Eisenhower: Viet War Should Take Priority

CHICAGO (AP) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower has criticized careless spending of the taxpayers' money and says winning the war in Viet Nam quickly should take precedence "over the war on poverty or getting to the moon, or anything else."

At a news conference yesterday, Eisenhower advocated immediate application of "as much force as we need to win" the war. He added "I'd take any action to win," but he avoided a direct yes or no to a question

whether he proposed use of nuclear weapons.

The war, he said "either will be won in, say the next 24 months or it will become much bigger than it is now." He did not elaborate.

The World War II military leader said the continuing war exerts military, economic and political forces "all in the same direction" toward making the party in power so strong it could pass "any kind of law it wants."

In an address last night at a Republican fund-raising dinner, the former president said "responsible progress is what we want."

'LOT OF BELIEFS'
"Not careless spending" that gives the appearance of prosperity, Republicanism can cover a lot of individual beliefs as long as we all believe in sound and responsible government."

Eisenhower also was campaigning for his brother, Earl, a candidate for the clerk of Cook County (Chicago). The dinner marked a reunion for the former president with his

other brothers—Edgar, a Seattle, Wash., lawyer; and Milton, president of Johns Hopkins University. The \$100 a plate affair was held at McCormick Place on the lakefront.

The dinner crowd of 2,000 included world heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay.

A plaque decorated by the dove of peace was presented to Eisenhower by the Republican Women of Illinois, "for eight years of peace during the administration of President Dwight D. Eisenhower."

UF Breakfast Held by Labor

Management Execs. Attend Annual Event

Union officials attended a labor breakfast in support of the Pontiac Area United Fund yesterday at the Waldron Hotel.

The annual event is sponsored by the UAW-AFL-CIO prior to the United Fund kickoff, which is Oct. 11 this year.

Representatives from 17 different locals were present.

The 1966 goal is \$1,042,000.

Labor invited several management officials from the three area General Motors divisions as guests.

STRESSES IMPORTANCE
Kenneth Morris, director of UAW Region 1B, emphasized the importance of labor participation in the UF.

"Unions were formed to help one another. The UF does the same," he explained.

"Union members have an obligation to and a deeper understanding of people having difficulties and needing help because of our past," he added.

Bruce J. Annett, president of the PAUF, stated that labor has played an important part in the UF structure through the years.

Harold Julian, international representative for UAW Region 1B, acted as master of ceremonies.

Walled Lake School for Retarded Okayed

The Oakland Schools Board of Education has authorized expenditure of \$124,000 for construction of a building in the Walled Lake School District for the education of trainable mentally handicapped children.

Earmarked for occupancy next September, the structure, at first, will consist of three classrooms. Location of the building hasn't been decided.

The classes are for children under the age of 14 from Walled Lake and five other districts—South Lyon, Huron Valley, Dublin, Novi and Holly.

At present, 21 children are enrolled in the Walled Lake program. Another 17 students from the six-district area are on the waiting list, according to Oakland Schools officials.

Also at Thursday's special meeting, the board tentatively awarded a contract to the IBM Corp. for rental of a central data processing unit for a teleprocessing system planned for county school districts.

Slated for delivery by Jan. 1, 1968, the computer would be rented from IBM for \$25,000 a month. The expense would be shared by Oakland Schools and benefiting local districts on a use basis.

PURCHASE PRICE
Purchase price of the computer is \$1.2 million, according to Oakland Schools officials. However, with the ever-increasing demand for better computers, it is estimated the machine would be replaced in four years.

A bid of \$25,312 a month was submitted by another firm. Oakland Schools officials contend the machine is 10 times faster than their present unit in making computations.

Eight county districts, including Pontiac, have committed themselves to the future teleprocessing system, designed to simplify and speed up business, accounting and research work for local systems.

Six other districts have signified their intent to join the system.

Three Oakland County communities, Walled Lake, Novi and Pontiac Township, were among seven in the state charged yesterday with water pollution infractions by the State Water Resources Commission.

