Commies Now in Power

India's State of Kerala to Decide If Reds Rule

NEW DELHI (UPI)—Voters will decide next Monday whether to elect India's only Communist state government in the palm covered state of Kerala.

Situated on India's southwestern coast, the narrow 300-mile-long state has a steamy tropical climate and 14 million people. Half of them are expected to go to the polls to elect 126 members to the state legislative assembly.

In 1957, after India was re-organized into linguistic states (most Keralans speak the Malayalam language), the Communists took control of the government.

Although their vote amounted to just under 50 per cent, they won 50 seats and took control of the house with the help of five independents.

There were a number of reasons for the Communist victory. Non-Communist candidates split the vote in many constituencies and allowed the Communist candidate to win. Balloting was held over a period of days and a Communist trend in the first voting district apparently helped start a landslide everywhere. All voting will be held on Feb. 1 this year.

Finally, the Keralans, although well educated for Indians (the literacy rate is nearly 50 per cent),

are underpaid and underemployed. The biggest employer in the state is the coconut fiber industry. Educated Indians apparently prefer better ways of making a living.

The Communists promised to help the educated find a better way in 1957. The result was a resounding victory for the Communists that nearly tripled their house membership.

Under their stammering leader, E. M. S. Namboodripad, the Reds lasted until last Aug. 31 when a civil disobedience campaign drove them from office. After 48 days of rioting and protest demonstrations, the Communist government was dissolved for lawlessness and misrule. Since then the central government has been running Kerala's affairs.

Kalamazoo's Youngest Mayor Gets J.C. Award

KALAMAZOO (UPI)—James S. Gilmore Jr., Kalamazoo's youngest mayor in history, has been given the Junior Chamber of Commerce distinguished service award for 1959 last night.

Mayor Gilmore, 33, member of the Gilmore Department Store family, was elected last fall when he got the most votes among the candidates to the City Commission in his first try in politics. Kalamazoo's non-partisan city government chooses its mayor in that manner.

Ferris Board Asks End of Student Loyalty Oath

BIG RAPIDS (UPI)—The Board of Control of Ferris Institute has asked Michigan's congressional delegation to urge legislation to have the loyalty oath removed from the student loan fund section of the National Defense Education Act of 1958.

The board said it did not plan to withdraw from participation in the fund, however, if the section in question was not deleted.

Open Letter to the Citizens of Pontiac

Mr. George D. Eastman has been the Director of Public Safety of the City for approximately fifteen (15) months and during that time, the Police Department has made great strides in providing efficient and economical public service. Many of the policies and procedures inaugurated by Mr. Eastman are standard with the better police administrators throughout the nation, while some are even revolutionary in the police field, but each has been part of an intricate plan to overcome the chaos, inefficiency, low morale, low productivity, etc. which was present within the department at the time of Mr. Eastman's appointment.

Following is a partial list of the accomplishments of the Director of Public Safety during his tenure and, while not necessarily in the order of their occurrence or adoption, each is of equal importance as a part of the over-all plan to provide efficient service to the public and to elevate the morale of the entire department:

1. A Planning, Research and Training Unit, presently known as the Staff Bureau, was created in order that the many problems of the Department could be funneled to one unit for study and recommendation. One of the first projects undertaken was the specification for uniforms, whose purchase had been approved by the City Commission two (2) years prior, in order that the contract could be let and the members of the Department provided with much needed equipment.
2. Records were centralized in the Services Bureau for the purpose of maintaining honest and accurate records and improving the efficiency of our operation. This resulted in the reassignment of most civilian personnel under one commander and a re-location of office space. Many new files were created, for example, the Alphabetical file, where the names of all persons contacted by the Department are filed, and the Lost and Stolen Property file, which contains a complete index of all lost and stolen property reported to the department. These two, along with many others, were created since the appointment of Mr. Eastman. Prior to their inception, complaints, when recorded, were filed only by number and there was no file kept which dealt exclusively with lost or stolen property. It might be well to point out that with the inception of this new system of records, the Department accepted 16,470 complaints in 1959 compared to 4,089 in 1958, which facts tend to prove that prior to 1959 we were not keeping accurate and complete records, but in 1959 for the first time, we received a nearly complete picture of the crime activities within the City.
3. A Report Review Sergeant was assigned for the purpose of assuring accurate and complete reports with formal follow-up procedure when necessary. All records were made available to field personnel around the clock.
4. For the first time, personnel assignments were made solely on merit and accurate promotional procedures.
5. For the first time, responsibilities and authority was delegated to Bureau and Unit Commanders which went far in the development of leadership of many of the individual officers.
6. His policy or procedure was adopted without full staff discussion and approval.
7. An intra-divisional disciplinary program was adopted and has worked very effectively.
8. Preliminary work on a Department Manual was begun with the issuance of numerous procedural instructions and this work is continuing at present.
9. An In-service Training Program was inaugurated for officers of all ranks which was well received and attended.
10. A recruiting program was inaugurated which resulted in the hiring of personnel to fill vacancies and brought about the creation of a recruit training school conducted by members of this department.
11. The Patrol Bureau was recognized as the major bureau and the officers became generalists, rather than specialists. The specialized Traffic Bureau was dissolved and the officers reassigned to general patrol with the responsibility for traffic enforcement, the success of which is evidenced by the 50% reduction in traffic deaths during 1959. One man patrol, on a permanent shift and best assignment, was adopted with the result that more than double the patrol units were placed in the field and the officers became better acquainted with their sections when given the full responsibility during their tours of duty. Many items of equipment have been obtained and provided for use by patrol officers, including new police cars, automatic recall device, audiotapes, new patrol wagon, special notebooks, lights, availability for dispatch boards, revised beats, crime incident maps, improved line-up procedures with more spacious quarters, traffic enforcement bulletin to individual patrol unit, system of field interrogation, etc. which has elevated morale and enabled the Patrol Bureau to provide a more efficient public service.
12. A unique striking force, known as the Flexible Unit and consisting of a Sergeant and five (5) patrolmen, was created to enable the concentration of a strong force in any high incident area without disrupting the regular patrol units.
13. A Court Officer was assigned for the purpose of improving relationships with the courts and assuring that both complainants and witnesses are present on court days.
14. An Accident Follow-up Officer was assigned for the purpose of eliminating delay in the processing of accident reports and to assure that each accident is completely and accurately reported and recorded.
15. Four (4) civilian switchboard operators have been appointed and trained and are now functioning efficiently. This relieved four (4) police officers for field assignments.
16. A Car Pool was created for the use of unmarked vehicles and with the proper controls and the elimination of specific vehicle assignments, it was found that field personnel had vehicles available when needed.

