BABINI, MISCHAKOFF, SMITH CHAMBER RECITAL, JANUARY 21

The second program of the Oakland University Chamber Recital Series will be presented on Friday, January 21, 1972, at 8 p.m. in Varner Recitall Hall on the Oakland University campus.

These concerts present cellist Italo Babini, violinist Mischa Mischakoff, and pianist Ruth Kolb Smith in programs of solos, duos, and trios.

The January concert will include a Bach chaconne for solo violin, a Brahms scherzo for violin and piano, the Chopin sonata for piano and cello, and the Schubert trio in B flat, opus 99.

Prior to the concert the artists will present a seminar for Oakland University music students illustrated by excerpts from the concert program.

Tickets for the concert will be \$4 or \$2 for students.

The third recital, to be announced later, will be on March 24.

"RACISM IMPLICATIONS FOR THE '70's" FORUM COURSE BEGINS JANUARY 24

Assistant Provost James Bullock has announced a new University Forum course devoted to "racism and its implications for Americans in the seventies."

Bullock says the course, which will take place every Monday in Meadow Brook Theatre, is also designed "to express concern about racism at Oakland University and to help describe the manifestations of that racism."

Designated as UC 004, The Forum will be made up of 13 guest lectures given by such distinguished black commentators as Charles Evers, CORE Director Roy Innes, columnist Jim Ingram and economist Marcus Alexis. The course is open for credit to all students with 28 credits or more, but all members of the University community may attend the

programs. The class is scheduled for I p.m. through 3 p.m. each Monday.

"The lecturers will be introduced by members of the University staff," said Professor Bullock. "For instance, President O'Dowd will be introducing Mr. Evers and Professor Karl Gregory of the Economics Department will be introducing Professor Alexis."

Other guest lecturers include Bob Chrisman, editor and publisher of the Black Scholar Magazine; Jean Williams, Dick Gregory's defense counsel; Professor Harry Edwards of the department of sociology at the University of California, Santa Barbara and Beulah Sanders of the National Welfare Rights Association.

MILLIKEN FINALLY ORDERS 2% BUDGET CUT

Governor Milliken has ordered a two percent reduction in all state appropriations for the 1971-72 budget year.

The move by the governor, expected since early fall, reduces Oakland's state appropriation for the year by \$186,300. The University had originally been appropriated \$9,315,000 for the year which began July I.

Milliken had indicated in September that it may be necessary to reduce all state appropriations by as much as three percent because of a potential state deficit this fiscal year.

In a letter to all university presidents, John Dempsey, state budget director, indicated that

Dempsey also noted that there was a remote possibility that the state's budget situation may improve in the months to come and that the universities might be given back some of the two percent already withheld.

The move by the state was the third time in two years that the University's budget has been cut in mid-year. Last year, the Legislature twice trimmed budgets because of a state deficit. In this year's appropriations bills, the Legislature gave the governor the authority to cut budgets back to prevent a state deficit.

OAKLAND OVER WINDSOR 106 + 88, JAN. 4, AS THEY COME FROM BEHIND

In the first quarter the Pioneers defense was lacking as Oakland trailed Windsor 13-8. The game picked up as Craig Coney, junior quard and highest scorer with 22 points, brought Oakland from behind. With a pattern of passing down and across the court, Ronald Brown, junior, lost his Windsor guard and also scored. Near the end of the first half Oakland and Windsor were tied 33-33, as O.U.'s Walter Johnson scored with 2:15 remaining in the first half. Windsor also scored cutting the O.U. lead to 2 points. With seconds left in the first half 3 quick baskets were made by O.U.'s Carvin Melson, Walter Johnson and Larry Walls, for and Oakland lead at half time with the score 44-35.

Oakland led the second half of the game with a 10 point edge over Windsor as the score was 0.U. 72 -Windsor 62. With 7:23 remaining in the fourth quarter, John Eley 0.U.'s second highest scorer with 21 points, scored a field goal to boost the scoreboard 75-64.

