

15 Workers Sealed in Burning Mine

Foul-Up Delays McCarthy Quiz of Sen. Watkins

Senior Democrat May
Not Be Able to Attend;
Time Set Back 1 Hour

WASHINGTON (AP)—A McCarthy subcommittee session to question Sen. Watkins (R-Utah) about charges against Sen. McCarthy got into a snarl today even before it convened.

The meeting of the Senate Investigations subcommittee was originally set for 9 a. m. (EST), but just before that hour word came from the subcommittee it had been put off until 10 o'clock.

And about the same time Sen. McClellan (Ark.), senior Democrat on the group who is slated to become chairman in January, said he had no direct notice of any meeting.

McClellan said he had a date downtown on other business and was going to attend it unless he got notice of the subcommittee session.

McClellan had no further comment for the moment but he gave every indication he would take a dim view of a session held in his absence without formal notice to him.

A little later, however, McClellan's office said it had finally been notified.

Aides said McClellan's plans were uncertain.

The office of Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) said Jackson received the notice about 9 o'clock and he would be at the hearing.

Staff members of the subcommittee said the hearing would be held behind closed doors.

The group, headed by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) wants to quiz Watkins about the case of Maj. Irving Peress and perhaps other matters in connection with the report from Watkins' committee recommending censure for McCarthy.

Watkins showed up at 8:58 a. m. EST for the hearing. He told newsmen his office had been notified by telephone the hearing would be delayed one hour.

But he said he showed up at the original time anyway because "I didn't want to take a chance."

He said he had uncovered some additional information over the weekend about Peress' promotion and honorable discharge and was prepared to give this to McCarthy's subcommittee.

Mrs. Ruth Watts, chief clerk of the investigations subcommittee staff, told newsmen she had tried this morning to notify all the committee members of the session, and had succeeded in reaching every office except that of Sen. McClellan.

Sinking of Nationalist Ship Brings New China Tension

TAIPEI, Formosa (UP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's military chiefs met today to cope with an emergency caused by the sinking of a U.S.-built Nationalist warship by four Communist Chinese torpedo boats.

Latest unconfirmed reports said Nationalist warplanes and sea-planes had picked up all but 28 of the 200 crewmen who were aboard the destroyer-escort Taiping when it was attacked early Sunday.

The Taiping, formerly the U.S.S. Decker, went down north of the Nationalist-held Tachen Islands, 200 miles north of Formosa, which have been under Communist artillery fire for several weeks.

Sinking of the Taiping was the third spectacular Communist move in the recent outbreak of fighting around Chiang's outpost islands. Earlier the Reds had heavily shelled Quemoy Island, 115 miles west of Formosa, and bombed the northernmost Tachen Islands.

Nationalist naval authorities pointed out more than a year ago that fast motor torpedo boats would seriously threaten Nationalist naval supremacy in the Formosa Straits.

The action of the Red torpedo boats surprised military circles in Taipei, even though it had been reported that the Russians were handing over these craft to the Red Chinese in increasing numbers.

Nationalist newspapers angrily demanded "massive retaliation" against the Chinese and denounced the attack on the Taiping as a deliberate Communist attempt to strain Nationalist relations with the United States.

Sheppard Case Recalls Other Crime Classics

Is Dr. Sam Sheppard innocent or guilty of the murder of his wife?

As Americans ponder this question during the intriguing Cleveland trials, a great reporter goes back down the years to tell of other murder trials that made as large—or larger—an impact on the American public during the last 35 years.

Sensations of their days were New Jersey's Hall-Mills Case, involving a handsome young minister and his young girl friend, the Snyder-Gray murder in which a plain, middle-aged New York suburban housewife helped club her husband to death for love of a persuasive traveling salesman, the Hauptmann trial for the kidnapping of the Lindbergh baby, Chicago's sordid Loeb-Leopold case, the fantastic Cincinnati murder trial of the onetime "bootleg king," George Remus.

James L. Kilgallen, who will bring these American murder trial classics into fresh focus against the backdrop of the Sheppard case, covered most of these famous trials, and provides unusual background glimpses at the principals involved.

Today he tells the story on page 17 of the Hall-Mills case, dealing with one of the most puzzling crimes in U. S. annals.

4 Navy Airmen Rescued at Sea by Coast Guard

Fifth Crewman Aboard
Downed Plane Killed;
Search Craft Missing

NORFOLK, Va. (INS)—The Coast Guard today rescued four of the five crewmen aboard a Navy patrol plane lost last night off the North Carolina coast.

A spokesman for the fifth naval district in Norfolk said the four airmen were floating in a life raft five miles south of Buff Point, N. C., when they were picked up shortly after 7 a. m. (EST) by a Coast Guard plane.

The spokesman said that the fifth member of the plane's crew lost his life.

The Navy identified the survivors as:

LT. Robert Lawton, the pilot, of Towson, Md.; LT. Cmdr. George Sanford Smith, Fairfax, Va.; LT. Albert Winston Funkhouser, Edgewater, Md., and Airman Apprentice Dimitrios Georgios Sotiropoulos, Washington, D.C.

Listed as missing and presumed dead was Seaman Apprentice Richard Zigmund Garienski of Washington.

All except Funkhouser are naval reservists. Funkhouser is in the Coast Guard reserve.

Two other fliers, who joined in the search for the downed patrol craft, also are feared lost. They were aboard a two-seater fighter plane which has been missing since last night.

Two of the four survivors appeared to be in good health. One crewman suffered a head injury while another had a broken leg.

The Navy said that the survivors were spotted in Pamlico Sound by a Coast Guard plane based at Elizabeth City, N. C., where the survivors were taken.

Meanwhile, a sea-air hunt continues for the two Marine Corps fliers aboard the missing search plane.