17. The Crime Clearance Rate was raised with the advent of one man patrol and the assignment of Detective Bureau personnel as individual investigators, rather than teams, working day tours only except in emergencies, despite the fact that the department received hundreds of additional complaints which it would not previously have recorded.
18. A Jail Survey was conducted after it was determined that original design and construction was inadequate for security and recommended corrections are being made. The Jail section is still not operating due to the additional cost involved in keeping our own prisoners and the lack of personnel for this assignment.
19. A Bureau Inspection program was inaugurated with the thought of seeking out deficiencies and making necessary corrections. This is in progress at the present time.
20. A more realistic Budget was prepared for 1960, which marks the second year in a row that there has been a reduction in the overall operating expense.
21. A Deciphering (Liaison Detector) was acquired and an officer trained in its use. This is the first machine of its type in use in Oakland County and is available to other departments as well as our own.
22. A Manual Dictation system was installed in the Detective Bureau where there immediately appeared a marked reduction in the amount of time spent preparing reports and with practice the officers became very adept in its use.
23. The Emergency Phone Index for businesses was completely revised and renewed with personal contact being made with every business place in the City. This is presently in the process of being renewed for the second time and this occasion, a booklet on how to protect business houses from burglaries is being distributed. The booklet was prepared as a Public Relations aid by the Staff Bureau.
24. Items of radio, photographic, filing and stenographic equipment, too numerous to mention, have been provided for use by various members of the department in the performance of their duties.
25. Morale (Esprit-De-Corps) was elevated with the advent of formal promotional ceremonies, system of commendation, clearance of immaterial items from personnel files, opportunity for enrollment in outside educational institutions, recognition of seniority rights, assignments on merit, etc., which has resulted in a 40% less loss of time due to sickness. It should also be noted that the relationship between the various bureaus has improved and there is presently no petty jealousy and bickering of the type that was so much in evidence prior to the arrival of Mr. Eastman.
26. A pedestrian safety program was inaugurated during the Christmas season which proved highly successful.
27. All special events, such as parades, high school football and basketball games, etc., are policed by off-duty regular officers for straight time pay.
28. Books, covering all phases of police work along with numerous magazines and periodicals, were purchased and placed in a Police Library for use by all members of the department.
29. A program of continuous preventive maintenance was started for the care of all police vehicles.
30. Under the direction of Mr. Eastman, a state wide association of check investigators was formed to pool information on bogus and stolen checks. We believe this to be the first organization of this type in the United States.

It is our belief that with the advent of the above items, along with the many others which space does not permit mentioning, the majority of shortcomings, which were so evident in our service to the public during Chief Staley's regime, had been or were being overcome, but with the reversal of the decision of the Civil Service Commission by Judge Davis, it was immediately obvious that fifteen (15) months' work would be wasted.

It is our firm belief that conditions will get steadily worse if Herbert Staley is allowed to remain as Chief of Police.

Therefore, we recommend that the following action be immediately taken:

I Herbert Staley resign or be immediately separated from the office of Chief of Police.

II George Eastman assist in the selection of a new Chief of Police and remain until the new Chief is prepared to assume his responsibilities.

III After the previous recommendations are accomplished, the office of Director of Public Safety be abolished and the new Chief of Police assume duties as the executive head of the police department, as previously recommended by Mr. George Eastman.

AF's Missile Fails 6th Time

Seems to Give Army's
Nike-Hercules the Edge
in Merit Squabble

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The sixth straight failure of a Bomarc-B intercepter missile may solve a year-long controversy between the Air Force and the Army over who has the better anti-aircraft weapon.

A Bomarc-B veered off course shortly after launching here Friday and plunged into the Atlantic Ocean several miles offshore. The Defense Department said failure was caused by malfunction in the flight control system.

This could mean the end of the Bomarc-B program. A congressional committee has been critical of the missile, which has not had a successful flight in eight months. The Air Force and Army have been at odds for more than five years on the respective merits of their Nike-Hercules and Nike-Hercules missiles, both of which are designed to seek out and destroy enemy planes. The Nike-Hercules has a shorter range.

Publishers Warned of Higher Costs in '60

EAST LANSING UP—The new president of the Michigan Press Assn. (MPA) has warned publishers they face higher labor and materials costs in 1960.

Jack C. Sinclair, publisher of the Hartford Day Spring, sounded the serious note yesterday as editors and publishers of some 350 Michigan dailies and weeklies opened a two-day convention at Michigan State University.

He said the newspaper industry was "caught in a cost-price squeeze" last year although circulation and advertising income were both up.

The MPA president maintained that most newspapers sell their advertising at too low cost and that the cost of operation is advancing faster than the rate of income.

Sinclair noted that Michigan lost two weeklies and a daily last year. He said publishers who operate on a narrow margin face the same prospect.

To Push Michigan Week
DETROIT UP—William J. Trepapier, editor of Motor News, has been named chairman of the 1960 Michigan Week's magazine committee. He will publicize Michigan Week in magazines in and about the state. Michigan Week will be held May 15-21.

Remanded Back to City's Court for Examination

Eugene J. Thoun, 54-year-old ex-convict accused of robbing a Pontiac supermarket of \$9,000 last month, yesterday was remanded back to Municipal Court for examination.

Circuit Judge H. Russell Holland moved to have Thoun returned to the lower court where he had earlier waived examination.

Thoun was arrested by Pontiac police Dec. 18 less than an hour after Claire-Krump, 50, manager of the A & P market at 1185 N. Perry St., and a woman cashier were held up.

Saying he wanted more time for his wife in Miami to hire an attorney for him, Thoun, Dec. 18, stood mute when arraigned on an armed robbery charge before Judge Holland.

'Country Club' Hotel Planned in Detroit

DETROIT UP—A real estate developer announced yesterday plans for a \$2,500,000 downtown hotel.

