Weary Senators Shout Approval of Highway Bill

Aims at 40,000 Miles of Modern Roads Over Next 13 Years

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate passage of the highway bill early today assured the nation of mammoth program of road construction aimed at coping with the ever-swelling flow of motor traffic.

Passage came after midnight. Weary senators shouted approval of the measure that would set in motion the greatest peacetime federal building program in history.

The legislation will give President Eisenhower a highway program of about the size he has been asking.

Both houses approved taxes designed to do the work on a pay-as-you-build basis.

Now, the question is how to divide among the states 25 billion dollars in federal money to be spent on the 40,000-mile interstate system under both versions of the bill.

The projected 13-year program network to link practically every city of more than 50,000 population with no-intersection, no-stop-light roads.

Also planned are by-passes around 50 major cities and inner-loop expressways in some cities.

All but about 7,000 miles of the system will be dual highways of more than two lanes; some will have eight lanes.

The House apportionment formula for the interstate system all funds to the interstate system among the states according to their claimed needs as reported to the federal Bureau of Public Roads.

ACCEPTED BY 55-27 VOTE

The Senate formula, accepted 55-27 there yesterday, follows the method used for the interstate system under the present federal aid law.

This gives two-thirds weight to a state's population, one-sixth to its area, and one-sixth to its rural road mileage.

Sen. Gore (D-Tenn.) said the compromise bill might include provision for a re-study by the Public Roads Bureau after five years to determine the actual needs of the states in completing their shares of work on the interstate network.

Clements Wins Kentucky Bid

Rolls Up Big Margin Over Chandler Choice for Renomination

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Sen. Earle C. Clements has won a thumping renomination victory over the candidate backed by Gov. A. B. (Happy) Chandler's forces in the Kentucky Democratic senatorial primary.

Clements, the Senate majority whip, rolled up a surprisingly easy triumph over Chandler-backed Joe B. Bates, a former U.S. representative, in yesterday's senatorial primary, thus adding the people's mandate to the power he wielded in the state Democratic organization.

Clements will tangle in the Nov. 6 election with Republican Thurston B. Morton, who captured his party's nomination handily.

Returns from 3,625 of Kentucky's 4,036 precincts gave:

Clements 204,994; Bates 125,184; James L. Delk 3,496.

Morton 37,748; former State Sen. Julian H. Golden 10,872; Granville Thomas 4,252.

Only last year Chandler returned to politics, after a tour as baseball commissioner, to whip Clements' forces in winning the governor's nomination over former Judge Bert T. Combs by 18,000 in a half million voter turnout.

Clements' primary victory also strengthened his party position. It handed him a bigger say-so in selecting a nominee for a second Senate term.

Chandler will name a senator to serve until the November election. Barkley died of a heart attack April 30.

Board Adopts Tax Allocations for Area Units

Millage for Townships Announced Following Public Hearing

After a public hearing yesterday in the County Office Building, Oakland County's Tax Allocation Board formally adopted most of the tentative allocation schedule drawn up at last week's meeting.

Uniform rate throughout the county for county government will be 4.68 mills, which will produce revenues totaling \$7,416,872.89 on the county's state-equalized valuation of \$1,584,801,900.

Maximum millage for township governments this year is 1.9, though most will get less and some will take no millage allowance at all.

Total millage allotments for some of the county's larger school districts are:

Rochester, 21.07; Birmingham, 27.82; Bloomfield Hills, 25.32; Walled Lake, 37.23; Farmington Township, 34.54; Huron Valley, 22.23; Pontiac, 18.07; Oak Park, 40.82; Royal Oak, 29.72; Berkley, 32.32; Ferndale, 17.42; Southfield Township, 24.12; Troy Township, 29.42; Waterford Township, 32.10.

All school district millages include building and operating millages authorized by voters in addition to the annual board allocation. Under Michigan law, county and township government and school district allocations together must not exceed 15 mills.

