

Hopes Riding on Surveyor Soft-Landing System

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Surveyor 1, streaking toward a landing on the moon tomorrow morning, carries not only a camera but this nation's hopes of making the first touchdown gentle enough for men to survive.

Surveyor is due to settle on a broad equatorial plain at 1:17 a.m. EST and begin radioing

pictures which will help scientists pick the safest areas for Apollo astronaut landings later in this decade.

If everything works, Surveyor will fire retro-rockets to break its approach speed from 6,100 miles an hour to 3½ miles an hour, then drop gently the final 14 feet with

less impact than a parachute feels on earth.

The Soviet Union's ball-shaped Luna 9, which radioed the first pictures from the lunar surface last Feb. 3, apparently was ejected from a carrier vehicle at a height of several hundred feet.

"Information and pictures

recently released in Moscow indicate the fall probably would have been fatal to an unprotected human," said Dr. Thomas Vrebalovich of Jet Propulsion Laboratory, which is guiding Surveyor on its quarter-million-mile flight.

Dr. Vrebalovich, a Surveyor project scientist, said in an interview that the Luna 9 tech-

nique was similar to one abandoned by the U.S. space agency years ago.

He referred to the early Ranger shots, originally planned to drop instruments imbedding balsa wood balls just before they crashed into the moon.

The balls later were left off the spacecraft to allow more

room for television cameras which radioed back history's first close-ups of the moon as they plunged to destruction.

The Soviets have never disclosed just how Luna 9 was landed, but Dr. Vrebalovich said it was obvious the 200-pound ball carried no retro-rockets.

Monitoring of Soviet signals

indicated that the carrier vehicle fired a retro-rocket about 40 miles above the lunar surface and shortly afterwards ejected the crushproof ball, which popped open on impact and started a camera, he said.

The 2,200-pound Surveyor, however, carries both camera and retro-rockets on its spindly three-legged frame.

Housing Plans Take Big Step

City Gets OK for 250 Senior Citizen Units

Plans for the construction of public housing units for Pontiac senior citizens moved a giant step forward yesterday.

City officials received word that Pontiac has been approved for 250 units of public housing designed for the elderly.

Mayor William H. Taylor Jr. said the Public Housing Administration has reserved the units for Pontiac and the next step would be to apply for a planning grant.

City officials have estimated the planning funds would total \$42,500.

Taylor said the federal government would supply the grant application documents.

However, he indicated the city's 1966 workable program for community improvement must be certified before the city receives any federal aid.

After being returned by regional officers of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), the workable program was resubmitted April 6 with six to eight weeks of time estimated to secure the program's approval.

In the interim, city officials were to report any progress made in conjunction with the workable program.

City officials indicated last

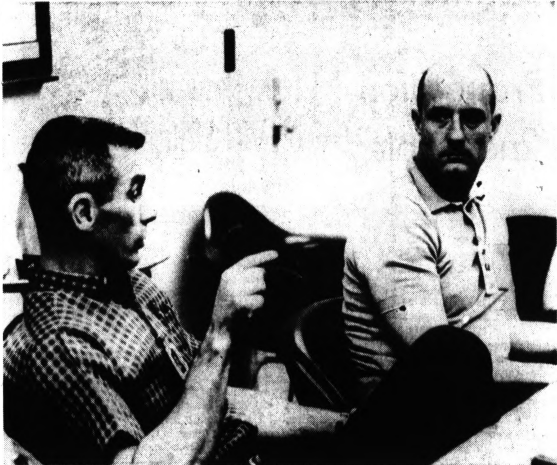

Urges DeLoe

'Boost City's Downtown Area'

Pontiac business leaders were urged to band together to stimulate the downtown area yesterday by John S. DeLoe, a General Motors Corp. vice president and general manager of Pontiac Motor Division.

The advice was offered by DeLoe in a speech before 350 persons attending an interservice club luncheon at the Pontiac Elks Temple.