The Navy said it was not known why the crew of the Navy PB-2 were forced to ditch the plane about 6:30 p. m., yesterday.

The craft, which was stationed at the Anacostia Naval Air Station in Washington, D.C., was en route from Miami.

The F3D Skyknight Marine jet fighter, which was sent from Cherry Point, N. C., to join in the search, was reported missing hours after it was due to return to its base.

Polar Air Route Opened Today

Scandinavian Airlines
Flight From Los Angeles
to Denmark Inaugurated

LOS ANGELES (UP)—The airliner Royal Viking took off early today to inaugurate the first commercial transpolar passenger service between Los Angeles and Copenhagen, Denmark.

The Scandinavian Airlines System's DC8B rose from fogbound International Airport at 12:22 a. m. with film actors Jean Hersholt and Walter Pidgeon, public officials and two dozen newsmen, including this writer, aboard.

Shortly before the takeoff, actress Cyd Charisse christened the Royal Viking with the traditional champagne bottle. A reception and dinner honored the passengers earlier in the evening.

At 8:10 p. m. today, a similar plane—also likewise loaded with newsmen and dignitaries—will leave Copenhagen headed west. The eastbound plane's flying time, for the 5,900-mile "short course," is 22 hours. But the westbound craft, due to prevailing westerly winds, will be in the air about 25 hours. It is due in Los Angeles Tuesday. There is, incidentally a nine-hour differential between Denmark and the Pacific Coast.

One Killed, Two Wounded at Opening of Buck Season

At least one hunter was dead and two were injured Monday as an estimated 400,000 deer hunters opened the Nov. 15-30 buck season.

The first of a predicted 15 hunting fatalities occurred Sunday, the day before the season actually got under way.

Rudolph Franson, 47, Ishpeming, was accidentally shot and killed by a hunting companion in their camp in Marquette County, State Police reported.

Police said Philip de Gabriele picked up a loaded .22 automatic pistol from a table to put it in a holster. The weapon discharged, striking Franson in the neck, police said.

Injured were: Edward Aho, 36, Rudyard, who accidentally shot himself in the left hand with a 30-30 rifle in Mackinac County.

Vernon Langworthy, 19, Muskegon, who police said was shining deer when he was struck by buckshot fired by an unidentified person in Osceola County.

Hunters, who began lining up at the Straits of Mackinac Saturday in one of the worst traffic jams in state history, legally opened fire at 6 a. m. Monday.

Conservation Department officials predicted at least 41,000 bucks would fall in the northern Lower Peninsula and more than 26,000 would be killed in the Upper Peninsula.

Traffic claimed at least 20 victims, a home fire accounted for another, and two men died in falls.

Police today are hunting two bandits, one of whom was believed wounded early Sunday in an exchange of shots with their victim, James Willhite, 27, part owner of a 269 N. Perry St. filling station.

Willhite, of 830 Orlando St., said he fired four shots from his .22-caliber pistol at the pair as they fled toward their car after they took \$18 from the cash register.

He told police their dark colored auto was driven by a woman.

The victim said one of the men felt when presumably hit and was carried to the car by his companion. Willhite said he retreated back into the station and ducked behind a counter when the fleeing bandits returned his fire. One of the men, he said, was armed with a .45-caliber pistol.

Close Openings to Choke Blaze in West Virginia

Grief-Stricken Families
Awaiting Bodies After
Series of Explosions

FARMINGTON, W. Va. (UP)—Grief-stricken families of 15 men entombed by an explosion at the Jamison Coal and Coke Co. No. 9 mine kept a lonely vigil today waiting for a raging underground fire to be choked out so rescue squads can bring out the bodies of the victims.

All five entrances to the large mine, which recently had undergone a \$4,000,000 remodeling to make it safe, were sealed off with steel and concrete yesterday after state and federal mine officials and the United Mine Workers Union decided it was not safe to send additional rescue squads into the pit.

The 15 men, all maintenance workers, were trapped in the mine when an explosion, believed to have been caused by an accumulation of methane gas, belched black smoke and flames into the sky through the main portal and a fan house Saturday afternoon.

Howard Jenkins, a 38-year-old father of four children, was the first known victim. He was killed while standing in the fan house. The 16 deaths made it the worst mining disaster in West Virginia in ten years.

Officials said it may take days or even as long as a month for the fire to be extinguished by shutting off the air, depending on how big the fire was and how much air already was in the mine.

They will keep a constant check on the atmosphere in the mine by taking air samples at various bore holes to see when it will be safe to crack the concrete seals.

A big crane was used to lower fabricated steel plates over the top of the ventilating and hoisting shaft at the portal. They were sealed tight with concrete. The main slope was covered with earth.

Two rescue squads went into the pit through the tangle entrance four hours after the blast but were driven back after penetrating about one-quarter mile when their oxygen supply ran out. Two reserve teams (Continued on Page 2, Col. 5)

In Hurry to Get Home Army-Bound Youth Eludes Searchers in Stolen Plane

GLADSTONE (UP)—An 18-year-old Gladstone boy who had "foiled around planes some" yesterday flew a sleek stolen plane from Grand Rapids to Gladstone, giving several Air Force jets the bird en route.

After landing the single-engine, \$26,000 Beechcraft Bonanza at a small airstrip near this Upper Peninsula town, Darryl Spaulding calmly said:

"I just wanted to get to Gladstone in a hurry."

State police, who arrested him on investigation of at least three charges, including grand larceny, said he told them he intended to fly home for a visit and then pilot the craft to Detroit, where he was scheduled to be inducted into the Army today.

The plane finally was spotted by Fred Sensen, a private pilot, on a landing strip near Gladstone.

Police said he readily admitted the unauthorized flight. They quoted him as saying he had no formal pilot training. He was removed to the Delta County Jail at Escanaba.
