HONORS DINNER: The dinner in honor of all students who achieved standing on the Dean's List at the end of the Winter Quarter will be held at 6:30 p.m., May 1, in the Student Center. A special program has been arranged.

SEMINAR: The seventh meeting of the Seminar in Basic Contemporary Theologies will be held at 1 p.m., May 3, in 159 North Foundation Hall. The Rev. Donald G. Zill, pastor of Beautiful Saviour Lutheran Church, Birmingham, will discuss "The Religious Structure of Protestantism." Pastor Zill, a native of Ann Arbor and a graduate of Capital University, received his master's degree from the University of Michigan and his divinity degree from Lutheran Theological Seminary. He served for three years as instructor in religion at Capital University. The following week, Rev. Zill will return to speak on "The Ethical Nature of Protestantism." His second talk will be the concluding meeting of the Seminar.

COLLATERAL PROGRAM: "The Twisted Cross" is a famous documentary film on the rise of Hitler and Nazism in the 1930s.

LECTURE-CONCERT: Wernher Von Braun, director of the Army's space and missile development program, will speak at a special meeting of the Science Club at 11 a.m., May 5, in 156 North Foundation Hall. Non-members may attend this meeting, which mainly will be a question-answer session. At 2:30 p.m., Mr. Von Braun will give a public lecture, "Why We Must Conquer Space," in the Student Center.

A N N O U N C E M E N T S

APPOINTMENTS: James C. Haden, assistant professor of philosophy at Yale University, and Sol Schwartz of the University of Michigan psychology department, have been appointed to the MSUO faculty. Czetong Song, a researcher with the Association for Asian Studies, Inc., UM, was named assistant librarian.

Mr. Eklund and two assistants to the dean of faculty, were named associate deans, as was Kenneth Roose, recently appointed to head MSUO's division of business and economics.

Appointments: Mr. Matthews becomes associate dean for humanities; Mr. McKay becomes associate dean for science. Mr. Eklund becomes associate dean for Continuing Education. Mr. Roose, who will come to MSUO July 1 from Oberlin College, will be associate dean for social sciences.

Haden, 39, and a Kansan, received his doctor of philosophy and master of science degrees from Yale and his bachelor's degree from Haverford College. He previously taught at the University of South Carolina and at the University of Virginia. At MSUO, Haden will be associate professor of philosophy.

Schwartz, 36, holder of master of arts and bachelor of science degrees from the City College of New York, is now a teaching fellow in psychology at UM. He will be assistant professor of psychology here. He is a New Yorker. He has done considerable research in his field, including work on a joint project in schizophrenia conducted by the Ypsilanti (Mich.) State Hospital and the UM Mental Health Research Institute.

Song, 32, an American of Korean ancestry born in Tokyo, holds a master's degree in philosophy from UM and will receive a master's in library science from UM this June. He is a graduate of Dartmouth College. Song speaks six languages.

These appointments, approved Thursday by the Trustees, are effective August 15.