DeLoe was introduced by Harold A. Fitzgerald, publisher of The Pontiac Press.

"We are not the model community we should be," said DeLoe.

"Pontiac has everything going for it — full employment, an extremely high average family income, and GM pays much of the taxes — but in spite of this I think you would agree it does not have the appeal it should have."

CHANGE IMAGE

The city, he said, could change its image through aggressive action, much like Pontiac Motor executives did for the Pontiac car ten years ago.

DeLoe credited former Pontiac general manager Simon Knudsen, with making the Pontiac a prestige car with youthful appeal.

Other major cities have undergone successful transformations, DeLoe said, and Pontiac could do the same with little trouble if its master plan was implemented.

"To get the job done, however, petty bickering and minor

differences of opinion must be eliminated," he added.

"My business experience tells me that it's better to get behind a good program and get the job done, even if it isn't 100 per cent your own way, than waste time arguing about some slight difference and lose the whole thing."

The program needs leadership from the business community because the City Commission cannot and should not have to do the whole job, said DeLoe.

"Hopefully, the chamber of commerce could supply this leadership.

"In every successful program of this nature in the country, a small group of businessmen rose as leaders to organize, push and implement the program," said DeLoe.

"Who are these giants in Pontiac?"

SAIGON (UPI) — The government and Buddhist leaders announced tonight they had reached an agreement to end their civil war.

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—The Gemini 9 mission was canceled today because of last-minute problems with the spacecraft. The flight was rescheduled for Friday morning.

Frustrated once before by rocket failure, Stafford and Cernan awoke today fit and ready for a second attempt to carry out the most difficult of U.S. space assignments.

The control center said that it received an indication of shroud separation when a light blinked on in ground tracking equipment. However, the light went out shortly afterward.

If the shroud had separated, the light should have stayed on.

PROTECTIVE COVER

The shroud, made of fiberglass material, is designed to protect the satellite from buffeting and heat during the blastoff.

It was to have separated at the time the Atlas engines cut off and kicked the satellite loose.

The Gemini 9 count ticked on toward a planned 11:38 a.m. lift-off.

The first goal of the three-day mission of space men Thomas P. Stafford and Eugene A. Cernan was to catch the target after a 75,000-mile pursuit and link up with it high above the Pacific in late afternoon.

During the chase they were to execute orbit-shifting maneuvers similar to those apollo astronauts must make in leaving the moon for return trips to earth.

Informed that the target was in orbit, Stafford called out "Good show, Len," to Len

Schull, test conductor in the Atlas blockhouse.

Schull then said: "We knew if you stuck there long enough, we'd get you a good one."

PAST FRUSTRATION

The highlight of the exciting journey was to come tomorrow, when Cernan leaves the spacecraft and for nearly 2½ hours becomes a human satellite hurtling through space at fantastic speed.

One problem was overcome and another minor one was ignored before rocket crews went into the final complex countdown for the doubleheader launch.

"We were ready two weeks ago, and we're ready now," said confident Cernan.

Technicians cleared up a minor electrical problem in the Atlas last night and received the green light to begin the countdown.

This morning another piece of telemetry equipment which measures the temperature of the liquid oxygen in the fuel cell power system was found to be inoperative.

But it was decided that this was not mandatory for the flight.

School Costs Likely to Hike City Tax Rate

Pontiac taxpayers will likely pay \$1.20 more per \$1,000 of assessed property value this year over 1965 in city, school and community college taxes.

City Assessor James E. Kephart last night unveiled the probable 1966 tax rate in a report to the City Commission.

Kephart said the rate was tentative until final figures were submitted by the Pontiac School Board.

Kephart estimated the combined tax rate this year would total \$45.90 per \$1,000 assessed value, compared to \$44.70 last year—an increase of \$1.20.

