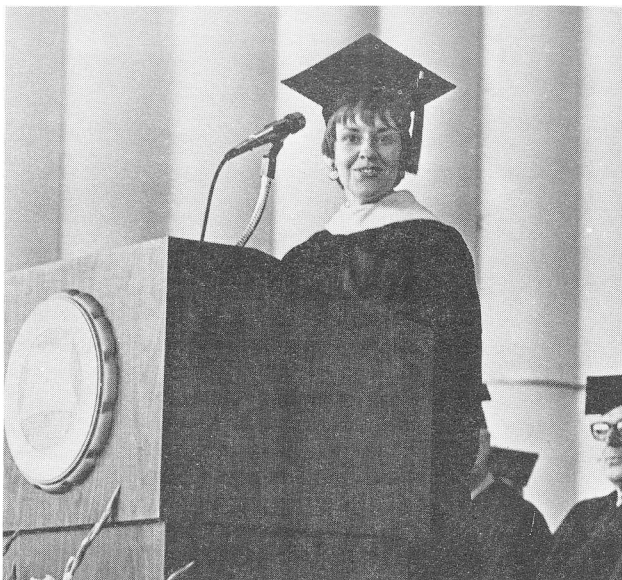

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Julie Fredrick Welcomes Graduates

Julie Fredrick, a member of the charter class that entered OU in 1959, welcomed 1,495 students into the Alumni Association at Commencement June 2.

Mrs. Fredrick (nee Becker) is vice-president of the Alumni Association and a 1963 graduate. Her husband, Jack, is a 1964 graduate.

Commencement speaker Leonard Woodcock, United Auto Workers president, urged students to become involved in politics and to not abandon their country. He asked that limits be placed on the amounts of money individuals or organizations could contribute to national campaigns and would set those limits at \$100 for a candidate to the U. S. House of Representatives, at \$250 for Senate candidates, and at \$500 for a candidate for President of the United States.

The 1,495 students included 634 who have completed their work in April, last December's graduates, and students who hope to complete their degree work in June or August. Of the 634 April degree recipients, there were 67 graduating with university honors.

Woodcock deplored Watergate and said the nation owed its gratitude to the *Washington Post* and to Watergate trial judge John Sirica. He said this national crisis is not a time for partisan advantage, and he defended the American political system.

WOODCOCK RECEIVES DEGREE

As highlights of the commencement, Woodcock received an honorary doctorate in law. Others honored and the fields of their honorary degrees follow: Sixten Ehrling, former conductor of the Detroit Symphony who has accepted new posi-

tions at the Juilliard School of Music and the Metropolitan Opera (musical arts); Nelson Meredith, president, Matilda R. Wilson Fund (law); Gifford G. Scott, Fellow of the American Physical Society and physicist with the Kettering Magnetics Laboratory (science); Leonard Spearman, chief, Division of Student Assistance, U. S. Office of Education (law); and Theodore Yntema, OU professor of economics and retired vice-president and chairman, Finance Committee, Ford Motor Company (humanities).

WILSON WINNERS

Miss Deborah Kalcevic, a political science major from Midland, and Earl Johnson, Jr., a history major from Detroit, were named winners of Oakland University's Matilda R. and Alfred G. Wilson awards as the outstanding senior students in the graduating class.

Miss Kalcevic, 21, maintained a 3.39 grade point average and was active in the students for McGovern and voter registration groups. She has been a member of the National Youth Caucus, a freshman orientation adviser, and a student adviser. She has participated in a student intern program in which selected undergraduates work in various student affairs offices to learn the administrative side of higher education.

Johnson was head of the OU student tutoring organization, president of the Association of Education Majors, vice-chairman of the Inter-Faith Council, president of the Pre-Seminarians, president of the Society for Academic Study of Religion, president of the Black Christian Lay Caucus, and house manager for the Meadow Brook Music Festival. He maintained a 3.31 academic average.

Black Scholarship Winners Named

Five academically gifted black students have been awarded four-year, competitive scholarships to Oakland University. The special scholarship program was begun at the institution last year.

