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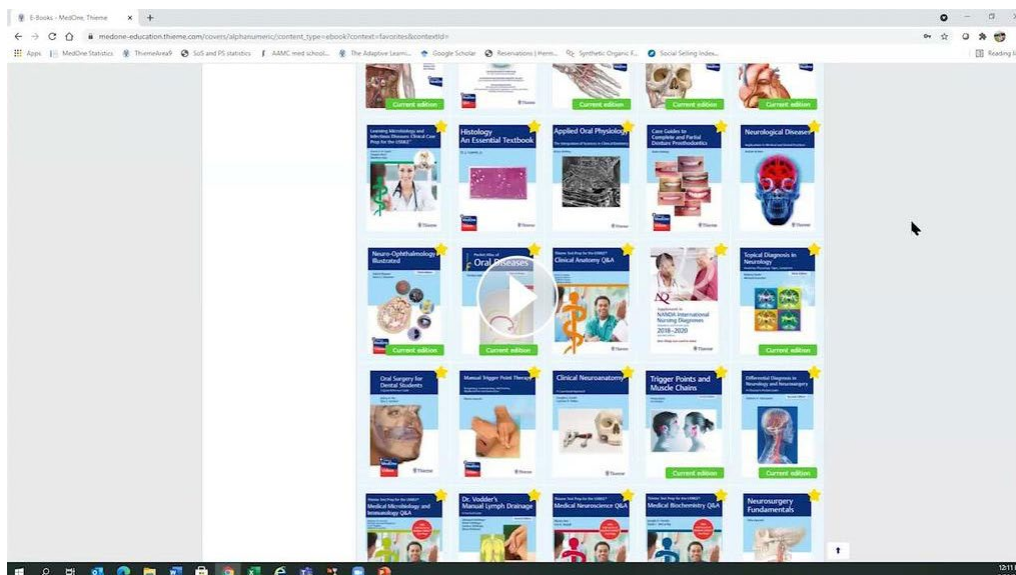

Thieme MedOne Education

In an effort to highlight resources that are useful to M1 and M2 students, this week the Medical Library is showcasing [Thieme's MedOne Education](#). MedOne Education includes titles in anatomy, basic sciences, clinical sciences, radiology, and test preparation, and it is specifically designed to support the entire curriculum from first year through residency. MedOne includes access to 125 eBooks, more than 60,000 images and 800 videos, and over 1000 multiple choice questions and answers related to first and second year student curricula. Here are a few notable areas to take a look at in MedOne Education (click on the links for quick guides on each portion):

- [MedOne App](#) - The MedOne App allows students to download and read e-books, journal articles, and watch videos wherever they are. Any title in the MedOne catalog is available on mobile devices for easy access.
- [Search](#) - The advanced search engine in MedOne Education allows students to find the information they need with intuitive methods, including auto-filling terms and results filtering.
- [Playlist](#) - Students can create custom content playlists so that all the information they need is gathered into one convenient package. This makes a great study tool for both incoming M1s and existing M2s.
- [Offsite Access](#) - While most of our resources are available outside of campus, MedOne Education has furthered simplified this process by allowing users to set up individual user names within the Medical Library's license, ensuring access to resources off campus and outside the OUWB atmosphere.

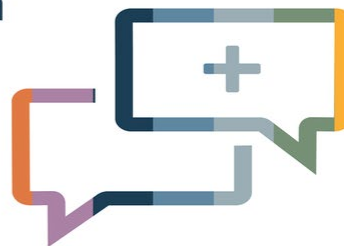