Thus, the owner of a home assessed at \$5,000 will pay \$6 more in taxes this year than in 1965. The total bill will jump from last year's \$223.50 to \$229.50 on the same house.

The 1966 increase is still less than the jump last year of \$3.14 per \$1,000 assessed value.

County Dems Hear Hopefuls

No Official Backing; Soapy Gets Ovation

The Oakland County Democratic Committee last night voted officially against endorsing any of the three party candidates for U.S. senator, but it was clear that members unofficially support former Gov. G. Mennen Williams.

Williams, his major opponent Detroit Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh, and admitted underdog James L. Elmsman, a Birmingham attorney, appeared before the committee to discuss issues.

County Democratic Chairman George Googanson called the meeting after receiving a request from Cavanagh in March for endorsement from the committee.

Elmsman did not seek endorsement, and Williams, according to Googanson, simply said "The committee should do what's best for Oakland County."

As expected, the committee decided to follow its traditional, noncommittal policy in a primary and voted 51 to 22, to continue its stand.

But if there was any doubt about who they favored, it disappeared yesterday.

Guildsmen in NY Favor News Union

NEW YORK (UPI)—A group of New York Newspaper Guild members, "disgusted" by the 38-day newspaper strike, called yesterday for the formation of a new union to represent the interests of editorial personnel.

An announcement of plans to form the union claimed that 75 per cent of the editorial workers on New York papers backed the idea "before we even started."

Representatives of the striking guild and the World Journal Tribune, Inc., met again yesterday to discuss the number of jobs to be exempt from union jurisdiction in the newly merged newspaper firm.

An organizing group of seven, including columnists Dick Schaap and Jimmy Breslin and cartoonist Walt Kelly, called a meeting to set up a union "which will step out and get reporters some real money instead of shuffling papers over the right of two typists in accounting."

"Editorial people want to work on newspapers, not have them shut down while the guild negotiates ways for phone clerks to leave the business," the announcement said. "We look forward to the future when editorial people will withdraw from the guild."

Exec Is Named by Red Cross

Kenneth A. Winter has been named manager of the Oakland regional office of the Southeastern Michigan Chapter of the American National Red Cross.

Winter's appointment, effective today, was announced by chapter chairman Sylvester F. Leahy of Orchard Lake.

The regional office is located at 118 Franklin Blvd.

Leahy noted Winter has been a field representative in the chapter's downriver office for several years.

Winter has been on a number of national disaster assignments including the 1963 Kentucky-Virginia floods, the Chesterfield Township tornado of 1964 and against Governor George Romo two months on duty in Louisiana following disastrous Hurricane Betsy in 1965.

He succeeds Donald M. Miller who joined the Pontiac Area United Fund staff this week as an associate director in charge of U.F. campaign activities.

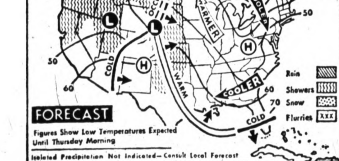

City Druggist Found Guilty

Convicted for Illegal
Prescription Pill Sale

Pontiac pharmacist Louis Finegold was convicted by a Municipal Court jury yesterday on a charge of illegally dispensing a prescription drug.

The guilty verdict came after 30 minutes of deliberation and ended a three-day trial before Judge Cecil B. McCallum.

Finegold, owner of L.O.U.'s Drugs & Hardware, 493 S. Sanford, is to be sentenced Monday. Conviction on the charge, a state law misdemeanor, carries up to 90 days in jail and \$500 fine.

Finegold was arrested April 2 on a warrant charging him with selling prescription tablets — later determined to be penicillin — to a police informer who had no prescription.

The informer, Samuel Adams, of 173 Elm, testified during the trial that he obtained the tablets Feb. 21 by walking into the store and asking Finegold for "some pills."

12 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value from 1965, while the combined school rate has been hiked \$1.32 per \$1,000 assessed value.

A slip containing a breakdown of the tax rate for last year and the current year will be mailed with each taxpayer's bill.

