THEODORE LOWI NEXT PRESIDENT'S CLUB LECTURER

Theodore J. Lowi, John L. Senior Professor of American Institutions at Cornell University, will speak on "The Second Republic" on February 12 as Oakland University continues its President's Club Lecture Series. The 8 p.m. program in Varner Recital Hall is open to all interested persons at no charge.

Lowi is an internationally known lecturer, who is criticized by traditional conservatives and liberals. At OU he will discuss the changes in styles of political decision-making in the United States.

In his books and articles, Lowi has stressed the theme that elected public officials have, and often shirk, the responsibility to make difficult decisions.

Lowi is a member of the executive council of the American Political Science Association and a member of nearly a dozen other professional organizations. His seventh and eighth books are due for publication this spring.

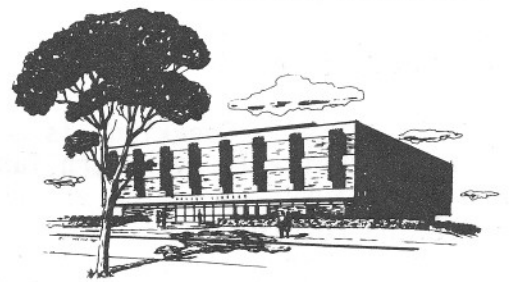

OU CHOSEN AS PROBATION VOLUNTEER CENTER

Oakland University has been chosen as the national training center by Volunteers in Probation (VIP), a division of the National Council on Crime and Delinquency.

Fifty people are enrolled this winter in an OU VIP training course. Participants are OU students, volunteers, and professionals in the criminal justice system.

The course includes lectures, field experience, and training through the use of 30 hours of video-tape cassettes. The cassette lessons include counseling techniques, management and administration, and examples of VIP programs conducted with courts throughout the United States.

Oakland University, through its Urban Affairs Center, will offer expanded VIP training programs in the future.

The VIP program originated in 1959 in the court of Municipal Judge Keith J. Leenhouts in Royal Oak. Judge Leenhouts' program was originally known as Project Misdemeanant. It was an immediate success. Over the first three years only 39 out of 357 probationers had violated probation.

The Friends also announce the recent purchase of a special collection of out-of-print Detroit City Directories from Kay Frank. This 14-volume collection represents city directories from 1837 to 1887 and 1904.

Professor Gregory has also presented a paper on "Budget Reform and Its Impact" before the Society of Government Economists at a meeting held in Washington, D.C. recently. He has contributed to several recent publications of the Congressional Budget Office. He will be rejoining the School of Economics and Management this September.
