## 'State Senator' OK on Ballot

### State Supreme Court Decides in Favor of Lodge's Designation

Sen. L. Harvey Lodge can use "State Senator" under his name on the Aug. 5 primary ballot, the Michigan Supreme Court ruled yesterday.

Justices, half of them out of Lansing and contacted by telephone, upheld a 1957 legislative act which allows state senators and representatives to use their incumbent designation on primary ballots if they wish.

Sen. Lodge's Republican opponent this year, Pontiac car wash owner Richard D. Kuhn, asked the high court to prohibit the senator from using the designation, Kuhn, of 205 Gateway Dr., Waterford Township, said it gave Lodge an unfair advantage.

He still maintained this view after learning of the court's ruling. "It's worth 25 per cent of the votes," Kuhn, 28, insisted.

Another candidate for office, William L. Johnson, Democratic aspirant for governor, lost out also in another ballot ruling by the Supreme Court Tuesday.

Johnson, of Ironwood, sought to have Gov. Williams' picture removed from the Democratic party vignette on the ballot. The justices ruled this picture was permissible.

The court ruled without comment in both decisions. Kuhn's contention, when he petitioned for a writ of mandamus June 30, was that lawmakers passed the measure in a "move to self-perpetuate themselves in office."

Yesterday's court ruling came just days before presses were ready to roll on the primary ballots. Sample ballots were already in the office of Mrs. Mabel Child, Oakland County election clerk. Under Sen. Lodge's name was the incumbent designation.

## Courteous Drivers to Get Tickets to Water Follies

Pontiac Police were handing out a new-type ticket today, and if you're a courteous driver you might get one.

The ticket is good for a reserved seat at the Water Follies of 1958, an internationally famous aquacade which the Pontiac Area Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring at Wisner Stadium Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

With chamber cooperation, the Police Department's Traffic and Safety Bureau hopes to encourage courteous driving in Pontiac.

"We feel that the courteous driver is usually a safer driver," said Lieut. Clayton Randolph of the Traffic Bureau. "His concern for others leads him to be more cautious and patient as far as other drivers and pedestrians are concerned."

About 200 follies' tickets, donated by the chamber, have been distributed to the 16 officers of the Police Department has assigned to traffic patrol, Randolph said.

"The officers have orders to pass out as many tickets as they can through Friday to motorists who deserve to be complimented on their driving," Randolph said.

Traffic patrolmen, he said, will be on the alert for courteous driving, as they usually are for bad driving.

They'll be especially alert for drivers who allow pedestrians the right-of-way. "For some reason lately," Randolph observed, "Pontiac drivers have not been giving pedestrians the consideration they deserve, with the result that pedestrian accidents have been on the increase."

Randolph said the Traffic Bureau plans some special honor for the most courteous driver observed between now and Friday.

## Former 'M' Star McAfee Killed

### Among Four Victims in Airplane Crash; Pitched in Majors

CULPEPER, Va. (AP) — William F. McAfee, former pitcher with the Washington Senators in the American League, and three companions died in the crash of their twin-engine airplane last night on rolling Culpeper County farmland.

The other victims were identified as James H. Samford, son of a prominent Georgia manufacturer; Olan F. Fulmer, president of the Citizens & Southern Bank of Albany, Ga.; and James A. Berger.

All were residents of Albany where McAfee was mayor. McAfee, former star pitcher at the University of Michigan, quit professional baseball in 1934 when the Senators sold him to the St. Louis Browns.

The four were returning from Tuesday's All-Star major league baseball game at Baltimore when their plane crashed during a heavy rainstorm.

On an instrument flight plan, the plane crashed into a field on the farm of James C. Marsh, eight miles south of here near Mitchell. The crash scene is in north-central Virginia, approximately 60 miles southwest of Washington, D.C.

## Goldfine Says He'll Turn Over Some Records

### Renewed Hearing Gets Off to Amicable Start After One-Day Delay

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bernard Goldfine agreed today to give House investigators some of the financial records demanded from him.

With this promise, there was an amicable start on his renewed visit to the witness chair of a House subcommittee looking into his relations with presidential aide Sherman Adams and the way federal regulatory agencies have dealt with Goldfine.

Goldfine, Boston millionaire textile man, showed up on time for the 10 a.m. hearing.