Pontiac School District accounts for the bulk of the \$1.20 increase per \$1,000 assessed value. Most of the hike comes from a hike in debt value of \$1.12 per \$1,000.

Meantime, the community college tax rate has increased two cents per \$1,000 assessed value from last year's \$1.25 levy.

FINAL FIGURE
Kephart reported last night that Pontiac's total evaluated value had been finalized at \$401,047,416—an increase of \$14,731,768 over 1965, but \$5 million under the total tax base estimated for the 1966 budget.

City officials previously said the \$5 million loss in tax base would mean only a loss of \$50,000 to the \$7.6 million general fund.

The total drop in city taxes results primary from taking off the interest in the water collection tax, used last year to finance purchase of a sanitary land-fill site.

Kephart emphasized that the tax levy for Pontiac School District was still tentative, pending of a final notification from the school board.

GENERAL FUND
An increase in the city's 1966 equalizing factor increased the charter-limited general fund levy by 17 cents per \$1,000 assessed value from last year's \$12.56 levy.

City tax bills, including the school and college taxes, are due after July 1.

Moon Treaty Prospect Good

U. S. Is Optimistic

Soviets Will Agree

WASHINGTON — U.S. officials said today the prospects for negotiating a treaty with the Soviet Union to ban use of the moon and other heavenly bodies for military purposes appear to be good.

The war in Viet Nam was the prime concern of the candidates.

The two countries are in agreement on the need for such a treaty, which would provide for international cooperation in exploring the moon and other celestial bodies.

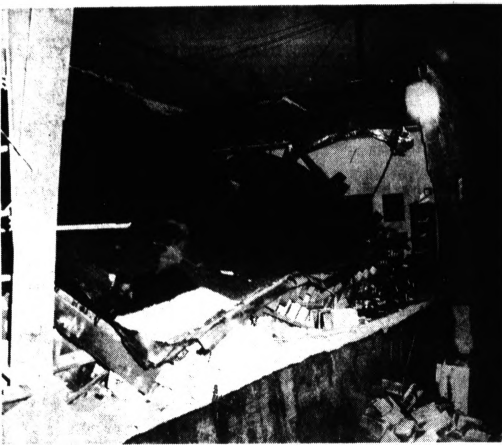
President Johnson had proposed May 7 that the United States should start early discussions of a moon treaty. The Soviet Union made what seemed to be a legal proposal to U.N. Secretary General U. Thant Monday. It was disclosed in New York Tuesday by Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko.

WELCOMES CALL
The Johnson administration welcomed the Soviet call for action and said the subject is so important that work on it should begin "without delay."

In the first comment here on the Fedorenko disclosure, White House deputy press secretary Robert H. Fleming said: "It appears to support the stand taken by the President in the May 7 statement."

A State Department spokesman said "we are encouraged by the apparently affirmative interest shown by the Soviet government in President Johnson's proposal. We believe that work on a celestial bodies treaty should begin without delay, and it is for that reason that we asked for an early meeting of the United Nations Outer Space Committee."

State Department press officer Robert J. McCloskey added: "We note that the Soviet letter to the apparent general speaks in favor of this put on the agenda of the General Assembly next fall. We see no reason to wait until then to begin this important work."

City commissioners last night approved a ballot proposition for the Aug. 2 state primary election, but referred for further study a request for a ballot proposal to create a third Municipal Court judgeship.

Commissioners were critical of the local bench for not "communicating" with them.

The commission did approve a ballot proposal to ask voters to amend the City Charter to permit "full-time elected officials" to come under the city's pension plan.

Municipal Judges Cecil B. McCallum and Maurice E. Finnegan, both reelected to six-year terms this spring, are the city's only full-time elected officials.

City officials were unable to state what the cost would be if the judges joined the pension plan retroactive to their respective starting dates.

