Lecture Series features 7 speakers

Garrett Hardin, an internationally known expert on human ecology, will present two lectures here September 29 and 30 to open the 1977-78 President's Club Lecture Series.

Hardin has been a champion of legalized abortion and an advocate of effective wide-scale birth control programs. His September 29 lecture on "The Limits of Altruism" will be given at 1 p.m. in Varner Recital Hall. The September 30 talk will be at 1 p.m. in the Gold Room of the Oakland Center. A topic will be announced.

The speaker is the first of seven distinguished lecturers who will appear during the year to speak on various aspects of the general theme "Human Values and the Environment."

A professor of human ecology at the University of California, Santa Barbara, Hardin has studied widely in the fields of genetics, evolution, pollution, and population growth. He predicts that people must practice birth control or face the consequences of social disorder, disease, and starvation.

The speaker's many books on the subject include Nature and Man's Fate, Exploring New Ethics for Survival, Stalking the Wild Taboo, and the forthcoming The Limits of Altruism.

The 1977-78 lecture series is supported by the Oakland University President's Club, a group of approximately 100 local citizens dedicated to the advancement of the university. Supplemental support for the Lecture Series has been provided by Dr. Frederick W. Obear, Vice-President for Academic Affairs and Provost, the Student Life area of the University, and the University Concert-Lecture Board.