Charles H. Gershenson said the hotel will have five underground parking levels and a swimming pool on the mezzanine.

He said it was designed to provide a "country club atmosphere" in the heart of the downtown district.

Gershenson said the hotel, 12 stories high, will be completed by the spring of 1961.

Women's Auxiliary Puts Light Into a Stay at Pontiac General

With public service groups like the Women's Auxiliary to Pontiac General Hospital in operation, a stay in the hospital frequently develops into a happy experience rather than a dreaded ordeal.

Daily, at specified hours, auxiliary members faithfully report to their various service posts with a smile and words of encouragement for each patient.

Of numerous auxiliary projects helping to cheer the convalescing period for patients at Pontiac General, two are the

Book-Mobile and the Aux-Mobile.

Offering a variety of free literature donated by auxiliary members and others interested, the Book-Mobile is wheeled around by cheerful auxiliary members, wearing the perky smocks which have become a trademark for these workers.

Mrs. William McCure of Illinois avenue is chairman of this project.

The Aux-Mobile (the prefix for auxiliary) features an array of notions to meet the needs or fancy of patients who otherwise might not have immediate access to such items.

Mrs. Robert McIntosh of Drayton Plains is chairman of this mobile unit which regularly visits the rooms.

One of the cheeriest corners brightened by the auxiliary at Pontiac General is the new play room on the pediatrics floor.

Activities of the Play Ladies and Story Book Ladies here are under direction of personable Mrs. Harold A. Tripp, who reports.

"The Play Ladies and the Story Book Ladies of the Women's Auxiliary are in daily at-

tendance to keep play hours happy ones and to bring comfort through love and understanding, to the lonely children."

Hospitalized youngsters often are frightened and homesick. They have found a mother figure in these workers who have caught the true spirit of charity embodied in the religious principles upon which their organization was founded nearly seven years ago.

SCHOOL CONDUCTED
A blackboard and work tables are part of the equipment in the play room, where a

school is conducted three mornings a week for children well enough to attend.

In the afternoon "open play room" is held.

For the less fortunate bed-ridden youngsters, a colorful miniature train, loaded with toys, makes regular stops at each small bedside on its daily run through pediatrics.

The evening hours, usually the loneliest for a child away from home, find youngsters not forgotten by the play room staff.

Just before bedtime, Story Book Ladies, also directed by Mrs. Tripp, make their rounds, telling stories which effectively pave the way to a sound night's sleep for the enervated little listeners.

It was through Mrs. Tripp's inspiration that a charming and well received idea was put to use by the hospital's obstetrical ward this past Christmas season.

Each newborn was brought to its mother wrapped in a bright red stocking.

For the "preemies" (premature infants), too tiny for much fondling, a smaller stocking was attached to each incubator.

The auxiliary, open for membership to all interested area women, has several additional service groups currently in need of recruits functioning at the hospital.

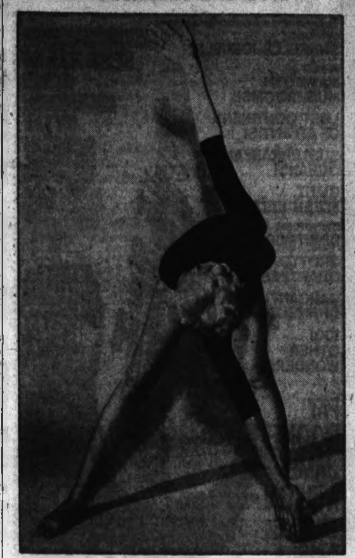

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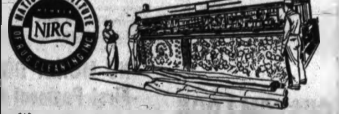

S. A. Skillman, vice president and general sales manager, said more than 45,000 autos have been sold retail since the 1960 Lark was introduced in October. He said market penetration rose to 2.80 per cent, compared with 1.89 in the same period of 1958.

CHICAGO (AP) — The price of traffic accidents in 1959 added up this way today:
Deaths 37,800.
Disabling injuries: 1,400,000.
Cost: \$5,800,000,000.

The National Safety Council, in totaling up the bill, found fatalities increased 800 over the 1958 total and disabling injuries rose 50,000.

While the council showed concern, it figured the two per cent rise in deaths was less than half of the five per cent gain in motor vehicle mileage.

Travel was estimated at a record-breaking 659 million miles in 1959.

The mileage death rate—the number of deaths per 100 million vehicle miles—was calculated at 5.4 per cent, the lowest in the nation's history.

Another hopeful factor was a break in the upward trend in motor vehicle deaths from August through November. The record toll is 59,969. It was set in 1941.

**U.S. Imports Reach
All-Time High Mark**

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Commerce Department reported today that U.S. imports reached an all-time high of \$15,212,300,000 in 1959, an increase of 19 per cent over the previous year.

The department said the December totals of imports also hit a new peak of \$1,477,800,000—about

13 per cent higher than the November figure.

This was the highest monthly figure on record, surpassing the previous total of \$1,322,100,000 reported in September.

The department said the increase in imports came in nearly all categories of goods brought into this country.

Noticeable rises occurred in imports of metals, machinery and vehicles, manufactured goods, textiles, inedible vegetable products, wood and paper.

The only category which showed a decline in 1959 was vegetable food products and beverages.

ROME (UPI) — Italy has announced plans to build the biggest telescope in Europe.

The telescope, with a diameter of about three meters (10 feet), will take three years to build and cost an estimated \$3,200,000.

