DORM COUNCIL — HOUSE COUNCILS IN CONTROVERSY

Last week the Dormitory Council and the House Council crashed head-on into a major conflict over what policies the House Councils could and could not legislate. The controversy indirectly started from Hill House's P.D.A. policy in their lounge. The Hill House has been under discussion at two of the last three Council meetings. Last Monday the question arose, at Dorm Council's regular meeting, what could the House Councils legally legislate. The House Presidents were at this meeting and because discussion became so involved a special meeting was called for Tuesday.

Some representatives felt that a house couldn't make any legislation that would affect the dormitory population as a whole and that such legislation was entirely up to the Dorm Council. Other representatives felt that whatever went on in a particular house was strictly the business of that house and thus any legislation could only be made by the House Council. A satisfactory decision to this controversy has not yet been reached. At tonight's Dorm Council meeting it is hoped that a satisfactory solution will be made. (The Dorm Council meets at 5:30 in the Oakland Center--meetings are open to all.)