The County Special Education millage, authorized by voters three years ago, is set at .50 mills this year.

Most school district millages listed include variable millages ranging as high as 1.97 mills, which do not apply in all townships included in the school districts.

Whooping Bird Arrives in South

First One Ever Hatched in Captivity; Species Near Extinction

NEW YORK (INS)—The first whooping crane ever born in captivity was hatched today in New Orleans.

The new arrival at Audubon Park brought the total world population of the nearly extinct bird up to 30. The baby is the offspring of the only two whooping cranes in captivity.

Ornithologists from all over the nation had traveled to New Orleans in the hope of witnessing the birth, but only three men were in the right place at the right time. They are the first persons ever known to have witnessed the birth of a whooping crane.

The men are George Douglas, superintendent of Audubon Park, John Northcutt, head zookeeper, and John O'Riley, an ornithologist from New York City.

Douglas, who had been sitting on top of the roof adjacent to the whooping crane pen for several days and nights—with but two or three hours for sleep, announced:

"The mother is doing fine, and we believe the baby is doing well also."

The mother is a bird named Josephine, owned by Audubon Park. The father is Crit, owned by the U.S. Wild Life and Fisheries Department.

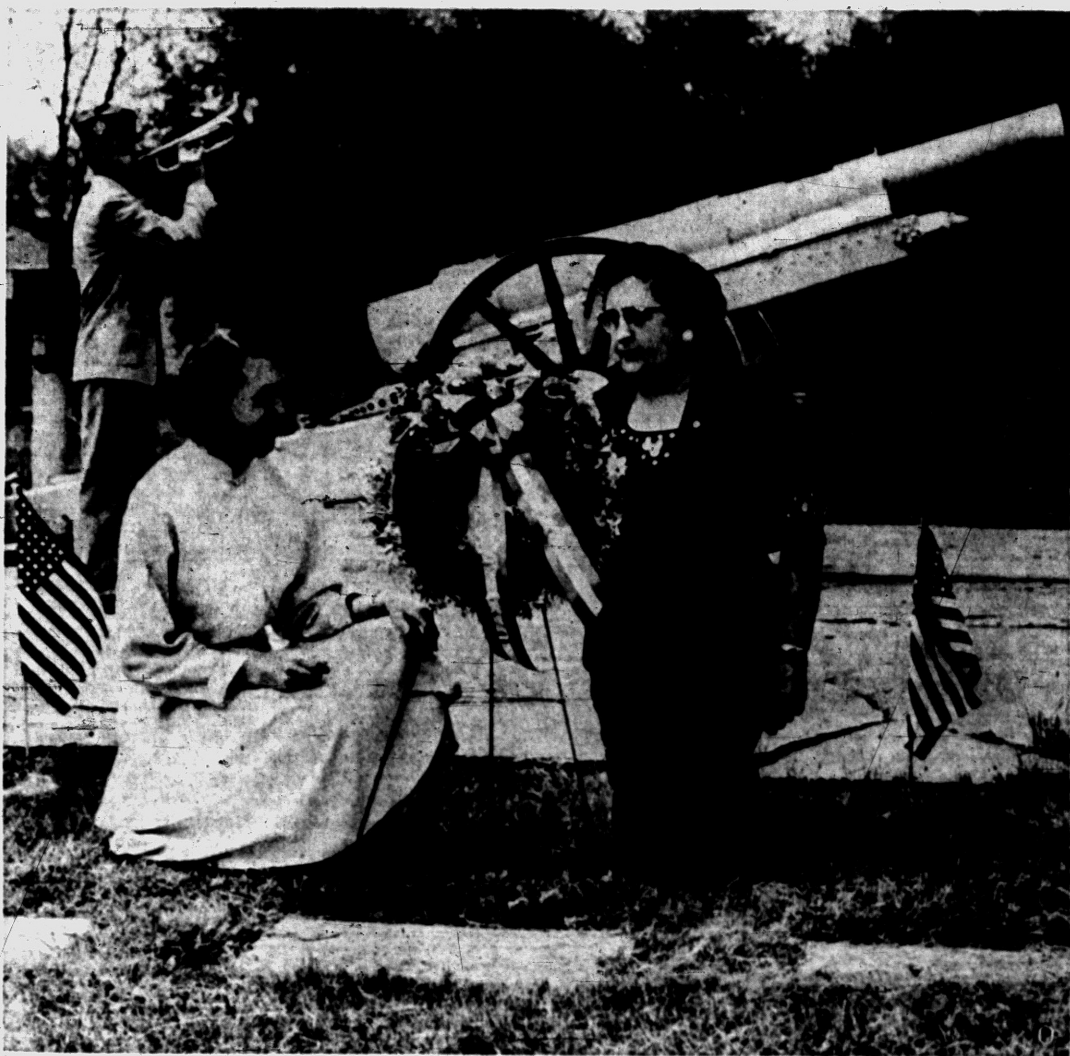
Cooler on Thursday, Weatherman Says

Aircraft, Auto Merger Seen

Curtiss-Wright Corp. Ready to Reveal Deal With Studebaker

NEW YORK (AP)—Wall Street sources say Curtiss-Wright Corp., aircraft firm, is ready to announce a large stock transaction deal aimed at solving the financial troubles of Studebaker-Packard Corp., the nation's fourth largest auto manufacturer.

Sources close to the auto company said Curtiss-Wright is preparing to assume control of Studebaker-Packard by acquiring a large block of unissued stock. Reportedly, the aircraft firm would pay 35 million dollars for 7 million shares of the stock.

The deal also would pave the way for an outright merger at some future date.

James J. Nance, president and board chairman of the deficit-plagued Studebaker-Packard, and other top company officials met here behind closed doors yesterday with a group of bankers from Detroit, Chicago and New York.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Nance told reporters: "There is nothing I can tell you."

Traffic Heavy in County, but No Tie-Ups Reported