He had had an extra day to rest up with postponement of yesterday's hearings.

The delay was granted on a plea that the 67-year-old Goldfine was exhausted by such weekend excitement as the exposure of an attempt by a committee staff investigator to listen in on hotel room conversations of Goldfine aides and the reported theft of some of Goldfine's papers.

## TO SUPPLY RECORDS

At the outset, Goldfine and his attorney, Roger Robb, agreed that some records demanded by Chairman Owen Harris (D-Ark) would be supplied.

Harris also asked the Boston industrialist to tell about 33 names the subcommittee put in the public record last week.

The subcommittee said the list included persons who were in White House and Capitol Hill offices. Goldfine said he sent checks to these people at Christmas time.

## GIFTS DENIED

Harris noted that some people on the list had denied getting the Goldfine money.

"I think perhaps an explanation should be given sometime during the morning over these alleged gifts," Harris said.

Goldfine drew a bigger crowd to the House caucus room — scene of the hearings — than had his friend Adams when Adams was before the subcommittee last month.

The four hundred seats were taken well before the starting hour. Congressmen and wives of (Continued on Page 2, Col. 3)

## After 50 Hours in Wilderness

## Lost Girl, 5, Rescued

MALONE, N.Y. (AP) — "What day is it?" chubby 5-year-old Brenda Jean Doud bubbled when three hunters found her scratched, bitten, but happily alive yesterday after 50 hours in an Adirondack wilderness.

Told it was Tuesday, plucky Brenda said: "I've been lost since Sunday," a fact 500 worried searchers had known only too well.

Brenda, clad only in her panties, was standing in a swampy area thick with fallen timber. The spot is about two miles from the camp her parents are building at Eagle Pond, 16 miles south of this northern New York village.

One of the three hunters, Harold Scott of Malone, said they were calling to one another as they beat through the brush. Frequently, they shouted "Brenda."

She answered, "Who's that hollering at me over there?" Scott quoted her as saying.

"You'll find out," he laughed.

Scott, George Hanna of Malone and Robert Armstrong of Westville carried Brenda nearly a mile to their camp, then drove her to a hospital here for a reunion with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Doud of Massena.

Hospital officials said Brenda, who apparently had not eaten, was in good condition.

## 'Free Nations Must Unite,' President Says

### Speaks to Parliament Growing More Critical of U.S. Policies

OTTAWA (AP) — President Eisenhower told Canada's Parliament today that differences between the two neighbor nations can be solved and must not be allowed to overshadow the transcendent importance of free world cooperation in the winning of the global struggle against communism.

"We stand together at a pivotal point in history," Eisenhower said.

"All that we Canadians and Americans, and those who went before us, have built, all that we believe in, is challenged as it has never been challenged before."

"It is for us to bring to the challenge a response worthy of ourselves and our nations."

The setting for the presidential address was the great oak and stone chamber of the House of Commons in towering Parliament Building — a spot which has resounded more and more with criticism of the United States and its policies.

## STRENGTHEN TIES

In awareness of such criticism, Eisenhower came to the Canadian capital yesterday to attempt to strengthen the friendship which has been slipping.

"It is my conviction that for all our present problems and all our future ones, we will find acceptable solutions," he assured members of Commons and the Senate.

In conciliatory terms, the President got down to specific points of difference — U.S. wheat exports, American restrictions on oil imports, Canada's trade imbalance with the United States, and the heavy flow of American investment capital to Canada.

Eisenhower was introduced by Prime Minister John G. Diefenbaker, with whom he is consulting on problems affecting the two nations.

The President made no mention in his address of a possible new channel for cooperation, in the realm of defense, through creation of a joint Canadian-American Cabinet Committee on Defense.

## EYE IDEA

The two leaders canvassed in tentative fashion the idea of setting up such a committee in the first of their official talks yesterday. Details and decisions were reserved for later talks.

To a nation with a strong element of French inheritance, Eisenhower spoke a few sentences at the outset in what he termed his halting French.

"Though we may speak in different tongues and accents," he told the French of Canada, "the fact does not weaken our determination to work for a just and lasting peace. All of Canada has a great and rich tradition in the service of this high purpose."