Hurricane Hits Cuba Again, Threatens U.S.

Inez Changes Course to Become Definite Menace to Florida

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Hurricane Inez, sucking new power into her system from the tepid waters of the Caribbean, lashed and tore at Cuba again today and once more Floridians followed the killer storm's erratic course with alarm.

Just when forecasters were considering the "all clear" sign for Florida, Inez crossed them up during the night with a westward turn that brought all of Communist Cuba in range of her howling winds and torrential rains.

And, as Prime Minister Fidel Castro glumly watched an economic disaster develop in his already tottering nation, Inez became again a definite menace to the U.S. mainland.

With more than 100 dead in her wake and possibly many more, Inez screamed out of the southeast into Cuba's easternmost Oriente Province yesterday, battering that agriculturally rich area with wind gusts up to 138 miles an hour.

The Weather Bureau thought then she would veer northward, come off the island into the Atlantic, then hammer the central Bahamas on a track that would keep her clear of Florida.

CUBA'S COAST
But Inez never got to Cuba's north coast.

Instead, she thrashed to west-northwest back into the Caribbean and howled along the south edge of the island on a snake-like course that is expected to bring her close to Havana late today.

"If she regains her strength and moves back over Cuba," said forecaster Paul Moore, "she could reach the Florida Straits by tonight."

Russian Walks Out of China Celebration

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union's diplomatic representative to Peking, in an unprecedented move in the history of Sino-Soviet relations, today walked out of a celebration marking the 17th anniversary of Communist China, the Soviet news agency Tass reported.

The representative, the charge d'affaires of the Soviet Embassy in Peking, was followed in his walkout by the representatives of Moscow's loyal allies — Poland, Hungary, Bulgaria, Mongolia, East Germany and Czechoslovakia.

The fence-straddling Romanians presumably stayed on as did the envoy of North Viet Nam, North Korea and Albania.

Mansfield Prods Ike on Specifics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield suggested today former President Dwight D. Eisenhower spell out to President Johnson his views on what is needed to win the Viet Nam war — how many men and what kind of weapons.

Eisenhower, who led Allied armies to victory in Europe in World War II and was president when a cease-fire was declared in Korea, advocated at a Chicago news conference yesterday the application of "as much force as we need to win."

The five-star general avoided a direct yes or no to a question whether he proposed use of nuclear weapons. But he said: "If they gave me the problem, I'd take any action to win."

Mansfield noted a lack of specifics and said in an interview, "If Gen. Eisenhower has any specific ideas as to what he would do if he were in President Johnson's shoes, I would suggest he make his views known to President Johnson."

Mansfield, who has opposed escalation of the war, said he was sure Johnson would receive any Eisenhower suggestions most gratefully and consider them seriously and with great respect."

But the Democratic leader said Eisenhower's statement "needs amplification and answers to such questions as does he think we need 750,000, 1 million, 2 million men to win? What kind of weapons would he use and what does he mean when he said, 'I'd take any action to win.'"

Medical Aid Sign-Up to Start

The Oakland County Bureau of Social Aid will begin taking applications Monday for a medical assistance program implemented by the State Department of Social Services.

Designated Title 19 of the Social Security Act, this program will provide medical assistance for low income persons not receiving public relief as well as for public assistance cases.

Providers of hospitalization and medical services under this program will bill the

State Department of Social Services.

Ora L. Hinckley, director of the County Bureau of Social Aid, pointed out income is the main standard in determining eligibility of persons not on public assistance.

An income of \$1,900 is the maximum standard for a single person, a \$2,700 level set for a couple.

INCOME LEVEL
"The protected income level for the medical assistance program

increases \$20 for each additional family member, according to Miss Hinckley.

Property holdings as well as income are considered in relation to the scope of medical expenses, Miss Hinckley said.

She pointed out that a family of five, whose income standard would be a maximum of \$3,950, might have earnings of \$4,500 and still be eligible.