Coney them picked up the ball and the court was all his as he scored one field goal and two free throws after being fouled. Melson added to the scoring streak with 2 points and as the clock ticked away Larry Pierce received a pass from Coney, brought it down the court and scored with 2:45 remaining in the fourth quarter, Oakland was now leading 93-80.

Coney, with 2 minutes left to play, scored two field goals in succession along with a free throw pushing Oakland far ahead with 106 points.

With 46 seconds left in the game, Windsor's team had only 3 men on the court after one injury and 6 men were out on fouls.

The final score of the game was Oakland 106 - Windsor 88.

Oakland's win over Windsor gave the Pioneers a 5-4 season.

The game with Windsor was marked by numerous fouls. Windsor's Lancers showed some fine defensive plays but they were not good enough to overcome the offensive force of Oakland's Coney, Melson and Eley scoring team.

OAKLAND UPSETS WAYNE JAN. 5, BOLDON HAPPY

Oakland University's win January 5, over Wayne State gives Coach Boldon's Pioneers a 6-4 season.

At half time, Oakland was behind Wayne, 41-33. Oakland's scoring team during the second half consisted of Melson with 26 points, Eley with 17 points and Pierce with 12; their offensive thrust brought Oakland out in front 58-57 with 7:41 remaining in the second half.

With 2:57 remaining and the score tied 67-67, five quick points were made by Melson, Eley and Pierce. Wayne scored with 19 seconds left in the game for a final score of Oakland 72 - Wayne State 69.

Carvin Melson led Oakland's scoring with 26 points, giving him 270 total game points in 10 games and a 27.2 game average, to place 14th in the NCAA College Division Individual Scoring.

Oakland's next game is with Alma College, January 12, at Oakland. January 15, Oakland will play Aquinas at Grand Rapids.

SKI HILL IS OPEN EQUIPMENT ROOM RENTAL COSTS ARE LOW

The ski hill is ready now that there is a base of snow.

The ski tow will be in operation Monday through Friday from 1:30 p.m. until dusk; Saturday from 10:00 a.m. until 12 noon and 1:00 p.m. to dusk. Sunday's hours are 1:30 p.m. to dusk.

The use of the ski hill and ski tow is reserved for Oakland University students, faculty and staff. They may host their immediate family members without charge. They may host a maximum of two quests upon payment of a \$1.00 quest fee.

Each person (student, faculty, staff or their dependents or guests) must wear a Daily Ski Tow Tag. The tag can be obtained from the equipment room office on the lower level of the Sports and Recreation Building. The student, faculty or staff member must obtain the tag for a dependent or quest.

There are a limited number of skis, boots and poles available for O.U. people. Because of the limited supply, however, dependents and guests will be unable to rent equipment.

The rental fee for skis, boots and poles is \$1 per day on campus and \$2.50 per day for use off campus. There is a weekend charge of \$5 for checking out Friday noon and checking in Monday noon.

With Joe Weaver, special projects director narrating, the excellent documentary 'Meadow Brook Hall, November 2, 1971' produced for 'TV 2 Reports' will be re-broadcast Tuesday, January 25, 1972, at 10:30 p.m.

Weaver skillfully blends his own film essay acumen with the recollections of Richard Wilson, the surviving son. From nook-and-cranny peeks at the fabulous 100-room home, to vignettes from family albums and film clips of the Wilson's fine horses, the 'abundant life' is thoughtfully portrayed.

'Variety' of November 24, 1971 gave Weaver and the film 'good marks' for being "more charmed than awed" by all the baronial splendor. "T mood of the essay," says Variety, "is set as the first shot shows the Oakland University Singers singing, Waltzing Matilda."

Variety also credited the motives of Meadow Brook Hall to "continued use" whereas the other Dodge estate, Rose Terrace, "was slated for removal".

The Variety article was respectful of the humble beginnings of Mrs. Wilson and of her generosity "to Oakland University, home of Meadow Brook Theatre and the Meadow Brook Summer Festival".
