HOUSE WOULD APPROPRIATE \$11,406,000 FOR OAKLAND

A conference committee of the Senate and House of Representatives is working on a higher education aid bill to submit to Gov. William Milliken.

The bill went to conference after the House passed 78 amendments to a version approved in the Senate. OU's general fund budget allocation for 1973-74 was set at \$11,406,000 in both the Senate and House legislation. A contingency plan to provide additional appropriations for exceeding a budgeted enrollment figure remains essentially the same for OU in the House and Senate bills.

Briefly, OU would receive a general fund appropriation of \$11,406,000 based on 7,325 full-time equivalent students. For each additional full-time equivalent student enrolled above the 7,325 figure, OU would receive an additional \$1,000 up to a maximum payment of \$450,000. The Senate bill had contained a contingency plan for all of the state's public colleges and universities, but the House bill would limit the contingency program to schools with less than 8,000 full-time equivalent student enrollment. The Senate contingency budget for all institutions was set at \$3,000,000, but the House, which would allow fewer schools to participate, set its contingency budget at \$1,300,000.

Oakland University received a \$10,394,000 general fund budget appropriation for 1972-73. There were no contingency provisions in the budget.

CAPITAL OUTLAY BILL INCLUDES FUNDS FOR THREE OU PROGRAMS

A Senate-House conference committee has approved a Joint Capital Outlay Bill that includes \$1,645,000 for Oakland University programs.

OU expenditures have been approved for the following purposes and amounts: Start of construction costs for Classroom-Office Building II, \$1,000,000; completion of construction costs for Public Safety and Service Building, \$320,000; and \$325,000 for various campus site development projects.

Future meetings will be held with the Joint Capital Outlay Committee of the Legislature to present and receive approval for schematic, preliminary, working and final drawings for the new classroom-office building. Architect for COB-II is the Tarapata-MacMahon-Paulsen Corporation. The COB-II facility will have approximately 67,000 square feet of assignable space. It will be located just east of the Oakland Center and it will contain lecture hall, classroom, support service and office space. Total cost, including furnishings and site development, will be approximately \$5,000,000.

NON-ECONOMIC ISSUES SETTLED; MONEY TALKS BEGIN

Contract talks between Oakland University and three recognized bargaining units, the Clerical-Technical Association, the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, and the Police Officers Association, continued at OU last week.

Agreement has been reached with all three units on almost every non-economic issue in a new contract, and consideration of salary proposals has begun.

The Clerical-Technical Association, which received its first wage offer from the university on July 16, has indicated that it might accept the offer if OU in turn will adopt some cost of living clauses that the CT organization would like included in a new contract. No specifics are being released at this point in the negotiations.

The Clerical-Technical Association has 230 members, AFSME has 155, and there are 14 officers in the police bargaining unit. An arbitrator is scheduled to return the last week in July with findings on wage, student-faculty ratio, and library expenditure questions still unsettled in OU's contract talks with the university's chapter of the American Association of University Professors. There are 314 persons in the AAUP bargaining unit.

ALDO CECCATO WILL MAKE FIRST FESTIVAL APPEARANCES

Aldo Ceccato, new principal conductor of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, will make his first appearances at the Meadow Brook Festival Thursday, July 26, and Saturday, July 28. Cellist Lawrence Foster will be guest soloist in an all-Tchaikovsky program on the 26th while pianist Radu Lupu will appear as guest artist on the 28th. Lupu was winner of the 1966 Van Cliburn competition in the United States.

In other highlights of the Festival's fifth week, singer and composer Mac Davis will appear in concert Wednesday, July 25 and singer Sarah Vaughan will be featured on Friday, July 27. Mitch Miller will conduct the Detroit Symphony on Sunday, July 29, with violinist Kishiko Suzuki as guest soloist in the Mendelssohn E Minor Concerto. The Sunday concert begins at 6:30 p.m. All other programs have an 8:30 p.m. opening.