In determining financial eligibility, the state agency would compute the family's expenses

of earning its income and determining medical expenses already paid by the family.

ELIGIBILITY

If such expenses, applied as deductions, reduce the family income to the established standard eligibility is gained.

Regular aid recipients of the Bureau of Social Aid automatically are eligible for the medical program.

Many in U.N. Back U.S. Viet Peace Bid

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI) — The General Assembly approached the halfway point of its annual policy debate today with expressed sentiment overwhelmingly behind U.S. overtures for a Viet Nam peace.

Forty-one foreign ministers and other delegation leaders had spoken in the opening general debate between yesterday — the Soviet Union and its Communist colleagues being notable exceptions — and the great ma-

Viet Reds Medical Aid May Launch Sign-Up Near Major Drive

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — The biggest conflict of the Viet Nam war may shape up along the old demilitarized zone in northern South Viet Nam when monsoon winds bring seasonal rains that there next month, informed sources say here.

Despite repeated aerial poundings of the zone and ground operations designed to plug the infiltration routes, the sources said, North Vietnamese continue to pour over the one-time buffer territory and three or four fresh enemy battalions have been identified in the field.

With the upcoming heavy rains, aerial support of the ground troops will be restricted and the enemy may make a major drive, the sources said. American military leaders are confident an attack could be stopped, but U.S. and South Vietnamese forces in the area may have to be beefed up.

Another 2,500 U.S. troops departed at Qui Nhon Friday, bringing U.S. military strength in South Viet Nam to 317,500 troops. This tops by 500 the number of South Vietnamese regulars involved in the war.

The Americans, arriving from Ft. Lewis, Wash., were to join a 4,000-man brigade of the 4th Infantry Division at Pleiku in the central highlands.

In separate operations near the buffer zone Friday, U.S. Marines and South Vietnamese troops reported killing 37 North Vietnamese, while suffering only light casualties.

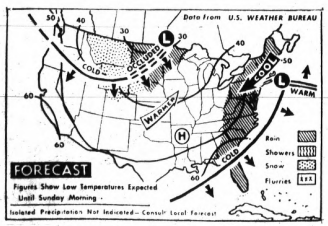
A U.S. Marine company on Operation Prairie battled a platoon of Communist troops for 90 minutes Friday night before artillery and air strikes drove off the enemy. The Leathernecks reported killing 10 North Vietnamese, raising to 943 the number of Communists killed in the two-month-old operation.

He said it had been expected that the initial Communist reaction would tend to be "propagandistic."

Goldberg, tying into one package of U.S. peace proposals, most of which previously had emerged from the White House and other quarters, proposed that:

- U.S. bombing of North Viet Nam would cease if the Communist demand similar desecration concessions.

- The United States stood ready to start a phased withdrawal of its troops from South Viet Nam, simultaneously with a Communist withdrawal under U.N. or other international supervision.

- Participation of the Communist Viet Cong or its political arm, the National Liberation Front for South Viet Nam, peace talks to follow would not present an "insurmountable obstacle."

Although Hanoi and Peking broadcasts denounced the Goldberg proposals and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko said here that the Kremlin stood firmly behind the four-point Communist plan for peace, notable exceptions were in evidence.

The principal one was that neither Hanoi nor Gromyko specified that the Viet Cong should be the only South Vietnamese representative in the negotiations.

Also, insistence on prior U.S. troop withdrawal seemed to be less vociferous.

Vying with Viet Nam for domination of the assembly session were African proposals.

The world parliament was midway through debate on African demands for an end to the mandate over South-West Africa granted by the defunct league of nations to South Africa. This demand created mountainous legal, as well as political problems, and no general agreement seemed in sight.

CONGO CHARGE

The Security Council also was discussing the Congo's charge that Portugal harbored mercenaries from Europe — chiefly France — in neighboring Angola, for an invasion of its territory in behalf of ousted Premier Moise Tshombe. Portugal denied the complaint and filed a countercharge concerning the sacking of its embassy in Kinshasa, formerly Leopoldville.