No highway fatalities were reported in Oakland County today despite the usual heavy Memorial Day traffic on main roads of the county.

Deputies of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department had a heavy patrol set up throughout the area last night and were planning to carry on through the danger hours. They reported no tie-ups on county highways and traffic was said to be well under control.

The county officers were joined with state and city police, National Guardsmen and air units in an effort to cut the highway toll in Michigan and the country. The National Safety Council has estimated that 110 persons will die in traffic accidents before midnight tonight.

They urge motorists to start for home early tonight, with the most dangerous hours being from 7 to 11 p.m. An estimated three million cars were expected to be on Michigan highways.

The American Red Cross' Holiday Highway Patrol swung into action last night beginning the annual program of safety in heavy traffic areas in northern Oakland County. The program operates in the interest of safety on Memorial Day, July 4, and Labor Day.

Six radio equipped cars, each carrying two advanced first aiders, are patrolling the main county arteries in their effort to prophylactically aid motorists involved in accidents. Two stationary units have been placed near telephones in order that workers may be notified where they are most needed.

Clyde Norton of Lake Orion is patrolling the highways by air to notify first aid cars of heavily congested areas and of accidents in areas away from the operating cars.

Last year's three-day Memorial Day weekend death toll was 369.

U.S. Weather Stormy, Warm

Wide Sections of Nation Feel Tornado Winds, See Funnel Clouds

Wet weather threatened to dampen the observance of the Memorial Day holiday in wide sections of the country today.

More stormy weather appeared the outlook for areas in the mid-continent in the wake of tornado winds and severe thunderstorms yesterday and last night.

The Weather Bureau reported several tornado funnel clouds and unconfirmed twisters in sections of Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Illinois, Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle. No casualties were reported.

Thunderstorms rumbled across the central and upper Mississippi Valley, the Ohio Valley, the Great Lakes region and the Plains states. Hail pelted many areas. Thunderstorms also occurred along the Gulf of Mexico and in the Southeastern states.

