Julius Caesar" by the Canadian Players because you happened to see it a couple of weeks ago on television, you missed a dimension in entertainment.

The appearance of the famed touring company of the Stratford Theatre was well received by an audience, largely adult, at Pontiac Northern High School, brought to Pontiac under the sponsorship of Pontiac, Oakland Town Hall, the familiar classic was the same that devoted theatergoers make pilgrimage to Stratford, Ont., each summer to see.

And here it was in all its stark raw and gutsy mouthiness on our very doorstep.

Taking the audience by surprise, this excellent polished cast charmed viewers at the outset with a 20 opening scene in which the audience itself became the Roman through

Players descended the aisle, hurling challenge at the stage.

The artful use of drum accompaniment and skillfully executed lighting effects gave breadth and depth to a stage setting that was essentially simple.

SILENCES EFFECTIVE

Silences were used as effectively as the school-book familiar speeches of Antony, Brutus and Caesar. The muted use of color in the jewel-toned robes and banners was in excellent taste. There was a quality of an ancient Greek chorus in the mob scenes, particularly when following Mark Antony's famed "Friends, Romans, countrymen," but the director saw fit to have the crowd mourn in the keen fashion of an Abby Theater production.

Mervyn Blake as Caesar gave an excellent performance. We will long remember him in an early scene when he described Caesar's refusal of the crown.

Max Hejman as Cassius

was master of his role. His use of voice and body was a constant pleasure to his audience. The stage movements of the entire cast were so fluid and apt, they might have been choreographed.

Another memorable moment was an exciting tempest scene a minute moment after thrown away by Shakespearean groups. The parallel soliloquies of Caesar and Brutus also were strong. I remember seeing the same bit many years ago when the celebrated Globe Theater Players toured this country and the parallelism was totally lost.

The finely stylized interpretation of this magnificent classic lost nothing. It gained all for the company. A bare stage such as this tests the ability and strength of the actor. Director Douglas Campbell deserves accolades along with William Swales for his sensitive portrayal of Brutus.

Town Hall's generosity in bringing this company to Pontiac again deserves mention. It is to be hoped they will return.

Chiefs Lucky to Stay Alive in Valley Race

Flint Northern Carries Central 5 Right Down to Wire Before Losing

Pontiac Central's hard-pressed basketball forces were lucky to escape with the 45-44 victory last night against an underdog Flint Northern team in a Saginaw Valley Conference thriller at the PCH gymnasium.

Jack Marlette's fighting Vikings scared the Chiefs almost to death before Pontiac's defending Saginaw Valley champions finally eked out a 45-44 victory under the astonished eyes of 1,300 fans.

You'd have a hard time convincing Art Van Ryn, that Northern is a winless club after he watched his cagers fight for their very existence in a home contest figured by some to be a "breather" for PCH.

A jump shot by Andy Branch from inside the foul stripe with just 1:47 remaining proved to be the winning bucket. The field goal gave PCH a 45-40 lead and two foldovers by the never-say-die Vikings still left them one point shy.

Added by Lady Luck, the Chiefs withstood a furious Northern barrage in the final minute to remain tied for 2nd place in the Valley standings with unbeaten Saginaw High coming here next Friday evening.

The Vikings missed at least half a dozen shots at the basket in the last minute, including a layup by Gus Talbert on a breakaway following an interrupted pass. Another shot by Stan Brunner was blocked in mid-air by George Ford, who then recovered the rebound for the Chiefs.

Charlie Haynes and Brunner scouted two pointers in the final minute to cut the Chiefs' margin to 1-11, but the luckless Vikings just couldn't pick up the tying or go-ahead shot.

The Vikings outplayed and outscored the Chiefs in the first half, but they were outplayed in the second half. The Vikings scored 11 times and the lead changed hands on seven occasions. PCH recovered by more than two points and three times held the lead by five.

Central just wasn't playing well enough to break the game open, although it appeared they might on two or three occasions in the 2nd half. Northern's spirited warriors just refused to fold or quit.

Dennis Diehm, Clarence Douglas, Roush and Ford all missed free throws in the last minute, but would have added the tie game and removed a little of the pressure.

Despite grabbing 17 rebounds and scoring 11 points, Ford missed his last three free throws and the team's last shot.

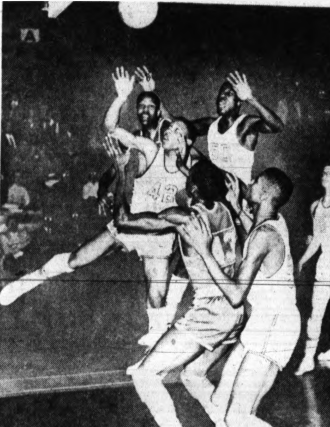
Each team had three players in double figures. Clarence Douglas paced PCH with 15 points. 11 in the 1st half, and Roush tallied 10 in John Ford. Ron Clark and Brunner scored 11 apiece for Northern and Haynes added 10.

Northern held a 13-13 edge at the end of the first half, but PCH was in front at halftime, 22-21, and again after three periods, 36-32.

The Vikings played alert defense and outplayed the Chiefs from the floor, 39 to 17. Both clubs were past at the foul line, PCH leading only 11 of 22, and Northern only six of 13.

The aggressive Vikings were guilty of fouling 21 times while the Chiefs committed only 11.

The narrow triumph was the 30th in a row for the Chiefs, who have won a 31 Valley record and a 21 percent foul rate while the Chiefs committed only 11.