Eisenhower stressed the similarities of views and objectives between the two nations. (Continued on Page 2, Col. 3)

## Underworld Kingpin Freed on Bail Facing Dope Charge

NEW YORK (UPI) — Vito Genovese, charged with being head of a worldwide narcotics combine, posted \$50,000 bail yesterday 30 minutes after it was set at his arraignment on the charges.

Genovese and 36 others were named in an indictment as members of a syndicate importing heroin into the United States from Europe, Cuba, Puerto Rico and Mexico.

He was said to be the "right man," or the head of the syndicate which allocated distribution of the

narcotics in such areas as New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Cleveland and Las Vegas.

Another defendant, Vincent I. Gigante, said by U.S. Attorney Paul W. Williams to be Genovese's "No. 1 boy," was released in \$35,000 bail.

Gigante recently was acquitted in the shooting of gambler Frank Costello.

Genovese attended the gangland convention at Apalachin, N.Y., last Nov. 14 and has been named as one of the leaders of the underworld Mafia organization in criminal inquiries for the last 20 years. Of the persons named in the narcotics conspiracy indictment, 23 have been arrested, eight others are serving prison terms and six are being sought.

The dapper Genovese, of Atlantic Highlands, N.J., was described by his attorney as a small businessman who lived a family life in a rented house.

His wealth has been estimated by the district attorney's office at 30 million dollars.

## Stamp Machine Won't Take Nickels Anymore

DETROIT (AP)—When you step up to a stamp machine in the corner drug store a month from now, there will be no need for a nickel.

Inflation has caught up with automation in the postage stamp business. The result is a major overhauling of many of the stamp vending machines.

On Aug. 1 the mailing price of post cards and unsealed Christmas cards will go up from 2 cents to 3 cents, first-class mail will go up from 3 to 4 cents, and air mail will increase from 6 to 7 cents.

Schermack Products Corp. of Detroit, the largest and one of the oldest makers of postage stamp vending machines in the United States, is making these changes to keep up with the act of Congress:

1. The slot that gives four 1-cent stamps for 5 cents will give you two 4-cent stamps for 10 cents (same 20 per cent profit for the machine's owner).
2. The slot that gives you two 2-cent stamps for 5 cents will give you two 4-cent stamps for 10 cents (same 20 per cent profit).
3. The slot that gives you four 6-cent air mail stamps for 25 cents will give you three 7-cent stamps for 25 cents (raising the profit from 4 per cent to 16 per cent).
4. The slot that gives you three 3-cent stamps for 10 cents will give you two 4-cent stamps for 10 cents (raising the profit from 10 per cent to 20 per cent).

J. S. Schermack, president of the firm his father founded in 1908, says the cost of revamping the machines will run from 52 cents to \$28. The machines cost from \$30 to \$200, depending on the number and type of slots.

"We don't own any of our machines," said Schermack. "We sell some to drugstores and other merchants. Some of them we sell to operators who will buy, say, a

## He Wants Trujillo to Tow His Raft

SAN PEDRO, Calif. (AP)—The man who has made three unsuccessful attempts to float to Hawaii on a raft has now made two unsuccessful attempts to talk to Gen. Rafael Trujillo Jr.

Devere Baker wants the general to tow the raft Lehi IV 50 miles to sea with his palatial yacht, which is tied up at San Pedro. He did so, and was informed that Trujillo was still asleep at noon.

"I'm going to try to see Trujillo again," said the raftsman. He hopes a 50-mile tow will take him to ocean currents to drift off to Hawaii.

Trujillo, son of the Dominican Republic strongman, moved his yacht yesterday—but only four berths away, so he could load his \$12,000 sports car.

## Adams Runs U.S., Truman Declares

NEW YORK (AP)—Former President Harry S. Truman, returning from a European vacation, said today it was up to President Eisenhower to decide whether to fire his assistant, Sherman Adams.

But Truman added tartly: "The government would be in a bad fix if he loses Adams—he's running it, you know."

Truman, tanned and beaming, met newsmen aboard the liner Constitution and right from the start he was peppered with questions about the storm stirred up in Washington over the congressional investigation of the relations between Adams and Boston industrialist Bernard Goldfine.

The NEA's membership of more than 6,500 includes the daily and weekly newspapers.