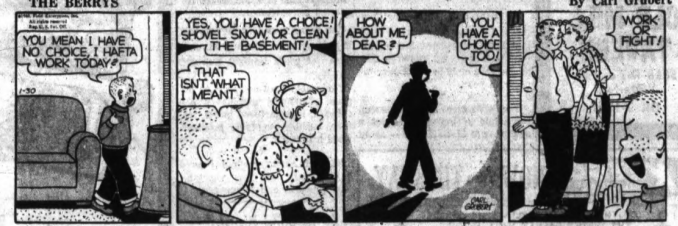

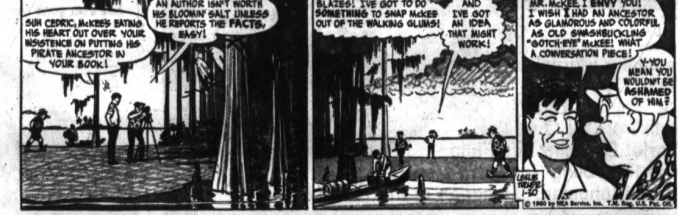

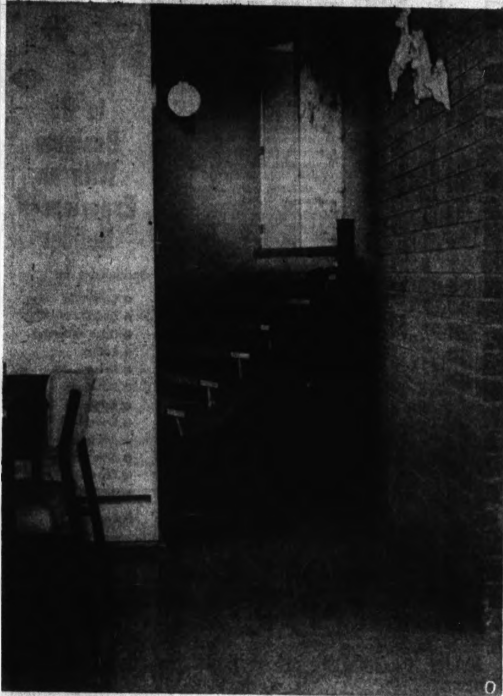

Don't Hide the Hi-Fi Set

Newest trend in furnishing with high fidelity equipment is to put the instruments on display instead of out of sight. Until recently, high fidelity was a decorating headache. The choice was between a sizeable console radio-phonograph or, for the discriminating who prefer components, a custom installation with equipment behind doors or in drawers.

Americans Enjoy Trading In Homes

About a third of all families interested in new homes might enter the market earlier if they could trade their equities in, a study made at Stanford University's Graduate School of Business has disclosed.

The study showed that nearly all families that have traded houses are satisfied and would trade again, and that the typical American family interested in trading consists of a couple between 30 and 40 years old with two or three children.

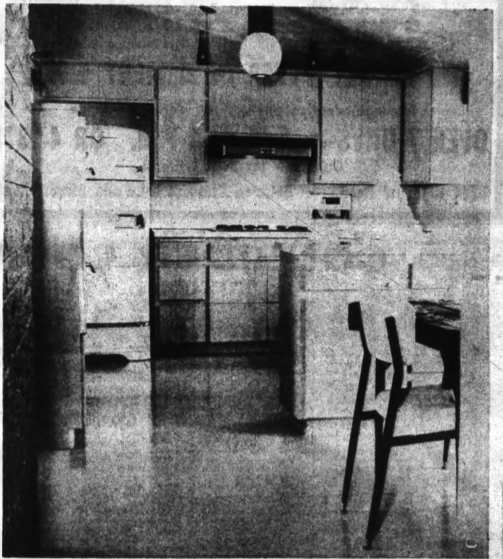

Mills' Use Pontiac Press Plan

Starting with a Pontiac Press plan, the Donald Mills family modified it slightly to suit their tastes, then had K. W. Mills, Inc. of Royal Oak build a house from this plan.

The Mills live on Northover drive in Northover Farms, a subdivision in the Adams-Long Lake road area. Their lot is on a curve in the road so is irregularly shaped. They have 150 feet on the front.

Fifteen-year-old Sue and eight-year-old Randy share this pink tri-level home. The exterior of the house combines brick and siding. Trim is black. There's a pink brick wall on one side of the drive.

On the living level which is the middle one there are few dividing walls. Right in the center of this level is a gray

brick chimney. The fireplace opens into the family room. The raised hearth is plain gray stone.

Ceilings on this level are cathedral type. A black beam runs through the center. The floor in the family room is cork-tile, while in the kitchen it is beige linoleum.

On the west the window wall opens onto a patio. Three walls are beige, but the one on the north is driftwood. Draperies are beige with a black and gold design.

This room has two red plastic covered sofas. The one lounge chair with matching footstool is avocado. Near the kitchen is a black slatted bench.

The kitchen in this house is located at the front. Walls and Formica counter tops are pink. No one could ask for more side-

quite cupboard space, says Mrs. Mills. All the cabinets are finished in a pale beige tone.

Two features not always found in kitchens are a boiling water faucet and an intercom system.

DINETTE

On the long windows in the dinette area there is a black matchstick bamboo shade with pink squiggles all over it. The breakfast set is pink and black. There is a modern black clock mounted on the paneled wall which has a design of black Chinese lanterns on beige.

Behind the kitchen is a utility room and a half bath. Both are done in shades of pink.

The Mills' are fond of Oriental decorations. On the chimney there are some scrolls. In the

If you want the piano to be the center of attention in a living room, try a baby grand. If you live in an apartment, you might choose a small upright. A large upright serves as a room divider.

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Closets Often Waste Space

Most closets are "space wasters."

The shelf and clothes rod in most closets are about 66 inches above the floor, and the bottom 24 to 30 inches is left unused because most families have few items that need more than four feet of vertical hanging space.

Men's coats need only 36 inches; men's trousers only 48 inches; children's clothes less than 36 inches, and women's dresses about 66 inches. Although some families may put some type of shoe rack at the bottom of the closet, valuable space still is going to waste.

Architects and builders have become aware of this problem since homeowners want as much storage space as possible. In some homes many builders are using the Massillon Panelok system in all closets to double storage capacity.

Key to this system is the wall structure, which consists of slotted hardboard panels two feet wide, with metal lockstrips separating them. The lockstrips, perforated at one-inch intervals, provide support for a variety of decorative shelf and wall accessories.

Adjustable coat and shoe racks, storage shelves, hat racks, skirt and pants hangers, and plastic drawer units permit full use of all closet space. Wasted space is eliminated because the accessories can be moved to make maximum use of all wall space.

Additional storage space can be included in old closets by lining the walls and the back of the door with Peg Board, which provides support for a wide variety of fixtures and hooks.

Shelves can be mounted in the closet, while coat, hat and shoe racks can be positioned on the back of the door if it is covered with the perforated hardboard.