In reference to the proposed third municipal judge, Mayor William H. Taylor Jr. said he would attempt to set up a meeting with both judges and the commission.

Talks Resumed on Viet Strife

Key Buddhist Target

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Buddhist leaders resumed their peace talks with Premier Nguyen Cao Ky's military junta today despite a mysterious grenade attack on one of the leading monks involved.

While the resumption of the negotiations seemed a hopeful sign in South Viet Nam's political crisis, rampaging student mobs sacked and burned the deserted U.S. consulate and at least three other buildings in the rebellious Buddhist stronghold of Hue.

Commissioner Robert C. Irwin, meantime, suggested that a pacting attorneys be consulted on what changes should be made in the operation of the municipal bench.

The municipal judges claimed the addition of a third judge would not cost the city anything and, in fact, could be paid for with an increase in filing fees and added court revenue.

They estimated 8,000 to 9,000 civil cases that should be heard by the local bench are now heard in justice courts in nearby townships.

In the war, U.S. pilots dropped half a dozen Soviet missiles in a near-circled area of attack on North Viet Nam but conventional ground fire knocked down three American jets. The assault on the Communist north included the heaviest single raid of the war, an 18-missile strike against the Yen Bay storage complex along the Red River 80 miles northwest of Hanoi.

HEAVY DAMAGE
An Air Force spokesman said more planes were sent against Yen Bay than any other individual target since the raids on the north began Feb. 7, 1965. He reported 25 anti-aircraft gun hits and 72 buildings destroyed and 44 buildings badly damaged.

The resumption of the negotiations in Saigon's Gia Long Palace between the junta and monks of the powerful Buddhist Institute followed a public declaration by Ky to carry out his promise to add civilians to the 10-man ruling directory.

In a statement broadcast by Saigon radio, Ky was quoted as saying: "The government of Viet Nam has decided to enlarge the National Leadership Committee to include representatives of mass organizations, religions and political parties."

"The National Leadership Committee will make immediate contact with mass organizations, religions and political parties to define the methods of participation and enlarge scope of the committee."

RAINFALL

Leaders Join in Airing of Downtown Problems

BIRMINGHAM — Problems connected with improving and promoting Birmingham's downtown business district were discussed by business and government leaders here last night.

City commissioners adjourned their public meeting early in order to attend the session at the Baldwin Public Library.

There they held a three-hour informal conversation with 40 to 50 merchants.

Aim of the meeting was to open a channel of effective communications between the commission and business community, according to Mayor Robert W. Page.

Heading the list of topics were traffic control and parking, the two perennial problems of merchants and their neighbors.

FIRST IN SERIES
Page said he hoped last night's session would be the first in a series of meetings with all interested groups — "residents as well as merchants."

The mayor, earlier in the evening, had been taken to task in the commission chambers on his recent appointment of a committee to promote commercial development in downtown Birmingham.

Commissioner Mrs. Ruth McNamee said she thought commercial development more properly was the concern of the chamber of commerce.

DeLorean said that recently he had visited a shopping center developed by Taubman near San Francisco, "and I must say that I was particularly impressed by the magnificent center. It was one of the finest structures of this type that I've seen. It was well built and well planned."

If such a development becomes a reality in Pontiac, surrounding land values would increase, said DeLorean, and in time apartments would rise in downtown Pontiac.

"For the first time in many years, you would find families moving into Pontiac," he said.

"I am confident that if you decide to go ahead with such a project it will serve as a magnet."

DeLorean cautioned, however, that the shopping would serve only as a nucleus. There should be a further revitalization, he said, based on "a strong coordinated program" that includes a civic center for cultural, social and educational activities, the planting of trees and shrubs, some simple rules to eliminate unsightly signs, posters and overhead lines and programs to provide low, medium, upper income and senior citizens housing.

"The shopping center will be the hub, but don't overlook all the other pieces which complete the transformation," said DeLorean. "I don't think your downtown rejuvenation will be as difficult as it sounds."

