

Kennedy Orders Food Expansion for the Needy

Auto Accidents Show Big Rise During 1960

**Pontiac Police Report
52.2 Increase Over '59
Including 10 Deaths**

An alarming increase in reported auto accidents during 1960 was disclosed today by the Pontiac Police Department year-end traffic statistics.

Accidents last year totaled 2,878, up from 1,824 in 1959—an increase of 52.2 per cent.

Ten persons were killed in accidents in 1960, one more than the previous year. Four of the victims were pedestrians.

The annual police report also showed that the number of people injured in accidents last year shot up sharply.

Injured persons in 1960 numbered 1,095, as compared to 688 in 1959. This is a 58.3 per cent rise.

Of the accidents, 2,151 involved property damage only, 719 injuries and eight deaths.

The report showed that more than three times as many men were involved in accidents as women, 3,800 to 1,061, and drivers in the 25-34 age group were involved in more accidents than any other age group.

Also, persons in the 25-34 age group led the classifications of the injured.

As in 1959, more accidents occurred between the hour of 3-4 p.m. than any other time, more on Saturdays than any other day, and more in shopping districts than any other location.

The most dangerous intersection in the city was at Saginaw Street and Auburn Avenue where 28 accidents were reported last year, followed by the intersection of Saginaw and Lawrence Streets with 19 accidents.

Police reported traffic violations in almost all of the accidents last year.

They said that 632 accidents were caused by drivers failing to yield the right of way.

The number of drivers ticketed or arrested last year was 24,141, a slight increase from 24,067 in 1959. Of these, 5,353 were cited for hazardous violations. Ninety-two motorists were charged with reckless driving, and 104 for drunken driving.

Just Came to See President

No One Dances at the Balls

WASHINGTON (AP) — President John F. Kennedy went to five inaugural balls Friday night and announced at the window that he had yet to see anybody dance. He had a right to be surprised. According to the dictionary, a ball is a large assembly for social dancing.

But, then, Kennedy and his wife Jacqueline didn't dance either.

And Mrs. Kennedy went home after the third ball, leaving her husband and Vice President and Mrs. Lyndon Johnson to carry the ball—as it were.

The thousands of guests who paid \$25 to \$40 each to come to the social highlight of the four-day inaugural festivities followed protocol on wearing white tie and formal gowns.

The Inaugural Committee provided the best setting it could: hotel ballrooms and a gaily decorated—though huge and barn-like—armory.

There were society orchestras, Army herald trumpets, royal blue and gold presidential boxes, all the necessary ingredients.

But, the message about dancing never got through the crush.

At the armory, where 45 minutes of the ball was carried to television, dancing was called for in the name of the President.

Those in TV audience "want to find us dancing at the ball," the master of ceremonies pleaded just before bedtime.

Meyer Davis and his orchestra played "I Could Have Danced All Night."

But the majority of close to 20,000 ballgoers just wouldn't go along. And, in all fairness, the dance floor was so crowded at times that they couldn't have danced if they wanted to.

There were certain main objectives at all five balls—to get a close look at the President, to be able to claim the distinction of having been here and, perhaps, to take a snapshot of the newly inaugurated President.

Along with white tie, many ballgoers seemed to think a camera was necessary equipment.

Somewhat, Kennedy's departure from any of the ballrooms appeared to be a signal for hordes of ballgoers to call it a night and go home.

Pierre Salinger, Kennedy's press secretary, said it is impossible at this time to put a price tag on the supplemental program.

Myer Friedman, a Kennedy aide, told a news conference that the government at present is spending about \$250 million a month for distribution of surplus food to needy families in distressed areas.

During the campaign Kennedy promised that if elected he would act speedily to increase the distribution and variety of surplus foods to areas of chronic unemployment.

Kennedy, who celebrated his inauguration until 3:30 a.m., began his first day in the White House by arriving at his office more or less on time and getting a visit from former President Harry S. Truman.

Truman, who didn't sleep too in the White House during the entire eight years that Dwight D. Eisenhower was president, made a nostalgic visit to his old office—at the invitation of the new president.

And he took occasion to make several stops at Eisenhower's WALKS DENITE WEATHER.

The property Truman, whose relations with Eisenhower have been chilly, had dropped in at the executive mansion for a few minutes Friday with Mrs. Truman following President Kennedy's inauguration.

This morning, Kennedy called Truman to ask him over and the 84-year-old ex-president walked from the Mayflower Hotel—about half a mile—despite a 19-degree temperature and streets covered with ice and snow.

Kennedy, whom Truman had first opposed as the Democratic standard-bearer, met the former president, led him through the reception room and into his executive office, a familiar spot.

WASHINGTON — President Kennedy, carrying out a campaign pledge, issued an executive order today for an expansion of the federal program of food distribution to needy families in chronic unemployment areas.

In his first executive order since taking office Friday, Kennedy directed the new secretary of agriculture, Orville L. Freeman, to expand the distribution program using funds already available.

Approve 3 Others for Cabinet

Senators Give OK to Bobby

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate today overwhelmingly confirmed President Kennedy's 10 selections for his cabinet.

Only his choice of his brother Robert to be attorney general drew any opposition.

WASHINGTON UP — The Senate today confirmed the nomination of

Robert F. Kennedy to be attorney general—the first of President Kennedy's choices to face any active opposition.

A standing vote showed only Sen. Gordon Allott, R-Colo., voting against the President's choice of his younger brother for the post.

Meeting in unusual Saturday session, the Senate had given unanimous approval by vote to Dean Rusk as secretary of state, Douglas Dillon as secretary of the treasury and

Robert S. McNamara as secretary of defense. Senators spoke out with praise and support for them.

But Allott described Robert Kennedy as a man who is not quite "in a far drive."

"Capable, ambitious and driving as he may be, he has not had sufficient background in the law to qualify him for this position," Allott contended. He said that

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Charles S. Murphy, former special counsel to President Truman, today was named undersecretary of agriculture.

Kennedy has never engaged in private law practice nor tried a case nor written a trial brief.

He said he was not opposed to Kennedy's appointment because he is the president's brother, but said their relationship "may come to vex them," and destroy some of the objectivity of a cabinet member's relationship with the president.

But warm words of praise came from Sens. Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., the majority leader, James O. Eastland, D-Miss., of the Senate Judiciary Committee, and John L. McClellan, D-Ark.

"The judiciary committee unanimously agreed that Mr. Kennedy is qualified in every respect for this appointment," Eastland said.

McClellan, under whom Kennedy served as chief counsel for the committee which investigated labor-management relations, praised the nominee for "his vigor, his skill and his courage."

Kennedy's nomination, approved by the Senate quickly, approved J. Edward Day, Los Angeles insurance executive, as postmaster general and continued down the list of cabinet appointments.

Eisenhowers Finally Find Place to Hang Their Hats

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP)—Dwight and Mamie Eisenhower, out of the White House less than a day, settled down today in the first private home they have ever known.

Throughout their married life, the Eisenhowers have always lived at temporary addresses. Some of them have been excellent ones, such as 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington, D. C., Supreme Headquarters, Allied Powers in Europe, and the President's Residence, Columbia University.

But wherever they have lived in the past, the Eisenhowers always knew a moving day would come.

Now, regardless of how far they may travel, an attractive white brick and fieldstone house with 14 bedrooms and 8 baths will always be home.

The Eisenhowers bought their farm on the edge of the Gettysburg battlefield in 1950 and immediately began renovating the ancient house. The renovation was completed in 1953 at a cost of some \$150,000. They spent their first night there in March 1955.

