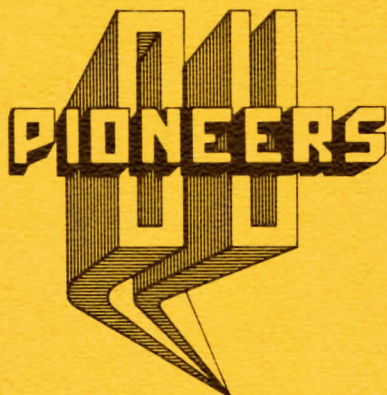

OUTLOOK

During the final match of 1968 against a club team from the University of Toledo, Oakland University's Bahran Faramand took a pass from Paul Neeson and turned it into a goal that broke a 2-2 deadlock and gave the Pioneers their first winning season in four years of soccer on the Rochester campus. OU hasn't experienced a losing year since.

Last fall, led by the superb goalkeeping of All Midwest junior college transfer Mark Hamilton and freshman forward sensation Morris Lupenec, the Pioneers posted a 14-4-2 record under Head Coach Klas DeBoer - their best ever. By defeating seven of eight opponents from Michigan and tying the other (Michigan State), OU proved to be one of the top squads in the state. At one point listed as high as ninth in the NCAA Division II national poll and first in the midwest region, the school missed an invitation to the 1980 NCAA II play-offs by only a slight margin.

With Hamilton back on one end of the field, Lupenec on the other, and an extremely large collection of additional talent all around, 1981 looks like another spectacular year for the OU booters.

Of his returning players, first-year Head Coach Gary Parsons sees senior Dave Wandeloski and sophmores Steve Mastrogianis and Barrie Vince as possible help on the front line with Lupenec. Sophomore Dan Fitzgerald and junior Dandy Oskey should lead the way at midfield, while juniors Dave Morgan and Kevin Kelly line up with senior Bob Read to take charge of the defensive line in front of Hamilton.

Parsons has also recruited a group of promising freshman and transfer students to boost the OU effort. Jody Mehl, a 5-9, 160 pound freshman from Hamilton (OH) High School, and Cliff Poe, a 6-0, 165 pound junior transfer from Oakland Community College (OCC), are both slated for action at the forward position. Lindsay Hamilton (Mark Hamilton's brother), a 5-8, 145 pound sophomore transfer from OCC, and Chris Hauer, a 6-0, 165 pound freshman from Fairfield (OH) High School, are expected to supply strength at midfield. Dave Marttila, a 5-11, 170 pound freshman from Okemos, MI, will back up Mark Hamilton in goal, while Lou Volovich, a 6-3, 185 pound junior also from Macomb, should play as a back.

Four freshmen walk-ons, Mehdi Eskandari (5-9, 140, Birmingham, MI), Gregg Laatsch (5-7, 145, Saginaw, MI), Ben Serratus (5-8, 150, Detroit, MI) and John Socaciu (5-10, 145, Warren, MI) will also join OU this fall.

As his predecessors had done before with the Pioneer program, Parsons has scheduled his team to compete against some of the top soccer powers in the midwest. After opening at nationally respected Cleveland State University on September 1st, OU will take on such noted institutions as the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, the University of Illinois-Chicago Circle, arch-rival Michigan State, Indiana State University-Evansville, Sangamon State University and Eastern Illinois University.

An exciting home schedule includes the PIONEER CLASSIC TOURNAMENT (Sept. 5-6), CHICAGO CIRCLE (HOMECOMING/Sept. 19), AQUINAS (Sept. 26), MICHIGAN STATE (Oct. 7), CENTRAL MICHIGAN (Oct. 28), TOLEDO (Oct. 31), MICHIGAN (Nov. 4) and WRIGHT STATE (Nov. 7).

COACHING

HEAD COACH GARY PARSONS

For the past five years, Gary Parsons has spent time as an assistant coach with some of the top soccer programs in the nation. Now he is stepping out on his own as the head coach of another one of the nation's best - Oakland University.

Parsons replaces Klas DeBoer who left OU to take an assistant coaching position with the Los Angeles Aztecs of the North American Soccer League.

A 29-year-old native of Oakham, Massachusetts, Parsons was voted as the most valuable defensive player at Plymouth State College when he was a senior. Plymouth State made the New England State College Athletic Conference soccer finals the last two years he was on the squad.

Parsons holds bachelor's degrees in both math (Plymouth State-1973) and Physical Education (Plymouth State-1975), as well as master's degree in Physical Education (Eastern Illinois University-1978).

His first coaching job was with Quabbin Regional High School (Barre, MA) - the 1973 Massachusetts state champions.

In 1977, Parsons joined the staff of Eastern Illinois University as the assistant coach. The squad made the NCAA Division II play-offs both in 1977 and in 1978. Before he left to take a similar position with the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, two of Parsons' defenders were named All-Americans.

While he was there during the 1979-1980 seasons, Wisconsin-Milwaukee also went to the NCAA II play-offs - giving Parsons a total of four experiences in post-season competition.

In addition to taking over the OU intercollegiate program, Parsons began directing the university's youth soccer camps last summer. An active participant in the development of young players, Parsons is arranging to have local youth soccer clubs play before the Pioneers take the field for several of their home matches.