Falcons, Roseville Remain Deadlocked

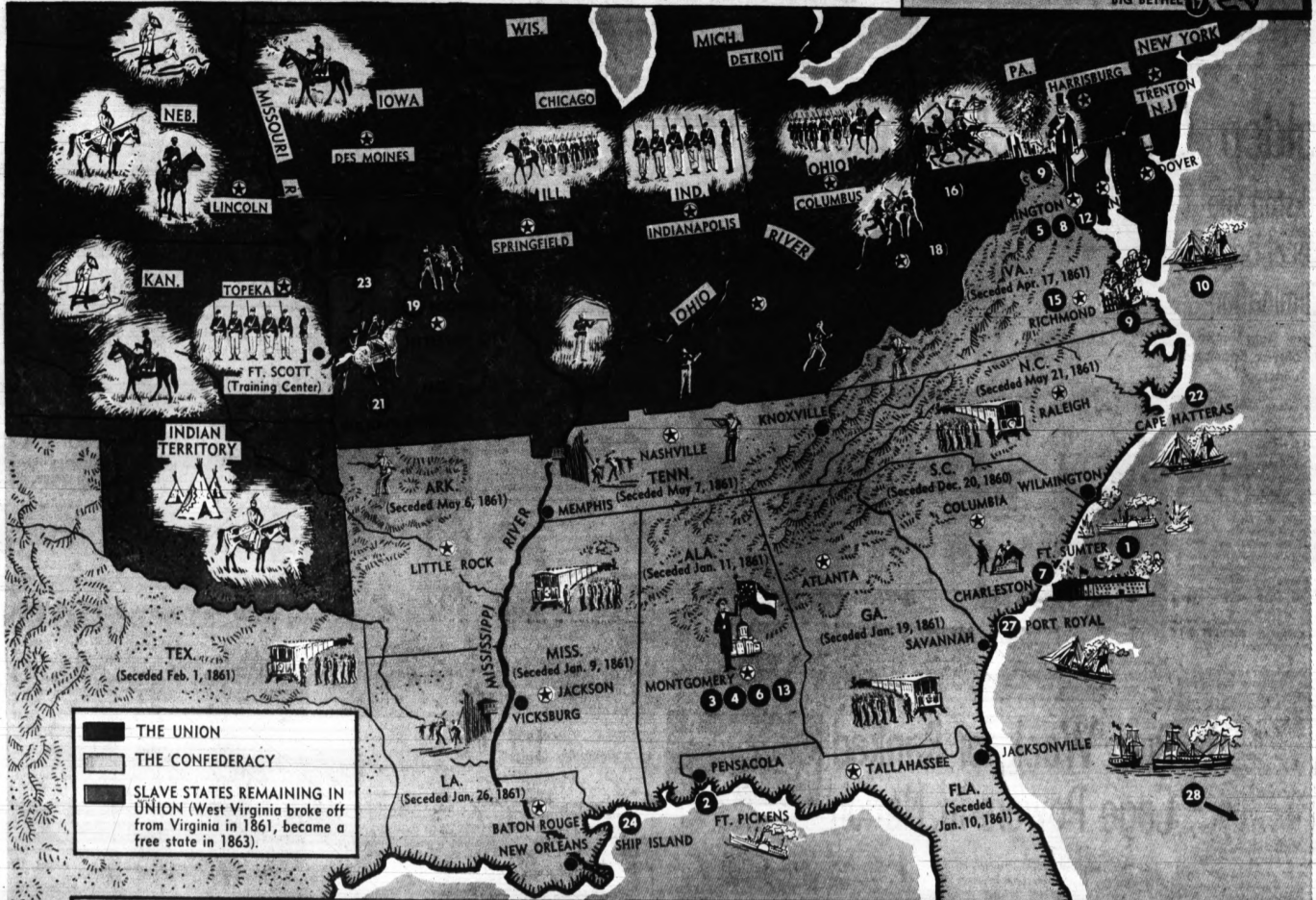
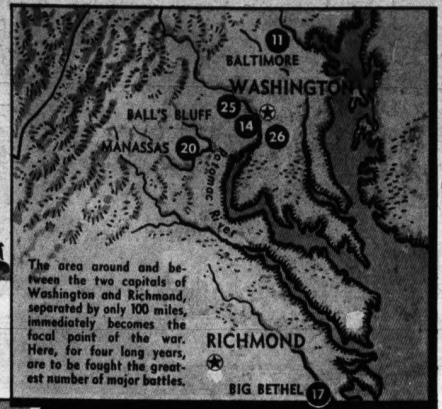
Recherster and Roseville stayed neck-and-neck in the Tri-County League race with victories while Pontiac Central and Flint Northern contested Friday night.

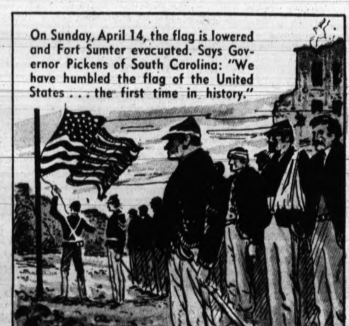
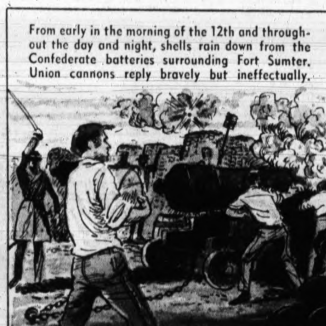
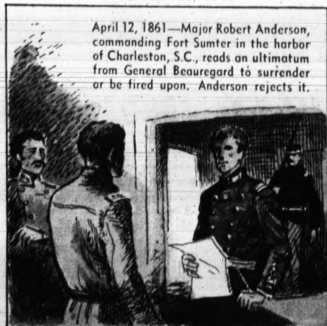

Your Neighbor's House

E. J. Walerych Home Is New Watkins Hills Tri-Level

Ward Ross has been building homes in the Pontiac area for a long time. One of his newer subdivisions is Watkins Hills. Here he departed from the one-story ranch home and built some tri-levels. One of these tri-levels belongs to the E. J. Walerych family (E. J. is more commonly known as "Whitey").

Early in September the four members of the Walerych family moved from a home on Williams Lake to this new one on Terness Drive. Paulette is 17 and in high school. Barbara, at 9, is in grade school. Jeff, a white miniature French poodle, stays home and guards the house. His guarding is vocal, to say the least.

Double front doors open into a slate-floored vestibule. On the outside these doors are painted black with gold trim. Inside they are natural birch. At the left of the doors is a folding-door coat closet. At the right a planter provides a half wall with

bookcase on the living room side. Three black and white hanging lamps over the planter give soft light to the area.

The living room is a step-down from vestibule and dining room. Gray carpeting is used in living and dining areas. Walls are gray. Behind the rest sofa is an oriental mural.

The floor length draperies are unusual; made of three panels, they shade from white through

gray to charcoal. Lamps are tall. One is aqua and gold, the other gold and white.

FOLDING TABLE

All tables are black with white Formica tops. The low coffee table can be turned into a dining table seating 8 and raised to any height. Normally it sets in front of the sofa. For guests it is moved to the dining room.

A second sofa on the wall opposite the windows is a

twoeedy black and white with an old gold thread in the upholstery. A swivel rocker is aqua.

In the dining room there is a china cupboard built into the wall. The rear wall of this cupboard is ribbed glass which allows light to filter through to the kitchen.

At the present, the folding coffee table serves as a dining room table. The Walerychs intend to get Danish modern dining room furniture.

Aqua marbled tile on the kitchen floor and aqua appliances carry out the color scheme of the living area of the house. Walls are white. Curtains are white with an aqua and pink design.