The Eisenhowers reached home at 3:32 p.m. Friday after an auto mobile trip of two hours and 22 minutes from Washington, for the first time without a Secret Service and police escort.

Roads made hazardous by the heavy snow, a slip to take off chains, and several slow-downs to acknowledge greetings from roadside wellwishers accounted for the longer than usual travel time.

Gettysburgers, who in the past have respected the Eisenhowers' wishes for privacy, will give them a big "welcome home" tonight.

They will be guests at a dinner at the Hotel Gettysburg. Since only about 200 tickets are available, there will be a public ceremony on the town square before the dinner.

Denies Refugees Dying

GENEVA (UPI) — The World Health Organization (WHO) has denied that 200 Baluch refugees are dying of starvation each day in the Congo's South Kasai Province. It places the known figure at 20 to 30 deaths a week.

Fire Would Not Touch Early Saint

One of the most important things the Apostles had to do was to see that the Church was in the right hands, humanly speaking, after they were gone. They took great care in the selection and training of their successors, for these men would be the link between those who had been with the Lord Himself and all who would come after.

One such link was Polycarp, pupil and disciple of the beloved Apostle, St. John. John's choice was a good one, for Polycarp was a great man in his own right. He was alive during the times when the New Testament was written. He is not mentioned in the Scripture, but we know a good deal about him even now.

He was born in the year 70 and died in either 133 or 166, that is either at 63 or 96. In those 96 or 96 years he was Bishop of Smyrna from the year 96 until he died.

One of the three writings is a letter to Polycarp from the great St. Ignatius; another is a letter Polycarp wrote to the Church at Philippi; but the one that tells us most is an eyewitness account of his death.

He was martyred, as most of the early Christian leaders were. This was during the persecutions set up by the Emperor Marcus Aurelius, and whether it was in 155 or 166, Polycarp was a very old man.

The officers who came to arrest him did not want to harm him, and neither did the Proconsul before whom they brought him for trial. They tried their best to make things easy for him, but the old saint just would not cooperate.

Polycarp was brought to the Proconsul at the local arena, or stadium, just as an afternoon's program of games concluded.

You clerics can prate about God of spirituality on the part of us in the audience, but if you are unrighteously bull-headed, you are driving youth from the pews and stifling dynamic religion.

"To make it seem more casual, I even agreed to join with him and pay his tuition."

"But he has a college 'high-brow' complex and thinks your column cannot be scientific because you employ 3-syllable words."

COLLEGE HYPOCRITES

Protestant Churches Aid Starving People of Congo

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Two hundred and nine thousand, five hundred pounds of powdered milk, 33,000 pounds of flour, 328,000 pounds of rice, and 33,000 pounds of dried beans, with a total value of nearly \$40,000, are now on the high seas, shipped by the Protestant Churches of America to meet desperate and increasing needs of starving refugees and war casualties in the embattled Congo.

The foods are the latest consignments in a relief program which, during the last six months, has shipped food and medicines worth \$27,587 to the Congo, according to Bishop Frederick B. Newell, acting executive director of Church World Service, cooperative overseas relief agency of major Protestant and Eastern Orthodox communions.

Relief materials are distributed by the Congo Protestant Relief Agency which channels supplies to areas where suffering is most acute. Distributions are made between bands of gunfire, roads clogged with starving refugees, and hospitals crowded to three and four times their capacity with sick and dying patients. According to reports from the Congo 250,000 to 300,000 refugees are in need.

Most of the drugs available in the overflowing hospitals have been contributed through Church World Service by American pharmaceutical manufacturers and to date the total value of the shipments has reached nearly half a million dollars.

Much of the food is from American surplus stocks, donated by the United States government, but costs of distribution within the Congo are borne by the Protestant churches. The shipment of beans was contributed by CROP (the Christian Rural Overseas Program), the community food appeal of Church World Service.

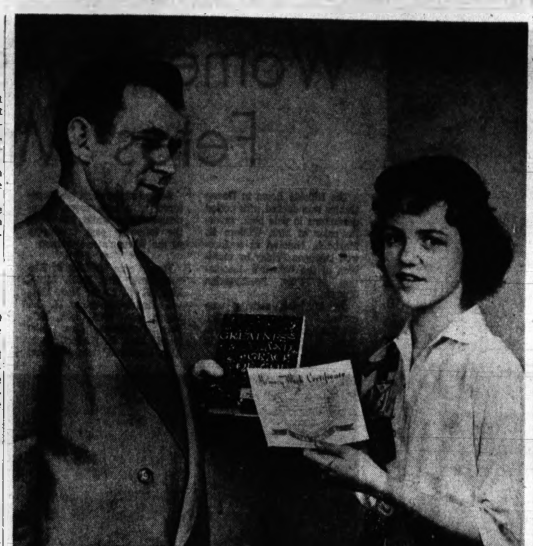

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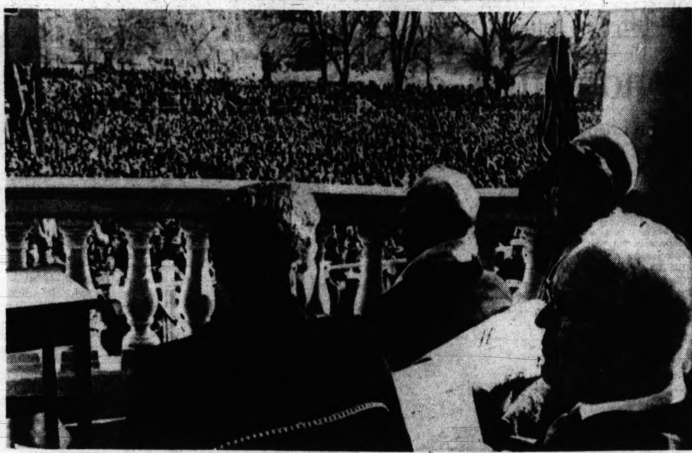

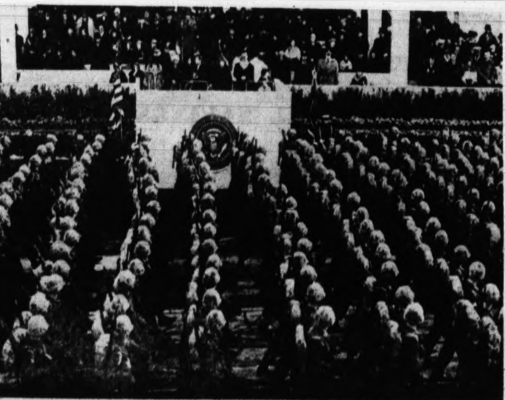

Kennedy's Reign Limp Off to Hectic Start

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy was hampered by the bright sun, a teen-age girl fell in the crush at one inaugural ball and her leg was trampled by surging crowds. Well, if the first day was any indication, he certainly is right.

Things began to go wrong when a storm, which stopped only hours before the inauguration ceremony, dumped eight inches of snow on the capital.

Thousands of workmen and army troops using hundreds of plows and wreckers and tons of salt and sand labored until shortly before the swearing-in to clear the Capitol Plaza and parade route of snow and stalled cars.

They made it.

But the 22-degree cold and 18 mile-an-hour wind forced spectators to huddle in ski togs, stadium coats, parkas, sweaters, ear muffs and blankets. Former-screen star Marion Davies wore cable-knit ski stockings. Parade watchers had to plow through two-foot snow drifts to reach hot dog stands.