In addition to the local economic strength, all of Oakland County is undergoing a dynamic

City to Seek 2 Storm Sewers

Pontiac will petition the Oakland County Drain Commission for the construction of two storm sewers at an estimated cost of nearly \$400,000, according to City Commission action last night.

The commission agreed to petition for the storm drains as two additional neighborhood projects to help combat the city's estimated \$30 million storm drain problem.

Petitioning the county drain commissioner would put the cost of the two new storm sewers to city residents on the county tax bill at an estimated ten cents per \$1,000 assessed valuation on a 30-year bond issue.

City Engineer Joseph E. Nepling said the two drains would resolve drainage problems in sections on the north and east sides immediately north of the subdivision.

Construction of a relief sewer in the area of the Grand Trunk Belt Line Railroad and Featherstone on the east side would cost an estimated \$282,100, said Nepling.

Meantime, the second storm sewer is proposed in the vicinity of Baldwin and Walton on the north side at an estimated total cost of \$113,000.

The Featherstone sewer would resolve storm water flooding south of Mount Clemens on Kenilworth, Cameron and Emerson, according to the city engineer.

In addition, street improvements could be made once the storm water is taken care of, added Nepling.

The city engineer said the east side storm sewer would correct deficiencies in the existing storm drainage in Herrington Hills Subdivision and provide an outlet for the area immediately north of the subdivision.

He said acreage north of the subdivision could then be developed.

The second project would give relief to street flooding along Brooklyn, both east and west of Baldwin. Further consideration could also be given to street improvements in the area once the storm line is in place.

The north end drain also would provide storm sewers for unimproved acreage — some 73 acres — located immediately west of Kennedy Junior High School.

DETROIT (UPI) — The possibility of strikes by schoolteachers loomed throughout the Detroit area today as the Michigan Federation of Teachers threatened to take action if demands are not met.

Tom Hill, administrative assistant to the MFT president and Harold Ash, chief contract negotiator for the American Federation of Teachers, scheduled a news conference for today to announce final strike plans to the teachers.

Hill said strikes have been authorized by teachers "in Taylor Township, Ecorse, Melvindale and North Dearborn Heights."

"Unless negotiations speed up and bring an end to the current impasse," Hill said, "Teachers strikes will be inevitable."

Problems appeared especially touchy at Melvindale where teachers scheduled two picket lines "in an attempt to avert a final crisis" tomorrow.

Cost Is Estimated in British Sea Strike

LONDON (AP) — Britain's National Institute of Economic and Social Research said today that the national seaman's strike will cost the British economy \$56 million a month in trade and other earnings if it continues.

The institute, a private non-profit organization, said the 17-day-old strike could endanger seriously Britain's balance of payments if it lasts two more weeks.

It was the first independent estimate of the impact of the strike on the economy.

TO SET UP LINE

The teachers planned to set up a line in front of the board of education headquarters tonight and another tomorrow morning in front of Melvindale High School.

The Melvindale federation charged its competition, the Melvindale Education Association of "an attempt to smear the federation and break the impending teacher strike."

The education association charged in the list that federation representatives intimidated teachers, made obscene phone calls and threatened physical violence on teachers who would not strike.

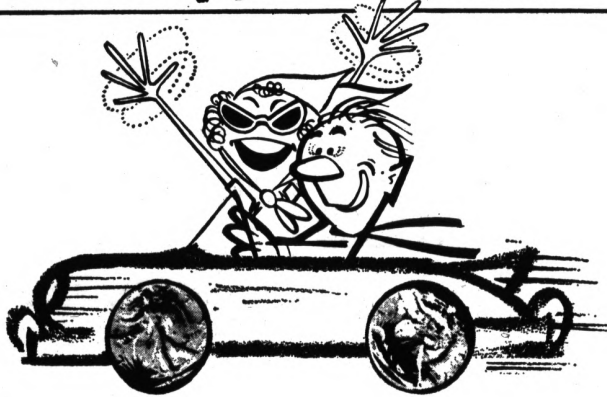

There's Still Time to Enter Big Bass

There's still time for Oakland County fishermen to win the Pontiac Press Big Fish Derby's opening day black bass contest.