All cupboards are natural birch. The breakfast set is metal with a gold sequined white Formica top. Chairs are white with gold lines.

In the recreation room on the lower level, all but one wall is paneled birch. The exception—a deep tangerine—is the wall

that can be changed to suit the whims of the owners. There's a sliding glass window wall at the rear; in the front are more smaller windows. The floor is gold and white linoleum.

A gray Roman brick fireplace takes up one wall. The high hearth is slate. A sunburst clock matches the brass fittings of the fireplace.

Near the fireplace there's a desk built into the wall with book shelves around it. Here the girls do homework. There's a brass pole lamp mounted next to the desk.

Most of the furniture is blond. One leather armchair is white. In the alcove near the glass doors is an aqua sectional sofa.

The house was built from a stock plan with a few changes. One of these was a fourth bedroom—that is the future television room.

GIRLS' ROOMS

The girls have the two first bedrooms with their own bath. Barbara's room is all greens and aquas. There's a green rug on the oak floor. Walls are green; curtains are aqua. Furniture is bleached mahogany with aqua trim. The bedspread is striped in aqua and green.

Paulette's room is blue and white. Walls are blue; curtains are a dark blue. Her furniture is limed oak. Her bed has a bookcase headboard. The spread is blue and white with a rosebud design. She has her own white telephone.

The master bedroom has its own dressing room and attached lavatory. The first two are carpeted in blue. The bedroom has blue walls and a white ceiling.

Curtains are a sheer blue with gold draperies at each side.

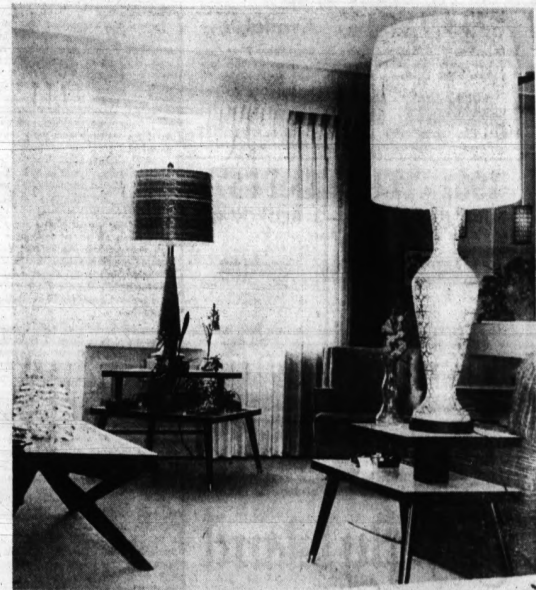
The white furniture has an antiqued finish. Near the front windows is a blue velvet chaise longue with a gold pillow on it. The gold quilted bedspread hangs over a gold striped skirt. Blue and white throw pillows tie in with the walls. There are

gold and white lamps on the low square night chests.

In the dressing room there is blue and white rosebud wall paper. The vanity top is white Formica with silver speckles. The round wash bowl is blue. The attached lavatory is blue

and white. Conversation wall-paper is white with aqua and coral in the design.

The exterior of the Walerych home is pale gray brick and white siding. The double garage is at one side. The lot is about half an acre.

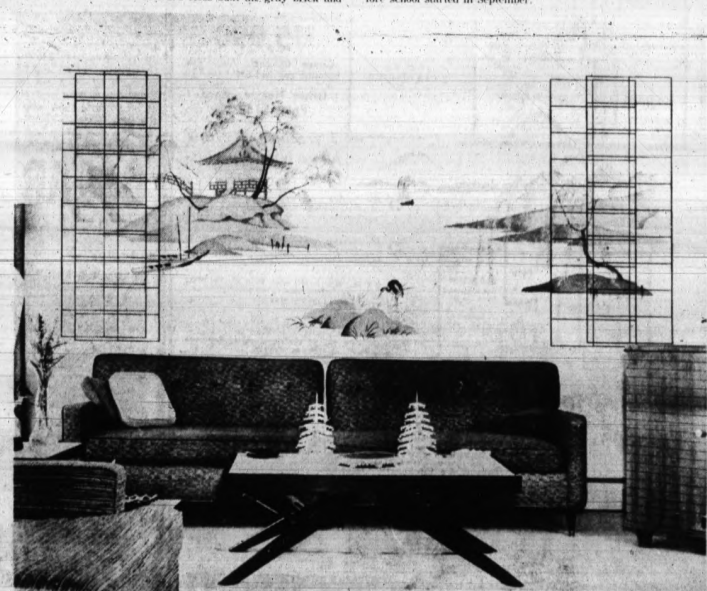

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Winter GARDEN NOTES

The current enthusiasm among fashionable interior decorators for masses of greenery within the home will strike many home-makers as pretty funny. They can't imagine a home without a sunny window full of cheerful flowers and greenery tucked wherever possible, fashionable or not. But the fast remains that the emphasis on plants as important decorative accessories has spurred some of us to test the green thumb.

Light — Plants that will bear heavy or fruit need direct sun for best development. Most foliage plants do well without direct sun but have strong natural light (or artificial light) to grow properly.

Temperature — Most plants thrive best in rooms heated no higher than 70-75 degrees by day and 65 at night. Some plants can stand higher temperatures than others; let your plant dealer or florist advise on this point.

Humidity — Plants like high humidity. Offset dryness of rooms in winter by setting potted plants in trays or saucers of pebbles and keep a constant water level just below base of pots. In planters or decorative cache pots, put a layer of pebbles about inch in the base, set porous clay pots on pebbles and fill in around them with peat moss and keep moss damp.

Water — Each plant needs individual attention. Touch topsoil with fingertip. If soil feels dry, water thoroughly. If soil feels moist, don't water.

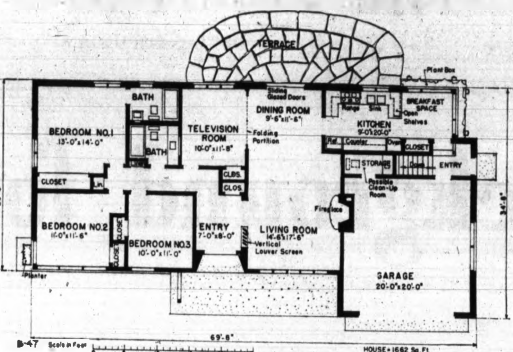
Fresh Air — All plants must have fresh air every day. They will do better if not subject to drafts (thank heavens, the parlor palm can't read). A preferred treatment is to open a window in an adjoining room for 15 minutes every day.