Thunderstorms yesterday hit areas along the western slopes of the Appalachians from Ohio to North Carolina and others were reported in northern California, Oregon and Montana.

Fairly warm weather prevailed in most of the country. Temperatures ranged from 50s in North Dakota and New England to the 70s in the Southern states.

Kefauver Happy at Tight Margin of About 7,000

Voters Seem to Lack Interest in Candidates on Dem Ticket

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson emerged from Florida's Democratic presidential primary today with a close and somewhat hollow victory over Sen. Estes Kefauver.

Florida voters simply didn't care much—and showed it with a small, tight vote—whether they gave the nod to the former Illinois governor or the Tennessee senator as their preference for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Returns from 1,680 of the state's 1,778 precincts added up this way:

Stevenson 212,217
Kefauver 204,519

In the Republican primary, barren of any real competition, President Eisenhower topped Sen. William F. Knowland of California without trying. Knowland, on his part, made no effort to campaign or win.

GOP results from 1,346 of the 1,778 precincts showed:
Eisenhower 37,777, Knowland 1,888.

Stevenson finally wrapped up his squeak through victory in the early morning hours, in one of the tightest presidential primaries in recent history.

Most of the way the ballot counting was a see-saw affair, with Stevenson up one moment and Kefauver the next.

For Stevenson, the major prize was 22 of the 28 Florida votes at the Democratic National Convention in August.

But the voters handed them over with no great outpouring of enthusiasm, and a switch of a few thousand votes could have put most of them in Kefauver's pocket.

Both Stevenson and Kefauver already were in California to resume their primary wars.

In Los Angeles, Kefauver called the closeness of the Florida primary a "great moral victory for me."

Stevenson said at Vallejo he was "very pleased" at the outcome and "deeply grateful to the people of Florida for their endorsement."

Stevenson ran best in the four largest in population counties and in the far north and far south of the state.

Kefauver took three congressional districts, with their six votes (Continued on Page 2, Col. 5)

City Will Study Noise Complaint

Residents Near Plant of Baldwin Rubber Co. Seeking Action

The "noisy" topic of the Baldwin Rubber Co. on South Boulevard has once again been laid in the laps of the city commissioners.

Ten residents living around the plant appeared before the City Commission last night to describe the reported noise emanated from the factory as "unbearable" and "driving residents crazy."

The topic was originally raised on Nov. 1, 1955 when a number of persons requested city help in eliminating noise and dirt they said came from the company.

Spokesman for the group, Anthony Bellisario, 420 Central Ave., said: "People can't sleep night or day... there's noise 24 hours a day... I don't know what the people are going to do there."

City Manager W. K. Willman told the commissioners a sound test performed last year by the State Health Dept. indicated no excessive noise "at that time."

Last year, M. D. McIntock, firm president, said the noise and dust had been eliminated by installation of muffling devices and a system to prevent finely ground rubber from escaping into the air.

The city manager was instructed to re-investigate the situation and if necessary have another noise test performed by the health department.

Detectives Probing 3 Home Breakins

The detective-bureau of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department began investigation of three home breakins in Novi Township today following notification of the homes being entered from Novi police.

Various miscellaneous articles of food, steak knives, wine, a camera, cuff links, a tie pin, and wallet were reportedly missing from the ransacked homes.

All the breaks were believed to have taken place Sunday. The three homes are located on East Lake Drive. Entries were gained by breaking screens and windows, according to Novi police. They said a neighbor reported having seen two juveniles leaving one of the homes Sunday.

Post Office Loss Set at Whopping \$1,000 a Minute

WASHINGTON — The House Post Office Committee called on Congress today to face up to a \$1,000-a-minute postal deficit by enacting higher mail rates.