ASSISTANT COACH LAWRENCE MURRAY

Lawrence Murray, a 25-year-old former Oakland University soccer player, will be assisting the Pioneer program for the first time this season.

A native of Glasgo, Scotland, Murray entered the United States with his family in 1967 and has since served with the US Army (1974-76), played soccer for OU (1973, 1978, 1979), and joined Michigan's oldest soccer organization - Sport Club 1924. He was named OU's captain in 1979, and helped Sport Club 1924 capture the 1980 United States Soccer Federation Michigan Senior Championship.

Murray is now a senior management student at OU concentrating in accounting and computer science. He will also be including in his 1981-82 agenda a Head Resident position with the OU Residence Halls Staff.

RETURNING PLAYERS

DAN FITZGERALD 6-0, 160 POUND SOPHOMORE MIDFIELDER
NORTH HIGH SCHOOL/GRANITE CITY, ILLINOIS

Had four goals and three assists in 19 games as a freshman. Tallied against Wayne State, Michigan, Illinois-Chicago Circle and Lewis. His 31 shots on goal in 1980 is second highest among this year's returning players.

MARK HAMILTON 5-11, 165 POUND SENIOR GOALKEEPER
ROCHESTER, HIGH SCHOOL/ROCHESTER, MICHIGAN

Played in every game for the Pioneers last season after transferring from Macomb Community College where he was an All-American selection. Held the opposition to 21 goals last fall while making 112 saves and chalking up a school record nine shutouts. An ISAA All-Mideast pick in 1980, he is regarded by many as the best collegiate keeper in the state.

KEVIN KELLY 5-10, 165 POUND JUNIOR BACK
UNIVERSITY HIGH SCHOOL/ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI

Excellent all-around player who switched from the forward position as a freshman to defense in 1980. Led the 1979 squad in goals with six, and was fourth on the shots list with 44. Five shots on goal last fall. Saw action in 17 games as a freshman and in 19 as a sophomore.

MARTIN LITTLE 6-0, 160 POUND JUNIOR FORWARD
SEAHOLM HIGH SCHOOL/BIRMINGHAM, MICHIGAN

Returns to the forward position he played as a freshman after being injured in 1980 and filling in as a goalkeeper in 1979. Scored nine goals and assisted on two others in 1978. Recorded a 5-5-1 mark in front of the goal the following season when he stepped in for OU's injured starter, Tony Pietrantoni. Also scored goals against Ohio University and Kalamazoo College that year.

MORRIS LUPENEC 5-9, 170 POUND SOPHOMORE FORWARD
NOTRE DAME HIGH SCHOOL/WELLAND, ONTARIO

Led 1980 squad in shots with 83, goals with 18, and tied Dandy Oskey for most assists with seven. Was only two short of OU's most goals/season record set by Ken Whiteside in 1973. Well on his way to shattering Whiteside's most goals/career mark of 60 (1973-76). Had two goals against Michigan, Evansville, Michigan State and Central Michigan. Pulled off a hat trick against Wayne State. Joined Mark Hamilton on the 1980 ISAA All-Mideast roster.

STEVE MASTROGIANIS 5-9, 155 POUND SOPHOMORE FORWARD/MIDFIELDER
DANFORTH TECH HIGH SCHOOL/TORONTO, ONTARIO

Played in 11 games as a freshman. Had two assists and averaged one shot per game.

DAVE MORGAN 5-11, 165 POUND JUNIOR MIDFIELDER/BACK
UNIVERSITY HIGH SCHOOL/ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI

High school teammate of back Kevin Kelly. Has played 33 times in two years with the Pioneers. Scored his first collegiate goal as a freshman against Grace College, firing 26 shots at the keeper over the course of the 1979 season. Came up with 14 shots, two goals and three assists in 1980. Put the ball in the net against Wayne State and in OU's thrilling 3-2 overtime win against Wisconsin-Green Bay.

DANDY OSKEY 5-8, 150 POUND JUNIOR FORWARD/MIDFIELDER
CARMAN HIGH SCHOOL/FLINT, MICHIGAN

Four goals and nine assists as a freshman gave him a team leading nine points. Scored 1979 game winner against Spring Arbor. Was tied with Morris Lupenec for most assists in 1980 with seven, and scored a goal against Grace. Has only sat out during one game in two years on the squad.

BOB READ 6-2, 170 POUND SENIOR BACK
GROVES HIGH SCHOOL/BIRMINGHAM, MICHIGAN

On the field in 18 games last season after being there for 16 the year before. Had 21 shots on goal, two goals and one assist in 1979, while managing two shots and one assist in 1980. Goals came against Kalamazoo and Dayton.

BARRIE VINCE 5-2, 120 POUND SOPHOMORE FORWARD
OKEMOS HIGH SCHOOL/EAST LANSING, MICHIGAN

One shot and one assist in five games as a freshman.

DAVE WANDELOSKI 5-10, 165 POUND SENIOR FORWARD/BACK
EISENHOWER HIGH SCHOOL/UTICA, MICHIGAN

Has seen action in every Pioneer contest during the past two seasons. Holds a collegiate career total of five goals and nine assists. Managed 13 shots on goal last fall. Played for the Michigan State Senior Champions Sport Club 1924 this past summer.