The students, who all have better than a 3.50 average, were chosen on the basis of scholastic achievement, extra-curricular activities, and interviews. Each scholarship award is worth \$2,000.

The program was authorized last year by the OU Board of Trustees and five students were chosen then for scholarships effective with the 1972-73 year. The scholarships are granted to "academically gifted black students who have demonstrated the interest, maturity, and ability to benefit from and contribute to the programs at OU," the trustees said.

Winners for the 1973-74 academic year are:

Miss Cynthia O. Gay, River Rouge. Miss Gay maintained a 3.60 average at River Rouge High School.

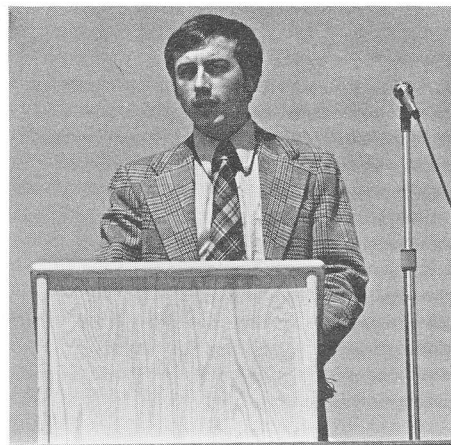
Edward Hewlett, Detroit. Hewlett carries a 3.60 average at Northern High School. He has been a participant in a Cadet Engineering Program offered at OU through a grant from the federal government.

Miss Sharri Lynn Rolland, Lapeer. Miss Rolland has maintained a 3.65 average at Lapeer Senior High School.

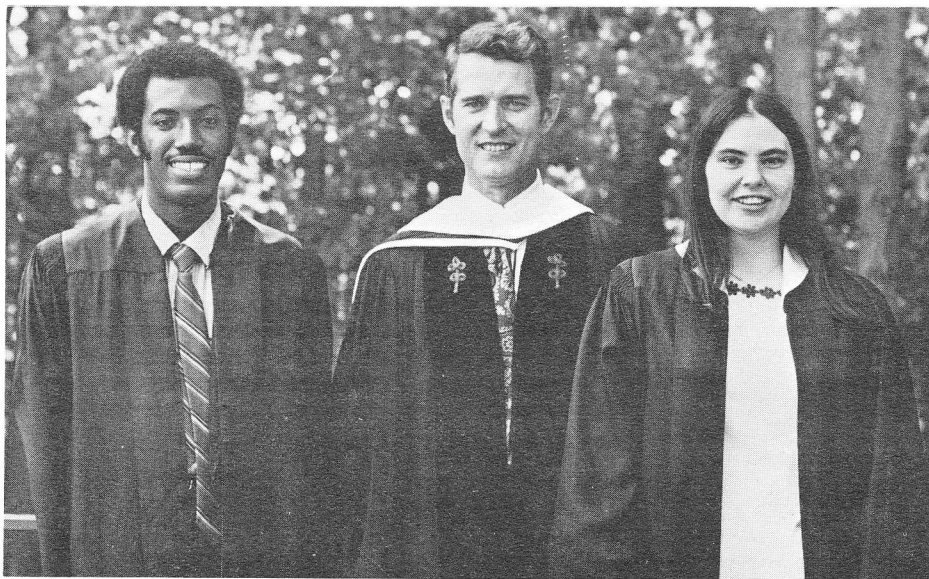
Miss Debra Ann Walton, Detroit. Miss Walton has a 3.60 average at Cooley High School.

Diversity Is Essential to OU O'Dowd Maintains

Oakland University must continue to develop as a complex, diverse university of medium size, President Donald D. O'Dowd stated in his state of the university address May 31.

The university must also become more responsive to the needs of the communities it serves, and particularly Oakland County, O'Dowd said. He pointed out increasing competition for students in the populous Oakland County area that has been OU's primary enrollment center.

