GERALDENE FELTON NAMED NURSING DEAN

The appointment of Dr. Geraldene Felton as professor of nursing and dean of Oakland University's new School of Nursing was approved Tuesday, November 26 by the Oakland University Board of Trustees. Her appointment becomes effective December 1, 1974.

Frederick W. Obear, academic vice president and provost, said the new dean will direct final planning for the B.S.N. program that the university plans to offer in the fall of 1975. Some 300 students have already enrolled for a year of pre-nursing study at the institution.

"Dr. Felton's extensive record as a nursing educator and practitioner, researcher and administrator is exceptionally strong," Obear said. "Nursing appears to be one of our programs with the widest student interest and I now feel confident that we have a capable dean to guide the development of that program."

Nationally known in nursing education and nursing research, Dr. Felton who is a Lieutenant Colonel in the U.S. Army Nurse Corps is presently research nurse and deputy director of the Division of Nursing, Walter Reed Army Institute of Research, Washington, D.C., and clinical associate professor at Georgetown University School of Nursing. Before going to Walter Reed, she was research assistant at Wayne State University, Detroit, Michigan, and an assistant and associate professor at the University of Hawaii School of Nursing in Honolulu, on special assignment from the Army Nurse Corps. She was also staff nurse and anesthetist at the St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital in Pontiac from 1956 to 1960.

Dr. Felton was born in Norfolk, Virginia, received her primary and secondary education in Philadelphia, PA., and a diploma in nursing from Mercy Hospital, Philadelphia. She has a doctorate in education (1969) from New York University, a master of science (1962) and a bachelor of science degree (1960), both in nursing and both from Wayne State University.

She is a Charter Fellow of the Academy of Nursing and member of the Joint Committee of the American Nurses' Association Council on Nursing Research and the Commission on Nursing. Formerly, she was a member of the Board of Directors of the American Journal of Nursing Company, Vice-Chairperson of WCHEN, Consultant to Regional Medical Programs, and secretary of the Hawaii Nurses' Association. She is a member of the Manuscript Review Panel of the Journal of Nursing Research. She has authored many articles and published proceedings. Presently, she is engaged in several collaborative research projects, serves as technical advisor on films on patient teaching and acts as a consultant in nursing education, nursing research, evaluation, and quality appraisal.

O'DOWD ENDORSES PROJECT UNITY

President O'Dowd issues the following statement regarding Project Unity, a student-sponsored project to raise funds, food and clothing for needy families in the local community:

Project Unity hopes to raise \$3,000 to assist four community agencies in their holiday programs to aid needy families. The agencies are the Oakland County Association for Retarded Citizens, the Pontiac Area Urban League, the Oakland County Family Services, and Oakland County Big Brothers -- Big Sisters. COYLE ACCEPTS EMPLOYMENT RELATIONS POST

John B. Coyle, veteran personnel director, labor arbitrator and teacher, has been named director of employment relations at Oakland University.

The 54-year-old Coyle has had extensive experience in all facets of the employment relations field. He held a number of executive positions with the Burroughs Corporation during the 1950's, and from 1961-72 served as vice president for personnel and industrial relations for Al Green Enterprises, a national corporation in the food service industry.

Coyle has taught in the fields of personnel and management at the University of Detroit, Michigan State University, Macomb County Community College, and at the Lawrence Institute of Technology.

William Sturner, assistant president for administrative affairs, said Coyle was "an extremely competent professional, well-qualified to give leadership to the many complex and challenging aspects of university employment relations. We are delighted to have attracted a person of John Coyle's talent and background to the university."

As director of employment relations, Coyle will coordinate the responsibilities of personnel recruitment and training, wage and salary administration, labor relations, affirmative action, benefit programs, and personnel records.

During his career Coyle has served in both private industry and the public sector as an arbitrator, fact finder and impartial chairman of arbitration panels in compulsory police and fireman contract arbitration.

Since 1972, he has been on arbitration panels of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, the National Mediation Board, the American Arbitration Association, and the Michigan Employment Relations Commission.

Coyle holds the B.A. and M.B.A. degrees from the University of Detroit. He is the author of numerous professional articles and three books on personnel, salary administration and labor relations. Among his memberships are the American Society for Personnel Administration, Industrial Relations Research Corporation, American Arbitration Association, and the Society of Professionals in Dispute Resolution. Coyle resides in Detroit.

OU COMPLIES WITH PRIVACY ACT

President O'Dowd has announced that the university will comply with the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. There are, he noted, some legal uncertainties on the application of the law to confidential documents. The university is awaiting legal clarification and guidelines from the Secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare regarding such documents. During the interim period, procedures will be developed for the implementation of the act.

The 17 faculty members have concluded their probationary contract periods and now receive a continuing contract with the university. The probationary period leading to a tenure appointment is normally six years.

GIFTS AND GRANTS
TOTAL \$307,704

The Oakland University Board of Trustees accepted \$307,704 in gifts and grants during its Tuesday, November 26 meeting on campus.

The funds have been received by the university since the board's Monday, Sept. 30 meeting.

The largest single grant was one of \$123,357 from the Wayne County Juvenile Facility Network Program to support the university's Oakland Prep School. The school is designed to enable high school dropouts to complete secondary education and to enter a college or university. The school at 7001 Burlingame in Detroit is operated under the aegis of OU's Urban Affairs Center.

Two grants totaling \$52,284 were received from the National Institutes of Health. The first for \$31,858 supports research on "Hormonal Control of 2u Globulin Synthesis in Liver," under project director Arun K. Roy, Department of Biological Sciences. The second for \$20,426 supports research on the "Use of the Moire Technique to Measure Corneal Topography." Project director is Joseph Der Hovanesian, School of Engineering.

The Atomic Energy Commission approved two grants to OU faculty members. V. Everett Kinsey, Institute of Biological Sciences, received \$19,795 for research on "Biochemical Studies on the Ocular Lens in Relation to Cataractogenesis," and Michael Sevilla, Department of Chemistry, received \$16,161 for his project entitled "A Mechanism for Radiation Damage in DNA." Sevilla also received \$5,500 from the American Chemical Society for research on "Hydrocarbon Anion Protonation Reactions."

The U.S. Office of Education made a \$19,761 grant to the university to be used in support of its "Veterans Cost of Instruction Program" under direction of Manuel Pierson, dean for Student Services.
