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## CONVOCATION MARKING TEN-YEAR OBSERVANCE TO PRECEDE FACULTY RECEPTION

At the recommendation of the Tenth Anniversary Committee, the University will officially launch a year-long observance of the completion of its first decade with a Convocation on Wednesday, September 17. The speaker will be Chancellor Varner, who will deliver a State of the University address and describe some of the major Anniversary year programs. All members of the University community are invited to attend the ceremony, which will be held at 2 p.m. in the Sports and Recreation Building. The Convocation will not include an academic procession as originally planned. Classes scheduled at that time may be dismissed at the discretion of the instructor.

The Chancellor's annual reception for faculty and administrative professional staff members will be held immediately following the Convocation at the Varner home, on South Adams at Butler Road. Invitations will be mailed this week, but faculty and staff who do not receive them because of address changes or mail delays are urged to crash the party anyway.

RIVAL PAPER COMING

The Observer, official student newspaper for the University faces a double challenge this week in a slated referendum in which the students will decide whether they want to continue to pay fees to support it and the scheduled publication of a rival newspaper. The Board of Publications meets today (Monday) to act on a proposal to submit the publication fee issue to the student body on October 1. Meanwhile the rival newspaper, Focus: Oakland, to be supported by newsstand sales and advertising revenue, is due off the presses Wednesday. First edition of the Observer, which will be supported by publication fees through the fall term regardless of the outcome of the referendum, is due out Friday.

FOOD SERVICE REPORT

James R. Appleton (student affairs) asks all members of the University community to be patient with food service as the new facilities of the expanded Oakland Center are put in operation. The construction is moving along well, but revisions are just not complete, he reports. The grill, relocated in the southern wing of the lower floor, is open on a limited basis and services will be stepped up as days go on. In addition to using the grill, Sunset Room and South Cafeteria for lunches, you might try Vandenburg Hall's dining room. Appleton suggests off-hour dining for best service. Vandenburg food service runs from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. The Oakland Room, for faculty and staff dining, will open today (Monday).

DONATED BOOKS

After lengthy negotiations with the Calouste Gulbenkian
Foundation of Lisbon, Richard Mazzara (modern languages)
has received a gift of almost 300 volumes on Portugal and its culture for the
University. Topics covered are geography, folklore, ethnology, sociology, history,
philosophy, language, linguistics and philology, art, literary works of all periods
and genres, and literary history and criticism. This small but substantial
collection, soon to be housed in Kresge Library, will form the nucleus of LusoBrazilian holdings and will prove useful for the budding Latin American studies
programs.