Pipes Protect Patio, Pool From Ice Damage

Freezing, thawing, and underground "hydrostatic" pressure are forces which will crack and buckle a patio. Water, the root of all these evils, can be lead off where it will do no harm by an inexpensive pipeline during construction.

The pipeline is constructed of perforated black fibre pipe made with twin rows of small 5/16-inch holes. Laid at a slight angle, the pipes collect unwanted water and lead it to a dry well.

Swimming pools are protected against freezing by floating logs in the water near the edge. Patios, walks, driveways, garage aprons, and other areas need protection too. When installed at time of construction, the cost of protecting your patio against cracking is negligible.

For effective protection, regardless of the depth of frost line in your area, the pipeline may be placed at a depth of about one foot. The type of soil and its drainage characteristics will determine how far apart to space drainage lines.

For best results the pipe should be laid in a bed of gravel or crushed stone. Pipe is laid with holes placed down so they will not become clogged. A surface drain

Small Decrease in Nov. Building

DETROIT—November contracts for future construction in Michigan totaled \$64,639,000, a decrease of 25 per cent compared to November 1958. Marvin J. Brokaw, district manager of F. W. Dodge Corporation reported today.

A breakdown of contracts by the major construction categories in November compared to the corresponding 1958 month, showed: non-residential at \$30,167,000, up 34 per cent; residential at \$28,804,000 down 35 per cent; and heavy engineering at \$5,668,000, down 76 per cent.

According to Dodge figures, the cumulative total of contracts for the first eleven months of 1959 amounted to \$1,280,150,000, up 3 per cent compared to the corresponding period of 1958.

Here's the Answer

QUESTION: Can you tell me how to remove whitewash from poured concrete walls?

ANSWER: It can be washed off the hot water and a stiff brush. With a stubborn case, you may have to do the job twice.

QUESTION: I would like to put down a small brick walk. Can the bricks be laid right in the soil or must they be set in mortar or sand?

ANSWER: They can be set in sand, which should be placed in earth that has been tamped down. The sand foundation should be about two inches deep.

QUESTION: We have a bookcase that was shelved several years ago. There are several white spots on the top shelf, possibly caused by water glasses placed there. How can the spots be removed?

ANSWER: Wipe the spots gently with a cloth dampened with denatured alcohol. Don't rub too hard or you may take off part of the finish, in which case you would have to apply another coat

of shellac. You can prevent future trouble of that nature by applying some paste wax to the top of the bookcase.

QUESTION: My husband wants to use steel wool to clean the surface of our electric iron. Is this all right?

ANSWER: Yes. Steel wool is fine for this purpose.

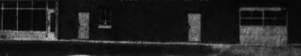

Choose Wood You Like Best

CHICAGO (UPI)—Puzzled about the type of wood to choose for furniture? The Fine Hardware Association recommends six types of hardwoods.

Here are descriptions of the woods and a guide to their use: Birch and Maple—the natural blonde adapt well to lighter-toned modern furniture. Strong, satiny-smooth birch also is good in warm, brown tones for provincial pieces. Maple, which is extremely hard, makes sturdy furniture for children.

Oak—Durable enough for flooring, it is sometimes used, with a warm grain and more texture than other woods. Used in boys' bedrooms or dens, it can give the suburban home a "country estate" air.

Cherry—The only true hardwood now in general use ranges from a tawny tone to a soft brown in its natural state. Its inconspicuous grain and subtle figure pattern make it an excellent choice for the single "important" piece. Long used in provincial furniture, cherry recently has been styled into sleek modern lines.

Mahogany—The aristocrat of the hardwoods radiates a look of quiet luxury. Because it often is limited, care should be taken to determine its authenticity, whether in a single prestige piece or full dining set. In the past, mahogany was generally deep red, but today it comes in a wide range of contemporary browns and beiges.

Walnut—Most versatile of the hardwoods, it takes to almost any design. Neither fine nor coarse grained, it's suitable for any room. The natural color spans of walnut ranges from light grey-brown to a rich, dark tone.

Modern Ranch Home Fits Narrow Lot Easily

By DAVID L. BOWEN

Designing a modern house for a narrow lot is one of the toughest problems facing an architect. Years ago narrow bungalows were the most common type of family home built in many sections of the United States. Now, however, the "modern look" almost invariably demands that the home's longest dimension be front side.

X-95 in the House of the Week Series is one of the exceptions to this rule. Its gable end is to the front, but the stigma of out-dated architectural style is swiftly removed and the switch made an advantage by numerous details.

Main elements creating the pleasing modern effect are the dramatic window rising all the way to the roof beams, the low pitch of the roof and the wide roof overhang.

Just as modern inside as out, X-95 has sloping ceilings in all principal rooms except kitchen and family room. This enhances the modern theme and provides a feeling of spaciousness throughout the house.

Under many zoning ordinances, the house without garage would fit on a 20-foot lot since width of the main structure is only 48'4". Including breezeway and garage, width is 48'4", which would require a 60 or 65-foot lot, depending upon local rules.

Architect Herman H. York provided three bedrooms in a plan covering 1,743 square feet, with a large front living room, separate dining room, and family room adjoining kitchen and opening on a well-shielded side terrace. Basement offers ample room for a recreation room, laundry and workshop.

ADDITIONAL DETAILS

Breezeway patio solves one of the basic problems of a narrow-front house: how to create a graceful, attractive entrance. A convenient closet fills one side of the entrance vestibule, which leads traffic into the living room.

Sloping ceiling, fireplace, high window and lever screen give the living room distinction. Dining room, with an attractive cantilevered bay, connects with the living room through arched opening at fireplace end.

The big family room and kitchen are laid out in an "L" with breakfast bar marking the division and set at an angle. Sliding glass doors lead to the side terrace, which is shielded on one side by the house, on the front by the garage, and on the second side by storage closets and a wooden fence. It is open only to the rear.

Maximum use of available space is illustrated in the kitchen by the unusual partition, formed by placing sliding doors in front of shelves only 6 inches deep. Ordinarily wasted, this space inside a partition is entirely adequate for storage of canned goods.

The three bedrooms are served by a rear hall. The main bath is compartmentalized, with a second lavatory in the forward section. The master bedroom has a dressing alcove and a private bath with corner tub.