Cleanliness — House plants with glossy or leathery foliage should be washed every week with clear water. Use a small laundry spray or the dish spray in your kitchen sink.

Food — Give plants a monthly feeding of a soluble houseplant food mixed according to package directions. Use good potting soil, either a prepared ready-made one or mix your own using equal parts of garden loam, sand, plus leaf-mold or peatmoss.

Pest Control — Be on the alert for possible insects. As a precaution, you might spray plants once a month. Pushbutton cans of insecticides made for use on house plants are convenient but you can mix your own spray. Be sure to spray undersides of leaves as well as on top.

Large Ranch Has Homey Midwestern Flavor

There's an air of warm Midwestern hospitality about this neat three-bedroom ranch, designed by Architect Elmer Gyleck of Elgin, Ill.
The living and dining rooms are in line, contrary to the usual arrangement which places these rooms parallel to the front wall. In this home they run from front to back between the bedroom section and the service area.
One of the extras this makes possible in B-47 in the House of the Week series is a television room separated from the dining room by a folding partition. If the TV watchers are a minority the accordion doors can be closed to separate the viewers from the talkers.
At other times, the doors can be opened — making the TV screen visible (front dining room and even the kitchen).
With a door opening into the bedroom hall, the TV room also can double as a guest bedroom.
Architect Gyleck points out that the back-to-back plumbing of the two full baths in the bedroom section holds the cost of this luxury to a minimum. The closet in the master bedroom is extra large, taking up almost an entire wall.
There's convenient access from the two-car attached garage through the service entry into the breakfast space which is part of the long kitchen. Basement stairway is directly opposite the side entry.
B-47 has seven rooms and the total living space is 1,662 sq. ft. Overall dimensions are 48' 8" in width by 34' 8" in depth. If desired, the home could be built on a slab foundation and the basement eliminated. In this case, heating equipment would go in the space now marked for basement stairs.
The exterior of the home is primarily brick veneer, with some stone veneer and vertical wood siding on the front elevation.
The front entry is bounded on one side by a decorative wood

louver. The living room fireplace is of a distinctive sunburst design, with lines radiating from the hearth first in the stone of the chimney and then in the wood paneling enclosing the adjoining wall. Sliding glass doors lead from the dining room onto the rear terrace.
Kitchen counters are arranged in a shallow U, with range and sink side by side. Note the large closet in the kitchen, which could be used as a pantry.
The closet shown at the rear of the garage could either be used for storage or, if desired, could be equipped with plumbing to make a convenient laundry.

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If you're doing over one or more rooms in your house, save the bits of wallpaper and fabric that you have left over. You may need them as time goes on for patching and mending but they have other uses, too.
For lending a co-ordinated effect to a room, these scraps can work wonders. Either wall paper or fabric can be used to turn an ordinary metal wastepaper basket into something special. Paint the inside and about one-half inch on the outside, at both ends, in a contrasting color. Paste fabric on the outside and add a braided trim top and bottom.
In a pine paneled country kitchen, one imaginative homemaker covered plastic canisters with the provincial patterned wallpaper she had used on the upper half of her walls. Even extra curtain material can be pressed into service in the form of place mats.
Lotex-Based, Not Water
Some people refer to the water-thinned latex paints as "water based" paints. There is no such thing. The base of a paint is the part that forms the film after the thinner or solvent has dried or evaporated. Since the water in latex paints evaporates, water-based is a misnomer. To be in the know, refer to them as water emulsion paints or as latexes.

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House Number in Lights Is Easy to See

Visitors can find your home easier at night if you install a lighted house number, the American Home Lighting Institute says. There are several ways of lighting your address sign. You can purchase a fixture which is supplied with decals for your number. You can mount numerals below a fixture on your house or on a post near your entrance, or you can paint numerals on frosted glass which shields a recessed 15-watt bulb.

Numerals 3 inches high and 1 1/2 inches wide are visible up to 75 feet.

In addition don't forget to provide fixtures to direct light on your steps, walks, and driveway, the institute reminded.

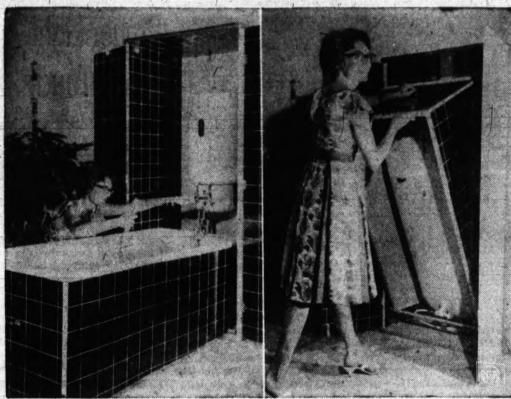
Dramatize It

If you have one large piece of furniture of which you are especially proud—an antique, a family heirloom or even a beautiful modern creation—the proper use of paint can help call attention to it. By painting the wall behind the object in an appropriate color different from those applied to the other walls, the eye is drawn to that wall and the furniture in front of it.

Plastic Skylight Easy to Install

One of the best ways to bring light into an interior space is through a skylight. Using a pre-fabricated plastic skylight, you can install the unit yourself, says the January issue of Better Homes & Gardens.

Cost depends on size and type of unit. Flat skylights are cheaper than bubble-dome types, which range from about \$33 to \$630. Professional labor will cost between \$25 and \$50, the magazine says.

Depending upon the difficulty in locating rafters, and the slope angle of your roof, the job will vary in its complexity. In a pitch-roof job, guide nails driven up from below are essential, to guide your saw from above.

Skylights fasten to the roof two different ways, says the magazine. So-called self-flashing units are fastened atop roof shingles. For units that have a curb fastened to the opening in the roof, the roofing is cut back and the flashing fitted under it.

Luminous Ceiling

By installing a luminous ceiling, a windowless kitchen or bathroom in the middle of the house can be better lighted than the same room with double exposure to outside light, the American Home Lighting Institute said.

Partition Storage Solves Problem in in New Home

Homemakers with their backs to the wall over the storage problem may actually be very close to a solution.

Walls in the popular modern home with roof truss construction are not loadbearing. So why not make use of the space in the partitions for built-in storage?