Mixed with the top hats and cutaway coats of the dignitaries were fur-lined coats, overshoes, and sweaters.

Because snow-clogged streets slowed transportation and crowded aisles on the platform delayed the seating of the diplomatic corps and Supreme Court justices, the swearing-in ceremony didn't start until 12:10 p.m.—10 minutes after Dwight D. Eisenhower's term ran out and 41 minutes before John F. Kennedy took his oath.

The lengthy prayers by four clergymen slowed down the program further. Richard Cardinal Cushing's invocation ran nine minutes.

MOTOR SMOKE

Undoubtedly, the smoking motor caused the most furor, because it happened at the feet of presidents and before the eyes of millions.

The motor operated a device which raised or lowered the platform to suit the height of the speaker. To the consternation of

Secret Service agents, firemen and electricians, the motor could not be disconnected at once because it was behind a locked panel and the key had to be found. A fire extinguisher was held in readiness.

Before the panel was opened and the plug pulled, the short and stout Eisenhower and Kennedy. The smoke was heaviest during Cardinal Cushing's invocation and Marian Anderson's National Anthem.

The most heart-tugging mishap was Frost's eye trouble.

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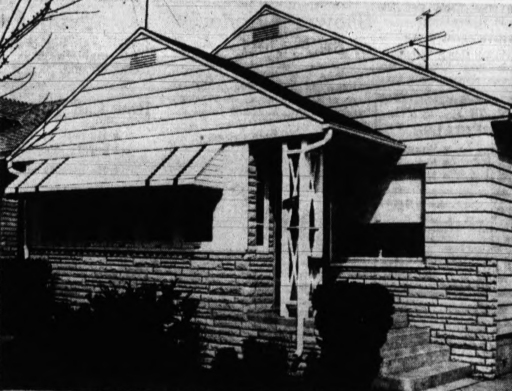

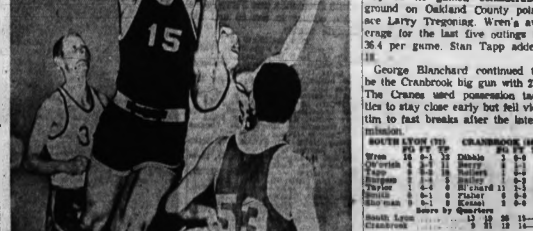

No. 17—Baseball's Unforgettable Games

Redleg Catcher Who Played for Keeps, Willard Hershberger Loses and Dies

By JOE RECHLER and BEN OLAN

On the sultry evening of July 31, 1940, more than 30,000 baseball fans gathered at New York's Polo Grounds to witness a game between the Giants and the National League champion, Cincinnati Reds. Night ball, being in its infancy, was more of a spectacle than then a sport.

On the mound for the Reds was Buckly Walters, the National League top hurler of 1940, winner of the Most Valuable Player award for the year.

He was backed by an alert, aggressive team which included such fine players as Frank McCormick, the power-hitting first baseman; Ival Goodman, the team's leading home run hitter; Harry Craft, the sure-handed center fielder, and Lonnie Frey, the speedy little second baseman.

As the Giants went into the last half of the ninth inning, they were trailing 4-1. The summer crowd, in holiday mood, was not particularly unhappy. The fans were enjoying themselves. Why not? It's only a game.

Back of the plate was a lean, black-looking young athlete, Willard Hershberger, second-string catcher of the champion Reds. He was a sensitive, high-strung, sincere, hard-playing young American to whom baseball was more than a game, more than a business, more than life.

Hershberger had been a star catcher of the minor league New York Bears. Spindly legged, full of spunk, he became a substitute for huge, lumbering Ernie Lombardi. He caught occasionally and filled in during the late innings. He could be depended upon. He had pretty good power and had a knack of hitting in the clutch.

In mid-July of 1940, Lombardi hurt his leg. The Reds were set to win the flag again. Hershberger had his chance. "Little Slug" did his work well.

He banded with dexterity the pitches of Buckly Walters and Paul Derringer and Ernest Thompson. But the Reds' winning streak had ended.

They lost two games to the Phillies. Kindly Manager Bill McKechnie noticed that Hershberger was

trying too hard. He said: "Don't worry . . ."

The Reds came to New York. With Hershberger catching, they lost the first of three game series, 4-3. They won the second game, 6-3.

Now it was the ninth inning of the third game, and with the great Walters on the long end of a 4-1 lead, there was nothing to worry about.

Just three more outs were needed to win the game. Nick Witte and Joe Moore, pinch-hitting for Paul Dean, quietly went to first. Then Bob Seeds came to bat. Walters got two quick strikes on.

Seeds. The next three pitches were balls. Hershberger called for an outside pitch, figuring to keep the ball away from Seeds' power. Ball four.

Next was Burgess Whitehead, hitting third. Whitehead, who took two strikes but waited patiently until the count was three and two, Hershberger called for a fast ball and Whitehead swung.

The ball arched lazily toward right field and barely fell into the glove for a home run. It was now 4-2. Hershberger hit had won a game but cost a life.

Ott. Hershberger called for a fast ball. Ott took both and they were strikes. Worried, anxious, to get it over with, Hershberger called for another curve. It was outside. Again the same pitch, ball two. Ball three. Hershberger decided to ask for a change-up. Ott walked.

The tying run was on first, the winning run at the plate—Harry Danning, the hard-hitting catcher. Heart in his mouth, Hershberger decided to stake the game on fast balls. Danning watched the first pitch by Strike one. Then a long foul. Hershberger signaled again.

A fast ball. Walters saw the sign and shook his head. The time now was for a waste ball, make Danning to for a bad pitch.

But Hershberger figured Danning would not be prepared for a good pitch. The ball would whiz by for strike three. He signaled again.

Walters went along—and threw the fast ball right over the heart of the plate. Danning swung and the ball shot out as if coming from the mouth of a cannon. It landed deep in the upper left field stands. A home run! The Giants won, 5-4.

The fans dashed out on the field and fought to be the first to congratulate Danning. They shouted and sang and danced.

This was fun, real fun. But Hershberger stood at home plate, shocked, stunned, hardly able to realize what had happened.

There was no game the next day. Two days later Hershberger caught a game in Boston. Cincinnati lost. He failed to hit. He failed to field a ball.

That evening Hershberger couldn't eat his dinner. He called himself a failure. The following day, Saturday, a doubleheader was scheduled with Boston. Hershberger failed to appear at the park. Worried, Manager McKechnie sent another to the hotel.

The door to Hershberger's room was locked. When they opened it, they found the little catcher, the youth who played the game too hard, who couldn't take defeat, lying there dead. He had cut his throat, because he had called for the wrong pitch—the home run ball that Harry Danning hit had won a game but cost a life.

Q. We have a 4-year-old horse that has distemper. Can you tell me what is best to do for him? Karen, Killbuck, Dallas.

A. Distemper is a term loosely applied to any number of respiratory conditions in the horse, all of which have in common the symptoms of runny eyes and nose. In most cases, what is called distemper is a simple strep infection and will respond readily to antibiotic treatment.

Other cases like strangles or common shipping fever may require prolonged treatment, while a few distemper cases may develop into equine influenza and be very serious.

Because of the complexity and difficulty in making a correct diagnosis, it is advisable to consult your veterinarian.

The tabloid Daily Mirror, Britain's largest circulation daily newspaper, said Kennedy was assuming "the biggest job in the world."

"Today in our biggest type we—the Daily Mirror—welcome the man," the newspaper said.

