Professor Halvor N. Christensen, a leading authority on membrane transport, will present a Sigma Xi science lecture at Oakland University Tuesday, November 20.

The 8:00 p.m. address on "Amino Acid Transport Across Biological Membranes" is in Room 200, Dodge Hall. It is sponsored by the OU members of Sigma Xi. Sigma Xi is the national society for the encouragement of scientific research.

Christensen is a professor of biological chemistry and former chairman of that department at the University of Michigan. Among his many honors are a Guggenheim Fellowship at Carlsberg Laboratory in Copenhagen, Denmark, and appointment as a Nobel Guest Professor at the University of Uppsala, Uppsala, Sweden.

**AWARD WINNER VAUGHN
DIRECTS ADA PRODUCTION**

Author-director Stuart Vaughan, who directed George C. Scott in "Richard III" at the New York Shakespeare Festival, is now at Oakland University directing the Academy of Dramatic Art's Studio Company in its production of "Richard III." The play opens Friday, Nov. 30, in the Studio Theatre, Varner Hall and it runs three weekends, Dec. 1 and 2, Dec. 6, 7, 8 and 9 and Dec. 13, 14 and 15. Curtain is 8:15 nightly, Sundays, 6:30 p.m.

Vaughan who was born and educated in Indiana, had a Fulbright grant to England in 1949-50, enabling him to work with over 20 British repertory theatres, including Stratford-on-Avon and the Bristol Old Vic.

Then, after stints as an actor in regional theatres and on and off-Broadway, he started directing.

In 1956, Joseph Papp asked him to direct the first outdoor productions of the N.Y. Shakespeare Festival, and he continued as artistic director there for four seasons.

Most recently, he directed the world premiere of his second play "Ghost Dance" produced by the Trinity Square Repertory Company at the Lederer Theatre, Providence, R.I. In addition to Scott, he has directed such stars as Lillian Gish, Florence Reed, Hal Holbrook and June Havoc..

**OU HAS INTERNSHIP
PROGRAM WITH HOSPITALS**

Oakland University has signed an internship affiliation agreement with Schools of Medical Technology at four Oakland County Hospitals.

The affiliation between OU and Pontiac General, Providence, St. Joseph Mercy, and William Beaumont Hospitals provides a fourth-year hospital internship each year for qualified OU medical technology students.

In addition, an affiliation agreement has been signed between OU and Crittenton Hospital where a medical technology program is being planned. The Crittenton program, when opened, will give OU a total of 58 internship possibilities spread among the five hospital schools.

Dr. Moon J. Pak, chairman of the OU Interdepartmental Committee on the Health Sciences, said the affiliation is the result of negotiation between OU and the hospitals through the Oakland Health Education Program. The O.H.E.P. is a county-wide hospital consortium to centralize the health education programs in Oakland County and to place them under a single comprehensive planning body. OU is a member of the O.H.E.P.

Oakland University began offering a four-year B.S. degree in medical technology this fall. Six continuing students and 36 new students have already enrolled in the program. The first three years are spent in study on campus and the fourth year at a hospital school of medical technology. Entrance to the hospital program is by application.

Medical technology is one of four programs of study in the allied health professions begun at OU this fall. Others are medical physics, health-medical behavioral sciences, and environmental health technology.