## UAW Members Told to Work at Plymouth

DETROIT (AP)—Local 212 of the United Auto Workers Union at Chrysler's Plymouth Body Plant tested its influence with a back-to-work order today.

The local's leadership, while expressing agreement with rank and file charges of speedup, directed its membership to stay on the job. "We want to strike at a time it suits the UAW, not Chrysler," said Eurlie Bruce, Local 212 president.

A work stoppage yesterday led to closing of two plants and idling of 2,700 employees for a fifth time in eight working days.

Chrysler sent home 1,500 body plant workers and another 1,200 in the Plymouth Assembly Plant because it said trim workers in the body plant refused to do assigned duties.

Bruce's comment on a time for a strike suitable to the UAW was an apparent reference to present strike votes in the entire UAW to support contract demands.

Contract negotiations resume July 14 with Chrysler, Ford and General Motors.

There has been a recess since before the Fourth of July. There have been no contracts since the Memorial Day weekend when the last pacts expired.

## 62 South Koreans Die in Torrential Rains

SEOUL (AP)—The national police said torrential rains which finally ended today caused the death of 62 persons in South Korea and did damage estimated at more than eight million dollars.

Ten persons were missing and 6,800 homeless. The damage included 933 homes destroyed, 6,258 houses flooded or wrecked, 54 ships sunk or missing and 236 highway bridges damaged.

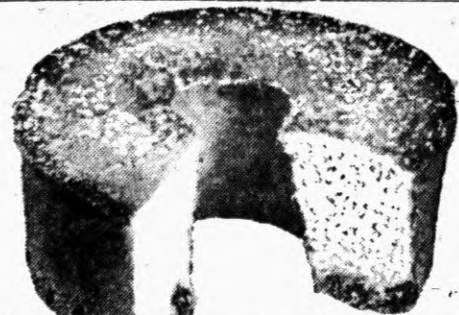

## Pontiac City Affairs

### OK Waterford Sewer Hookup

Approving a new agreement last night covering Waterford Township's sewage hookup with the Pontiac disposal system, City Commissioners began eyeing a similar agreement with Sylvan Lake. City Manager Walter K. Willman said the Sylvan agreement should be based like Waterford's, on specific rates for every 1,000 cubic feet of flow entering the Pontiac system. The flow would be measured by Pontiac-installed meters, he said.

Not only does the new Waterford agreement make measuring and billing easier, Willman told Commissioners last night, it also prevents the township from enlarging its use of the system without approval by Pontiac.

Contracts with Waterford are expected to be signed soon. The City Manager has already been authorized to begin negotiations with Sylvan Lake, the only other outside user of the Pontiac system.

The Waterford rate is 16 cents for every 1,000 cubic feet of flow, a rate which allows the city to realize about a 10 per cent profit over operational and maintenance costs, Willman said.

If costs go up, he said, the agreement allows the city to up its rates upon 90-day notice. Described by Willman as a "re-write" of the original, 1935 agreement, the new contract can be terminated by either side upon three-year notice.

Commissioners, in other action, set next Tuesday for public hearings to begin three improvements. Together with estimated costs on their construction, they are:

A combined storm and sanitary sewer on the east side of Stanley avenue, from Yale about 100 feet south; assessed cost, \$402; city cost, \$442; Sidewalks on both sides of Robinwood avenue, Perry to Baltimore (except where already installed); assessed cost, \$2,163; city cost, \$1,676; Sidewalk on the north side of Baltimore avenue, Stirling to Melrose; assessed cost, \$294; city cost, \$517.

Commissioners held a hearing on assessment rolls covering a combined sewer on Stanley avenue, Hopkins to Yale, and confirmed another roll for curbs and gutters on Kinney road, Oakland to Stanley. The latter assessments are to be paid off in three payments.

Finance Director Oscar Eckman presented the annual city audit by the Detroit branch of Haskins and Sells, national auditing firm.

Covering the 12-month period ending Dec. 31, 1957, the audit made several minor recommendations for improved bookkeeping, Eckman said.

**To Use State Equipment Against Swimmers' Itch**  
LANSING (UPI) — The Water Resources Commission has notified Michigan resort owners that state equipment will be available in fighting swimmers' itch.

Milton Adams, executive secretary of the commission, said yesterday the commission's equipment may be used for a "limited amount of beach treatment service" and would be loaned through local governmental units. Adams said operating costs would be borne by local personnel and not by the state.