Besides defining areas of activity in the home, partitions may be used for open or enclosed space for shelves, drawers and walk-in closets. Storage units can be arranged side-by-side or back-to-back to face into one or two rooms. In planning partitions, consider these pointers on storage:

1. Accessibility of contents. (Closets should be shallow enough to reach in without rearranging the contents. Pull opening fronts give freer access than door-in-wall closets.)
2. Location. Storage units ideally are near the place their contents are needed. For example, toilet articles such as shaving gear should rest in a cabinet over the ceramic tile counter surrounding the bathroom lavatory.
3. Flexibility. Adjustable shelves and drawers make it possible to adapt storage space to a variety of articles and help in meeting the changing needs of growing families.
4. Simplicity. Storage units and

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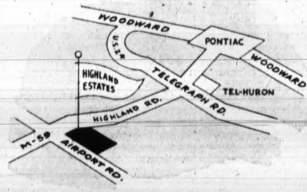
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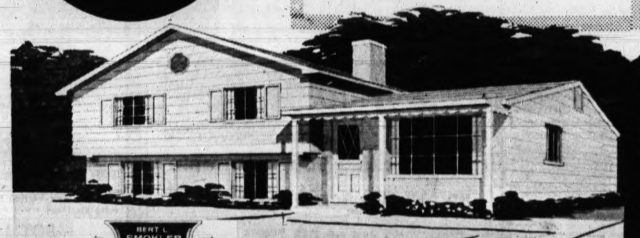
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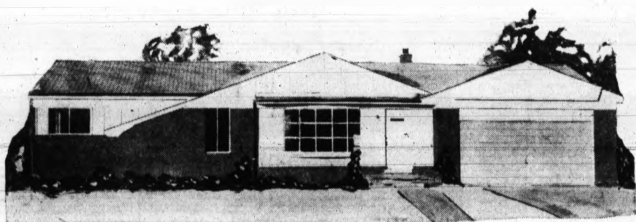
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Kitchen in Space Capsule Will Just Look Familiar

The would-be cook who can't boil water without burning it would have no trouble in becoming a master chef in America's first Space Kitchen, an experimental project under development by Whirlpool Corporation, St. Joseph, Michigan, for the Wright Air Research and Development Command, USAF. The kitchen would occupy one-half an acre 1 1/2 feet in diameter by 10 feet long within a space capsule is being designed to provide three space pilots with all the foods and beverages they would require on a fourteen day mission.

All the food in the refrigerator, freezer or overhead (airlock) storage areas of the Space Kitchen will be canned, dehydrated, frozen or packaged forms and will be necessary to prepare a recipe.

Even when foods require the addition of liquids or heat to make them edible there is no possibility of going wrong. Precise amounts of liquids, usually two ounces, will be metered out of an air-free water system into containers of dehydrated foods or beverages. Canned foods that require heat will be placed in a three cavity oven that automatically turns itself off to prevent over-cooking.

Furthermore, the problem of "what to have for dinner" that frequently plagues the terrestrial cook could never arise in the Space Kitchen. Complete meals for the three men on the four-day mission have been planned by Miss Beatrice Finkelshtein, who is in charge of food technology research at the Aerospace Medical Laboratory, Wright Patterson Air Force Base.

Aware that members of the space crew, like members of the walking Army will travel on their stomachs, Miss Finkelshtein has devised a series of varied, nutritional and appealing meals that would do credit to the most imaginative chef.

Included are such main course items as roast beef with mushroom gravy with raisin sauce, filet of sole, turkey, Swiss steak and curried chicken. Vegetables include "battered" string beans, green peas, corn, succotash and buttered beans. There'll be plenty of unusual breakfast items as well as a variety of fruits, beverages, pastries, such as french fries, as cookies and brownies.

Although the crew will rely upon expelling devices to feed

themselves, a matter made necessary by the lack of gravity which precludes the use of such utensils as a knife or fork during space flight, all the foods the space crew consumes will be familiar to them. So will the appliances they use to prepare it. The refrigerator, freezer, even the water heater in the Space Kitchen are being designed to resemble earthly counterparts, although they will be miniaturized due to space and weight limitations.

Keeping food and appliances in familiar earthly forms is of tremendous psychological importance, according to Howard J. Brehm, Whirlpool Space Kitchen Project Coordinator. According to designers of Libbey-Owens - Ford Glass Company, paneling the doors with plate glass makes the wardrobe a focal point in the room, and provides a full length view for dressing.

Placed at one end of a bedroom, the wardrobe serves as a divider, forming a semi-private dressing area. Where space permits, this extra "room within a room" can be made into a convenient sewing room or handy household office.

This idea is perfect for separating a child's bedroom into sleeping and play areas. In many older homes which have spacious bedrooms but no recreation room, the wardrobe can be used as an ideal place for children to play. The location of the wardrobe is important to gain the most useful use without sacrificing flexibility. Wherever possible it should be placed at a right angle to the longest wall in the bedroom to leave plenty of space in the sleeping area.

If building it opposite the largest window in the room, the mirrored door will reflect the light and make the entire setting bright and cheery.

Salt Saves Lives but Hurts Trees

Your landscaping may be the envy of the earth to you, but this isn't good if taken too literally. The salt that is used to clear your walks and driveway of ice, let me warn the winter gardener, is deadly to your plant life. This warning is sounded by E. A. Dahlgren, field representative of the Duway Tree Expert Co., who says sand, cinders and the trashy ones which are safer answers to the problem.

Common salt — sodium chloride or calcium chloride — is a highly acidic and often recommended as such. When dissolved salt runs rain or into the soil systems, it is likely to spell trouble for woody plants. Chemical ice-removing is advisable only when extreme care and judgment are used.

If you insist upon salt application, then, from the rigid storms, have a large quantity of salt in mind. Use of any salt will be readily apparent. If trees are located above and well away from driveway or walks, little damage to chemical ice-removing is inevitable only when extreme care and judgment are used.

Salt injury works in a somewhat complex way. It occurs through dehydration, sometimes called exosmosis. This is the reverse of the process through which fluids are brought up into the tree through transpiration action. Salt injury has a delayed action. It is usually noticed the next summer when foliage and twig growth may be stunted. Leaf scorch also is a common symptom.