Other British papers preferred

intimate, frank sketches of Kennedy's personality to editorial comment on his inauguration.

In a dispatch from Washington, the Daily Mail said that Kennedy has "everything" but then added that he lacks human compassion to some degree.

In a "What's he really like" story, the Daily Sketch said Kennedy "bears grudges, curses like a sailor, is often broke, often late, drives too fast and plays jokes."

The Paris newspaper Combat said that "under the Republican administration, the United States met defeats in the field of technology where it thought it was beyond competition."

Combat added that "whatever his youthful ardor, John Kennedy will meet difficulties in putting his plans into effect."

L'Aurore said Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev might "regret" he no longer will be dealing with Eisenhower because of Kennedy's firm character.

In Germany, Die Welt of Hamburg said "Eisenhower's name will disappear from the headlines as of today. He preserved the peace but... was an adviser, not a man of action."

Dems to Elect New Chairman

John Bailey Selected to Succeed Jackson; Was Early Backer

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Democratic National Committee today to elect John Bailey of Connecticut, one of the original Kennedy supporters, as national chairman to prepare the party for the 1962 and 1964 elections.

Bailey, 56, an attorney and Connecticut Democratic chairman for the past 13 years, was President Kennedy's choice to succeed Sen. Henry M. Jackson of Washington.

Kennedy named Jackson chairman after the Democratic national convention last summer. Jackson agreed to take the post only for the duration of the presidential election campaign.

He announced that Kennedy's election victory that he would resign to devote full time to his Senate duties.

Bailey has been one of Kennedy's chief campaign advisers. He was an early Kennedy booster, for the vice presidential nomination in 1956 and for the top prize in 1960.

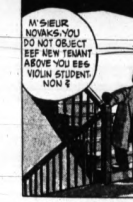

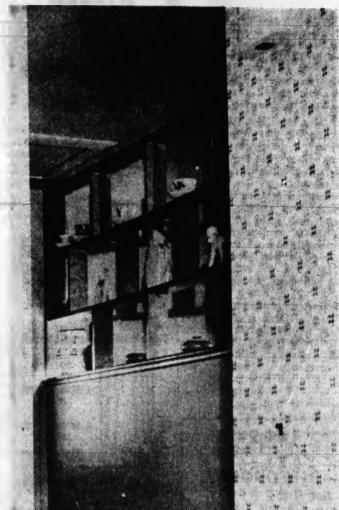

Imaginative Touches Lend Charm to Douglas Houston Residence

Two blonde chambers in lavender and white checked dresses met us at the door. Over their dresses Pamela and Cindy had lavender aprons, appliqued with pussy cats. They were definitely excited at the prospect of having their pictures taken.

The mother of these two preschool daughters said she was excited too. Mrs. Douglas Houston is an attractive young homemaker, rather typical of today's suburban wife and mother.

The Houstons live in a "project house" in Carole Acres. This is a Walled Lake subdivision, just off Decker Road and north of Pontiac Trail. They have a 73 by 120 foot lot. They moved to their new house from an apartment in Royal Oak three years ago.

Tilchin-Aaron Builders, Inc. of Detroit built the trim light gray brick house. There are black shutters on the front. In the carpet one side has storage with louvered doors.

Houston is handy around the house and has done many odd jobs since moving in; the carpet is one of his accomplishments. He's currently working on a bird set and taking a course in oil painting.

The front vestibule is just big enough to stand in while you take off your coat and hang it in the convenient closet there.

In the living room there are three big windows on the front.

These Mrs. Houston has dressed with three tiers of white cafe curtains.

The walls are painted ice green, while the carpeting is brown tweed.

There's a sofa and two chairs in this room with the necessary tables to hold lamps and accessories. The sofa is aqua with a raised design in the upholstery. Deeper aqua throwrugs make the design stand out. Two coral pillows provide a contrasting note.

The armchair near the windows is light brown. The other one is silpcovered in aqua, coral, gold and black. Tables are all cherry. Plants stand in redwood tubs.

In the dining room the Houstons show their ingenuity. It is an ordinary ell of the living room and the carpeting is extended. At the rear is the usual set of glass doors opening onto a patio.

LOUVERS

These doors are covered with inside louvered doors which give the appearance of more wall space. Doors and a wooden dado around two walls are painted the same green as the living room walls. Above there is paper depicting old tavern signs, aqua on white.

Shorter louvered doors close off a part of the kitchen or can be folded back against the wall.

Houston made the long table that holds the TV and serves also as a bench. On the wall there is one of his paintings.

The wing back sofa is upholstered in deep red. On the floor is a red braided rug.

The first bedroom opens to the vestibule and the hall. This is known as the hobby room and houses the hi-fi and painting materials. Walls are gray. There's a black desk with white drawers and brass hardware. The bookcase is made of bricks and boards.

In the bathroom there is pink tile on the floor and gray tile

on the walls. Above is white paper with gold birdcages and pink apple blossoms.

The Fernlike topped vanity is pink and white. Curtains are pink chaise.

Pam and Cindy have brown tile on the floor of their bedroom. Walls are pink with one wall papered in a carousel design.

Curtains are white trimmed with pink ball fringe. There's a pink quilted spread on Pam's bed. The dresser has a gray frame, pink drawers and satin brass knobs.

In the master bedroom walls and the rug are a creamy white. Curtains are white. The aqua chintz spread is quilted. Below is a blue and aqua ruffled skirt. Furniture is cherry. The little