## Seeking Opinion About Prisoners

### Commission Explores Fixed Bond for Release During Weekends

Pontiac City Commissioners will seek an Attorney General's opinion on the legality of releasing weekend prisoners on fixed bonds before Municipal Court arraignment. Commissioners voted last night to ask Prosecutor Frederick C. Ziem to seek the opinion for them.

At present, persons arrested for violation of local ordinances on weekends are held at Oakland County Jail unless they can obtain special police permission to go home.

If no permission is granted, prisoners have to stay in jail until Municipal Court opens Monday and bond can be set at arraignment.

Commissioner Philip E. Rowston urged that the proposal be given consideration, "since human liberties are involved."

It was City Attorney William A. Ewart's opinion that the city could not adopt a fixed bond setup, since none was provided for in state law.

After hearing his opinion, Commissioners decided to seek a fresh ruling by the attorney general.

## South African Farmers Plan Crocodile War

DURBAN, S. Africa — Following the deaths of a number of natives in recent months from crocodile attacks, armed farmers and bounty-hungry natives in Northern Zululand have been waiting government authority, to start "Operation Crocodile." Durban reports. The Game Preservation Board in the Natal area refuses to recognize the need for killing "crocs" but residents have appealed directly to the Government.

"If our plea is granted we will shoot every reptile on sight," said I. C. van Rooyen, spokesman for the farmers. "Natives will be paid a small bounty for every crocodile egg and young reptile destroyed. Something has to be done to save lives and further heavy losses of livestock. The attack will be carried into the night with lights and perhaps using 'spotters' in aircraft."

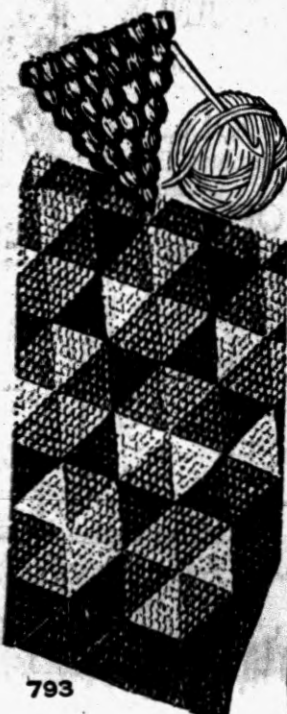

## Show Children Greatness of America

By MURIEL LAWRENCE

At 5:30 a.m., a Hudson River pier can be a dismal place.

The one where I waited that dawn seemed especially bleak to me. For the year was 1940. From where I stood I could see our American water slapping against dock piles, but beyond it France had died—and from the skies over Europe's broken cities, Hitler's Luftwaffe was gathered for the assault on England.

So, though the month was July, I remember the wind from the river as damp and chilly. Shivering in my thin dress, I watched the ship from Bordeaux swerve for approach to her dock. They'd painted her gray, but the unobtrusive color hadn't served its purpose. The dive bombers had been

at her, the marks of their strafing visible on her pitted sides.

You could also see the marks in the faces of her passengers as they shuffled down the gang-plank, carrying no luggage, their eyes so lost in memories of defeat and flight that they moved toward me and safety like people in a dream.

The writer I had come to meet said to me tonelessly, "No, I didn't bring my portable. There wasn't time to get it."

I never felt so helpless in my life. Then the haggard lines of his face changed. I turned—and there behind me on the pier where nothing had been before was a Salvation Army mobile canteen, its bonneted women

and uniformed chief quietly dispensing steaming coffee and doughnuts to the refugees crowding around them.

That was the moment when I became an American.

I think that we have all had experiences that gave us the same sudden insight into America's unadvertised goodness. At this time when she's so beset by other countries' hate, let's share these experiences with children.

Like foreign countries, they find it easy to see America as

Zsa Zsa Gabor's fur coats, Little Rock riots, the gadgets on our show-off cars. But those of us who know her well know that she isn't at all what the flash-bulbs and ads report her to be. It is now our obligation to show children our own truer picture.

There were no photographers, no promoters on the pier that morning to cheapen that welcome to Hitler's refugees. So my memory of it is my personal possession—and I'm sharing it with all the children I know.