When debate resumes Monday, Portugal will ask the Security Council to send a team to investigate charges by the Congo.

The Portuguese, however, also want the council to carry out a similar investigation on the Congo side of the border and filed a countercharge concerning the sacking of its embassy in Kinshasa, formerly Leopoldville.

Informed sources said this would be the crux of the Portuguese speech in the council when it resumes its session Monday afternoon.

November Call-Up Is 265 in County

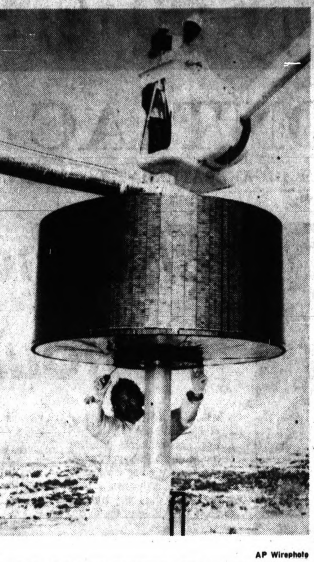
Oakland County will be tapped for 265 men in November in the fourth largest monthly draft call this year.

The call, among 3,427 slated for induction across the state, affects single men; those married after Aug. 27, 1965, and men married before that date but without children.

Board No. 65 in Pontiac is scheduled to draft 265 men; Board No. 67 from southwestern Oakland County, 26 men; and Board No. 231 drawing on the northern sector of the county will call 67.

In addition, Farmington Board No. 328 is scheduled for 70 men, and the three Royal Oak-based boards will induce 116.

The county call is second only to the Wayne County quota of 1,019 among Michigan counties.

Man, 65, Is Bilked of \$87 in Pontiac

A 65-year-old Pontiac man was bilked of \$87 yesterday by another man who pretended to have \$7,000 he was "afraid to keep by himself."

William Walker of 384 Dittmar told Pontiac police he was approached outside a market near his home by a man who said he was "from Mississippi," had \$7,000, and "wanted to see a preacher."

Walker said he took the stranger to a church on Bloomfield Street, where the man went inside the building briefly and returned to ask Walker if Walker would hold the "\$7,000."

After giving the man \$87 as "security," Walker was handed a handkerchief purportedly containing \$7,000.

Walker said the man promised to return and then he said he opened the handkerchief after a few minutes and found only crumpled paper.

Peking Echoes N. Viet Pledge

Chinese Warn U.S. During Celebration

TOKYO (AP) — Communist China marked its 17th anniversary today with a pledge to support the Vietnamese Communists to the end and a warning to the United States not to force China into war.

Defense Minister Lin Biao, speaking for party chairman Mao Tse-tung and the Central Committee of the Communist Party, told a cheering throng of millions:

"We are determined to support to the end the fight of the fraternal Vietnamese people in resisting America and saving their country, whatever sacrifice we have to make."

He also echoed an editorial in the Peking People's Daily which warned the United States that if it dared to force China into war "several millions of bravely fighting Liberation Army troops and several tens of millions of militia and Red Guards who are the fraternal rear of the Liberation Army" would be waiting.

DEFENSE MINISTER

The 58-year-old bespectacled defense minister, the No. 2 man in the Communist Chinese hierarchy, appeared with Mao and other leaders of the state and party before a crowd estimated at 2 1/2 to 3 million persons in Peking's Gate of Heavenly Peace Square.

Peking radio, monitored in Tokyo, announced earlier that the anniversary also marked the premiere of a color film of Red China's three nuclear blasts, which "smash the nuclear blackmail" of the Soviet Union and the United States.

Tragedy Mars Viet Air Show

Plane Hits Crowded Area; 8 Persons Die

SAIGON (UPI) — A South Viet names lighter-bomber staging aerial acrobatics for Premier Nguyen Cao Ky and a group of boy scouts crashed today in a shopping-housing area on the suburban Tan Son Nhut Airbase.