A combination of brick veneer and boards and battens gives the house a well-balanced exterior. Plant areas of brick added accent and interest.

Building plans were engineered to employ standard size lumber to eliminate cutting and waste.

X-95 Statistics

This home contains 1,743 square feet of habitable area, with three bedrooms, living room, dining room, family room, kitchen and two full baths.

Basement is called for in plans but the home could be constructed on a slab foundation. The over-all dimensions are 48'4" in width by 60'8" in depth.

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WORKING WALL.—Thank-you notes and letters are easy to write at this pleasant desk, which has convenient storage cabinets underneath for stationery, checkbook, and other paraphernalia. Actually a home office, this neat arrangement for correspondence or budget "conferences" is a real space saver. The desk, shelves, and even the flower pots and pictures

in the background can be moved easily, since they are mounted on a Mascoite Panellok wall. Key to this "working wall" are the grooved hardwood panels two feet wide, with slotted metal lockstrips separating them. The lockstrips provide support for the fixtures, which can be fastened to perforations at any level on the wall.

**Slab Roof Economical,
Has Many Advantages**

A new structural system for residential roofs developed by a number of western architects may well change the national concept of home design in the future, as well as cut home construction costs.

The new roof is a solid slab of wood made up of 2x4s nailed together with the narrow edge exposed. The underside of the slab becomes the ceiling of the home. The top side needs only a layer of roofing paper and shingles to make a complete roof.

The roof can be made of rough sawn or surfaced 2x4s. They can be either Douglas fir or west coast hemlock. They can also be lower grades of utility fir or hemlock because stiffness is the quality most needed in this roof system and the lower grade 2x4 has good stiffness.

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We get a beautiful ceiling with good texture and virtually no upkeep. This ceiling can be left raw so that the wood takes on a golden color as it ages, or it can be stained. One coat of stain should be good for many years.

This roof of four inches of solid wood has good insulation qualities to keep summer heat out and winter heat in. Several insulated roofing papers and patterns are on the market which can be laid directly on the top side of the wood slab before the roof shingles are laid.

All conduits for electric wiring are laid directly on top of the wood slab and covered with the insulation material.

Tips for building this roof were offered by the architect. A simple framework beneath the roof section during nailing will insure true lines. If two carpenters are nailing, it is best to have them trade off positions after each two feet are nailed to insure even rows. When using lower grades of 2x4s, care should be taken to turn knots upward.

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Instructions for everyday care of the ceramic tile surfaces in your home can be covered in one sentence: wipe with a cloth soaked in a detergent-and-water solution. Maintenance situations may arise even with such a carefree material as ceramic tile.

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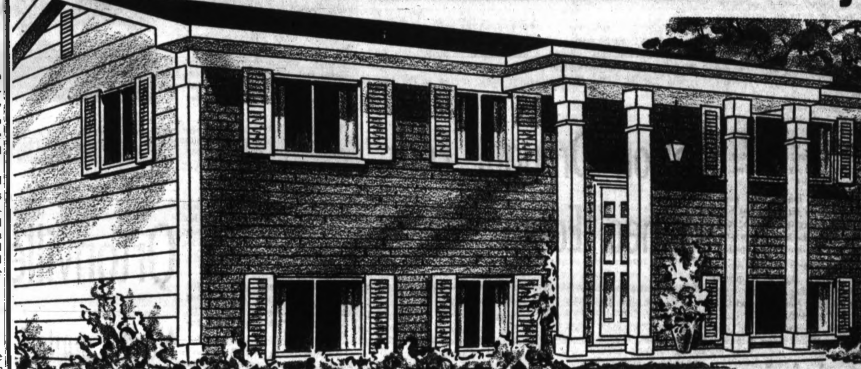
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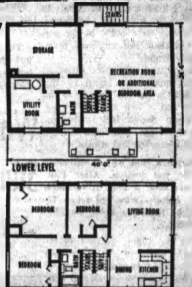
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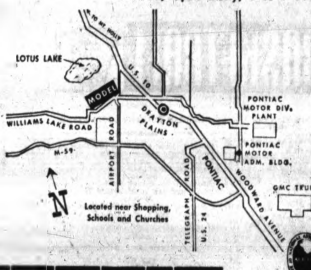

SAGINAW — "I can swallow a defeat, but I hate to give victory away on a silver platter."

That statement by Pontiac Central basketball coach Art Van Ryn aptly summed up his feelings here Friday night as the Chiefs went down to defeat for the first time this season.

Committing every sin in the basketball book, the PCH were downed 45-41 in a home loss to host Arthur Hill for their last home in night starts.

A capacity crowd in the Arthur Hill gym watched the Lumberjacks upset the defending Saginaw Valley Conference champs and cut their league lead to one game with four more to go.

The Chiefs still rule the roost with a 5-1 record and three of their four remaining Valley games will be on the friendly PCH court.

Flint Northern, a 55-52 winner over Saginaw last night, shares 2nd place with Arthur Hill at 4-2. Bay City Central won its last game of the season and pulled even with Flint Central at the bottom of the standings by losing out to the Indians, 59-47.

If it's true that every good basketball team has at least one night slinger during the season, then the PCH cagers had theirs yesterday — and had it in spades.

There was little if any resemblance between this PCH quintet and the one that so thoroughly outclassed Flint Northern and Saginaw the previous two Fridays.

Aggressively, the Chiefs started to a 7-0 edge and held an 8-3 lead entering the 2nd stanza.

You got an inkling of things to come right from the beginning. The Chiefs were tense at the outset and their shooting was unbelievably frigid.

They scored only three points in the first quarter, a layup by Bill Pritchett in the 5th minute of the period and a foul shot by Henry Robertson. Arthur Hill jumped off to a 7-0 edge and held an 8-3 lead entering the 2nd stanza.

Pontiac's cold wave continued in the 2nd stanza. After Phil Rabeau made a long two-hander, the Lumberjacks led 4-0 in straight points to erect an 18-5 advantage.

Then the Chiefs started to un-track themselves a bit. They scored nine consecutive points in the final two minutes of the first half to tie the game at 18-18 at half time, 24-21.

