TRAGEDY "OEDIPUS REX" IS MEADOW BROOK 'FIRST'

Meadow Brook Theatre is presenting a new adaptation of Sophocles' tragedy "Oedipus Rex" now through Jan. 27. Charles Nolte's updated version of the classic is the first Greek Tragedy ever performed at Meadow Brook.

Nolte is directing his own production. Set and lighting designer is Tom Aston. Ticket information may be obtained by calling 377-3300.

Members of the cast include Brian Petchey as Oedipus. Petchey trained at the Bristol Old Vic Theatre School in England, and he is a past winner of the Tyrone Guthrie Award for Acting. Creon, brother-in-law to Oedipus, is portrayed by Bernard Kates. The king's wife, Jocasta, is played by Shirley Diercks, the prophet Tiresias is played by Joel Brooks, and John Crawford is the Old Shepherd from Thebes. Crawford has been honored by the Academy of Motion Pictures for his performances as Sheriff Bridges on "The Waltons."

MUSIC DEPARTMENT OFFERS SATURDAY CLINICS

The Department of Music will sponsor a series of free Saturday music clinics for area youths starting Jan. 12 and running through Feb. 23.

The sessions are open to students of junior high, high school and college age. Clifford Pheil, OU's composer in residence, will direct the clinics. Clinic dates and topics: Jan. 12, string instruments and classical guitar; Jan. 19, woodwinds, brass and percussion; Jan. 26, music of the Renaissance and Baroque periods; Feb. 2, jazz; and Feb. 16, composition. A special clinic for pianists and singers will be held Feb. 23.

GRADUATE FELLOWSHIPS AVAILABLE AT U OF M

The Rackham School of Graduate Studies at the University of Michigan has announced the opening of competition for the 1974-75 Michigan College Fellowships. These awards are for the support of first-year graduate study at the University of Michigan

and include a \$2,400 stipend plus tuition for 2 terms. Seniors who are interested and feel that they may qualify are urged to contact Ronald Kevern in the Career Advising and Placement Office, 377-3250. The application deadline is Tuesday, January 15. Twenty-two fellowships will be offered under the program and up to six students from a single institution may receive awards.

Eligibility. Candidates must be qualified for acceptance to the Graduate School and the departments in which they plan to specialize. Students planning to enter the following programs are not eligible because the Rackham School of Graduate Studies does not offer degrees in these areas: business administration, dentistry, law, medicine, public health, social work and music.

BAROQUE ENSEMBLE PLAYS WORKS BY TELEMANN

The Oakland University Baroque Ensemble will feature the music of Georg Phillip Telemann Friday, Jan. 11, in a free 8:00 p.m. concert in Varner Hall.

The compositions by Telemann are a trio sonata for recorder and viola da gamba; a trio sonata for recorder and horn; and a cantata for the first Sunday after Epiphany. The program includes the Sonata in D for trumpet and strings by Henry Purcell, the Sonata in C for recorder and continuo by Jean Baptiste Loeillet, and a quintet for violins, viola da gamba and recorder by Johann Christian Schickhard.

HISTORY DEPARTMENT HAS SPEAKERS BUREAU

The Department of History has organized a free speakers bureau as a service to area high schools.

The roster of speakers and topics was actually compiled at the request of a number of schools where OU faculty have spoken in the past, explains Charles W. Akers, professor history.

Topics include "The American Revolution," "Black American History," "Witchcraft in Europe and Colonial America," "Chinese: How It Sounds and How to Write It," and "Foreign Policy and American Political Parties: The Origin of a Strange Relationship."