Military spokesmen said "tentative" checks reported eight Vietnamese were killed and 16 others injured including six American servicemen. The Viet names pilot of the plane also was killed.

Witnesses said the A1E Sky-raidier whizzed as it swung low out of a maneuver and struck a machine gun nest defending the key war base, skidded across a roof and plunged into a barber shop-cyclist store complex.

They said hundreds of boy scouts, meeting with Ky for a jamboree, watched the prop-driven aircraft plunge into a horizon of rooftops and explode in flames.

Ky, wearing a flying suit, rushed to the scene and helped direct rescue operations.

MONSOON RAIN

A sudden torrential monsoon rain burst and the South Vietnamese base commander credited it with dousing the flaming debris.

The pilot was killed instantly, spokesmen said. They said there might have been a second man aboard, possibly an American. But the spokesmen said no trace of a second man had been found yet.

OEO Officials Ask State Quiz

Officials of the Oakland County Commission on Economic Opportunity have asked the Michigan Civil Rights Commission to investigate minority group involvement in the county's antipoverty program.

The investigation request was prompted by reasons accompanying the resignation of Commissioner Charles M. Tucker, Jr., which the commission accepted Wednesday.

Tucker, president of the Oakland County chapter of the NAACP, expressed concern over minority employment in conjunction with the antipoverty effort and the lack of employment security within the program itself.

Noting that they had requested the investigation, Carl F. Ingraham, commission chairman, and James M. McNeely, executive director of the poverty program, made the following statement yesterday:

"Our records indicate that while 8 per cent of the poor in Oakland County are Negroes, 25 per cent of the commission are Negroes."

Phone Pact Talks Go On

DETROIT (UPI) — Negotiations between Michigan Bell Telephone Co. and the Communications Workers of America continued yesterday with no word on any kind of progress toward a new contract.

The company said "fewer than 400" persons were idled by picket lines yesterday, mostly in the Pontiac area.

The old contract expired one week ago.

Armed Assailant Robs Local Man

An assailant armed with a 10-inch knife robbed a Pontiac man of \$240 shortly after midnight today at an intersection, Pontiac police were told.

Earl Foster, 26, of 280 E. Pike said he was in an automobile at the corner of Harrison and Franklin Road when the robber jumped in the car and pulled out the knife.

Foster said the man fled after taking the money from his wallet.

BLOOMFIELD HILLS — An exhibit entitled "No Place to Play" is now open to the public at Cranbrook Institute of Science.

The exhibit is composed of photographs, charts and maps which demonstrate what is happening to the open lands, lakes and rivers and indicates where and how help may be obtained in saving "some place to play."

Sun Prevalled in September

September favored Oakland County residents with sunshine and balmy breezes. Bright or filtered sun warmed the countryside 22 of the months 30 days.

The remaining eight days dumped a total of 2.5 inches of rainfall in showers, drizzles and a one-inch rainstorm the afternoon and evening of Sept. 20.

This compares to last September's 1.73 inches of rainfall. In August rainfall totaled 23.39 inches.

Mean temperature reading for the month was 62.3 compared to 64.4 in the same month a year ago and a mean of 74.9 last month.

NORMAL RAINFALL

Normal rainfall for September is 2.44 inches with the normal mean temperature 65.1.

The lowest thermometer reading for the month was 40 on the 24th with the high of 90 reached Sept. 2.

The greatest single day temperature variance 30 degrees occurred on Sept. 16 when the temperature fell from a high of 71 to a low of 41 and on Sept. 18 when it plunged from 79 to 49.

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Take Proper Precaution When Leaving Your Vacation Home

It's a sad day when the family takes leave of the vacation home. It's back to job, schools, the other house.