A committee report said the average annual deficit of the Post Office Department is running at about 600 million dollars. "The fact is we are losing \$1,000 a minute," the report said, and added: "The committee has approved a bill to raise rates on first, second and third class mail. The increases have been asked by the administration. As recommended by the committee, the boosts would add an estimated 432 million dollars a year to postal revenues."

Mayor Gets \$1,000 for Civic Auditorium

Mayor William W. Donaldson last night accepted a \$1,000 check from the City Federation of Women's Club for the Pontiac Foundation and earmarked for a civic auditorium.

The check was presented at the City Commission meeting by Mrs. Forrest Brown, president of the federation. Donaldson told his fellow commissioners proceeds from Sigma Beta and Beta Theta Phi sorority dances have also been designated for contribution to the foundation.

Commission Sets June 12 Hearing to Discuss Additional Funds Allocation

The City Commission last night set the date after accepting the amending ordinance by title only.

The following allocations will be discussed at the hearing: \$5,000, pay increases for the mayor and commissioners; \$4,500 city planning; \$23,205.34, equipment for the city; \$200,000, Public Safety Building; and \$9,743.14, hospital debt.

The hearing will be a prelude to establishment of the 1956 tax rate for the city and the acceptance of the revised budget from finalized assessed valuations for Pontiac.

Other action taken up on last night's 22-point agenda included the acceptance of a low bid of \$51,209.68 of the A & A Asphalt Paving Co. for recapping State and Osmun streets.

The work is slated to be done this summer according to City Engineer Lewis M. Wrenn. It is expected to be completed in September.

The commissioners also passed a memorial resolution in memory of Orrin McQuaid, Oakland County Register of Deeds, who died May 15.

Other public hearings to be conducted June 12 will include the following concerning proposed construction of sidewalks in the city. On Nebraska avenue from Franklin to Bagley, Melrose and Emerson avenues from Madison to Mt. Clemens, and for Cass avenue from existing sidewalk north of Wacker to Wisner Street.

Commissioners heard and accepted engineer estimates on the projects aired last night by the clerk.

No citizens were heard on similar hearings conducted on four projects on which the city assessor was instructed to prepare the special assessment rolls and report to the commission in two weeks.

Also accepted were rolls prepared by the assessor on two other projects. These jobs will be aired in hearings June 12.

Pontiac General Hospital Board Chairman William P. Babcock was appointed agent of the city in making applications for federal aid under the Hill-Burton program for help in the construction of the hospital addition.

Willis M. Brewer, chairman of the building committee, was appointed as alternate.

The commission passed a resolution authorizing the city to execute a quit claim deed to Consumers Power Co. for part of lot 12 assessor's plat 117. A regulator station will be built on the East Boulevard site.

Received and filed was a communication from the Michigan Liquor Commission concerning the reclassification of licenses as determined by the last federal decennial census.

formula in line with this study, he said.

Under both Senate and House versions, Uncle Sam would pay 90 per cent of the cost of the interstate system.

The House bill provides for a \$1 1/2-billion-dollar federal-state spending program over a 13-year period.

TOTALS 37 BILLIONS

The Senate version would be about the same if projected for the same number of years. But it actually totals about 37 billions because its authorizations for the three federal aid road systems other than the interstate run only five years; it carries a 13-year allotment for the interstate project.

The House voted to spread about \$14,500,000,000 in new taxes over 16 years to help to finance the federal share of the program. The Senate trimmed this to \$14,500,000,000 by softening the impact of a special levy on big trucks.

A penny-a-gallon boost in the federal gasoline tax to 3 cents is calculated to bring in the bulk of the new revenue. But the bill also provides increased levies on tires, tread rubber, trucks, buses and trailers.

The Public Roads Bureau estimates the new taxes, for a typical car owner, would amount to \$8.60 a year. But it could run as high as \$365 for a five-axle truck.

Hearings Are Final Steps in Intersection Changing

BIRMINGHAM — Things will be changed at the Hunter and Woodward northern intersection if a public hearing on June 25 does not alter present city, state and county plans.