CONSTRAINTS CITED

Commenting on the constraints within which the university will have to operate, O'Dowd predicted: that soon all government student aid would be on a direct basis to the student allowing the student to then decide on a college or university; that out-of-state tuition costs would be struck down; that the enrollment of regular, daytime first time in college freshmen would continue to decline and that the university would become even more dependent for growth upon transfer students, graduate programs, and a new credit evening program for part-time students.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS NOTED

He cited a number of accomplishments over the 1972-73 year including a new sense of spirit and cooperation, particularly over the last few months of the year, that has resulted in numerous new programs being prepared for the 1973-74 year. He noted that in the service areas, Meadow Brook Hall was on a self-supporting basis, Meadow Brook Theatre had concluded its most successful year, and that Meadow Brook Festival had a strong program for the coming season.

He identified some problem areas, including the need for more careful advising and intensified long range planning. More attention needs to be paid to helping undergraduates obtain the skills and information needed to make their initial entry into the job market, rather than preparing them for careers that they may assume six or seven years from the time they graduate, O'Dowd said.

He regretted the budget cuts that resulted in May job terminations for disrupting the lives of many of the university's loyal colleagues.

Alumni Association Drive Has \$6,500 Goal For 1973-74

The Friends of the Kresge Library organization has an offer OU alumni can't refuse.

It is an offer to match dollar for dollar every alumni contribution designated to the library, the focal point of the 1973-74 Alumni Fund Drive.

The fund period, July 1 through Jan. 31, 1974, seeks \$6,500 from OU alumni. The 1972-73 campaign raised more than \$5,000 which is the current record. Alumni are urged to designate their contributions to the library to qualify for matching Friends of the Kresge Library funds. Contributions not earmarked for library use will be used to support other alumni programs.

The approach will enable alumni to identify with the major support project, or they may wish to contribute to the other ongoing programs. Some may contribute to both.

INCREASED PARTICIPATION SOUGHT

Elaine Petz, director of alumni relations, said an additional goal has been established for the 1973 drive above and beyond the dollar figure. "We want to see a greater percentage rate of participation in this year's fund drive," Miss Petz said. Less than five percent of the alumni contributed last year (204 persons), and

attempts will be made to increase that figure to ten percent in 1973. Nationally, the average figure for alumni participation in fund drives is 13.3 percent.

"We are confident that our alumni will respond to the theme of the new fund drive and that they will combine with the Friends of Oakland Group to raise funds so vital to the library," Miss Petz said.

Alumni have shown constant support of the library and that facility is the source most often designated by alumni as recipient of their contributions. Those who have benefitted over the years from the library can understand the need to keep it strong, Miss Petz said. That need is even greater now that the university is preparing 20 new programs for the fall, and the library stands in need of additional texts and reference materials. It is fitting that two strong supporters of the library, the Alumni Association, and the Friends group, should now join hands in a fund raising effort, Miss Petz said. The Friends campaign to match alumni contributions will be chaired by Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Cunningham, and assisted by the Carl Bartons, Harvey Baumgardners, Walton Lewises, Leonard Lewises and the C. Theron VanDusens.

ONGOING PROGRAMS SUPPORTED

The contributions not earmarked for the library will support the following alumni programs:

The Alumni Short-term Loan Fund — The fund, administered by the financial aids office, provides small interest free loans to students and is supported solely by alumni.

Undergraduate Research Grant Fund — Most students have to wait until they become graduate students to receive any grant funding for research projects. The alumni began this fund to support serious undergraduate research. Five or six research projects are funded annually and again the money for these projects is a gift of the alumni.

The Upperclassmen Grant — Gives financial assistance to deserving sophomores, juniors and seniors who have shown outstanding scholarship. Again, funded only through alumni dollars.

The Alumni Athletic Scholarship Fund — Provides athletic scholarship money for promising freshmen and women.

The Isaac Jones Scholarship Fund — Supports scholarship for deserving black students in the Pontiac area.

Library Facilities Explained To Prospective Donors

Alumni contributions to the 1973 fund drive may be earmarked for library support and each alumni dollar will thus be matched by the Friends of the Kresge Library.

While the alumni have used and appreciated OU's library facilities over the years, many may not fully understand the complex scope of that operation. For their information, some basic materials on the library and the Friends of the Kresge Library have been prepared.