The tide turned against the Chiefs for keeps late in the 3rd period. It started rolling when George Fed found out midway through the stanza.

Despite the loss of Fed, the Chiefs actually went ahead late in the quarter, 30-29, on back-to-back layups by Booker Brunner. That was the last and only time the Chiefs held the lead.

The scrappy Hillites were not to be deterred. They heaped three field goals in the last minute — a hooker by Pete Datema, Paul Bishop's set shot and a layup by Tom Dawson — for a 35-30 margin going into the 4th period and PCH never caught them again.

Hurrier fouled out in the 1st minute of the 4th stanza and Arthur Hill netted eight points in succession for a 41-30 edge. This was too much for Central to overcome.

The Chiefs fought back in the waning seconds and sliced the deficit to 45-41 on 30 seconds left. Then they committed one of their many floor violations, gave up the ball and Arthur Hill killed the clock.

Dalanza, Arthur Hill's lanky center, was the top scorer with 16 points. Dawson added 12 and Bishop 10. Hurrier's 10 points were his for the Chiefs to illustrate their freezing cold shooting.

The Chiefs held their own on the backboards, but good rebounding was not enough to offset their catalogue of errors. They beat them 45-41.

But Picture Cloudy for Cheaper Models

Compacts Haven't Hurt Gold Lines

DETROIT — When the new compact cars were introduced last fall there wasn't an old-line manufacturer willing to admit he would be hurt.

Among the most vocal were the builders of the nation's luxury cars — the chariots with prices starting at \$5,000.

While the compact vs. standard car sales picture remains extremely cloudy at lower levels, in the rarified atmosphere of \$5,000 and up the picture so far appears to have been absolutely right.

Official sales figures for the 1959 calendar year still aren't quite complete, but indications are that about 200,000 cars in this price class, including a few imports such as Rolls Royce, Bentley and a couple of lines from Mercedes Benz, were sold in the United States.

Cadillac was cruising along to a record year until the steel strike forced a shutdown of all assembly for six weeks late in the year.

Official sales through November showed 128,785 Cadillacs had been sold and if you've been reading any price labels recently you'll

realize these cost from something over \$5,000 to more than \$11,000.

Cadillac sales for the 11 months were up more than 35,000 over 1958. Lincoln, with 25,484 registrations, was 1,541 ahead of the previous year and Imperial with 14,892 was 3,494 ahead of its 1958 pace.

All three cars are built at single locations rather than in assembly plants scattered around the country. Cadillac's home plant is in the heart of Detroit. Imperial has a modern plant in Dearborn, better known as the home of Ford, and Lincoln shares production facilities with Thunderbird at a new plant in Wixom.

Chrysler Corp. switched to unitized construction for almost all of its cars this year, but the Imperial

continues to have a separate frame and body. So does Cadillac. Lincoln is unitized.

All three divisions do considerable special order work, particularly on limousines purchased by governments.

"Actually," says James Roche, Cadillac general manager, "you could say almost all of our work is special order. Most every Cadillac buyer goes into a dealer and tells him exactly what he wants in the way of upholstery, color combinations and a host of special features. The dealer then orders this specific car from the factory and we build it to order."

Roche says his production costed construction for almost all of its cars this year, but the Imperial

Milk Walkout Threat Swells

12,000 Dairy Farmers Vote to Stop Deliveries Monday Without Hike

The threat of a milk strike affecting Pontiac was growing today.

About 12,000 dairy farmers have voted to withhold milk deliveries from 43 southeastern Michigan dairies Monday unless a price increase is granted.

Speakers for both sides said late last night a new offer was made but a leader of the group representing the farmers said it was "too little, too late."

An estimated four million people face the prospect of going out milk if the strike threat is carried out.

AGREEMENT ENDS SUNDAY

Dairy farmers told the strike vote last night. The present one-year price agreement expires Sunday night.

A walkout wouldn't seriously affect Pontiac milk supplies until Wednesday.

Negotiations between the Michigan Milk Producers Assn., representing the farmers, and Southern Michigan dairies broke down Wednesday night.

The dairies insisted farmers take a price cut while the MMPA demanded an increase.

MMPA's sales committee demanded continuation of current prices to farmers until the end of March.

For April through next January, the price to farmers would average about 15 cents per hundred pounds more than last year, according to the MMPA.

Their minimum figure for the period from April through July, they said, is \$4.65 per hundred.

This is the farmers' share of peak milk production.

State Road Deaths Up 5 Per Cent in 1959

FAST LANSING (AP)—Michigan's highway fatality toll last year rose more than 5 per cent over 1958, State Police reported. But, because of increase traffic, the death rate in both years was 4.6 per 100 million.

There were 1,432 road deaths in 1959 compared with 1,375 in the year before. Miles of travel went up from 29 to 31 billion.

The death toll was still 28 per cent under the 2,016 killed in 1955—the bloody year which caused Michigan to launch its traffic safety campaign.

A state police count revised earlier this month also showed 13,555 injuries and 196,639 reported accidents—both records.

Injuries increased 15 per cent while accidents were climbing 12 per cent. At the same time, the number of motor vehicle registrations rose by 3 per cent to 3,252,492.

Retiring Medaris Scorns Ike's Ideas on Space

Top Army Missileman Says Attitude Plunging U. S. Toward Disaster

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (AP)—Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris, retiring as the Army's top missileman, leaves with a parting shot at the Eisenhower administration's attitude toward space, which he says is leading to disaster.

Medaris, 57, leaves the Army as the Saturn project, the nation's biggest missile yet, is being turned over to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration for development.

The latest issue of Missiles and Rockets magazine says Medaris, in an interview, called the civilian-military separation of U. S. Space programs "fundamentally unrealistic."

Meanwhile in Washington, Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.) says defense leaders have changed their estimates of Soviet missile power since a week ago, and this time have taken a much more pessimistic view.

It was a week ago that Secretary of Defense Thomas S. Gates Jr. gave a House committee what was described as an extremely rosy, reassuring picture of American military might compared to the Soviet Union.

"Some of the rosy color that Mr. Gates had in his presentation has been taken out," Jackson told newsmen Friday after hearing secret testimony of Allen Dulles, director of the Central Intelligence Agency.

Gates had contended the United States will have no gap in its power to deter any Soviet atomic attack.