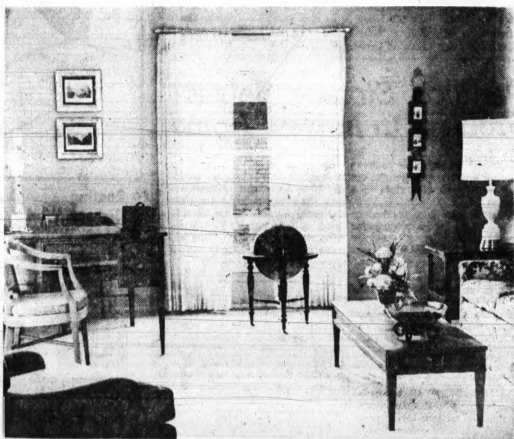

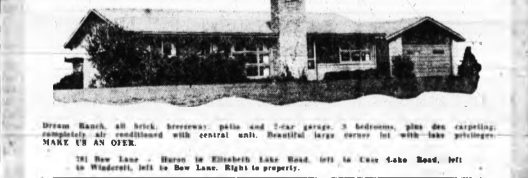

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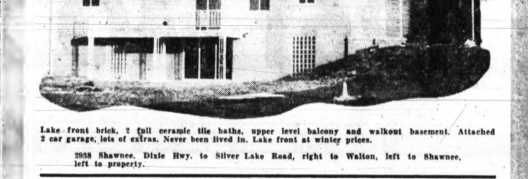

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—First glimmerings of Academy Award talk are echoing through the studios now that 1960's crop of movies have hit the nation's theaters. Last year the talk was all "Ben-Hur," the most expensive picture ever made. And the mammoth spectacle paid off with 11 Oscars, setting a record for a single film.

The year 1960 provided a mixture of epic and modestly budgeted "message" films which promise a spread of awards among many pictures.

Announcement of the five nominees in each category will not be made until academy votes are counted Feb. 27. But a poll of Hollywood newsmen already shows a greater diversification of contenders than 1959 provided.

Here with the best bets for nominations in the coming Oscar sweepstakes.

Best picture — "The Apartment," "Elmer Gantry," "Fahrenheit 451," "The Sundowners" and "Home From the Hill."

None of these can compare with the "Ben-Hur" extravaganza, but a couple of multimillion-dollar sagas may be in the running, too. John Wayne's "The Alamo" and Kirk Douglas' "Spartacus" may join the select circle of Oscar contenders.

Best actor — Jack Lemmon ("The Apartment"), Burt Lancaster ("Elmer Gantry"), Frederic March ("Inherit the Wind"), Ralph Bellamy ("Fahrenheit 451").

Best actress — Elizabeth Taylor ("Butterfield 8"), Shirley Maclaine ("The Apartment"), Deborah Kerr ("The Sundowners"), Doris Day ("Midnight Lace") and Lee Remick ("Wild River").

Two foreign actresses might surprise the local beauties in wowing Oscar across the Atlantic as Simone Signoret did last year. They are Melina Mercouri for "Never On Sunday" and Micheline Presle for "Chance Meeting."

Best supporting actor — Peter Ustinov ("Spartacus"), George Peppard ("Home From the Hill"), John Williams ("Midnight Lace") and James Whitmore ("Who Was That Lady?").

Best supporting actress — Ina Balin ("From the Terrace"), Jo Van Fleet ("Wild River"), Shirley Jones ("Elmer Gantry"), Donna Anderson ("Inherit the Wind") and Clytie Johnson ("The Sundowners").

Best director — Billy Wilder ("The Apartment"), Richard Brooks ("Elmer Gantry"), Joe Cardillo ("Sons and Lovers"), Stanley Kramer ("Inherit the Wind") and Vincent Minnelli ("Home From the Hill").

Individual producers and the major studios will spend the next month working overtime to publicize and advertise their pictures, knowing an Oscar means rousing their picture for an additional million dollars or so at the boxoffice.

Optimistic though they may be, the picture that carried the most money in 1960 was not one of the contenders. It was "Ben-Hur," and from all indications it will head the list of boxoffice hits again this year.

'Biggest Fraud' Faced by SEC

Charges Trust Firm Overvalued Deals in \$25-Million Case

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A federal attorney says the biggest fraud case in the history of the Securities and Exchange Commission is embodied in charges brought against officers of a Los Angeles trust deed firm.

Five officials of the Los Angeles Trust Deed & Mortgage Exchange were accused Friday of perpetrating a fraud involving at least \$25 million.

The defendants are charged with conspiracy to violate the Securities Act and the Mail Fraud Act by selling trust deeds which were not worth as much as the sellers said they were.

Four of the charged were arrested before a U.S. commission. The fifth was believed to be in San Francisco.

Frank E. Kennamer Jr., chief regional enforcement attorney of the SEC, was the one who called the case the biggest of its kind in the agency's history.

Two of the company's subsidiaries were named in the complaint. The three companies' accounts totaling about \$45 million for some 10,000 investors.

GUARANTEED TO PCT. U.S. Atty. Laughlin E. Waters said the complaint alleges that the firm guaranteed investments in what they called prime deeds of trust, yielding 10 per cent interest and providing income for life. Waters said such guarantees were made in advertising and in mailed material.

Civil court actions involving operation of the parent firm have been brought by state and federal agencies during the past two years. But this is the first criminal action.

Those arraigned were President David Farrell, Vice President Oliver J. Farrell, Comptroller Stanley G. Marks, and Thomas Walle Jr., an executive assistant to the president. Also named in the complaint is Frank Stark, vice president and manager of the firm's San Francisco office.

Bail was set at \$20,000 for David Farrell, at \$100,000 for Oliver Farrell, \$10,000 for Marks, and \$5,000 for Walle.

Robbery Suspect Flees, Recaptured

DETROIT (AP)—A handcuffed robbery suspect who fled from a Wayne County sheriff's patrol was recaptured two hours later today in the apartment of friends.

The suspect and his friends, the latter on charges of grand larceny, were arrested together.

Officers said they broke into the Taylor Township apartment to find their fugitive, Budlie Quick, 25, of Taylor Township, in the company of John Vail, 19, and his wife Peggy, 18, parents of a four-month-old baby.

Quick gave up. Vail admitted he had removed Quick's handcuffs, officers said.

Earlier Quick and two companions had been seized in connection with a \$45 township bus holdup. The road patrol said two pistols and three shotguns were found in their car.

Quick, though handcuffed, ran off, only to be found later in the apartment. The other two, Wayne Lincoln, 24, of Farmington, and Donald Lincoln, 22, of Dearborn Township, were jailed.

LANSING (AP)—Attorney General Paul L. Adams and Detroit Police Commissioner Herbert W. Hart will meet in Detroit Monday to discuss the anticrime crackdown of Hart's policemen in recent weeks.

"We will have a general discussion of law enforcement problems in Detroit," Adams said.

The attorney general denied, however, that he had arranged the meeting at insistence of State Sen. Basil W. Brown (D-Detroit), a Negro, who had written Adams charging Detroit police with discrimination and urging state action.

Adams said he hadn't yet received Brown's letter and the appointment with Hart was made some time ago.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and several other Negro groups have protested the crackdown, charging it had resulted in discrimination against members of their race.

Hart and his police have denied the allegation, although conceding that most searches and seizures have been made in predominantly Negro neighborhoods where crime has been most widespread.