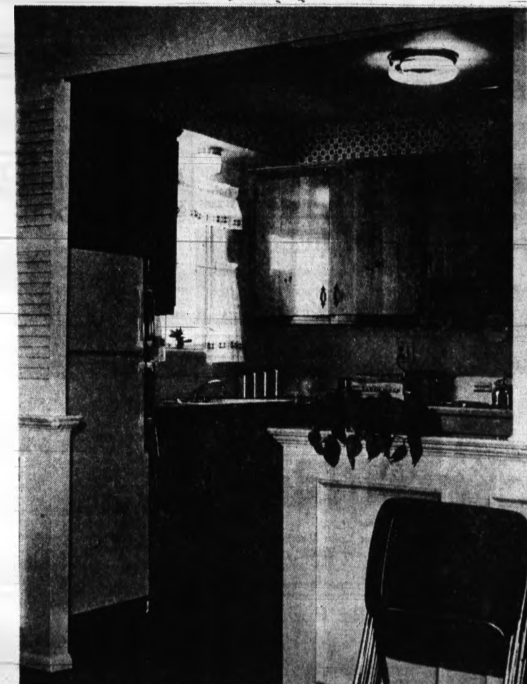

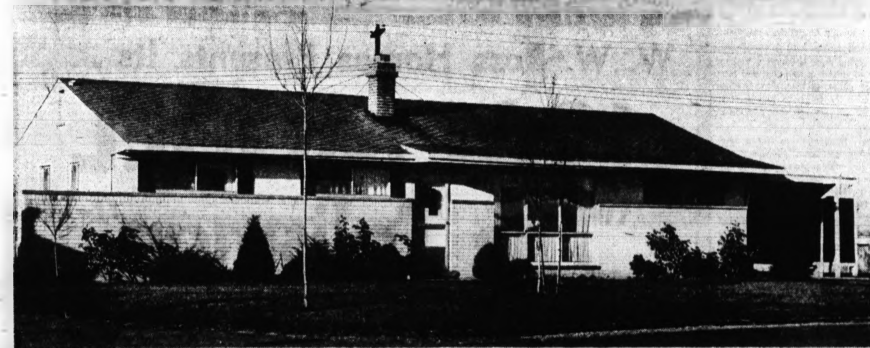

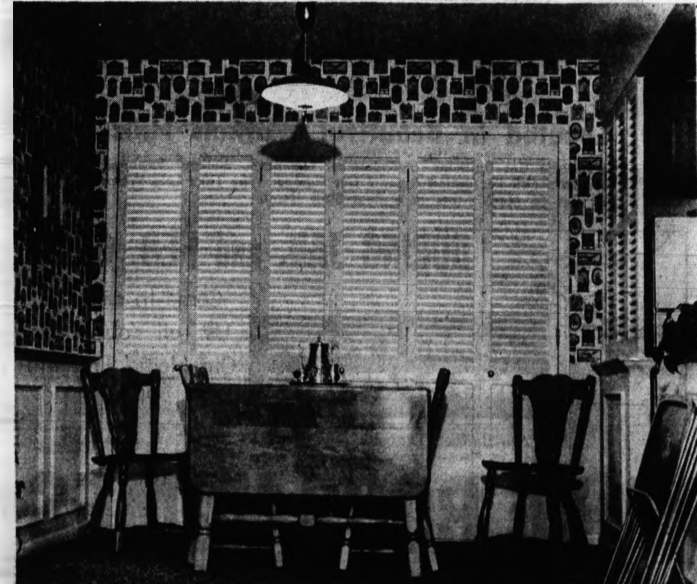

Try Resurfacing Kitchen Counter

Old kitchen counters can be given a bright and serviceable top by covering a base of granite, quarter-inch Masonite Preswood or Underlayment with flexible plastic sheeting.

Hardboard's smooth surface and uniform thickness simplify installation.

The nails or staples used to attach the underlayment to the old counter should be driven flush with the base so that the sheeting will fit smoothly.

The sink, any built-in burners and the old countertop surfacing should be removed before the hard-board base is fitted.

The shape of the counter area can be drawn on a piece of heavy building paper and then transferred to the hardboard and plastic surfacing.

Use a notched spreader to apply a latex-type adhesive to the hard-board.

Hand priming should be used to assure a firm bond.

A metal gaging strip may be applied to the edge of the counter-top to present a neat appearance.

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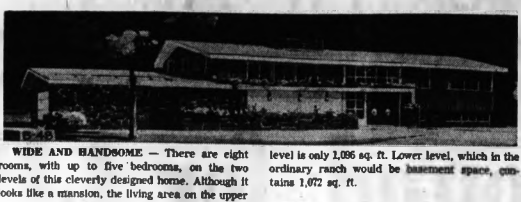
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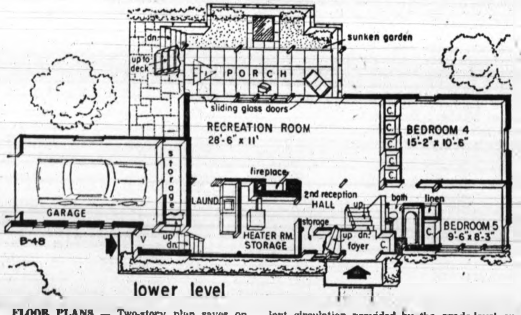
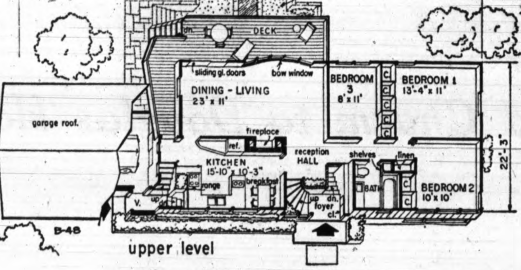

New Design Concept Yields Bonus Bedrooms

If you've been keeping an eye on new house plans, by now you've seen the rival to the popular ranch and split-level designs — a new concept which takes something from each.

It's alternately called the "raised ranch" or the "sunken two-story." The first name, however, doesn't really do justice to the grace and beauty which can be achieved in the new design and the second is not completely accurate, for the sleeping and living areas are not on separate floors.

But while the style itself has yet to be properly named, architects are constantly finding ever more pleasing ways to arrange the living space in such a home.

A prime example of this is today's House of the Week B-48, designed by Architect Rudolph Matern.

The lower story of this economical home nestles into the ground a bit — split-level style. This brings the upper story down to a convenient living level — actually as high as the first floor of many ranches with high basements.

The upper level in B-48 includes three bedrooms, large kitchen and living-dining room in 1,086 sq. ft. of ranch-style living, completely independent of the lower level. The lower level enlarges this living space economically deep in mind that, were this a ranch, the lower level would consume nearly as many materials in frequently wasteful basement.

While flexibility is high, B-48 plans call for development on the lower level of a second bath and two more bedrooms — making this a five-bedroom house — plus a grand recreation room, heater room, storage and laundry. Living area on this level totals 1,072 sq. ft.

Both the main and the service entries are at ground level, midway between the two floors. The main entrance has a charming foyer and the service entrance a vestibule opening on the one-car garage.

The recreation hall on the upper level is only 1,086 sq. ft. Lower level, which in the ordinary ranch would be basement space, contains 1,072 sq. ft.

Mobile fixtures can be adjusted to throw exactly the right study light, and then raised to provide general room light when studying is over.

Another way is to install a wall bracket with two fluorescent tubes, shaded by a faceboard.

Mounted six inches out from the wall, the bracket throws light on the desk and down on the desk, eliminating contrasts.

Your child's desk or study table should face a light-colored wall to reflect more light on the work and create a better seeing environment.

"In addition, the desk or table surface should be light-colored, or be covered with a light-colored blotter to avoid harsh contrasts," the engineers say.

Make Best Use of Lighting for Study Purposes

Lighting engineers report that the best type of light for studying comes from two light sources, one at each end of the desk, or from a single long light source across the desk.

One effective way to provide this light is to use wall or off-center ceiling fixtures, which also relieve the desk clutter and make for more working space.

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Winterize Oak Floors Now

Your fine oak floors, like your automobile, will perform far better during the rough winter months if you give them a modern winterizing treatment, home maintenance specialists say.

By performing better the experts mean the floors will be much easier to keep clean and sparkling even though subjected to the almost inevitable tracking in of snow and dirt. All they'll need is prompt wiping up of any "tracking" and a light once-over occasionally with a dry cloth or untreated dust mop.

For the average oak floor with finish in good condition, winterizing is a relatively simple chore. It consists merely of "dry cleaning," waxing and polishing.

Forget the old-time soap-and-water scrubbing or mopping routine, the experts advise. It's not only hard work but it's bad for the floor. It tends to wear the appearance of the finish and to raise the grain of the wood, causing a rough surface.

In "dry cleaning" by the new easy method you actually clean and wax at the same time. An approved wax-base liquid cleanser will remove stubborn dirt, marks and old wax.

Just pour a little on the floor, a small area at a time. Spread it around well with soft cloth or long-handled applicator. With a clean dry cloth soak up the loosened dirt and residue. Then wipe the floor dry and polish with a clean soft cloth, electric polisher or long-handled applicator equipped with a dry pad.

That's all there is to it if you use the type of cleaner containing a heavy wax content. Some homemakers, however, prefer the kind of cleaner with a thinner wax content. When this type is employed, it is advisable to follow up with a separate coating of wax.

