

For seven years now, the Oakland University Office of Student Success has planned an enlightening and impactful event in which distinguished experts share current findings and insights on fostering student success.

The <u>Great Lakes Regional Student Success Conference (GLRSSC)</u> – set for March 21-22 this year – hosts discussions on many topics including how to most effectively engage students in learning, utilize evolving technology to enhance instruction and support services, and promote growth and discovery outside the classroom.

The conference has grown to welcome more than 600 attendees from 75 higher education institutions and non-profit organizations from 15 states and Canada. In addition, the initiative has led to the creation of five new scholarships for conference

As a result of exceptional work in the classroom during the fall 2018 term, 132 Oakland University student-athletes have been named to the Horizon League's Academic Honor Roll.

the past season, completed at least three semesters as a full-time student, and maintained a cumulative gradepoint average of at least 3.2.