But it may be sadder when you return next year if you do not make needed repairs. Closing up the second house is more than just baiting down the hatches. Many people buy these homes as retirement homes. Then they can have a party and burn the mortgage.

But second house repairs are delayed year after year. Another time "We'll do it next spring," or "we'll get back here sometime next winter," say those who notice problems but want to relax on the big vacation.

Some people do not notice little things that can build up. Fewer get back to the chores and when next vacation season rolls around, it'll be made do again for another season. That's one way to let a house deteriorate. Time was when a vacation house was an old beat-

up dwelling that the family used for roughing it. They just battered around in it until it fell apart.

The new trend is to vacation homes with more conveniences for the leisure life—dishwashing machines, freezers, swimming pools, saunas. These investments are well worth the upkeep.

The time to take stock of disrepair is before you leave the house at the end of summer, painful though it may be.

But a two-home owner must consider himself a twin handyman, unless he can afford help. It isn't easy to get local help during vacation months when everyone else has the same idea.

MAKE A LIST
But you can make a list for the local handyman and caretaker so that everything will be put in order before winter winds howl.

The same check-up that is given your first home periodically must be given to the second.

Check the roof. If shingles blew off last winter, and there was little rain, it may not have mattered this vacation time.

But if there is lots of precipitation next winter, and more shingles rot or disappear in a storm, you may find floors, walls and furnishings ruined from leaks.

It's worth an inspection crawl on the roof. Gutters, downspouts, fireplaces should be checked. Chimneys should be cleaned if they've had a big cooking workout.

Loose window panes should be repaired and faulty door locks replaced. Make a list of things that need to be done when you get back. If you are equipped with paint or preservatives when you return next year, the job may get off the ground.

PLUMBING PROBLEMS
Resolve plumbing problems before you take leave of the house, and call plumbers before the house-closing rush sets in.

Second homes scheduled to be retirement homes are usually in less isolated areas than vacation homes. Older people

want to be near stores, doctors, hospitals. Even if you are in one of these well populated areas, you should inform the police that you are leaving the vacation spot, and where they can reach you in case of emergency.

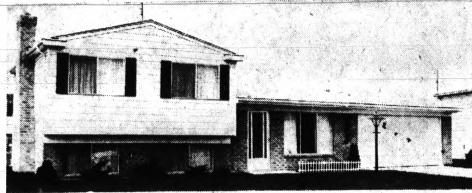
Find new homes for animals adopted while on vacation or take the animals with you when you leave the temporary house.

Many little cats and dogs come home for an expected dinner only to find that the city slickers have flown the coop with food and affection. It is cruel.

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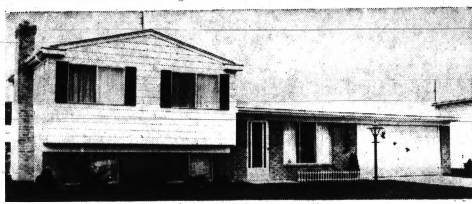
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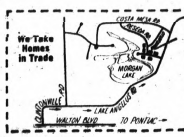
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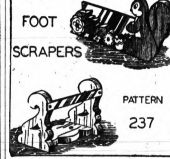
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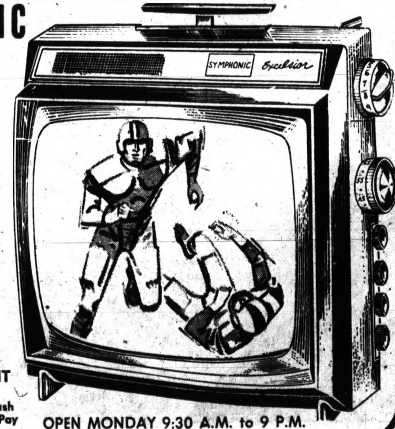
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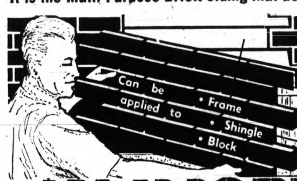
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