The libraries of Oakland University include the Performing Arts Library in Paula and Woody Varner Hall where an integrated collection of materials on music, theater and dance is housed, and the Kresge Library in which the bulk of library materials are displayed. The Kresge Library, a handsome building centering the Oakland campus, was erected through a Kresge Foundation grant of 1.5 million dollars and completed in 1961. Its collections consist of some 235,000 books and bound periodicals,

155,000 units of microform, and 6,000 recordings on disc and tape.

Among its outstanding holdings are the unusually rich Matilda R. Wilson Reference Collection; the Hicks Collection of Books by and about Women, the Alternative Press Collection of underground newspapers; a depository collection of U. S. government documents; and a collection of materials relating to the U. S. presidency and its incumbents, especially strong in Lincolniana. Plans are currently being consolidated for a new library building which will triple the capacity of the present library facilities.

Oakland students and alumni were instrumental in initiating two of the collections noted above, the Wilson Reference Collection and Alternative Press Collection, respectively. The latter collection, a representative assemblage of underground newspapers and related material, concentrating on Michigan and the Mid-west, was made possible through a developmental alumni gift. Since 1967

the student body has been voluntarily assessing itself \$1 per term until they have collected \$100,000 the sum underwritten by a \$100,000 grant from the Matilda R. Wilson Fund. Among the students responsible for this idea were Susan Adams Wyatt, '68, Craig Downs, '68, and William Cantlon who attended from 1967-1969. Approximately 16,000 titles have been purchased as a result of their concern for the library.

FACULTY DUTIES

The faculty of the library numbers 18 professional librarians, exclusive of 19 clerical assistants and 17 full-time-equivalent student assistants. They are responsible for the acquisition, preparation and organization of the library's collections as well as for the development of new methods of operation and programs of service. An important direction which library service has taken is greater interaction with the local

Spring Enrollment Sets New Record

The spring session enrollment is a record 3,472 students (headcount) compared with the previous high of 2,773 set in spring, 1972. The figure includes 160 undergraduates enrolled in evening credit courses in Royal Oak and Pontiac.

For the 1972-73 fiscal year, OU had the equivalent of 7,403 full-time students based on an average of 31 credits per undergraduate and 24 credits per graduate compared with 6,982 last year. The 7,403 student figure includes 28 full-time equivalent students through credits delivered in the Royal Oak and Pontiac programs.

The growth in full-time equivalent students from 1971-72 to 1972-73 is attributed to increases in the graduate credits delivered and to the new on-campus, credit evening program. Regular daytime undergraduate enrollment fell this year to 5,754 from 6,761 in 1971-72.

Headcount enrollments for the 1972-73 academic periods and the full-time equivalent student enrollment produced in each period follows: summer, 2,453 headcount (511 full-time); fall, 8,169 headcount (3,156 full-time); winter, 8,335 headcount (3,009 full-time); and spring 3,212 headcount, excluding the 160 off-campus undergraduates, for (699 full-time).

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community. A prominent example of this orientation is the Hotline, a telephone information service which provides public libraries in Oakland County with immediate reference, referral and photo-copy service when the local public libraries do not have the resources which meet the needs of their patrons.

Among the faculty of the library are two Oakland alumni. They are Andrea L. Mansour, Circulation Librarian, '67, and Elizabeth McKenny Titus, a reference librarian, '66. During their undergraduate days, both Andi and Beth worked in the library as student assistants. Beth also served as the first chairperson of the Student Library committee, an organization dedicated to support the development of library collections and services especially in areas of concern to students.

FRIENDS SUPPORT LIBRARY

Since their founding in 1962, the Friends of Kresge Library past ten years, the Friends' contributions to the library, in monetary terms, have approximated \$150,000; in terms of goodwill their

contribution, although unmeasurable, far exceeds that sum. The principal fund-raising activity of the Friends is the annual Glyndebourne Picnic. Fashioned after the Glyndebourne Festival held in Sussex, England, the Oakland Glyndebourne is held in the early fall after the indoor riding ring on the Meadowbrook Estate has been transformed into a lush garden. Each year this benefit has increased in elegance, attendance and profit, netting the library well over \$8,000 last year for the purchase of books and other materials.