The season started at 12:01 a.m. today and the near-freezing temperatures kept most anglers home. But they are expected to be out in force this afternoon and evening.

A \$50 savings bond will be awarded to the fishermen entering the heaviest black bass. The fish must be caught in county waters before midnight today and brought to The Press sports department between 6:30 a.m. and 8 p.m. Thursday.

The opening day bass winner also will be eligible for the \$50 savings bond that will be awarded to the heaviest Derby entry before the contest ends Sept. 5.

There also is a pie division. The current leader is 7 1/4 pounds. John L. Monier, 534 Fernhurst, Lake Orion, entered the early leader in the opening day bass section. He took a three-pound five-ounce largemouth on a Herter's spinner this morning at Lake Orion.

Monier reported catching one other bass.

Rubber spiders are producing

good catches of bluegills in shallow water on Pontiac, White, Orchard, Oakland and Orion lakes. A few perch are being taken at Lakeville and Pontiac.

Perch fishing is poor on Lake St. Clair and the pike and walleye fishing has slowed down considerably.

Catfish are biting along Long Point Drive near Fair Haven. Archers are doing well on carp at Pte. Mouille and on the Clinton and Salt rivers.

Anglers planning to try their luck on smallmouth bass near Grindstone City on Saginaw Bay this weekend will find the water much higher than last year. The outlook is for good to fair results — if the weather cooperates.

Pike fishing is good on the Cass River near the sugar corn field and on the Bunnobog river in Huron County. Calicoes are hitting small spoons at Caro-dam.

Dove Census Under Way

In mid-eastern, southern southwestern and west coast states the dove is a much sought after hunting target.

Classified as migratory game birds and under federal control, doves are primarily shot while flying to watering and feeding areas.

Conservation Department game men are quietly counting doves seen and heard along selected routes in Michigan.

Hunters who have gunned for doves in other states are producing the department for an open season. They are only a few voices, but the clamor could mount in the years to come.

The department has little data on doves that nest or pass through this state during the migration. "We just want to be prepared with the necessary facts," said one department official.

Baby Animal Problem

'Leave Them Alone'

"It's worse this spring than I can ever remember," said Howard Greene, district game biologist at the Conservation Department's Pontiac Lake office.

"The phone seems to be ringing every minute—people wanting to know what to do with baby wild animals and birds or wanting us to do something about them. It happens every spring.

"The best thing they can do is leave them alone."

Game experts list three reasons for not picking up wildlife babies:

• Young animals and birds need their real mothers to stand the best chance of surviving. Don't mistake them for being "orphans" if they are found alone in the wild (or in the backyard).

• It's against the law to possess game animals out of season.

• It could be a threat to the family health. Some wildlife diseases can be passed on to people.

"A lot of people find it pretty hard to leave what looks like a defenseless young animal right where it is," said George. "The mother isn't far away."

"Our biggest problem is getting people to understand this point. They don't see the mother so they think the baby has been left to fend for itself."

4-H Canine Club Slates Fun Match

The Oakland County 4-H Canine Club's first annual fun obedience match will be June 12 in the block building at the 4-H fairgrounds.

Open to any 4-H member who owns and has trained a dog in obedience, the match is expected to draw over 50 entries from Southeastern and Northern Michigan.

There will be five regular classes — subnovice A and B, novice, graduate novice and open — and special classes for 4-H leaders and junior handling.

Judges will be Donald Lawicki, Walled Lake; Carol Silverman, Detroit; and Miss Leslie Rowe, South Lyon. The program will get under way at 1 p.m. Post entries will be accepted.