Asbestos cement sheets used in doors can be easily painted with the same paints used for plaster walls. First apply a conventional oil, alkyd or latex primer. After this has dried, follow with the desired flat, semigloss or gloss finish coat. If the sheets are being used for shower stalls and where moisture conditions are severe, several coats of a solvent-type alkali-resistant resin paint should be applied.

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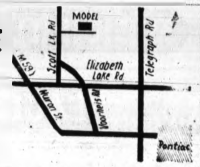
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Winter GARDEN NOTES

A timeless vogue — sometimes caused by the onslaught of winter or instigated by the homemaker with a green thumb — has been the cultivation of a potpourri of plants in the home. These bits of greenery have now grown from pots-on-the-sill status to a fascinating new decorating factor. Be it a miniature arrangement for a window box or a large setting, or a complicated interior landscape at the end of a room, the "indoor garden" can enrich a decorating scheme and be an interesting focal point.

Rebecca Petrik, A.I.D., sets an easy example for any homemaker to follow that highlights the diversity of indoor garden ideas and the refreshing beauty. If properly executed, that they can give to any room in the house.

In a long, narrow room, treated as a guest study, the window wall was divided with vertical, natural wood beams. On the vinyl tile floor in this area, Miss Petrik arranged a curved platform of white-washed bricks on which were placed a wide range of plants established in varying shapes of white and natural clay pots. This intriguing mass of greenery was then accented with a trio of tall, thin candlesticks and a handsome bronze sculpture.

The resulting effect combined color, design and the psychological impact of nature in a pleasant and easy integration to make a serene

and attractive atmosphere for reading.

Why don't my philodendron's leaves split? This is the most common question asked at plant clinics. When P. pertusum is young its leaves are heart-shaped, without a deeply-lobed margin. On older plants the leaves split and develop their characteristic appearance. If they are grown in too dark a location or if they are not fertilized regularly they will revert to the juvenile leaf condition.

Thus it can quickly tell you if it isn't getting enough light. If the top leaf comes out small and with an entire margin, move the plant to a brighter spot, and feed it with fish tablets if they are available in your community.

This plant is very much like MONSTERA DELICATISSIMA, the so-called Swiss cheese plant, which eventually develops leaves with various sized holes in them. Both are natives of tropical Mexico and require a rich potting mixture of peat moss, leaf mold and fir bark. The medium should be kept constantly moist and never allowed to dry out.

A location, by an east window is best but a bright north window is also good. On an interior wall it will grow but the leaves will be without their deeply cut margin.

To Have or Not — a Basement?

In planning a new home, the question arises whether or not to have a basement.

There are a number of things to consider, suggests the Title Council of America. For instance: Is there a drainage problem? If your home is on low ground where drainage is a problem, a basement might be a constant source of trouble.

Can the basement also be a recreation room? If this is so, it opens an entirely new area of home enjoyment. You can have a room especially designed for fun. If this is in your plans, use equipment and materials to keep maintenance at a minimum. That's why ceramic tile for floors and walls is so popular. It's easy and inexpensive to care for. It never needs to be waxed, polished or refinished.

Is there direct access to the outdoors? Without a basement door, the utility of your basement will suffer, and so will the inside cellar stairs which will have to carry all the traffic.

Is there adequate storage room elsewhere? A necessary function of a basement is storage. If there is no space elsewhere, a basement becomes essential regardless of cost.

These are just a few of the

questions involved. There are many others to be considered. The important thing is to think carefully about the basic need or lack thereof of a basement.

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FHA Approves Room Count for Bathrooms

For the first time since the Federal Housing Administration was created in the 30's, bathrooms now have a room count in apartment house minimum property standards.

Under the new standards, a full bathroom is given a half-room count on all sized apartments. A second full bathroom also receives a half-room count, except in so-called efficiency apartments — that is, apartments which do not have a bedroom.

Establishment of a room count for bathrooms means that builders can obtain additional mortgage insurance on multi-family construction. Thus the FHA, after 30 years, has recognized the importance of additional bathrooms in the construction of rental housing.

The FHA, in making this revision in its standards, has recognized that apartment house builders were being penalized for building extra bathroom facilities since they have not been able to obtain additional FHA insurance for such additions.

FHA sees the likelihood of improved quality in bathrooms as a result of the revised standards. Since builders will be receiving a specific amount of mortgage insurance for bathrooms, they will have more money for improving the quality of their bathroom installations.

"Modern Bathroom Plans" is the title of a booklet containing 34 suggested layouts for bathrooms and powder rooms. The booklet is helpful in new construction as well as modernization.

LEOPOLDVILLE, Congo (UPI)—White residents of Oriental Province appealed today for U.N. protection against a "reign of terror" being waged by local authorities who support imprisoned ex-premier Patrice Lumumba.

A similar appeal was sent here Friday by white men living in Kivu Province, another Lumumbist stronghold.

Troops loyal to strong man Col. Joseph Mobutu were reported massing today on the border between Equatorial and Oriental provinces opposite pro-Lumumba forces, but soldiers on each side were said to be deploying for defense rather than attack.

It was reported Friday that Belgian troops had moved up to the border of the Ruanda-Urundi trust territory, across the river from the Kivu capital of Bukavu, but authorities in Brussels denied any plan to attack.

Pontiac Man Complains Indict Mail Order Club on an Obscenity Charge

Pontiac Postmaster William W. Donaldson revealed Friday that a mail order club against which Pontiac postal authorities had filed a complaint has been indicted by a federal grand jury in Chicago.

The organization, indicted for conspiracy to violate the postal obscenity law was a group of alleged homosexuals operating under the name Adonis Male Club and International Body Culture Association with headquarters in Chicago.

Donaldson said an unidentified Pontiac man had complained about the organization.

"A letter containing advertising material pictures and so forth received by a Pontiac man last week," Donaldson asserted.

"He turned the material into our office and we immediately forwarded it to the postal inspector in charge, at Chicago, for his inspection."

"It is good to know that the operators of this club have been indicted," Donaldson asserted.

The indictment was announced this week by former Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield.

Red China's Food Rations Dwindling

MACAO (UPI)—Food rations in Red China are so scanty that "even the birds would find it hard to survive," refugees arriving in this Portuguese-ruled colony said today.

The underfed appearance of the refugees underscored reports of a near-famine behind the bamboo curtain.

The group, mostly men, said each person in their town in Communist China received four taels (5.3 oz.) of rice daily, plus an occasional few vegetables.

The refugees said there had been a "drastic cut" in food rations, the latest and worst in a series which have left rice bowls in the world's most populous country virtually empty. They said they made plans for escape when the latest ration reduction was announced.

Wyandotte Couple Die in Collision

A Wyandotte couple was killed Saturday when their car was struck broadside by another auto and then smashed by a semitrailer truck in the Detroit suburb of Southgate.

The deaths were the first recorded in the state by the Associated Press since it began its weekend count at 6 p.m. Friday night.

Killed in the crash were Charles P. Macivone, and his wife Helen both 48.

Two other persons were injured in the mishap, one critically.

Charge Discrimination at Bay City Skate Rink

BAY CITY (UPI)—The owner and manager of a skating rink were charged in Municipal Court Friday with racial discrimination.

To Scrutinize Foreign, Defense Policies

Sweeping Review Expected From Kennedy

By JOHN M. BRIGHTON
WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy is expected to be sent immediately a sweeping review of U.S. foreign and defense policies to determine how he can work toward worldwide peace and cooperation as set forth in his inaugural address.