Hart said he had not yet received Brown's letter and the appointment with Hart was made some time ago.

DETROIT (AP)—Michigan's mid-December unemployment was estimated tentatively today at between 233,000 and 235,000.

The State Employment Security Commission said this new estimate on the basis of preliminary mid-December figures announced a week ago.

Of the total, the Detroit number of jobless was set tentatively at about 130,000.

The new figure for auto-builders Michigan would be about 81 per cent of the state's full labor force. Detroit's would be 38 or 39 per cent.

Red Victory May Delay Laos Attack

VIETNAME (AP)—Communist rebels have driven government forces out of the jungle outpost of Ta Viang in a victory that could delay the government's counteroffensive against red-led Xeng Khouang, military sources reported today.

Ta Viang is a village controlling the approaches to Xeng Khouang and the Plain of Jars with its Communist-held air fields.

Military sources said rebel elements infiltrated the town and drove out a government force of about 1,500 men.

Military experts said loss of the village meant no concerted offensive would be possible in the "immediate future" against Xeng Khouang although Premier Boum Oun was reported anxious for military victories to strengthen his political position.

There were 418 fires in Waterford Township last year with an adjusted loss of \$155,586, according to an annual fire report by Fire Chief Elmer Fangbner.

There were 111 emergency calls with total runs of 412. Fire engines traveled 1,506 miles, and there were 13 false alarms listed on the report.

Detect Red Rocket; Man-in-Space Shot?

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A U.S. Air Force radar post at Shemya Island, Alaska, detected an object with "missile characteristics" fired from Russia toward the Pacific last night as the head of the U.S. space program said a Soviet man-in-space shot might be imminent.

As of early this morning the large area about 1,000 miles west of Hawaii.

Because the Soviet ships were not expected to reach the impact area until today and Russian has warned of a rocket shot, the Navy was inclined to believe the object fired last night was a satellite rather than a missile whose nose cone the Russians would want to fish from the ocean.

Other sources, however, felt the object was a missile.

T. Keith Glennan, chief of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, said in Chicago he would not be surprised if the Russians tried to launch a man into orbit "any day."

Glennan said next Friday, the date of President-Elect John F. Kennedy's inauguration, would be a "nice day" for a Soviet man-in-space try.

He noted that in the past Russia has tried some of its space spectacles to coincide with important events.

The space chief made his statement before the Air Force announced that its radar station had spotted the Russian object at 8:38 p.m. EST.

It was the first time the United States has publicly announced it had spotted a Russian missile in space.

In Moscow, the Soviet press and radio ignored American accusation of a new Soviet satellite or rocket launching.

And Viktor Bazulin, director of the Moscow Planetarium, said he believes the American report is "pure invention."

Second Integration Test Looms for U. of Georgia

ATHENS, Ga. (AP)—Students and faculty members at the University of Georgia today anxiously awaited a second test of integration in an atmosphere of mingled apprehension and reassurance.

The grim memory of recent rioting was offset to a degree by a promise from Gov. Ernest Vandiver that he would provide any forces necessary to prevent a new outbreak of violence.

At the same time the governor warned that law enforcement officials of great experience had informed him that "under such conditions exist."

In turn university officials said they would act swiftly to prevent any demonstrations when Charles A. Hunter, 18, and Hamilton E. Holmes, 19, return to the campus of this oldest chartered state university in the country.

The two Atlanta Negro students were ordered to remain at a federal judge in Macon who sternly warned that no action must be taken to expel them.

Judge W. A. Boyle restrained all state officials having any connection with the school or university officials themselves from again suspending or dismissing them.

Boyle ruled Friday that the university's "order of withdrawal or suspension is hereby terminated by 8 a.m., Jan. 14."

The two students were suspended early Thursday morning for the wake of a campus riot finally broken up by authorities using tear gas and live bombs.

Miss Hunter and Holmes were taken to their Atlanta homes, where they remained in seclusion. Both said they were eager to return to the university to resume studies started without major incident during the daylight hours Wednesday.

Police said witnesses told them the young men's car was traveling 80 to 100 miles an hour on Main Street when it leaped a curb and veered back to the center of the street. The collision followed.

The driver of the other car, Frank Balaja, 41, of Owosso, father of two sons, suffered a crushed chest, broken leg and other injuries.

Swanson Calls for Equitable Fiscal Changes

GRAND RAPIDS (AP)—Michigan must spend a billion dollars in the next five years, says Gov. John Swanson, to provide 25,000 additional school classrooms.

For every dollar spent on education in the 1950s two dollars will be required in the 1960s, the governor told the Michigan Association of School Administrators Friday night.

We will have to work to get these needed finances at all levels of government," Swanson said in calling for "the enactment of a stable and equitable fiscal policy."

He did not, however, spell out what his administration's recommendations will be to the legislature.

"The problem now revolves," he said, "around the achievement of a fiscal (tax) reform with equity, with fairness to all persons at all income levels and to business and industry at all levels."

"We can reach our education goals if we join our efforts in support of a revised financial structure which will provide adequate revenue for them."

Group to Push Local Air Flights

A campaign to promote public use of existing scheduled airline service will be one of the major aims of the Pontiac Area Chamber of Commerce's new aviation committee.

The committee, meeting for the first time yesterday, adopted a six-point program. Members pledged themselves to press for additional routes and services—including a Pontiac-Chicago flight, and expansion of Pontiac Municipal Airport under ownership of the city and county.

Other cities which fell below the mark were Port Huron, Alpena, Bay City-Cadillac, and Flint.

J. A. Hubbard, aviation committee chairman, appointed two subcommittees yesterday. The transportation committee will meet Jan. 27 and the airport subcommittee on Feb. 3.

City Falls Below Requirement

Group to Push Local Air Flights

"The program specifies cities must average five passengers daily over the 12-month test period."

North Central averaged slightly more than one passenger a day during its first month of Pontiac Airport. The company carried 41 outboard passengers from Dec. 1-31, lost number among the Michigan cities.

POLICE SAY CLUES SLIM IN DEATH OF 15-YEAR-OLD GERALDINE WILLIAMS

SEALTH HAVEN (AP)—State Police planned today to question a couple of suspects who look good on the surface in the sex slaying of 15-year-old Geraldine Williams whose battered body was found under an abandoned farm house Thursday.

But Lt. Fred O'Donnell cautioned "our clues are slim" and said the two in the questioned today may prove innocent, as did four who were questioned Friday.

"We are now down to routine police work, sifting and sorting," Lt. O'Donnell said. "We are coming down on by one case with a team of 12 detectives."

