Physical Therapy Graduates

Twenty-one students who will be in the first graduating class for the OU physical therapy program were honored at a recognition ceremony Aug. 29 in Varner Recital Hall.

The students will receive their degrees as part of the university commencement exercises Sept. 19.

Delivering the recognition address was A. Charles Dorando, director of physical therapy and coordinator of rehabilitation services at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac.

Other presentations were made by Judith S. Canfield, program director, and Dr. Moon J. Pak, associate provost and director of the Center for Health Sciences. Student Elizabeth Anne Kamp delivered the senior address.

The program in physical therapy was granted accreditation by the American Physical Therapy Association in action taken in mid summer. The accreditation process is a lengthy process taking in three separate steps over a two-year observation period. Accreditation is necessary for

the graduates to be eligible to sit for the state licensure examination.

James Schmidt, human and educational services, presented a program on "Managing Manager Stress" on Aug. 20 at a meeting of the Motor City Chapter of the Association of Field Service Managers. He also writes a monthly stress management column for *Ford World*.

Recent activities of the School of Economics and Management faculty have been reported. Elizabeth Barclay had her manuscript "Student Attitudes Toward Faculty Strikes in Higher Education" (with A. Inn and E. Rosen) approved for publication in the *Journal of Collective Negotiations in the Public Sector*. Sid Mittra has been elected to serve a three-year term on the Board of Directors of the International Association of Financial Planners, Inc., Southeast Michigan Chapter. Jacobo Varela has been chosen to receive the Third InterAmerican Psychology Award by the Board of Governors of the Inter-American Society of Psychology. The awards acknowledge persons who have made significant contributions to the development of psychology as a science and profession in the Americas.

Richard A. Mazzara, modern languages, presented two papers at the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese meeting held recently in Seattle, Washington. The papers were entitled "The Self and Social Consciousness in Jorge Andrade" and "Rediscovering Childhood and the Bases of Injustice: Graciliano's Infancia."

Ride And Van Pools Available

Students, faculty, and staff are invited to take advantage of two transportation programs designed to ease the costs of commuting.

RIDE POOL, a computerized matching program, will locate persons in the same geographic locations and with similar time schedules for commuting to OU. Participants receive a computer printout with the names and telephone numbers of potential persons to form a pool. Ride Poolers receive a special parking decal which permits parking in preferred areas.

We encourage interested persons to apply in order to increase the matching capacity, and you are under no obligation to form a car pool if you apply.

The **VAN POOL** program begun last year at OU generated much interest, however no pools were able to be formed at that time. A minimum of nine persons are needed to form a Van Pool. Participants share the costs of operating a vehicle that is provided to the pool by Michivan services. The driver/coordinator for the Van Pool arranges pick-up schedules, collects

fares, and maintains the vehicle. In return, the driver/coordinator is permitted to have the van for personal use with some limitations.