Under the considerable leadership of their president, jointly Henry and Helen Wolfenden, and their Executive Secretary, Peg Pearce, their efforts have found recognition this year in the winning of a John Cotton Dana award for mounting an outstanding public relations program which has effectively stimulated community interest and involvement. This award will be presented on June 25th of this year in Las Vegas, Nevada during the annual conference of the American Library Association.

Where Are Chads?

New Degree Programs Offered

Twenty new degree programs or concentrations are being readied for the 1973-74 academic year.

The new programs reflect the greatest period of academic productivity on the campus since 1965. At that time, many new master's programs were approved, the Schools of Education and Engineering were opened, and plans were made for other academic units including the School of Economics and Management which opened in 1969.

Most of the new programs are in the fields of medical technology, applied social sciences, and communications, areas of identified new student interests and needs.

OU officials say the new academic programs represent a return to the university's commitment to become a complex, diverse university of medium size. The university's attention since the mid 1960's had been diverted to accommodate a student body that until recently had been expanding at the rate of 20 percent a year.

APPROVAL RECEIVED

New programs already approved by the OU academic units and the Board of Trustees include undergraduate degrees in human resources development and elementary education and new master's programs in counseling and guidance, management, early childhood education, and history. Undergraduate programs awaiting board approval are in secondary education language arts, medical technology, medical physics, environmental health, computer and information science and speech communication.

New concentrations that will go to the board include ones in journalism, theatre arts, Judaic studies, public and societal systems, social justice and corrections, and health-medical behavioral sciences.

NEW CENTER CREATED

In addition, a new Center for Community and Human Development has been approved by the board. It will have the power to offer community service courses subject to review by the Academic Policy Committee and it will coordinate the off-campus practicum elements of community and human development programs offered by the various schools of the university. A director will be appointed by Frederick W. Obeir, academic vice president and provost, to help identify community needs to which the university can respond academically.



The Friends of Oakland Swim Meet was held March 31 and April 1. This Class B meet drew 550 entries. The event raised over \$450.00 for the University.

Fourteen Athletes Sign Letters of Intent for 1973-74

Fourteen Michigan athletes have signed letters of intent to compete for Oakland University. Corey Van Fleet, coach and athletic director, has announced.

New I.D. Policy Set for Alumni

As of September 1, a new policy will be in effect for Oakland University Alumni Association I.D.'s. Currently all alumni have received I.D.'s shortly after graduation. The Alumni Association Board of Directors voted at their March 12 meeting to limit the issuance of I.D. cards to Alumni Association members only, and to extend complimentary membership to alums during their first year after graduation.

Membership in the Alumni Association is open to any person who has received a degree from Oakland University and who contributes five dollars or more to the Annual Fund Drive. University privileges will be extended to holders of I.D. cards only.

Pioneer Club

A new group is forming within the Alumni Association. Composed of alums who have made substantially large (\$50.00 or more) contributions to the University through the Annual Alumni Fund Drive, the new organization had its first get-together June 29 for dinner and attendance of Duke Ellington's concert at Meadow Brook Festival. All contributions, no matter what size, are immensely appreciated by the University; however, we (the Alumni Association) would like to give special recognition to those who have made an extra effort to demonstrate their support of their alma mater. A tentative name has been selected for the new group — Oakland University Alumni Association Pioneer Club.

OU Cuts Budget

The university has reduced its operating budget by \$502,000 and requested \$256,000 from the legislature for 1973-74 start-up costs for new academic programs.

The administrative cuts include elimination of 50 positions, including seven now vacant. They included 32 positions in food service, university services and cleaning; ten clerical-technical and eight administrative professional positions. \$152,000 of the \$502,000 reduction came from non-personnel areas.

Carl Westman, director, Employment Relations, said attempts were being made to place the 43 people involved in other university areas, if possible.

The reductions were made on a priority basis as the university tightened its belt in the face of rising costs, OU officials said.