This compared to other estimates that the Soviet Union will have a 3:1 superiority in long-range missile power during the next three years.

JOHNSON AGREES

Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Texas) agreed that Dulles' report on Soviet rocket prowess was grim.

"Everything I have heard of day reinforces my conviction that we have got to go further and faster," Johnson said.

Medaris proposes a single missile-space agency, a joint military command, and he brushed aside the contention of President Eisenhower and others that the armed forces have no business in exploring space.

He said such an attitude is "utter nonsense."

No Hike in Present Tax Rate Seen by Willman

City commissioners last night adopted the proposed 1960 budget of \$6,125,207—uncut, but adjusted—and at the same time expressed hopes the city tax rate would be the same this year as last.

It will be the same, City Manager Walter K. Willman predicted, if the city's assessed valuation is also comparable to last year's.

The budget, highest ever for the city, is for the fiscal year beginning Jan. 1.

The assessed valuation will be set by the Board of (Tax) Review near municipal election time in April. The tax rate will follow soon after.

Pontiac city taxes have been levied for the past two years at a rate of \$13.27 for each \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

It is the lowest city tax rate since 1949 when it was \$13.10. From 1954 to 1957 it was \$13.70.

Within the budget — \$326,000 higher than last year's — is provision for \$200,000 in raises for city employees.

The rules, okayed by the Commission last night, for the second straight year cover only the rise in the cost of living, Willman announced.

They amount to \$125 a year for employees making up to \$5,000 and a 24 per cent increase for those making over that.

Commissioners promised, however, to consider merit raises if the city is blessed during the year with more cash than expected.

Willman said he would begin a study to see if Pontiac's pay scales compare favorably with those in other cities.

Raises that were granted will come out of \$150,000 in contingency funds tucked into the proposed budget.

TWO MAIN SHEETS

The budget as adopted, compared to the one proposed by Willman in November, shows two main sheets aimed at holding the line on taxes:

The amount to be raised by taxation has been cut by \$85,700.

And at the same time, the administration's prediction of non-tax revenues has been killed by an equal amount.

Only hopes to keep its cash outlay at the amount William said was necessary if the level of public services is to stay the same.

Last fall, when the budget was prepared, William forecast only \$1,660,372 coming into the city's coffers through various sources.

To balance the budget, it was figured that \$3,744,333 had to be raised through taxes—a levy that would have pushed the tax rate up to \$13.35, assuming the assessed valuation did not fall.

Now William predicts \$1,946,300 will be forthcoming from various sources.

MAY MAKE DIFFERENCE

Therefore, he told the Commission, the city will have to levy only \$2,678,627 in taxes this year. The \$57,000 cut in the proposed tax levy, he said, may make the difference between a rising and a stable tax rate.

The shift in anticipated revenues marks the only alteration in the budget as William proposed it.

William explained partially why he expected modest revenues to increase beyond his forecast of last fall.

He did say that tax increases from the state were estimated too conservatively then — that the effect on Pontiac of the 1960 census will not be as "drastic" as once thought.

The budget estimates the state revenues at \$1,137,500 — \$25,000 more than estimated last fall.

Other boosts in anticipated revenues were not explained, though.

According to the budget, an extra \$100,000 more is expected from fines, forfeits and penalties than was predicted last fall; \$27,700 more from city owned lands and property revenues; and a flat \$15,000 from sale of city services and commodities.

The boosty could the \$57,000 cut in the proposed tax levy.

On the subject of the census, William was confident that it wouldn't result in less state revenues for Pontiac, but only a smaller share proportionally.

ACCORDING TO POPULATION

State tax diversions are distributed to cities according to population.

The 1950 census has been the basis for distribution the past 10 years.

When the new census is completed this year, it will become the basis for slinging up the financial pie among Michigan cities.

The aides also noted the plans were for Mrs. Eisenhower to ride in such heat in a good many motorcades with the President through crowds which are expected to be huge.

The White House physician, Maj. Gen. Howard M. Snyder, was consulted and he recommended that the 53-year-old first lady abandon her plans to go along.

Mrs. William McClure of Illinois avenue is chairman of this project.

The Aux-Mobile (the prefix for auxiliary) features an array of notions to meet the needs or fancy of patients who otherwise might not have immediate access to such items.

Mrs. Robert McIntosh of Drayton Plains is chairman of this mobile unit which regularly visits the rooms.

One of the cheeriest corners brightened by the auxiliary at Pontiac General is the new play room on the pediatrics floor.

Activities of the Play Ladies and Story Book Ladies here are under direction of personable Mrs. Harold A. Tripp, who reports:

"The Play Ladies and the Story Book Ladies of the Women's Auxiliary are in daily at-

tendance to keep play hours fort through love and understanding ones and to bring com- standing in the lonely children."

Hospitalized youngsters often are frightened and homesick. They have found a mother figure in these workers who have caught the true spirit of charity embodied in the religious principles upon which their organization was founded nearly seven years ago.

SCHOOL CONDUCTED

A blackboard and work tables are part of the equipment in the play room, where a school is conducted three morn-

ings a week for children well enough to attend.

For the less fortunate bed-ridden youngsters, a colorful miniature train, loaded with toys, makes regular stops at each small bedside on its daily run through pediatrics.

The evening hours, usually the loneliest for a child away from home, find youngsters not forgotten by the play room staff.

Just before bedtime, Story Book Ladies, also directed by Mrs. Tripp, make their rounds, telling stories which effectively pave the way to a sound night's sleep for the enervated little listeners.

It was through Mrs. Tripp's inspiration that a charming and well received idea was put to use by the hospital's obstetrical ward this past Christmas.

Each newborn was brought to its mother wrapped in a bright red stocking.

For the "preemies" (premature infants), too tiny for much fondling, a smaller, stocking was attached to each incubator.

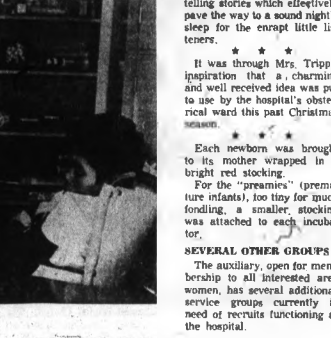