Diplomats predict the survey of international relations and the development of new or revised programs will lead to early, high-level consultation with allied governments as a prelude to negotiations with the Soviet Union.

Kennedy told the world after being sworn in Friday that both sides in the cold war should "begin now the quest for peace, including a fresh start on disarmament and other critical problems. His words stood as a challenge to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev who has called for an early return to summit conference.

The new president did not mention a summit conference nor any other form of negotiation in his specific terms. The burden of his

statement seemed to be that it is not the form but the purpose of negotiations that is important. He had said during the political campaign last fall that a meeting at the summit must give advance promise of agreement.

CAUTIONS AGAINST CHAIR
In his first official declaration as president, Kennedy said that the United States would never "negotiate out of fear."

Kennedy said, in "tearful" words that the problems which unite us instead of belaboring those problems which divide us.

He called for "serious and honest" control of the inspection and control of arms, and that both the Allied and Soviet blocs are overburdened by the cost of modern weapons. Several months probably will be required to develop such proposals.

Both sides could work together in the development of science, including the conquest of space. Kennedy declared and both could eventually undertake to create a new "world of law" in which peace and justice would be secured.

The difficult task now before the new administration is to devise programs by which these general statements of purpose can be translated into specific proposals for action.

The same thing holds true for Kennedy's pledge to work in close

cooperation with allied countries, to support the freedom of the new nations of Asia and Africa, to strengthen the United Nations and to create a "new alliance of progress" with "our sister republics" of the Western hemisphere.

With Secretary of State Dean Rusk and other Cabinet members taking office today, and with the U.S. training of organizing the new government still ahead, no one here now knows how long the task of developing new plans will take.

The only negotiation pending in the disarmament field is the Geneva conference on a nuclear weapons test ban. In suspension since late last year, this conference is scheduled to resume Feb. 7.

State Department officials expect the Kennedy administration will have to seek a delay. In the U.S. General Assembly, which resumed last year, it was decided to return March 7, a delay in that meeting has not been suggested, so the new administration has about half to get ready for the whole range of problems normally before the Assembly.

In at least one crisis Kennedy and Rusk have no choice but to move ahead rapidly. The conflict in Laos, which placed the closing months of the Eisenhower administration in a perilous position, the United States is supporting the pro-Western government of Premier Bou Soum. The Soviets, the legal premier is Souvanna Phouma, who the country by last month after warring factions destroyed the ability of his

neutralist regime to maintain order.

NEEDS DELIVER ARMS
Communist forces have been delivered to rebel forces from neighboring North Vietnam in Soviet planes. The State Department fears a Red triumph in Laos would endanger all Southeast Asia. Armed U.S. training planes have been made available to the pro-Western forces.

But more than a clash with Communist forces is involved in Laos. For the United States, Britain and France have differed among themselves over how to handle the situation. Though U.S. and British cooperation is now much stronger, the Laotian crisis still presents an immediate test of Kennedy's declared aim of drawing the Allies together in the most possible unity.

State Department officials believe the Cuban crisis, intensified by a break in relations early this month, will not require the most urgent attention from the new administration. The same thing is

to be true of the chaos in the Congo, where Washington is relying primarily on the United Nations to restore order.

But the international financial predicament of the United States, another problem carried over from the old administration, is believed by some of Kennedy's advisers to need immediate study and action. The United States has been losing gold and dollars to foreign countries at the rate of more than \$4 billion a year. This imbalance has raised grave doubts about the stability of the dollar. Officially, say the advisers, must be found in measures to expand American sales abroad and to cut this country's foreign costs.

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Castro Offers 'Peace Terms' Man Hurt in Scuffle With Thief

Lists His Conditions for Reopening Better Relations With U. S.

HAVANA (AP) — Fidel Castro offered Friday night to "begin anew" a quest for peace with President Kennedy's administration. But the Cuban prime minister made clear it would be strictly on his own terms.

The main condition for reconciliation laid down by Castro was a total change in what he labeled a "mistaken and absurd" policy of the United States toward his Communist-oriented revolution.

While Castro was laying down peace terms in a two-hour speech to followers at the Presidential Palace, his fiery younger brother sounded a belligerent note in an address at Santiago.

Raul Castro, minister of Cuba's armed forces, told supporters that the imperialist dangers still existed around and fled north in the direction of Guantanamo.

Both Castros addressed civilian audiences who are being partly demobilized after Cuba's three-week military alert against a "Zankee invasion" that never came.

But despite the presence of some 30,000 militiamen at the Presidential Palace to hear Fidel, hundreds of others remained on duty at key posts.

Note Big Increase in Traffic Accidents

An alarming increase in reported auto accidents during 1960 was disclosed today by the Pontiac Police Department year-end traffic statistics.

Accidents last year totaled 2,878, up from 1,824 in 1959—an increase of 52.2 per cent. Ten persons were killed in accidents in 1960, one more than the previous year. Four of the victims were pedestrians.

The annual police report also showed that the number of people injured in accidents last year shot up sharply.

Injured persons in 1960 numbered 1,095, as compared to 888 in 1959. This is a 36.8 per cent rise.

Of the accidents, 2,155 involve property damage only, 719 injuries and eight deaths.

The report showed that more than three times as many men were involved in accidents as women, 2,800 to 1,081, and drivers in the 25-34 age group were involved in more accidents than any other age group.

Also, persons in the 25-34 age group led the classifications of the injured.

Talk of the Problems Between 2 Countries May Meet Jack Soon

MOSCOW (AP)—Fresh on the heels of the inauguration of President Kennedy, Premier Khrushchev called in U.S. Ambassador J. Lee Thompson for a two-hour talk today. An embassy spokesman said they discussed "Soviet-American problems."

No further details were given about the subjects of the talks. It was presumed that Khrushchev wanted for an early meeting with Kennedy in an effort to establish a warmer relationship such as he felt he had worked out with President Eisenhower at the time of the Camp David meeting.

Khrushchev had with him Vasili Kostanov, deputy foreign minister, and A. K. Dobrynin, chief of the American section of the Foreign Office.

Each had interpreters, although much of the conversation was in Russian directly between Khrushchev and Thompson, who speaks relatively good Russian.

Khrushchev did not waste any time getting in touch with Kennedy. He and President Leonid Brezhnev sent Kennedy a telegram Friday expressing hope "we can remove existing suspicion and distrust and grow the seeds of friendship and businesslike cooperation between our two peoples."

Approval of Jack's Cabinet

Confirmation of Rusk as Secretary of State Is Unanimous

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate took up President Kennedy's Cabinet nominations one by one today, starting off with unanimous approval of Dean Rusk to be secretary of state.

The vote vote on confirmation followed warm praise of Rusk by both Democratic and Republican senators meeting in an unusual Saturday session.

Sen. Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., the majority leader, said that each of the 10 Cabinet nominations would be taken up separately, along with that of Adlai E. Stevenson, Kennedy's appointee as U.S. representative to the United Nations with the rank of ambassador.

Then next week the Senate will turn to Kennedy's domestic legislative program, taking up a bill to provide federal aid for areas plagued by chronic unemployment.

Senate committees already have conducted hearings on the various nominations and have recommended their confirmation.

Soon after Rusk was approved, the Senate confirmed—also without objection—the nomination of Douglas Dillon to be secretary of the Treasury and Robert S. McNamara to be secretary of defense.

McNamara, 41, left the presidency of the Ford Motor Co. to head the nation's defense establishment.

Dillon is a Republican investment banker from New York who served as ambassador to France and as undersecretary of state in the Eisenhower administration.