Geraldine was waylaid at a school bus stop Wednesday, abducted, raped and battered to death with a rock in the basement of a ramshackle 16th house three miles from where she disappeared.

Authorities in Ohio, Illinois and Indiana have been asked to aid Michigan troopers in a search for a dirty old car driven by a young man.

A strange car, a 1951 or earlier model Chevrolet or Ford, had been seen cruising in the vicinity of Geraldine's home for several days before she vanished.

When she failed to return from school Wednesday, her parents became alarmed and notified police. An all-day Thursday search resulted in the finding of her body.

Mr. and Mrs. Ward Williams, the parents, recalled seeing a strange car on several mornings cruising by their home about the time Geraldine was to leave for school.

Mr. O'Brien said two young men pushed him into an elevator of a housing project where he was making calls and forced him at knifepoint to give up the money.

First Civil War Shot Fired 100 Years Ago

The year 1861 was a time of crisis, a time of beginnings and — for the old South — the beginning of the end of the traditional way of life that had prevailed there for more than two centuries.

The year started with a series of crises as state after state seceded following South Carolina's lead. Excitement mounted when the Confederates drove the Star of the West away from Charleston Harbor with cannon fire when it tried to bring troops and provisions to the garrison of Ft. Sumter.

That was the first shot of the war.

The Provisional Government of the Confederacy was organized at Montgomery, Ala., on Feb. 4, and Jefferson Davis was inaugurated there on Feb. 18.

The country had two presidents (March 4) and armed men pointed on the rooftops along Pennsylvania Avenue.

The new President and his cabinet were immediately faced with the vexing problem of what to do about Ft. Sumter where Major Robert Anderson's little garrison had only a six-week supply of food.

After much debate, a relief expedition was sent there from New York on April 6.

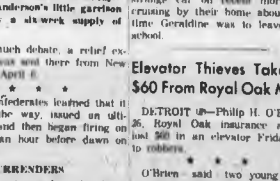
The Confederates learned that it was on the way, raised an ultimatum, and then began firing on the fort an hour before dawn on April 12.

Ward Ross has been building homes in the Pontiac area for a long time. One of his newer subdivisions is Watkins Hills. Here he departed from the one-story ranch home and built some tri-levels. One of these tri-levels belongs to the E. J. Walerych family (E. J. is more commonly known as "Whitey"). Early in September the four members of the Walerych family moved from a home on Williams Lake to this new one on Terrace Drive. Paulette is 17 and in high school. Barbara, at 9, is in grade school. Jeff, a white miniature French poodle, stays home and guards the house. His guarding is vocal, to say the least.

Double front doors open into a slate-floored vestibule. On the outside these doors are painted black with gold trim. Inside they are natural birch. At the left of the doors is a folding-door coat closet. At the right a planter provides a half wall with

bookcase on the living room side. Three black and white hanging lamps over the planter give soft light to the area.

The living room is a step down from vestibule and dining room. Gray carpeting is used in living and dining areas. Walls are gray. Behind the rust sofa is an oriental mural.

The floor length draperies are unusual: made of three panels, they shade from white through

gray to charcoal. Lamps are tall. One is aqua and gold, the other gold and white.

FOLDING TABLE

All tables are black with white Formica tops. The low coffee table can be turned into a dining table seating 8 and raised to any height. Normally it sets in front of the sofa. For guests it is moved to the dining room.

A second sofa on the wall opposite the windows is a

tweeds black and white with an old gold thread in the upholstery. A swivel rocker is aqua.

In the dining room there is a china cupboard built into the wall. The rear wall of this cupboard is ribbed glass which allows light to filter through to the kitchen.

At the present, the folding coffee table serves as a dining room table. The Walerychs intend to get Danish modern dining room furniture.

Aqua marbled tile on the kitchen floor and aqua appliances carry out the color scheme of the living area of the house. Walls are white. Curtains are white with an aqua and pink design.

All cupboards are natural birch. The breakfast set is natural with a gold sequined white Formica top. Chairs are white with gold lines.

In the recreation room on the lower level, all but one wall is paneled birch. The exception—a deep tangerine—is the wall

that can be changed to suit the whims of the owners. There's a sliding glass window wall at the rear, in the front are more smaller windows. The floor is gold and white linoleum.

A gray Roman brick fireplace takes up one wall. The high hearth is slate. A sunburst clock matches the brass fittings of the fireplace.

Near the fireplace there's a desk built into the wall with book shelves around it. Here the girls do homework. There's a brass pole lamp mounted next to the desk.

Most of the furniture is blond. One leather armchair is white. In the alcove near the glass doors is an aqua sectional sofa.

The house was built from a stock plan with a few changes. One of these was a fourth bedroom that is the future television room.

GRIR'S ROOMS

The girls have two first bedrooms with their own bath. Barbara's room is all greens and aquas. There's a green rug on the oak floor. Walls are green, curtains are aqua. Furniture is bleached mahogany with aqua trim. The bedspread is striped in aqua and green.

Paulette's room is blue and white. Walls are blue; curtains are a dark blue. Her furniture is limed oak. Her bed has a buckskin headboard. The spread is blue and white with a rosebud design. She has her own white telephone.

The master bedroom has its own dressing room and attached lavatory. The first two are carpeted in blue. The bedroom has blue walls and a white ceiling.

Curtains are a sheer blue with gold draperies at each side.

The white furniture has an elegant finish. Near the front windows is a blue velvet chair-lounger with a gold pillow on it.

The gold quilted bedspread hangs over a gold striped skirt. Blue and white throw pillows lie in with the walls. There are

gold and white lumps on the low square night chests.

In the dressing room there is blue and white rosebud wall paper. The vanity top is white Formica with silver speckles. The round wash bowl is blue. The attached lavatory is blue

and white. Conversation wall-paper is white with aqua and coral in the design.

The exterior of the Walerych home is pale gray brick and white siding. The double garage is at one side. The lot is about half an acre.

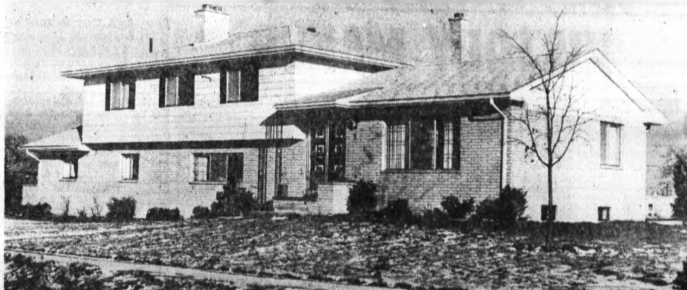