Dillon was described by both Republican and Democratic senators as unusually well qualified for the Treasury post, although his agreement to serve in the Kennedy Cabinet stirred some political rumblings at the time.

'Inaugural Blizzard' Moves On

The East Coast's "inaugural day blizzard" moved out to sea today, but the weather was making itself felt elsewhere.

Michigan was reminded of mid-January's tendency to make trouble as a cold blast forced temperatures far below zero in parts of the state. A new snowfall added to the woes.

The mercury plunged to 10 below at Pontiac and 15 below at Alpena, both in Northern Lower Michigan. South of there, in the Upper Peninsula, it was below.

The State Highway Department reported road conditions at 6 a.m. were poor in Michigan.

Up to six inches of snow fell on West Michigan and highways south of Traverse City and west of Cadillac. Grand Rapids and Kalamazoo were generally slippery.

Highways in the area bounded by Traverse City, Houghton Lake, Mount Pleasant and Newaygo were slippery in spots.

Light snow created an occasional slippery spot in the Bay City area. Light snow also made highways in Wayne County slippery in spots.

Road conditions over the rest of the Lower Peninsula were not as bad.

Temperatures in the 30s would be welcome in some places, but Florida observed in some readings as smaller pots burned to protect the citrus crop.

The violent blizzard, which buried the Northeast under 29 inches of snow, has claimed 68 lives, 20 of them in Pennsylvania alone.

The Northeast fought to shake off the storm's grip. Travel was disrupted, schools and businesses closed, and many events postponed.

FLIGHTS GROUNDED

Detroit has had nearly 2,000 unexpected guests the last two nights as snow-covered runways in the East forced airlines to terminate flights in the Motor City.

At one time, American Airlines had 10 jet planes on the ground at Detroit Metropolitan Airport. Trans-World, United and Capital Airlines also cancelled numerous flights.

The New York Central Railroad's strike complicated matters. No NVC trains were going east.

The blizzard and near-blizzard hit the East Thursday and continued 24 hours. It swept across Canada's Maritime Provinces last night and was expected to smother Newfoundland today.

Eisenhowers Finally Find Place to Hang Their Hats

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP)—Dwight and Mamie Eisenhower, out of the White House less than a day, settled down today in the first private home they have ever known.

Throughout their married life, the Eisenhowers have always lived at temporary addresses. Some of them have been excellent ones, such as 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington, D.C., Supreme Headquarters, Allied Powers in Europe, and the President's Residence.

But wherever they have lived in the past, the Eisenhowers always knew a moving day was soon.

Now, regardless of how far they may travel, an attractive white brick and fieldstone house with 14 bedrooms and 8 baths will always be home.

The Eisenhowers bought their farm on the edge of the Gettysburg Battlefield in 1959 and immediately began renovating the ancient house. The renovation was completed in 1960 at a cost of some \$120,000. They spent their last night there in March, 1960.

Harry Truman Breaks Walk Routine to Visit JFK at White House

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy, his inaugural fun over, got down to work today with a staff conference and a private talk with an unexpected visitor — former President Harry S. Truman.

Although another round of merry-making occupied Kennedy into today's early morning hours, he was only a little bit late for his first scheduled activity. And before that he took time out to inspect the executive mansion into which he moved Friday.

He showed up for his first staff meeting as president about 15 minutes later than the scheduled 9 a.m.

As that routine session ended, Truman stood up to the White

Protestant Churches Aid Starving People of Congo

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Two hundred and fifty thousand, five hundred pounds of powdered milk, 3,000 pounds of flour, 200,000 pounds of rice, and 33,000 pounds of dried beans, with a total value of nearly \$84,000, are now on the high seas, shipped by the Protestant Churches of America to meet desperate and increasing needs of starving refugees and war casualties in the embattled Congo.

The foods are the latest commitments in a relief program which, during the last six months, has shipped food and medicines worth \$27,000 to the Congo, according to Bishop Frederick B. Newell, acting executive director of Church World Service, cooperative overseas relief agency of major Protestant and Eastern Orthodox communions.

Relief materials are distributed by the Congo Protestant Relief Agency which channels supplies to areas where suffering is most acute. Distributions are made in two barrels of gunfire, roads crisscrossed with starving refugees, and hospitals, crowded to three and four times their capacity with sick and dying patients. According to reports from Congo, 250,000 to 300,000 refugees are in need.

Most of the drugs available in the overflowing hospitals have been contributed through Church World Service by American pharmaceutical manufacturers, and to date the total value of the shipments has reached nearly half a million dollars.

Much of the food is from American surplus stocks, donated by the United States government, but costs of distribution within the Congo are borne by the Protestant churches. The shipment of beans was contributed by CROP (The Christian Rural Overseas Program), the community food appeal of Church World Service.

Funds to continue this vital relief program are urgently needed. Bishop Newell has appealed to Protestants to contribute as generously as possible to their own denominations, directly to Church World Service, at 475 Riverside Drive, New York 27, N.Y., or to the Christian Rural Overseas Program at 117 West Lexington Ave., Elkhart, Indiana.

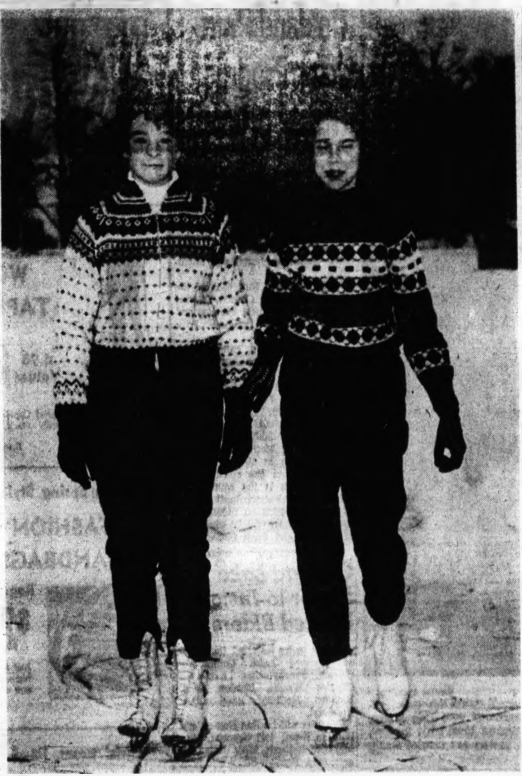

But hearts ached for a woman who sat two seats away from Mrs. Kennedy and who could hardly hold back her tears.

She was Pat Nixon, the woman who might have been first lady. Her face was a mirror of sadness.

At times she tried to smile but most of the time she closed her eyes and tilted her head to the side.

Once in a while she heaved a heavy sigh.

Her disappointment was not for herself but for her husband, Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who lost out to Kennedy in an incredibly close election.

Jacqueline Kennedy, 31, lived up to her reputation for being chic and elegantly simple in her dress. She wore a primly fitted beige coat with a round collar, a pill box hat of matching beige sitting on the back of her dark long hair, and carried a matching pink mink muff.

The sleeves of the coat were three-quarter length and she wore long white gloves to cover her arms against the bitterly cold day.

She looked delighted and daffy throughout the ceremony in front of the Capitol.

She kept a small smile on her face, and during her husband's moving inaugural address her eyes never left his face.

The new mistress of the White House had President Eisenhower on her left and Lady Bird Johnson, wife of the new vice president on her right.

Eisenhower smiled benevolently at her.
